EDITORIAL

Día de Armisticio

Hoy 11 de Noviembre de 1950, pensamos retrospectivamente del 11 de Noviembre de 1918, hace 32 años cuando la primera guerra mundial dió a su fin. Esta fecha ha sido designada «Día de Armisticio»; pero en Setiembre de 1939 el mundo humano fue lanzado de nuevo en un conflicto fatal entre el nazi-facismo combinados, y la Rusia Soviética con las Democracias unidas como las «Naciones Aliadas». Aproximadamente veintinueve años después de la firma de armisticio, aquellos documentos fueron anulados y la segunda guerra mundial se extendió sobre los cinco continentes. Después de la destrucción de millones de vidas y millares de propiedades la guerra terminó el 5 de Junio de 1945.

Los terribles eventos de estas dos guerras han abierto los ojos de las naciones e inmediatamente citaron la sabiduría de sus hombres de estado; gastando millones en dineros con el propósito de establecer paz perpetua y mientras los representantes de las naciones que aman la felicidad y libertad estuvieron poniendo sus mejores esfuerzos para resucitar el mundo en estado de prosperidad, Grecia comenzó una guerra civil y toda clase de disturbios dieron comienzo en distintos países pequeños de Europa. Los comunistas coreanos comenzaron a provocar disturbios en Asia, con tendencia de dar comienzo a una nueva guerra mundial.

En el mes de Julio del año en curso el Primer Ministro Attlee de Inglaterra, dió un mensaje radial a su pueblo y en el que introdujo la siguiente frase:

«El fuego que ha dado principio en Corea puede quemar su casa».

Estamos rápidamente acercandonos al memorable aniversario de aquella angelical proclamación de paz, a los hombres de buena voluntad y creemos que solamente cuando las naciones y las gentes se rindan completamente al Príncipe de Paz; entonces el mundo tendrá un verdadero armisticio.

Está fresco en nuestra memoria la triste experiencia del año pasado en relación a los temporales y la damnificación del puente de Cieneguita. "A nuestro deporte en general, en especial nuestros futbolistas"
Entrenamiento

Todos concedemos gran importancia al entrenamiento, pero no siempre lo practicamos con provecho por falta de adecuadas instrucciones. El deporte exige entrenamiento. Eso lo saben cuantos lo practican. Se entiende por entrenamiento la acción de prepararse a un esfuerzo físico o intelectual siguiendo las normas o métodos más eficaces para conseguir del organismo el máximo rendimiento de energía sin perjuicio para la salud.

Pero empecemos por hacer una distinción. Parte del entrenamiento es común a todos los deportes. El ejercicio de cualquiera de estos exige una suma

de esfuerzos físicos, además del despliegue de las habilidades propias de cada deporte. Sin fuerza, agilidad y resistencia nadie podrá sobresalir en ninguno. Por muy hábil que sea un delantero chutando y pasando, si carece de "fuelle" difícilmente llegará a figurar en un equipo de categoría.

Esa parte del entrenamiento común a todos los deportes se llama cultura física.

La práctica de la cultura física sin otra mira que el desarrollo armónico de los órganos del cuerpo es lo que recibe el nombre de atletismo, aunque sería más apropiado llamarle gimnasia para no confundirlo, como a veces se hace, con las artes de la propia defensa: la lucha y el pugilato. La carrera el salto, el levantamiento de pesos constituyen las principales manifestaciones del atletismo.

Todo deportista ha de tener por consiguiente algo de atleta, y el que cultiva el atletismo es materia dispuesta para todos los deportes.

Asamblea General Denominada Naciones Unidas y su sigla ONU

La ONU declaró día de las Naciones Unidas el 24 de Octubre, por eso estamos aquí frente a la bandera de la ONU, en representación solidaria de los 59 países signatarios, para conmemorar el quinto aniversario de su fun-

dación. Bien sabemos que en todo el orbe se pondrán de pie hoy, al son de los himnos nacionales y se izará entre muchas banderas, la nuestra que es tricolor, en medio de millones de aplausos hechos por manecitas que anhelan ver cristalizadas en realidad, la frase de este «año», ¡Tendremos paz!

