Political Movements

With the successful meeting called by the friends of Don Ricardo Jiménez in the Raventos Theatre on Friday last; his candidature coupled with the name of Don Manuel Castro Quesada was launched by an immense crowd of the most influential gentlemen of the land, pending the arrival to win the seat for don Ri-and aceptation of the act by cardo in 1924and which he cert-

The opponents of Don Ricardo, are putting up a most dangerous front, by a coalition of all the Partidos. That is, it is well known that no single candidate could run with any degree of success against him; hence the Carlista Republicans with don Carlos María liménez as Chief: the Partido Agrícola with don Alberto Echandi as chief; the Partido Regeneration with don Leon Cortés as chief; are deciding to formulate a great fusion and put forward a real strong young favourite such as Dr. Moreno Cañas or don León Cortés. It therefore looks as if our political campaign will be a very busy one. Don Alberto Echandi has always had a very good following in recent elections, and is considered as a very suitable man for Presidency, yet somehow has never been able to get on top with the voting: Don Carlos María Jiménez, a great supporter of Don Ricardo in campaign for 1924-28 was expected to win the seat in 1928-32 but Don Cleto González gave him the surprise of his life by his coalition with Genl. Volio's labour party.

His chances would have been good for this campaign of 1932-36 had he not go in a quarrel with don Ricardo because he did not help him against don Cleto González to win the seat; at the same time exposing the intrigues which he himself engineered ainly expected to be done for him when his time came. This of course lost him the confidence of the honest minded Republicanos, and split the party in tvvo, the majority of which being novy with don Ricardo as Jimenistas against

Don León Cortés came into prominence vvhen, as Min-ister of Public Works and Works and Agriculture, he displayed great zeal, preparation and honesty of purpose, just at the time when Don Carlos María, at the head of the opposition, was hacking to pieces the integrity of the manipulations of the present administration and when don Arturo Volio resigned as a consequence of the claim of the Simmons Co. against the Government for cancelling their contract, he claiming that don Cleto was in sides with don Luis Anderson the lavvyer for the Simmons Co. The advent of Ləón Cortés at this juncture, his most economic administration of the Department, highly satisfactory even to the opposition; then suddenly his break with the President on the unexpected arrival from Washington of don Manuel Castro Quesada our Minister

before the U.S. Government, made htm a martyr, and a great favourite for Presidency; but he is comparatively speaking a poor man, and not sur-rounded by the influential friends which happen to be the good fortune of the other candidates.

Therefore as soon as don Ricardo accepts his nomination, vehich vee expect veill be at an early date, the cam-paign veill burst forth in all quarters. With the votes being thus controlled by coalition, the Jimenistas vvill have to fight very hard for supremacy and it is being considered if don Ricardo does not accept the candidacy they vvill bring in his cousin don Ráfael Oreamuno.

The enemies of don Ricardo are canvassing against his age, meanyvhile his friends and infact the entire country are discussing his vvonderful povvers of vision, from the fact that in 1927 he told the country that if they did not accept the propsitions of the F. Co. for building the Río Frío-San Carlos Railvvay and developing the areas in that direction, that the country would be faced with great privations, and as he vvould not like to be a party to such lack of Judgment he

yvould rather find the yvay to his private residence, this advice, coupled with recent occurrences, as vvell as the six millions left by him in the Treasury, has turned all eyes (even those of his enemies) towards him as a great seer and the only likely Saviour for the country at this critical stage. And certainly vve too are thinking that at this moment vve cannot afford to experiment, vve need firm, honest minded experienced men to guide our destinies by repaying our foreign and internal debts, manipulating our Bonds to meet our immediate obligations, as vvell as the different monopolies being offered us, coupled with confiand influence in getting the U.F. Co. to so exploit our fruit areas as to bring our export capacity at least to vyhere vve vvere a decade

For these reasons it is expected that the Political vvizard viould be the only man vivho vvould fill the Bill just novv and it is hoped that so soon as he realizes that the country is willing to recompense. his past good services, by complete confidence in him, he will certainly declare himself at their disposal once again.

