The 9th of August, 1902, is yet fresh to the memory of millions when the illustrious King Edward VII. of revered memory was proclaimed King and Emperor by the Empire's millions. May 6, 1910 brought the sweet wail of "The King is dead!" But the formality of State and the necessity of the occasion betrayed the shout "Long live the King!" This day, June 22nd, of the year of our Lord 1911, is made historically eventful by the crowning of George V. and Mary V. Let Britishers in Port Limon, let Britishers the world around, let all well-wishers of the British people and let the foe sink to rise no more, his animosity to throns and nation, and unify his voice and heart to swell the shouts: "Long live the King! God bless the Queen!"

Cable to the King.
It has been arranged to send a cable message to His Britanic Majesty which in all probability will reach him at Westminster at the moment of his coronation (which is five and a half hours difference between here and London).

TWO PROCLAMATIONS BY THE KING.
We are able to give full details of the musical service that will form part of the Coronation ceremonial in Westminster Abbey on June 22.
The order of the service and the selection of music were approved by the King at a meeting of the Privy Council recently. The choice made by Sir Frederick Bridge received the unqualified approval of his Majesty.

Today being Coronation Day we have given a holiday to the staff so that they may avail themselves the opportunity of showing their patriotism. Our next number will be on Saturday.

It consists of two strips each nine feet wide and one 153 feet and the other 76 feet long. These will be laid from the Abbey entrance up the aisle, and between the transcripts to form the letter T. Underneath and covering the rest of the Abbey floor will be 600 square yards of plain carpet of a deep royal blue.

The foundation of the designed carpet is of the same shade, and the pattern, in a blue of the tint of the Order of the Garter, consists of an interlacing of laurels bound together with ribbon. In the spaces formed by the laurel design and running down the centre of the strip are alternate devices of the stars of the three principal orders, the Garter, the Thistle and the Order of St. Patrick. Alternating with these is an elaborate scheme of the Tudor rose, thistle and shamrock intertwined.

Along the right and left sides respectively recurat intervals the initials G. and M. surmounted by the imperial crown. The three national emblems occur once more along the borders. The total length of the pattern is some twenty feet.

How peculiar is the irony of fate which made Prince George who carried away Albert Victor who since January 1892 sleeps in death. But let us be consoled that "The Almighty God reveith it to who discover He will!"

TWO BANK HOLIDAYS.
The proclamation of Coronation Day, June 22, as a Bank Holiday in the United Kingdom, and of June 23, the day of the Royal progress, as a Bank Holiday in the County of London, is made in the following terms:—
BY THE KING.
A PROCLAMATION.
For appointing Thursday, June 22, and Friday June 23, Bank Holidays and Public Holidays throughout the United Kingdom and in the County of London, respectively.
GEORGE R. I.
WE, considering that it is desirable that Thursday, the 22nd day of June next, being the occasion of the Solemnity of Our Royal Coronation, and Friday, the 23rd day of June next, being the day of Our Royal Progress through the Chief City of our Empire, should be observed as Bank Holidays and as Public Holidays throughout the United Kingdom, and in the County of London, respectively, in pursuance of the provision of "The Bank Holidays Act, 1871," "The Holidays Extension Act, 1875," "The Customs Consolidation Act, 1878," "The Revenue Offices Scotland Holidays Act, 1887," Do hereby by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Acts aforesaid, so far as the same are severally applicable, appoint Thursday, the 22nd day of June next, being the occasion of the said Solemnity of Our Royal Coronation, and Friday, the 23rd day of the same being the day of Our said Royal Progress, as special days to be observed as Bank Holidays and as Public Holidays throughout the United Kingdom, and in the County of London, respectively, under and in accordance with the said Acts, and we do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said days to be observed, and all Our loving subjects to order themselves accordingly. Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this twenty-second day of March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and in the first year of Our Reign.

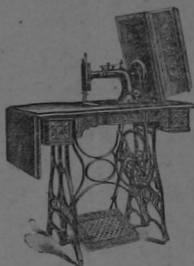

His Majesty King George V.



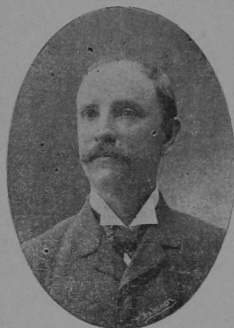
Her Majesty Queen Mary.

THE birth and life of King George V. is quite a familiar one to many, and does not need any artful skill and stratagem to explain. His life has been free and open for all men to see, and indeed he is deserving of great honor and admiration.

He first saw light at Marlborough House on June 3rd, 1865. His birth followed that of his elder brother, the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale, who died nineteen years ago, and whose death gave way to the throne to George V. From an early age the present King was destined for the navy. At the age of 12 he entered as a cadet on board the "Britannia," where he served two years leaving the ship with honor. The King received his tuition from the venerable Captain Dalton. He received his first command in 1890 when he was given charge of the "Thrush," then on the West India station; he became very popular, both with his officers and crew.

By his special request, he was allowed to take command of the "Melampus," a protected cruiser, in the naval manoeuvres of 1892. This was his last command, and tears were seen in his eyes when he was leaving the ship.

The then Duke of York, the present King of England, was betrothed to his cousin, the much beloved "Princess May." The marriage ceremony was performed in the Chapel Royal, St. James, on July 6th, 1893. It was the occasion of great national rejoicing.

LIKE the King, Queen Mary is a Londoner, having been born in Kensington Palace on May 26th, 1867. Her father was the late Duke of Teck and her mother was the late Princess Mary of Cambridge. It was the custom at that time to give children—and especially to Royal children—a multitude of christian names, and those Her Majesty received numbered no fewer than eight—Victoria, Mary, Augusta, Louisa, Olga, Pauline, Claudine, Agnes. She quickly became known, however as Princess Mary.

She was in every respect a fine specimen of an English baby girl. The first two years of her life were passed at Kensington Palace. Here Queen Mary passed some of the happiest days of her life. Her home was a very simple one, and there was no domestic duty with which she was not given practical acquaintance. Her mother was a firm believer in the "simple life" for her daughter who consequently was but rarely seen in the social world until she was on the verge of womanhood. Princess May quickly became known to the people in the neighbourhood of White House, and her many acts of childish kindness and charity are still gratefully remembered there. When it was announced in 1891, that she was to be married to the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale, there was considerable rejoicing all over the country. Her betrothal was destined to have a terrible tragic sequel as her lover died after a short illness.
