Comprendemos que la introducción de maquinaria para el desarrollo de muchas industrias importantes, hace pensar de primer momento a la mayor parte de los trabajadores que tal sistema implantado como medio de adelanto industrial tiene como fin, sin embargo, para ellos, los trabajadores una falta de consideración hacia la

masa obrera, que ve en esta maquinaria la disminución de brazos que entraña este. Sin embargo, con la marcha del tiempo y los resultados satisfactorios de la introducción de esta maquinaria, podemos apreciar también, que esta introducción trae consigo mismo, un aumento considerable en el número de trabajadores.

Tenemos información claramente que las gruas que están en servicio en nuestros muelles aunque a primera vista parecerá

acarrear una disminución de brazos, no lo es así; porque esas mismas gruas requieren un número de trabajadores bastante regular para el manejo de las mismas, ni tampoco una disminución de tiempo en la descarga. Ya que el móvil principal que persigue la Compañía, como logramos entender, en este asunto es evitar el constante movimiento de carros, con el uso eficiente de las gruas, teniendo como grandioso ventaja este sistema de poner directamente en los carros las mercaderías que se desalojan de la propia bodega de los barcos.

### Estudio sobre los problemas de la nutrición en la América Latina

— Por el Dr. NEVIN S. SCRIMSHAW —

Jefe de la Sección de Nutrición de la Oficina Sanitaria Panamericana

La decisiva importancia de la nutrición humana en el presente y futuro de la América Latina, ha sido ampliamente reconocida, como lo ha sido, igualmente, la urgente necesidad de adoptar programas de educación sobre nutrición que conduzcan tanto al mejoramiento de la dieta individual, como a suplementar o enriquecer los alimentos de ciertas regiones. Desdichadamente la moderna ciencia de la nutrición es tan nueva que no disponemos de la información necesaria para planear inteligentemente esos programas. Los progresos realizados en Estados Unidos no llegan hasta ese punto y no es posible dar por sentado, a priori, que los hechos conocidos con respecto a alimentos y habitantes de Estados Unidos y de otras regiones puedan ser aplicados a alimentos y pueblos latinoamericanos.

Si la América Latina ha de aprovechar la maravillosa variedad de alimentos locales, es necesario que se conozca la composición de los mismos. Ya se ha dado comienzo, en gran escala, a ese estudio, sobre todo en lo relativo a alimentos de Argentina (1, 2), México (3, 4) Colombia, Brasil y partes de la América Central (5). Se sabe que ciertos alimentos desconocidos a los investigadores de nutrición extranjeros, ocupan lugar importante en la alimentación

de algunos países de la América Latina.

Cierto es, también que debido a razones económicas y culturales, así como de alimentación, los programas para mejorar la nutrición de los países de la América Latina deben, hasta donde sea posible, utilizar los alimentos locales y estar basados en estudios de esos alimentos, tal como son cultivados y consumidos en la localidad para la cual se planea el programa de alimentación.

En intentar imponer arbitrariamente dietas norteamericanas o europeas, con el fin de mejorar la nutrición, constituiría probablemente un fracaso, puesto que económica y culturalmente resultaría inaceptable, a pesar de que en teoría

Además la alteración de hábitos alimentarios que aun sin ser óptimos resultan adecuados para subsistir, pudieran causar graves perjuicios ya que conducen a cierta adaptación que no es ni el hábito original, ni el nuevo que se trataba de introducir y que como consecuencia de lugar a una alimentación inadecuada.

Por lo tanto si es que se ha de mejorar la nutrición en Latinoamérica es de mayor necesidad desarrollar un programa de investigación de cada país o región, a fin de determinar el valor nutritivo de los alimentos locales. Esto, sin embargo, no es suficiente. Se hace necesario conocer la cantidad que se consume de esos alimentos, y lo que es aun más importante qué clases y cantidades debe consumirse para obtener nutrición óptima.

Objeto inmediato de dicha investigación debiera ser el determinar cómo puede mejorarse la nutrición humana de una región y la manera de efectuarlo satisfactoriamente.

## EDITORIAL

## Banco Internacional de Reconstrucción y Fomento

En vista de que la recapitalización necesitaba más tiempo de lo que se esperaba, el Banco comisionó en prorrogar el préstamo desde Diciembre de 1949 hasta julio de 1950. En Febrero de 1950, sin embargo, un Plan de Arreglo de recapitalización fue aprobado por los accionistas de la compañía y ratificado el 12 de Abril de 1950.