Cinco años tiene esta Organización de paz y planteamiento para el mejor vivir de la especie humana: cinco años de pacífico luchar para preservar al mundo de las guerras y realizar la fe en los derechos humanos, en la dignidad y el valor de la persona humana, no mismo en los países grandes que en los pequeños y crear condiciones por las cuales puedan mantenerse la justicia y el respeto a las obligaciones emanadas de los tratados y acuerdos, fuentes del Derecho Internacional. Promover el progreso social y elevar el nivel de vida dentro de un concepto más amplio de libertad. U. S. BASE AT TRINIDAD RETURNS TO ACTIVE LIST

The U. S. Naval Station at Trinidad, B. W. I., which was placed in a "reduced status" in May, it to be partially reactivated in the near future, it has been officially announced.

B. G. TEAM FOR N. Y. FORESTRY TASKS

British Guiana is being represented by a four-man team at an international eight-week conference on Forestry and timber production arranged by the Overseas Territories Committee of the Organization for European Economic Cooperation, which opened in New York in September 29. Cecil Swabey, Conservator of Forests, heads the team.

While in the U. S., Mr. Swabey will make contacts on behalf of the B. G. Government, including pre-testing of British Guiana timbers for U. S. Navy requirements, marketing Rymia for insecticide purposes, problems affecting export certification of timber for U. S. Markets, and proposal for a botanical expedition of the N. Y. Botanical Gardens to the Upper Mazaruni.

HOUSE PICKS W. I. PARLEY DELEGATES

The Jamaica House of Representatives has selected L. C. Bloomfield and A. M. W. Douglas to be delegates to the fourth session of the West Indian Conference to be held at Caracas in November. The House also nominated Hon. W. A. Bustamante to be Jamaica's candidate to the panel of names from which the W. I. delegates will select two to be members of the British Section of the Caribbean Commission.

Trabaja en colaboración con los Ministerios de Agricultura, a fin de que cada país produzca lo que consume y le sobre algo para exportar. Ayuda en la pesquería y en la conservación de los recursos naturales.

EL FISI... Fondo Internacional de Socorro a la Infancia... Al extinguirse a UNRA, su Consejo acordó: Crear un Fondo de Protección a la Infancia para atender los problemas de los desvalidos de la pasada guerra. Se creó el FISI, con la misión de asistir a los gobiernos para que atiendan al bienestar y la salud de la infancia y así ayudar a millones de niños y madres lactantes. El servicio empezó con doce

países de Europa y Oriente, y suplía a otros de pañales, calzado, camas para asistencia pública, un plato de comida caliente diaria. También el FISI, ataca a las enfermedades, ayudando a combatir las pestes, la tuberculosis con especialistas en la materia, acie de hígado de bacalao, medicinas en general y materia prima, cueros para calzado, vacunación de niños y becas para el entrenamiento del personal encargado de la salud del niño y de los servicios sociales de puericultura creados para la infancia. Natural es que llenas en parte las necesidades de Europa y Oriente, se ayudará a la América Latina en la nutrición y la salud,

UNICEF... EL UNICEF... Fondo Internacional de Socorro a la Infancia, establecido por las Naciones Unidas en la resolución de la Asamblea General del 11 de Diciembre de 1946, para responder a la crisis que se sentía en todas las naciones en la postguerra y llenar las necesidades de la infancia: sobre todo auxiliar a los niños y adolecentes víctimas de la agresión, y aquellos países donde la UNRA dispensaba algún auxilio. El UNICEF no es un órgano de caridad, es una cooperativa internacional que brinda auxilio en forma de alimentos y procura suministrar media comida al día integrada por alimentos del más alto valor protector al organismo humano. Hasta el momento son 27 los países contribuyentes, pero no todos los que contribuyentes reciben el beneficio, pues la ayuda se da con más frecuencia a aquellos países que con más urgencia necesitan el auxilio.

BY THE EDITOR

Today, November 11, 1950, we take a retrospective thought of November 11, 1918: nearly thirty two years ago when World War I had its termination on that date designated «Armistice Day», but in September 1939 the world of humanity was again plunged into a deadly struggle among the fascist-nazi combined, Soviet Russia and the democracies united together as the «Allied Nations». Approximately twenty one years after the signing of the Armistice those documents became void and the war had its spread over the five continents, terminated on June 5, 1945.

