RICH LIGHT FACE With the Druids Obituary

Photic trains and "Garden dances", vwho said vve omitted them? Not a bit of it. Our sporting facilities was sharpened and vwhy should vve have left our pet amusements? Why some of us sandwiched in a "peti carroussel" right in between the big one, but Limonites kept their place and vvvell stand for no rivaling, so those folks had to do theirs at Siquieres and be satisfied.

Yes, you hit it, you thought vve had forgotten them. Not a bit of it. Hovv could vve? When the fact stares us in the face that they were the "debutantes" of the season. Lots of people had lots of fun out of them, and they had lots of fun out of lots of people.

But let us look on the other side of the sheet. There we find that simultaneously with the "peti carroussel" came the Company's retrenchments, reductions of force or vwhat is so humorously termed in Costa Rican vernacular "cortando rabos", and other economic measures of all class and conditions, naturally affecting the vvhole province, but especially the laboring class. We are the only source of money circulation, and vvvell every body just decided to have a good time, leaving things as usual to take care of themselves.

The Municipality planned the road to Moín, and to the Cemetery. They also planned a "Bathing resort". If these enterprises should be carried into effect, they would not alone release the tension on the labour proposition to a certain extent, but they would place in Limon some enticement for the Tourists, vvhich would result probably slowly but surely beneficial to the Province. As it is there is nothing to entertain the tourists, novv consequently they pass through vvvit out even knowing Limon. Something should be done by the Municipality, the leading merchants and other men of enterprise so as to advertise Limon

and to increase the attractive appearance vvhich the paving of the streets and other improvements in sanitation has given it. . . We were wondering that as the bottom has nearly dropped out of the Banana Business, could not some of our brawny and brainy farmers use their surplus bananas for fattening pigs on a larger scale than has been customary. We notice quite an importation of Lard in the country. Why could not Limon supply some of this Lard even for Local consumption. Eggs and Chickens are supplied to Limon from the Interior, and during the Railroad interruption last year they were imported from the United States. Could Limon not supply enough chickens and eggs even for her own consumption?

What about a venture in Corn? This is just the season for trying out some beans vvhich can be harvested within three months, just exactly in the real vvvam summer. Why fold our arms and mope? Novv is the opportunity for men to show vvvhat they are made of. All these things need a bit of innovation, but that's only for a short time. Remember the old saying "NOTHING TRIED NOTHING DONE". Take opportunity of the facile possibilities. As occupied the lands in that vicinity. Novv is the time to turn "RIGHT ABOUT FACE".

Our Changes and our Prospects in 1930

The year 1930 has dawned upon us and there does not exist a man capable of thinking who has not had his prognostications pro and con, as to the possibilities or non possibilities of prosperity which might follow in the trail of events which must be the results of the different changes that shall take place in the world during this year.

Here in Costa Rica we have been looking forward to great changes in the marketing of our produce which might lead up to a very great wave of prosperity in our Agricultural lines but by one stroke of the pen conditions have been so changed, that instead of prosperity we are staring face to face at the greatest adversity that could possibly befall a Nation. In 1928, every farmer was encouraged to go forward in the planting and caring of his crops, in 1929 it was all the same, go ahead 1930 we are going to have a great change, our Concessions will soon be up and by the great change to follow we shall have competition in our Industries, we shall get better prices for our goods, labour will be more satisfied and everybody will be contented and happy; but while we are thinking to benefit by these changes some one else is also thinking. Our greatest benefactor on whom we are thinking to throw our backs is also thinking. The United Fruit Coy. secures an immense tract of land in Jamaica through the purchase of the Lindo Estates; she secures vast territories in Panama, Honduras and Guatemala and last but not least she dominates the activities of The Cuyamel Fruit Coy. *«on whom rested our Hopes»* in Nicaragua and the foreign markets, and we realize now that not only this year, but for the next five years she is thoroughly independent of Costa Rica and territory, therefore instead of needing a Concession she will have to concede something to us; for by cutting out all appropriations for 1930, as we are very confidently informed, those of us who have been relying on the advice of betterment by the coming changes find ourselves in the condition of begging to be conceded to, because all those Contracts that expire in 1930 to 1932 what shall happen if those farmers are not conceded an extension of their Contracts? Are they not liable to be told we don't need your fruit or I will buy your fruit for thirty cents? However we are among those who believe that changes must come and now it is time for a reverse change. The U. F. Co. has been the means of inducing thousands of West Indians, Europeans and Americans here to join in the ranks of the Army of their Suppliers and they will not allow those people to suffer in the catastrophe we can see ahead of us if the Coy, so desired, but we know they are not so desirous, they realize that there are people here who have been and are still faithful to their foreigner as well as natives, therefore it must be considered that since there are to be found *seven faithful souls the City shall be saved*, it is therefore the time now that all our small cultivators ought to continue and planting their crops, for the Coy will realize that she is responsible for our being here, and change the existing conditions, so in the meantime we must advise all farmers to continue caring their farms to meet the change, for there are immense changes for this year, for instance the most perplexing one is that there has been under Consideration for some time now the Changing of the Calendar, but it would involve such a gigantic alteration of all Calendar calculations, religious as well as Commercial that it had to be put in the hands of the League of Nations which Assembly has now issued Circulars to all the Nations of earth to approve of the move.

