Cables

París, 26.—Le Temps publica el siguiente despacho de Constantinopla. Después de verificarse hoy la segunda reunión de Ministros, dice que Turquía responderá, bajo reserva, á las potencias, aceptando sus demandas relativas á Macedonia. Consienten en que ejerzan control financiero en forma modificada á fin de no perjudicar el prestigio de Turquía.

Londres, 25.—Dice el Standard que en caso que el Sultán no cumpla con la demanda de las potencias, las potencias aliadas se apoderarán primero de la Aduana de Mylittine. Si esto no fuese eficaz, será ocupado Lemnos y bloqueados los dardanelos. Agrega el Standard que cree que el Emperador Guillermo, á la solicitud que le dirigió el Sultán, de intervenir á su favor, fué una enfática amonestación de aceptar la última nota de las potencias.

Tokio, 25.—Un testigo presencial de los motines habidos en Vladivostok, que llegó á Moji, dice que cuando salió de Vladivostok, el 20 de noviembre, los motines se habían suspendido, pero en las calles quedaban montones de escombros y por donde quiera habían manchas de sangre. Quedaban muchos cadáveres sin sepultura. Hubo poca existencia de comestibles, debido á la destrucción de las bodegas. Calcula que la base de comestibles que había era para dar á vasto á la población por veinte días.

Tokio, 25.—Se anuncia que dentro de 15 días se levantará el embargo contra los extranjeros, quienes desean visitar Puerto Arturo, para investigar la condición de su propiedad abandonada á causa de la guerra.

Habana, 25.—Anoche decomizó la policía 50 rifles Remington en una casa que está situada cerca de San Juan Martínez, provincia de Pinar del Río. En la misma casa se hallaban 50 personas conspirando contra el Gobierno, doce fueron capturados. En ésta se ha arrestado á Julián Cruz, prominente residente de Pinar del Río. Será llevado á dicha provincia para juzgarle por complicidad en el movimiento antigubernativo.

Londres, 25. Hoy se efectuó en ésta una ceremonia muy interesante. Doce oficiales del buque escuela "General Baquedano" visitaron Abadía de Westminster y colocaron sobre la tumba de Colcherrane una ancla formada de flores. También asistió el Ministro de Chile.

Petersburgo, 25.— Los diarios publican los detalles del movimiento agrario, que ha tomado enormes dimensiones. El movimiento es enteramente independiente de la política, siendo el único Norte de los aldeanos la adquisición de más terrenos. Pocas veces apelan á la violencia, excepto cuando los hacendados ofrecen resistencia á sus demandas: en tales casos se les quema las casas y se les amenaza con las vidas. Los aldeanos se posesionaron de gran cantidad de ganado, granos &c. En muy pocos casos la tropa se opone. En Parisoglibesk los soldados dispararon contra los aldeanos, matando á cien é

hiriendo á muchos. El movimiento abarca 24 provincias. Muchos propietarios se vieron obligados á huir, abandonando todo.

Londres, 25.—El Corresponsal del Times ha tratado de confirmar los feos rumores del descontento entre la tropa de guarnición de Petersburgo, que preocupa mucho, según se dice, al nuevo Comandante en Jefe, Gran Duque Nicholasvitch. Dice el corresponsal lo siguiente: "Un oficial de la guardia me dijo: es inútil negar que la intervención de los obreros á favor de los amotinados de Cronstadt ha tenido un efecto deplorable sobre la moral del soldado. Estamos haciendo todo lo posible en el sentido de frustrarlo, mediante la estricta vigilancia de los cuarteles y la disminución de licencias ó permisos de ausiliarse. No obstante, reina mucha ansiedad en otros oficiales con quienes he hablado, se expresan más pesimistas todavía, pues temen que algunos regimientos puedan pasarse en masa á las filas de los obreros, si acaso éstos se declaran otra vez en huelga, cuando se publiquen las sentencias contra los amotinados de Cronstadt. El duque Nicholasvitch está investigando el origen de las cartas escritas al Rus por oficiales del Ejército, protestando contra los ultrajes cometidos el 1º de este mes.