The terrible events of these two wars served as an eye-opener to the nations and unhesitatingly they harnessed the wisdom of their statesmen, spending millions of currencies with an endeavour to establish perpetual peace. While these lovers of human happiness and freedom were putting forth their very best endeavours to recover the world and to bring it back to material prosperity, before these peace-makers were well seated trouble started in Greece, in other lower countries of Europe and then Communist China threw a monkey wrench into the gears for world's peace with the appearance that the dogs of war are let loose in Asia and with the tendency to draw in the peoples of all the continents.

Some time in July it is said that Prime Minister Attlee told Britons sitting at their radios that «the fire that has been started in Korea may burn down their houses»; quite a vision on the part of Britain's Prime Minister.

We are fastly approaching the anniversary period of that angelic announcement of peace to men of goodwill and we believe it is only when the nations and peoples are fully surrendered to the Prince of Peace, then and only then the world will have an Armistice in its fulness.

The Death and Burial of Mr. Cyrenius Williams

By the physical appearance and robustness of Mr. Cyrenius Williams Mitchell who had lived at Hone Creek, one would almost wager that his life's end was extremely distant; but we cannot read the divine charter and so his earthly career terminated under a circumstance that evokes every human sympathy.

A few days prior to his death his wife left the farm for their city residence. Mr. Williams was then alone on the farm. On Sunday the 29th ultimo, as we learn he went to water his horse and after dismounting he was bitten by a specie of the most dangerous snake—a bite which made the very unfortunate man benumbed; thus the venomous serpent had him at its will to repeat its dart. In agony his shrill cry brought a neighbour to his aid. The difficult situation of the place and inadequate convenience to get the sufferer to at least a first aid station, quite naturally resulted in much delay; the poisonous effect of the serpent penetrated deeper while he was conveyed to the Hospital of the Costa Rica Banana Company.

The doctors did everything possible to save a valuable life, but it was regretfully too far gone.

His very genial character, his charity, his amiable dispositions had earned him the endearment of his fellowmen.

The late Mr. Williams was born in the parish of St. Catherine, Jamaica, nearly forty seven years ago. His parents, Mr. Moses Williams and Jane Mitchell de Williams preceded him to the grave. He followed on October 30, 1950.

He was a member of the Baptist Church. The funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Wm. Forde. The quantitative and qualitative representation of the persons who accompanied his last remains to the grave was selfevident of the admiration and esteem they held for him.

His loss is mourned by his widow, Mrs. Keturah Lutes de Williams, his son and daughter Winston and Linda, his step children, Joseph and Etta. To these deeply lamented dear ones we extend our profound condolence. May his soul rest in Peace.

CARIBBEAN REVIEW

JAMAICA BROADCASTING TO IMPROVE SERVICES

The Jamaica Broadcasting Company is working on plans to have an improved service by Christmas. Work is being used on the company's new studios and equipment ordered from overseas is expected to arrive in time to enable the company to carry out its program.

W. I. MAY EXPECT TOURIST BOOM

Visit programs now being worked out by travel agents and persons connected with the travel trade both in the Caribbean and the United States foreshadow a record tourist trade for the Caribbean islands during the next few years.

This was stated recently by J. R. Yarow, vicepresident of Travel Inc., of Washington, D. C., while travelling in the West Indies few first-hand information. Speaking of his visit to the British Caribbean islands, Mr. Yarow declared: "This is really a wonderful place, and ideal for the American tourist. I don't understand why there has not been more travel direct to these islands when one recognizes how near they are to the United States, and the variety of tourist facilities each island offers. In fact, these islands meet every requirement for the U. S. tourist".

COLONIAL SECRETARY ACTS AS GOVERNOR OF JAMAICA

Hon. D. C. MacGillivray, CMG, Colonial Secretary of Jamaica, has been sworn in as Acting Governor of the island and its dependencies, following the departure of Sir John Huggins, G. C. M. G., to the United Kingdom on leave prior to retirement. Sir John, who climaxed his military and civil service career with his appointment to the governorship of Jamaica in 1943, was feted by the Legislature and all the leading civic and business organizations in the island in a series of farewell functions. He told the Chamber of Commerce: "I personally have great faith in the future of Jamaica".