El costo total de expansión de la compañía en moneda local es como de 150 millones de pesos mexicanos, o el equivalente a 17,000,000 de dólares. Para poder cubrir este costo, la compañía obtuvo un préstamo a largo plazo 44 millones de pesos de la Nacional Financiera. El resto de la moneda local requerida será pagada de los propios recursos de Mexlight y para hacer posible que todos los recursos sean dedicados a la adquisición de moneda local, la compañía ha decidido que la amortización no comience y que no se pague dividendos durante el período d-

## OUR TASK

FROM OUR DESK

BY THE EDITOR

When some years ago the airport was inaugurated in this city, it was not thought to follow in its preliminary stage the wonderful development which the war has given to commercial aviation. We believe it is time to make a little work in relation with the necessities of present day. This airfield is actually a landing port in the international route.

We applaud the authorities for their labor in the extension and conditioning of the landing grounds, but it occurs to us that it is necessary to organize its service with greater efficiency.

At present the passengers who arrive, especially from abroad are conducted in a bus from the airport to the office of the Port Captain, (if we are correct), and then to the Custom House for the register of baggage. There is lost in this procedure one to two hours or more and with corresponding discomfort to the passengers. These delays, these difficulties, we believe, forcefully discourage the tourists instead of encouraging them as should be our purpose.

It should be at the airport proper where other than the revision of document, medical examination and the handling of baggage should also be done before the passengers are taken to the city. If any sickness of a serious nature is discovered among the passengers, such could be transported separately by means of our Red Cross Ambulance. If their papers are not in order, quite naturally, their entry would be denied and in turn the Aviation Company would be responsible for their return to the port of embarkation and if they bring merchandise or dangerous contraband, confiscation could be effected with entire facility.

In addition once free of governmental requirements, the commercial buses and automobiles would secure a medium of benefit by conveying them to their destination in our city.

Several Millions Already Spent on Jamaica 10-Year Plan

It was disclosed in the Jamaica House of Representatives recently that several million pounds sterling have already been spent on the island's Ten Year Plan of Development. The information given in answer to a members' question showed a total expenditure up to December 1949 on development projects of £ 4,082,042.

The money was spent under the following heads: Agriculture £ 1,639,019, Communications £ 257,207; Education £ 570,822; Industries and Trade Development £ 49,682; Public Health £ 1,166,871; Social Welfare £ 245,833; Miscellaneous £ 152,608.

## CARIBBEAN REVIEW

### Clear Hawkers Off Bridgetown Streets.

The Barbados Police have taken action in clearing hawkers peddling ware off the streets of Bridgetown.

While this has been hailed as a long overdue step, a deputation of the hawkers, led by E. D. Motley, member of the House of Assembly, interviewed the Commissioner of Police, aiming to secure alternative sites for the vendors.

The Commissioner explained that his action was intended to ensure a steady flow of vehicular traffic, but he would consider granting the hawkers other streets in which to sell their goods, pending erection of more markets.

### \$ 230,000 in Scholarships.

It is estimated that the value of scholarships awarded British Guiana Between 1944 and 1949 is \$ 230,000. The sum of \$ 125,000 was provided from Colonial Development and Welfare Funds, \$ 76,000 by the British Guiana government, and \$ 38,000 by other sources, principally the British Council.

### Trinidad and B. G. Portuguese Test Skill.

All sports rivalry between Portuguese teams from British Guiana and Trinidad is scheduled for this month when the Catholic Guild Club of British Guiana journeys to meet the Trinidad

Portuguese Association in a series of indoor and outdoor sporting events.

The Guild Club team, an all-Portuguese combination, arrives in Trinidad on June 13, and will contest honors with the Trinidad team in two cricket matches, two foot-ball games, and will play lawn tennis, table tennis, billiards and snooker series.

### Credit Union Secures Insurance Benefits

The Credit Union of Jamaica has secured for its membership insurance facilities from the Credit Union National Association of North America which protect their loans and their life savings.

Following years of negotiation, Jamaica has now become the first B. W. I. territory to secure these services for its Credit Union movement.

Under these facilities, the Credit Unions will be completely protected in the event of death or permanent disability of borrowers, without any charge having to be made against the survivors or the co-makers of the loans.

In addition, the total savings of a Credit Union members will be doubled for his beneficiary at his death.

### Population in B. G. May Bar Immigration

In his 'state of the nation' address at the recent opening of the new session of the Legislative Council, Sir Charles Woolley, Governor of British Guiana, stressed the point that the rapid growth of British Guiana's population is lessening the country's possibilities for largescale immigration.

Sir Charles pointed out that the Evans Settlement Commission thought that there might be room in British Guiana and British Honduras together for 100,000 immigrants — provided, of course, that large scale development also took place. But at the moment it seemed that the population of British Guiana would increase by that number in about 10 or 15 years.

### St. Lucians Fear Economic Collapse

The Government of St. Lucia is sending a delegation to London in July to hold discussions with the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the immediate necessity to find means of developing the island's economy. This decision has been taken owing to fear of financial and economic collapse as a result of the high cost of rebuilding Castries.