Panamá, 25.—El jueves comenzó á regir en ésta el servicio de policía, basado en el reglamento de la Nueva York. Los policías están bajo la dirección de instructores americanos.

Kursk, 25.— Los desórdenes agrarios en el distrito de Sulzha son violentísimos. Las tropas son impotentes para dominarlos. El Norte del distrito está en manos de los agrarios que se emplean en el saqueo de casas rurales y quemando las cosechas del gran duque Vladimir. En los distritos de Jurieff y Alexandrosk los agrarios piden la entrega de los víveres, amenazando incendiar todas las ciudades y saquear las tesorerías provinciales. En Pernan, durante la misa, un gran grupo de socialistas asaltaron la iglesia y echaron del púlpito al sacerdote. Los asistentes huyeron.

Atenas, 25.— Hoy á medio día zarparon del Pireo las flotas de la Gran Bretaña, Francia, Italia, Austria y Rusia, llevan órdenes selladas. Los torpederos británicos y franceses permanecen en ésta; servirán como correos para la tropa internacional. No existe la menor duda sobre el resentimiento de los turcos, por la rectitud de los gabinetes europeos. Aun entre aquellos que sinceramente desean el establecimiento de las reformas, expresan la esperanza de que el Sultán hará resistencia. Este sentimiento es fuerte especialmente fuerte, constante, contra Rusia que padece los dolores de los revolucionarios, producido por siglos de opresión y cuyo Gobierno desempeña el papel principal, al obligar á Turquía á establecer las reformas. Turquía se expresó sarcásticamente con respecto á la opinión de que las potencias podían haber empleado con mejor provecho las flotas enviándolas á Odessa, para impedir las partidas de ju

Cablegrams

JAPAN

Tokio, 25.—An eye witness of the revolts in Vladivostok has arrived at Moji, he says that when he left Vladivostok on 20th November the revolts had ceased but the streets were full of debris and blood stains were everywhere, many corpses were still unburied, there was a very limited stock of food owing to the destruction of the storehouses, it was calculated that there was just enough to last 20 days.

It is announced that within 15 days the prohibition against the entry of foreigners to Port Arthur for the purpose of looking after their properties abandoned during the war will be raised.

CUBA

Havana, 25.—The police confiscated 50 Remington rifles in a house near San Juan Martinez in the province of Pinar del Rio, in the same house were 50 persons conspiring against the Government, 12 of them were captured. Julian Cruz a prominent resident of Pinar del Rio has been arrested here. He will be taken to Pinar del Rio to be tried for complicity in the movement against the Government in that province.

RUSSIA

St. Petersburg, 25.—The papers are publishing details of the agrarian movement which has assumed enormous proportions, the movement is entirely independent of politics, the sole motive of the peasants being the acquisition of more lands. They very seldom resort to violence except when the estate owners oppose their demands; in such cases they burn the houses and threaten their lives. The peasants have obtained possession of a great quantity of cattle grain etc. They seldom oppose the troops. In Porisogliebsk the soldier fired on the peasants killing 100 and wounding many others, the movement is spread over 24 provinces, many proprietors are obliged to flee abandoning their possessions.

London, 25.—The correspondent of the Times has tried to confirm the ugly rumours relative to the discontent prevailing among the troops of the St Petersburg garrison which it is said is greatly troubling the new Commander in Chief Grand Duke Nicholas. The correspondent writes as follows. An officer of the Guard said to me. 'It is useless to deny the fact that the intervention of the working men on behalf of the Cronstadt revolt has had a most deplorable effect on the morals of the soldier we are doing all we can to counteract this bad effect by means of strict vigilance in the garrisons and curtailment of leave of absences etc. Great anxiety however prevails'. Other officers with whom I have spoken express still more pessimistic views. They think that several regiments may go over in a body to the workingmen should they again declare a strike when the sentences of the Cronstadt mutineers is made public Grand Duke

Nicholaievitch is investigating the origin of letters written to the "Russ" by officers of the army protesting against the outrages committed on the 1st inst.