Special bouquets were showered on Lady Huggins, who, as Governor's wife, set a new mark for popularity and social service in the island.

INDIA APPOINTS NEW ENVOY TO B. W. I.

The Government of India has appointed Fahir Anand Mohan Sahay as Commissioner in the British West Indies and British Guiana in place of Professor Satya Charan whose term of office expired recently.

BRAZILIAN NAVY HONORS MEMBER BURIED AT TRINIDAD

The Brazilian Navy recently sent a naval tanker to Trinidad to carry out the special mission of paying homage to a dead sailor by placing a brass anchor over his grave. With all the ceremonial attaching to such an occasion, Commander Lucio Meira delivered a panegyric and laid the anchor on the grave of P/O J. B. dos Santos Segundo, in the presence of Government officials and the Consul Corps.

20TH CENTURY-FOX SEEKS W. I. STORY

A search is now being made for a suitable West Indian story to implement a program of work to be instituted in the Caribbean by Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation. Stanley H. Goldsmith, famous producer of the corporation, told Trinidad reporters recently.

As soon as an attractive story is available, the necessary survey for location and material will be made by Daryl Zanuck, the producer who has been assigned to do the work, Mr. Goldsmith added.

JAMAICA INCREASES TAXATION

New taxes calculated to yield \$390,967 in a full year have been announced in Jamaica. The money is needed mainly to pay salary increases to civil servants and other government employees. Special works throughout the island as an immediate unemployment relief measure are also to be financed from this new source of revenue.

The weight of the new taxes falls on luxury items, such as automobiles, radios, gramophones, jewelry, watches, and certain textiles. Inland and foreign postage, entertainment duty, trade licenses and stamp duty on checks have also been increased.

URGE EMIGRATION TO EASE ST. LUCIA UNEMPLOYMENT

Increasing unemployment in St. Lucia, despite the work of reconstructing Castles, has resulted in clamor for emigration to ease the situation. The St. Lucia Workers' Cooperative Union has passed a resolution asking the Government to open negotiations looking towards the recruitment of farm labor for U. S. farms in St. Lucia. The St. Lucia Seamen and Waterfront Workers' Union has also asked that the Government send a representative to Curacao to investigate work opportunities for St. Lucians.

A DISAPPOINTMENT

We have fresh in memory the very sad experience of last year's rain-floods and the damage done to the Cteneguia Bridge. We had breathed the air of gladness at the appearance of the Constructing Engineer and his workmen and with ripened hope that the way would be made safe ere another rainy season sets in, but that hope has been blighted. The work commenced was not terminated; in fact it has been a measure of experiment. The rainy period is here; the showers began to fall thickly and fastly. Can the temporary wooden bridge withstand the flow of the presumably strong current, the streamlining of logs and other debris? This is the big question. Experience gives us the

right to answer -NO.

A few days ago we saw a few steers driven across the blank walk and we also observed the weakness of certain support to the bridge. There is no knowing in advance of the force of rains to come and to be faced with an interrupted railroad and the paralyzation of the way between this city and our airfield for the adequate transportation of goods and passengers arriving or to leave by airplanes would be a very sad and difficult situation. The crossing of the river by means of small boats was used last year, but was both unsafe and unsatisfactory.

We invite the study of our Municipal Fathers.

Barbados, Trinidad, Jamaica, B. G. Welcome Cricketers

Barbados, the first stop of the W. I. cricketers returning from their historic tour of England, put on its most gala aspect within living memory to give the boys a welcome surpassing that reserved for royalty. Thousands upon thousands jam-packed Trafalgar Square and the entire waterfront area.

The crowd gave a tumultuous cheer as John Goddard, the captain, and his team stepped ashore to walk in triumphal procession between two rows of flannel-clad cricketers with bats formin an arch, to a flag bedecked dais where they were introduced to the Governor by Chief Justice Sir Allan Collymore, president of the Cricket Association.

The team was taken in triumphal tour of the city and luncheon at the Marine Hotel followed.