The idea is to divide the year in thirteen months of 28 days each, the extra month is to be inserted between June and July, June 17th will close the first six months of the year, and with 13 days, of June and the first 15 days of July will form the extra month which will be called the *month of Sun* from the fact that at this time the Sun passes through its Summer Solstice thus giving us instead of the 21st day of June the longest day of the year, the fourth day of Sol will be that day.

Of course this is a matter of very great consultation and discussion, as one may well imagine the enormous changing up in religious festivals as well as in Commercial life. There would be one great change once for all in our Almanacs etc. as it would thereafter simply be a continual repetition of the days and dates, so in printing alone it would mean a wonderful economy; in the United States it is Calculated as an economy of forty millions annually in printing establishments. There is no change that does not bring the human family some good altho we may not be able to understand it, hence we must be optimistic in all these changes for there is always the Silvery lining behind every dark cloud. The change in the Calendar will handicap the Printers for a moment, but that very change will compel them to think of some other industry to recuperate the value lost, as the Breweries and distilleries, but they soon broke out into other industries which has brought greater fortunes, so it will be in our case, we shall be led into greater thought as soon as we find ourselves with our backs against the Wall; a way out of our difficulty will soon be found.

The Chiriqui Lands Co.

To the Editor of the Searchlight.
Sir, when I left the Chiriqui Administrators over their concessions? Does the Boston office know what is taking place with the laborers in the C. L. Co? I went to Puerto Armales in the month of October 1928, to work, for said Coy but I thought I was going to a place where I could better my condition, but when I arrived and saw the conditions and class of wages, I realized that I could not live on the salary. I was there for one year and two months and only worked six months and two weeks. BUT WHY? Not because I did not want to work, but I just couldn't stand the salary that I was I was offered as Foreman of track who are the cause of all this? I will frankly say. The General Manager H. Blair and Superintendent of farms. Mr. Blair is not a man that can and will go by his own opinion, but by some one else. State, he believes, that the laborers are more walking around Puerto Armales without work, than those that are working.

To see the cruelty of the Co's officials, there are men sitting at the office, work, and yet they are having agents outside picking up and sending in men and women on every boat that's going from Panama to Pto. Armales. Is not that a shame? What are the laborers getting for their labour? Only 16, 20 C and a few getting 25C per hour for 8 and 9 hours per day; for one who is getting 25 C per day, 25 to 31 C per hour for the same 8 and 9 hours. What about the Commissary, are they cheap or reasonable to correspond with the salary? Oh no, things are to its height in prices.

There are reductions of salary, but not from prices, The Co. went so far as to stop peddlers from selling on their boundary. Is that right?

I stood and witness ed once or twice two men pay days at the Corredor and Esperanza and the men engineers for the dragline drew 700 dollars do you think that's right? and 200 per day for their helpers? only 25 p. h. for 8 hours and 200 per day. Men, men, consider before taking your trip to Chiriqui, a man who does not know life in the country, money, will give you place good land, but no, it is no good. I am a traveller of eleven republics, so suppose to know when a place is good and prosperous, and I would advise you not to go there. 100 men left on the boat I did, and I left 140 ready with their papers, to quit that place.