letter to which Mr. Petgrave refers, we must point out, that some time ago Mr. Pelgrave sent us, for publication, a most unjustly, slanderous ar-ticle against His Lordship Bishop Bunn of British Honduras and the utility of the Anglican Church, in regard to the Bishop having obtained, by his influence, the re-allot-ment, in favour of the school conducted by his denomina-tion, of a small subsidy by, the United Fruit Co. as a help toward educational work at Siquirres, which letter we re-fused to publish from many stand-points; primarily, because it contained a ridiculous comparison between the benefits derived by the community as a result of the operations of the Anglican Faith as against those of the Progressive Lodge, which Lodge was incidentally the loser of five dollars per month as ren-tal, by this decision of the U. F. Co. at the request of the Bishop. Just at this point and from the fact that Mr. Petgrave is endeavouring to make us appear ridiculously partial and one sided, one is tempted to ask-of the twelve years rental at \$5. per month paid by the U.F. Co. supposedly to the Progressive Lodge, how much has the poor Progressive ever got? devolving therefore as a personal inter est.

Secondarily we knew that His Lordship had nothing to do with the withdrawal of the subsidy, but rather that it was promulgated at the instance of Mr. Petgrave himself, in consequence of a row he engineered (unjustly) and carried out with the Teacher at a most

our previous article, the New Law for the Corporate area of Kingston and St. Andrew, Jamaica which came up for the 2nd. reading on the 5th. instant, has given rise to a great deal of discussion; the majority of the electives disagreed with many of the changes proposed, and suggested counter proposals which, but with a few minor exceptions, the government has, so far as the matter reached refused, to accept. Mr. George Seymour, the sitting member for the parish of St. Andrew, who has had much experience regarding municipal affairs, and is an ex-Mayor, has in consequence of the attitude of the government decided to abstain from taking part in the discussion.

The member for the parish of Clarendon—Mr. J. A. G. Smith-who has all along taken a very keen interest in this matter of the amalgamation, has also, in consequence of the Attorney General's disinclination to entertain certain of his suggestions, which be considered of vital importance, decided, that though he will not withdraw, to adopt an attitude which would afford the Attorney General no relief of his responsibility for the pro-visions brought foward. The Bill was still under discussion When the Council adjourned over the week end.

The New Corporation Law New Calendar proposed Prisoners to be

From time to time, within recent years suggestions have been made with the view of changing the system under which the calendar year, as we know it, is calculated, but no definite conclusions were ever arrived at. It appears, however, that a Committee of the League of Nations has been studying the matter and has formulated a plan, which is said to have already received the favourable consideration of various governments as well as Leaders of the Protestant and Greek Churches; and it is expected that the Catholie Church will fall into line.

The proposal is that, commencing from the 1st. of January 1934, the year should be divided into 13 months of 28 days each. The additional or 13th. month would be inserted between June and July and is recommended to be called «SOL»; the 365th. day of each year will not be attached to any month, but is be named «YEAR DAY» and observed as a bays and observed as a holiday in all countries. Similarly in leap years, the extra day will be placed at the end of June, named «LEAP DAY» and be a universal holiday.

Under this plan all church festivals would fall on fixed dates. Easter Day, for example, Would be Sunday, April 15th., and Christmas Day on Monday. December 23rd.

Court decides against President Banana Prices

Some four months ago President Machado of Cu-ba ordered the closing, for an indefinite period, of all the normal schools in the provinces of Havana and Matanzas, on account of the actions of the students against his government. The matter was taken to the Courts and the Supreme Court has now issued its ruling (agreed to by its thirteen members) that the decree of the President Was unconstitutional, as also the suspension from employment of the professors at these schools and the confiscation of their sala-

ries. It is said that the Court also gave indication of other unconstitutional acts by the President. The press in commenting on these rulings assert that they indicate that the President is either incapable of correctly interpreting the constitut-ional provisions or else he willingly violates them pending appeals to the highest Court.