GREAT BRITAIN

London, 25.—The "Standard" says that should the Sultan not comply with the demands of the Powers the allied fleet will first seize the Custom House at Mitylene, but should this not prove efficacious they will occupy Lemnos and blockade the Dardanelles.

The "Standard" adds that it believes that the reply of Emperor William to the Sultan's request to intervene on behalf of Turkey, was an emphatic exhortation to accept the conditions of the last note of the Powers.

An interesting ceremony took place here, 12 officers of the training ship "General Baquedano" visited Westminster Abbey and placed an anchor of flowers on Cochranes tomb. The Chilean Minister also assisted at the ceremony.

FRANCE

Paris, 26.—"Le Temps" publishes a dispatch from Constantinople saying that after the second meeting of the Minister which took place to-day Turkey will reply to the note of the Powers accepting under reserve their demands relative to Macedonia. She will consent to their exercising financial control but in a modified manner in order that Turkish prestige may not be affected.

PANAMA

Panamá, 25.—The police force here organized on Thursday on the basis of the New York service they are under an American instructor.

RUSSIA

Kursk, 25.—The agrarian agitations in the district of Subzha are most virulent, the troops are powerless to dominate them. The northern part of the district is in the hands of the agrarians who are occupied in sacking the houses of the rural populations and burning the grain crops of Duke Vladimir. In the district of Jurieff and Alexandroosk the agrarians are demanding the delivery to them of the food supply threatening to burn all the cities and to loot the provincial treasuries. In Perman during mass a group of Socialists attacked the church ejecting the priest from the pulpit. The congregation fled from the church.

Vladivostok, 26.—The evacuation of Manchuria by 322000 men and 400 gus will take a year.

Warsaw.—The Governor General has addressed a confidential circular to the military governors ordering them to consider the agitators and revolters as insurrectionists and to exterminate them by shooting and to dissolve all political meetings by force of arms. He incites them to use their utmost energy. The professors of the suburbs here telegraph that the police expelled them from the schools in the districts of Radonk Saivulki Protrikow and Voukowitz at the point of the revolver, the

agrarian disorders are increasing. Revolutionary bands are scouring the cities burning the religious edifices schools and public Russian buildings.

In Radom the peasants are cutting down the forest trees.

Petersburg, 26.—The "Russ" says. It is evident that the reactionaries are preparing a propaganda in favour of absolutism the Judge of Kieff says that 100 facts point to the connivance of the police in the massacres. Advices from Batoum state that the second chief of Police has been seriously wounded by a revolver shot, the assassin escaped.

Warsaw, 26.—Fifty officers attempted to hold a secret meeting they were discovered and arrested.

GRECE

Athens, 25.—The fleets of Great Britain, France, Italy, Austria and Russia sailed from the Piræus to-day under sealed orders. The British and French torpedo boats will remain here. They will serve as dispatch boats for the international fleet. There is not the slightest doubt as to Turkey's resentment of the attitude of the European Cabinets. The number of those desiring reform is increasing the hope is expressed that the Sultan will offer resistance. This spirit of resentment is specially directed against who, in spite of her internal difficulties caused by centuries of oppression is foremost in the movement to force Turkey to establish reforms.

Turkey sarcastically expresses the opinion that the Powers might have employed their fleets to better advantage by sending them to Odessa to prevent the Jewish massacres instead of making a demonstration in Turkish waters. It is clearly evident that if the Sultan should decide to defy Europe he would be supported with enthusiasm by the whole nation. On the other hand His Majesty knows that sooner or later he will have to fight to maintain his dominion over Macedonia and it would be difficult to find a better chance than at present with Russia powerless and Austria so weakened that she could not very likely interfere.