From the Panama Tribune of 24th Nov. we see the following:
Coloured adventists vote to quit white Leadership and form independent Body.
What promises to be a nationwide movement of colored members of the Seventh Day Adventist Church to withdraw from the General Conference of that denomination and white leadership was started last Wednesday evening when 900 angry members of the Harlem First Seventh Day Adventist Church, 17th West 131st street, threatened to forcefully eject white officials of the Greater New York Conference and the General Conference who came to press charges that would lead into the ousting of their pastor, Elder James K. Humphrey, 141 West 131st street, from the Conference.

The auditorium was crowded and adventists representing churches in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and Connecticut were present and participated in the proceedings outwardly showing their disapproval of the action of the church officials.

Charges against Rev. Humphrey involved his participation in real estate transactions which refer to plans to purchase a large tract of land in Atlantic Highlands, N. J. to be used as a Utopia Park where a sanitarium for colored adventists would be constructed and eventually a community established. The charges were embodied in a resolution drawn up and adopted by the Union Conference which includes the Atlantic States and approved by the Conference of the World. The conference voted to take the Elder's credentials and to bar him from further service until his pastor showed a disposition to refrain from further participation in the land project which they claimed to be a serious infraction of the church rules.

The dignitaries who sought the approval of the Union Conference members of Rev. Humphrey's congregation and who nearly suffered bodily harm

as a result of the attempt, had it not been for the timely interference of the Elder himself, at the special meeting called by them from that purpose Saturday evening, were Louis M. Diehl, president, and John K. McMillan, secretary of the Greater New York Conference; William Spicer, president, and C. K. Myers, secretary of the General Conference of the World.

After hearing the charges, pandemonium broke loose among the members who not only showed their resentment with hoots and jeers, but threatened to throw the outsiders out of the church. After quiet had been restored they voted unanimously to withdraw from the General Conference and to re-organize independently of white control.

In an interview with a New York News reporter at his home last Monday evening, Elder Humphrey who did not seem to be perturbed over the situation, declared, "There is more discrimination than in any other. They bar colored adventists from the schools and sanitariums and refuse to employ them in any of their institutions. I have been here 26 years. They think I have been here too long that I am urging my people to think for themselves and build their own institutions. The church over which I have charge, asked for the property which they hold. The Conference not only refused but took away my credentials and threw me out, on grounds that I purchased property for my people with our their consent".

The members of the First Seventh Day Adventist Church who lend the fight for their pastor and instigated the move for withdrawal were: Messrs: Morille Voodie, Edward Seely, Herbert Gauntlet, Enos Warren and Samuel Delaney. They all expressed great confidence in their Elder and promised to place his cause before the colored adventists all over the country and seek re-nomination on an independent demonstration.

The Pacific Bananas

Reports are showing that the Piris Farm Co., of Puntarenas is progressing steadily, and the class of Bananas is improving. In this month it is expected they will put 25,000 stems in the Californian market, the price, of which is now at the rate of 41 cents per lb. Private trade in the fruit bought at the coast since its own boat was bought, last month over 4,000 stems were bought at 55 cents per ope straight. The Pacific Road is transporting the fruit at fifteen cents per stem. They have several offers from European firms to transport the fruit to the Northern Markets.

Mr. Marcus Garvey's Seat

The seat on the Council of the Kingdom of St Andrews Corporation to which Mr. Marcus Garvey founder of The Universal Negro Improvement Association has been elected is causing much anxiety in legal circles.

The opinion of the Council's Solicitor Mr. H. M. Dunn was taken on the vexed question and he decided that the Council is not entitled to elect 30 of the Law art 1 (b) provides that if a person elected to corporate office is absent from 3 consecutive meetings without the leave of the Council he shall immediately become disqualified a case to hold office. He goes on to say that inasmuch as Section 34 of the law provides, that persons elected to the Corporate office, shall not be in the office until he has subscribed the oath of office, but this is an act to be performed by himself.