Visit of Archbishop of Canterbury to The Holy Pla-

Objections of Catholics explained.- Rights of traditional privilege exclusively reserved.

A cable published in vesterday's Gleaner told of the reurn to England of the Most Rev. Cosmo Gordon Lang, Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of England, after a visit to the Holy Land, Italy nd Greece, in Mr. Pierpont Morgan's yatch, the Corsair.

As at the outset of the Archbishop's journey there was much interest aroused by the supposed objections of the Vatican to his entering the Holy Places, the following article taken from the current issue of «Catholic Opinion» is quoted to give the point of view of the opposition as it was:

News of the visit of the

Most Rev. Cosmo Gordon Lang, Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of the Engish Established Church, to the Holy Places at Eastertime having been followed by dispatchtelling that objections to the visitation had arisen, it is believed that some Catholics may not thoroughly under stand the reasons which prompt ed these objections.

Because in some quarters it may be felt that objection was made to a visit of any sort by the Anglican Primate, it is pointed out that there could have been no opposition to Archbishop Lang's entering the Holy Places as a private citizen. The only difficulty feared was from a visit to the Holy Sepulchre or the Basilica of the Navity processionally. Nor is this difficulty based upon religious fanaticism or intolerance, but rather on the rules of the «Status Quo» in effect a law, which give the right of solemn entry into the Holy Places only to the heads of the three Christian communities of the Latins, the Greeks and the Armenians.

These rules were adopted by the custodians of the Holy Places to prevent any possi bility of an occurrence which might violate the sanctity of the sacred spots.

Catholic leaders here were concerned only in seeing that this Status Quo be not again violated as it has been previously in recent years. It will be recalled that in 1927 the Roumanian Patriarch, Msgr. Mron Christea, made a solemn entrance into the Basilica of the Resurrection and officiated there, although he does not belong to any Christian community enjoying the right to hold ceremonies in the Holy Sepulchre.

Therefore, in order that the visit of Doctor Lang should cause no disturbances it was required only that from the religious viewpoint it remain entirely a private one. The civilian receptions to the Anglican Primate, of course, might be as much solemn as the importance of the visit deserves, even the Catholic authorities taking part, as they always do on similar occasions,

in paying their respects to the distinguished visitor. The objections of the Catholics, it is émphasised, were restricted to a possible attempt to in-fringe upon the Status Quo.

The privilege of entering processionally the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem and that of the Nativity of Our Lord in Bethlehem is reserved exclusively to the heads of the three Christian communities which are the co-propietors of both the Sanctuaries; to all Cardinals of the Roman Church; to all the Catholic Princes; to the Princes of Russia; and the Princes of Greece. No one else has a right to the traditional privilege.

Speaking in support of the Bill, the introducer Se-nato Barnard stated that thousands of dollars were going out of Canada every year to British and foreign sweepstakes and he thought this money might he kept for local charitable institutions. The Bill is now being considered by a special Committee.

As one approaches District of Guacimo he concieves the mistaken idea of a tremendous resucitation of commercial activities in this vicinity, which, on investigation, will soon be found to be nothing else than a huge overestimation of the volume of trade being done and which the operations will involve, and as the Coy, monopolizes the trade by their heavy drop in prices of foodstuffs to coincide with the reduced rate of wages being offered in the works, it will soon be seen that there is no money floating around.

On all sides can be seen business houses, dwelling houses, restaurants, drinking Saloons, houses of amusements, Theatres, etc., even Brothels being constructed, and for what may we ask is all this preparation?.

Compania Bananera alias U. F. Co., it is said, has no Camps, and some are silly enough to think that it is the decision of the Company not to build any, but how erroneous such an opinion is. It is true that every official of the U. F. Co. is a member of the «Great Brotherhood of Silence, hence you can get nothing out of them, but every one, who knows anything of the Banana business, must know that so soon as Harvest time is approaching Camps must be built to command a regular supply of labour for taking in the crops, or it would be better not to plant.