The rebuilding of the capital Castries, which was destroyed by fire, has proved costlier both financially and to the island's economy that was anticipated.

### Move to End St. Lucia Pay Dispute

Mr. Justice D. Jackson, Puisne Judge of the Windward and Leeward Is-

lands, has accepted the invitation of the Government of St. Lucia to arbitrate in the dispute between the Government Workers Union and the Colonial Development Corporation, which is re-constructing Castries.

The union demanded a 25 per cent over all increase in wages for workers employed by the Corporation, and when it was not forthcoming, went on strike for a week; then accepted Government's offer of arbitration.

Representing the union at the arbitration will be Hon. G. Herbert Adams, Barbados lawyer-legislator, who is at present in England.

### Barbados Opens Inquiry on Officials

Following allegations in the House of Assembly about payments being made to the Government Architect and Town Planning Officers in connection with the construction of buildings for which his department was responsible, the Government of Barbados has instituted an inquiry into the matter. The official himself asked for the inquiry. The officers of his department will also be probed.

### Governor of Jamaica Leaves, September

Sir John Huggins, G.M.C.G., Governor of Jamaica, who is shortly to retire from the Colonial Service, is leaving Jamaica on September 6, proceeding to the British Isles on leave prior to retirement. He and Lady Huggins and their youngest daughter propose to reside in London, following a holiday in Guernsey, Channel Islands.

Lady Huggins is due for another lecture tour in the U. S. during February and March next year, and proposes to visit the Bahamas and Jamaica thereafter.

### Receives Gold Medal for Nursing.

Miss Helen Joyce Payne, daughter of a St. Andrew, Jamaica, colored family, has been awarded the 1949-50 gold medal for nursing at the Middlesex Country Council Hospital, in England. Miss Payne, who left Jamaica three years ago, is the first Jamaican, among the many who have studied nursing at the Middlesex Country Council Hospital, to gain the highest award for a year's work. She takes her final nursing exams in a year's time.

### Ex-Speaker of Jamaica House Loses Appeal

Former Speaker of the Jamaica House of Representatives O. A. Malcolm lost his appeal against conviction by a magistrate for a breach of the electoral law. His appeal was heard by Sir Hearne, Chief Justice, Mr. Justice MacGregor, and Mr. Justice Rennie. He was represented by H. O. B. Wooding, K. C. of Trinidad, who was opposed by N. W. Manley, K. C.

Mr. Malcolm was accused of conveying a voter to the elections in an automobile which was not registered for the purpose. As a result of his conviction, he has lost his seat.

### Jamaica Bans Public Meetings

Following a wave of disorderly conduct and violence, the Governor of Jamaica has again banned all public meetings in the corporate area of Kingston and St. Andrew. The decision was taken in Executive Council, summoned to an emergency meeting.

Recent unemployed marches and gatherings at Headquarters House of jobless persons, the killing of one man

and injuring of several others by a gunman at the Coronation Market, and shooting and other violence at a Labor Party-Bustamante Union public meeting led the Acting Commissioner of Police to recommend to the Governor that the ban be reimposed in the interests of public order.

## British Information Services

IN BRITAIN TODAY, No. 7

A special service of news briefs for Labor Editors and Journals

Many British firms have issued reports showing how they have been able to increase output and lower costs. Nearly all the reports describe some form of incentive wages scheme. Details vary widely from a simple bonus on production to complex payment by results but the general effect is to give workers the chance of earning more by greater effort or by greater efficiency. The widening range of payment by results had enabled a large section of British workers to increase their earnings substantially during the last two years of the wage stabilization policy.

—X—

Joint consultation committees in British factories, enabling workers and management to discuss problems of production together, are growing more common every month. About three-quarters of the most successful firms make a point of finding ways of making every man and woman understand the importance of the job to be done. Many firms now take their workers fully in to their confidence by giving them facts of production and finance.

—X—

British workers are being told what is worth \$240 worth of their exports will buy for Britain—wheat for more than 5,000 loaves, or enough timber for a house, or 180 gallons of rum, or 900 dozen eggs, and so on.

—X—

Britain is now spending one-fifth of its national income on capital investment—new machinery, factories etc.

—X—

The difficult problem of extending payments by results wage incentive schemes to trades which provide services rather than make things, has been successfully tackled by British Export

Airways in their aircraft maintenance branch. By fixing a standard time for the job and paying a bonus for time saved, the company has made substantial economies. At the same time, earnings of their maintenance staff have increased and the quality of work has improved.

The British people now consume more grain products, milk, fish and potatoes than before the war.

—X—

Britain has the second highest housing record in the whole of Europe. She is beaten only by Sweden which was not involved in the war.

—X—

Exports from Northern Ireland to the United States and Canada increased by more than 50% during the six months ended March this year.