Mr. Dunn asked what would be the situation if the Council declared the seat vacant.

The Solicitor said an Election within 30 days after Mr. Dunn, and supposed Mr. Garvey goes to court to have the question of his seat tested?

The Solicitor. It is open to him to do so before the election of Mr. Simpson. But suppose the election comes off before the court gives its decision.

The Solicitor I think the Court will decide before the election.

Mr. Simpson said the issue involved was an important one, and he moved that the Council go into Committee to consider the matter fully.

Mr. Dunn here suggested there was no need for the Council going into Committee, and moved that The Council declare the seat vacant.

A heated debate arose, when Mr. Simpson showed the illegality and prejudice exhibited in the whole matter, he made an elaborate speech showing the damage the Council would be causing to representative institutions, pointing out that it was simply from prejudice against the Individual who in this was being done, but the people elected to the Council, if the Council went to the expense of another election, Marcus Garvey would certainly be elected again, for he said this prejudice is because many of you feel his Superiority over you. You may imbringe his body but you can never subjugate his brains.

And moved that the opinion of Council be taken on the matter for while he has the greatest respect for the Solicitor, he was not prepared to accept the dogma that his opinion should be the final word on the matter.

Which was adopted, and the matter was referred to Mr. N. W. Manley who is Counsel to the Corporation and whose advice is anxiously awaited.

Health Talk

Taenia Saginata (Unarmed, Fat, or Beef Tapeworm)

This is a longer and larger parasite than Taenia Solium. It may attain the length of 15 or 30 or even 60 feet. The head is larger than that of Taenia Solium. It is square-headed and provided with four large sucking disks, but there are no hooks. The ripe segments are from 1/4 to 1/2 in. length and from 1/2 to 3/4 in. breadth. The uterus or breeding section consists of a middle stem with from fifteen to thirty-five lateral branches which are given off in a more double formation than Taenia Solium. The eggs are much larger, and the shell thicker. The ripe segments are passed as in Taenia Solium and are ingested by cattle, in the flesh or organs of food, and sometimes found in man. The worms or CYSTICERCUS.

An other form of Tapeworm may be mentioned. Dipylidium Caninum A small kind very common in the dog and sometimes found in man. The larvae develop in the lice of the dog.

Himenolepis Diminuta—This small cestode was first found in the intestines of a child in Boston some years ago, and has since been found in many cases. It is common in rats. The larvae develop in Beetles. Hymenolepis (Taenia) is a rare form found in the States and in Italy. Taenia confusa. A new kind.

Di Bithirocephalus Latius. A form of Tapeworm found in southern Europe China and Japan, and in the vicinity of the great Lakes where the fish in these lakes, have become infested, as cases have increased in recent years. This parasite is large and long, measuring from twenty five to thirty or more feet. It is also called the Fish Tapeworm from the fact that it develops in the stomach of the pike and other fish. Development is also taken place in the flesh, head and other parts of the system of a large variety of fish.

Symptoms of Tapeworm Infection—Parasites are found in all ages. They are found in children and are sometimes found in sucklings. There are cases in which the Tapeworm has been found in infants of four or five days old. The first symptom may be the elimination of detached or disjointed segments, or the discovery of

the eggs in the stools by microscopic examinations. The patient may complain of pain anywhere in the abdominal cavity, nausea, diarrhea and sometimes colic. Sometimes the appetite is nervous. After eating the symptoms disappear, and are most prominent when the stomach and bowels are empty. In many cases the patient claims to feel the movement of the worm but this may be imagination. Many nervous conditions, such as convulsions, or epilepsy also The St. Vitus's dance are believed to be caused by Tapeworms.

The Dibothriocercus may cause a fatal form of anemia and in some cases hemorrhage.

Prevention. The prevention of prophilaxis is extremely important. Careful attention must be given to three points. First, all tapeworm segments must be destroyed in the water closets or not be thrown in the water closets or outside. Secondly, careful examination of meat and fish before cooking, and thoroughly cooking the meat or fish sufficiently to kill the Parasites.