It will soon be seen that the persistent building programme, and overstocking the vicinity with shops, is due to lack of business perspicuity, which must tend to failures and suffering. The profiteering in Rents is another item which calls one's attention, it is noticed that houses with four small rooms cannot be had for less than eighty to ninety colones which makes life so very distressing to the poor labourer.

There are Negro farmers Who have been planting in that vicinity for several years now, vvithout any appreciable ravages by desease, and so We are feeling that by careful management the same lands vvould yield the Company seven or eight years service, but with this nevv experimentation vve shall not be surprised to see the farms give out after tvvo crops have been gathered.

'1 the subscriptions collected the property Schon-field vvas acquired by Mr. Shavy as President for the Corporation in 1920 and exploited by him until July 1930 vyhen a nevy President Mr. Z. Farquharson vvas elected by the people and the property turned over by Mr. Shavv to him; in November Farquharson took ill and left for Jamaica subsequently resigning. The first Vice president ruling until a president vvas appointed. Mr. Shavv then demanded the value of his shares, supposedly being about six thousand colones being or a portion of the property, this being refused him he forcibly took charge of the property on the 6th. of May, thus inviting a lavvsuit as the sharehold-

ers are much incensed over his action in this direction speculation is rife as to vvhat is going to hap-pen. Since December all the Banana checks are held up in the possession of Mr. Shavy. The property having been bought in his name, pending the inscription of the Corporation which is not yet complet, hence checks are still drawn in his name, thus incapacitating the administration from exploiting the farm, and now the Cacao crop is being gathered by him, so that the Directors have not the wherewithal in their hands to meet their obligations, consequently the Directors are calling on the shareholders to subscribe the necessary funds to meet their legal expenses vivhich is evidently davvning upon them.

memorable meeting of the School Board, when the Secretary Mr. P. Bedward, had instructions to acquaint the. U. F. Co. that the grant of thirty dollars, was not being merited by the Teacher in charge (all this please note was done so as to get even with the teacher because he very indiscreetly called Mr. Petgrave illnames at this meeting) These things, naturally got to the hearing of the officials of the Co: the same as they came to our hearing, inasmuch as the Secretary of the School Board did not carry out his instructions. The result was that the Coy, in her urgent necessity of economizing every dollar she could, gave orders to suspend this grant, which was apparently not being judiciously appropriated, hence all the Bishop's inflence did was to get a third of this grant for his school. Thus, therefore, Mr. Petgrave's uncalled for, unjust letter of censure on Bishop Dunn, which might be seen in our office on appointment by anyone interested.

With Regard to Mr. Booth's payment for his article, while we do not admit the right of Mr. Petgrave to make this enquiry, we do not mind saying yes it is fully paid for, and we also gladly add that he pays regularly for his advertisement; We would be plaesed were we able to say the same of our correspondent

for his Adv. run herein some months ago.

To summarize. We beg to reply to Mr. Petgrave's intriguing charge of partiality to the white man over the Black man: that the classification is entirely erroneous: His is an unjust, libellous assault on Bishop Dunn as wellas, an attempt to depreciate the usefulness of an important Educative, civilizing Institution such as is the Anglican Church: while the other is an expression (mild or caustic) of a father's feeling in a matter apparently dear to his heart which was offered publicly given publicity in these columns and not refuted by those concerned. Of course we see clearly the gentleman's habitually destructive intention, and are quite prepared for it. He knows that the life of this journal depends on the English reading Community of this Republic, seven eighths of whom are coloured people, hence his pitting our alleged partiality for. Bishop Dunn over The Revd. Siley on the basis of colour so as, to hamper our progress and all this simply because we did not publish an untruthful scandal. But his tenets as well as ours are too well known to do us any harm in this direction. Our decided policy of impartiality is, we feel confident, too well known and appreciated by the reading public, for we repeat any harm to be done us by our «friend's» tactless and injudicious policy.