—X—

Nearly all of the 5,122,000 British children between the ages of five and 14 attended grant-aided schools in 1949, and were taught by 211,658 teachers. Over 38 per cent of all the children received one-third of a pint of milk free daily at school.

—X—

The first insurance policy in the world was written in Britain nearly 400 years ago—to cover the risk of a small sailing ship called the Santa Cruz. Today, Britain is one of the insurance centers of the world. The men who built the Oak Ridge atom bomb plant in the U. S. A. for instance, were protected by workmen's compensation policies written in Britain. Its policies are written in 100 languages to cover contingencies ranging from fire damage to bird's nest soup in a Singapore store, to the loss of a liner.

## Negro Students Sit With Whites Now in Oklahoma

Norman, Okla., June. — For the first time in Oklahoma's history, Negro students were sitting unsegregated in the classrooms with white students.

The precedent was broken with 82 Negroes attending the opening day summer sessions at the University of Oklahoma. Some 100 Negroes are expected before registration closes.

The newcomers to the once all-white institution, also took their meals in the Students Union at tables side by side with the whites—another heretofore unheard of occurrence.

## Caribbean Review

Jamaica to Benefit From Marshall Aid

The first irrigation and food development project in the Caribbean area to receive Marshall Aid is likely to be Jamaica's water scheme for mid Clarendon, which is being planned to serve some 5,000 acres of land on which about 2,000 people are dependent for their livelihood.

Marshall Plan funds to the amount of \$ 175,000 are to be made available to the Jamaica Government to purchase two high-powered electric units located at the deactivation of Vernon Field air base for use in the rural irrigation scheme.

The matter is still under negotiation among the U. K., U. S., and Jamaican Governments.

Caribbean Research Council Holds Third Meeting

For the first time since its formation in 1946, the Caribbean Research Council has been holding meetings at the same time as all of its several research committees. These took place at Port of Spain, Trinidad, from May 25 to 30. It was the Council's third meeting.

Among the subjects discussed was a proposal by a Dutch Foundation to make a film on the work of the Caribbean Commission, of which the Caribbean Research Council is an auxiliary body.

The Research Committees, which met at the same time, number six and are as follows:—1. Agriculture, Fish, Wildlife and Forestry, 2. Medicine, Public Health and Nutrition; 3. Sociology and Education; 4. Economics

Caribbean Commission to Meet in Martinique

The Caribbean Commission will be holding its fourth meeting at Fort de France, capital of Martinique, French West Indies, at the invitation of the French Government, from June 26 to July 1. It will be the Commission's first meeting this year, and its first to be held in Martinique.

The Commission, under the terms of its establishment, meets twice each year. So far, meetings have been held in Trinidad (2), St. Thomas (2), and in Curacao, Puerto Rico, Guadeloupe, Jamaica, Washington (one). The Commission's first meeting took place in St. Thomas on the occasion of the Second West Indian Conference in February, 1946.

Jamaica and New Zealand Make Citrus Agreement

The Citrus Growers' Association of Jamaica, which markets the island's oranges and other citrus products, has made an agreement to ship 100,000 boxes of fruit to the New Zealand market. The agreement followed a series of talks with representatives of the New Zealand fresh fruit trade, who travelled to Jamaica for the negotiations.

B. G. May Now Export Edible Oil

With its production of copra and edible oil reaching the highest level in many years, British Guiana now has the permission of its Controller of Supplies and Prices to export some of its edible oil to the West Indies. The quantity this year, however must not exceed 500 gallons.

Venezuelan Tourists Visit Barbados

About 800 Venezuelan tourists have visited Barbados so far this year, according to Vernon Knight, Honorary Vice-Consul for Venezuela at Bridgetown, who declared that he thought they had spent not less than \$ 150,000.

Mr. Knight said that negotiations have begun to allow the Avensa Airlines (of Venezuela) to operate a regular service to Barbados, and that more hotel accommodation would be required to meet the influx.

Scarlet Ibis May Attract Tourists to Trinidad

The scarlet ibis, a tropical bird much sought after by naturalists, is regarded as a possible special attraction for inducing tourists to visit Trinidad, where it has been breeding in large numbers since 1942. Many persons have journeyed far into the backwoods of Venezuela in search of this rare and beautiful specimen of bird life, which is described in glowing terms by nature lovers.

Trinidad is the only place in the world where the scarlet ibis can be seen within a few minutes of boat ride from the city.

Travel Agents «Discover» Jamaica

A group of fourteen American travel agents have just concluded a four-day visit to Jamaica in anticipation of a series of «Discover Jamaica» trips arranged by Chicago and Southern Airlines. The party's tour was based on the Myrtle Bank Hotel in Kingston and Tourer Isle (Hotel) on the north coast.