Trinidad turned out in carnival fashion to welcome Captain Goddard and the Trinidad and B. G. representatives on the team. Seven rockets were fired as they landed and three resounding cheers went up on the call of the Mayor of Port of Spain. The cricketers were taken in open car procession, led by steel bands, through the city to the Princess Building, where they were given a civic welcome. Dinner at Queen's Park Hotel, attended by the Governor, ended the welcome.

British Guiana welcomed its lone representative on the team, Robert Christian, with a cocktail party at the Hotel Tower.

Alfred Valentine, only Jamaican returning home, received the full enthusiasm of Jamaica's welcome. Rain washed out the civic reception at Sabina Park but the welcome luncheon left him no doubt that he was a returning hero.

Booklet Gives Hints to West Indians in U. K.

Two West Indians have written a handbook titled "A West Indian in England", for the benefit of prospective visitors and students going to Britain from the Caribbean. The authors are H. D. Garberry, law student and president of the West Indian Students Union in Britain, and Dudley Thompson, Rhodes Scholar, both from Jamaica.

The booklet is described as giving a frank and exceedingly fair picture of circumstances in the United Kingdom. (A copy of this booklet may be obtained free on request from the Information Department of the British Legation, Panama.)

CARIBBEAN REVIEW

COLOMBIANS VISIT JAMAICA ON INAUGURAL FLIGHT

Officials of the Government of Colombia and of Avianca Airlines of Bogotá, Colombia, together with travel executives and representatives of the United States and Colombian press were three-day goodwill visitors to Jamaica recently to mark the inauguration of Avianca's New York-Jamaica-Colombia air service.

The party was headed by Dr. Jorge Restrepo, President of Avianca Airlines, and included Major Eduardo Escandon, Director General of Civil Aeronautics, Colombia, and Dr. José María Villarreal, Minister of Commerce, Colombia.

Cocktails at the Myrtle Bank Hotel, tea with His Excellency the Acting Governor, luncheon as guests of the Tourist Board at the Manor House Hotel, entertainment at Tower Isle Hotel, and tours in the island were crowded into their full program.

ADVISING TRINIDAD BY FILM

Trinidad and Tobago will be advertised throughout the United States and Canada as well as other places in the near future when a full length travelogue will be presented to cinema goers under the title of "Rolling Down Rio", filmed by Curtis F. Nagel and William Moore of Boston.

The 20-minute film will include many typical shots of Trinidad fruit trees, beaches, towns, native Indians and their traditional dances, temples, plantations, and points of interest to visitors.

BRITISH SEND RELIEF FOR ANTIGUA

Beginning on Thursday, September 20, the British Government has been sending each Monday and Thursday a plane load of food and clothing for the relief of hurricane victims in Antigua and other Leeward Islands. Value of the first shipment was £2,000, and the shipments are to continue for three weeks.

This is part of the relief scheme for which the Government granted \$50,000 to aid the victims. Of this about \$30,000 will be devoted to rebuilding wooden and stone houses, and \$5,000 for rebuilding water houses, while \$5,000 will be devoted to renting premises and buying equipment for the burnt out secretariat.

Meanwhile the Jamaica Relief Fund had passed £2,700, and that of Trinidad had passed \$15,000, and money from these funds was being despatched at short intervals.

DRY GOODS CONTROL OFF

The Government of Jamaica has removed all controls from dry goods imported into the island. Previously the Government fixed profit margins.

CUSTOMS OFFICERS MAY TRAIN AT TRINIDAD

Trinidad has been proposed as the training center for customs officers of all the British Caribbean in both customs and excise work, according to A. T. Shill, newly appointed Comptroller of Customs and Excise in Trinidad, who has just returned from a holiday in the United Kingdom.

Mr. Shill reported that he had taken the opportunity of discussing with officials in London the main points in the report of the British Caribbean Customs Union Commission. This Commission visited the West Indies in 1949 to make a study of proposals for unifying the Customs in the area, as a result of recommendations made at the Montego Bay Conference on Closer Association of the B. W. I. territories.

NEW INDIAN COMMISSIONER IN THE B. W. I.

Shri Anand Mohan Sahay, 52, has been appointed by the Government of India to the post of Indian Commissioner in the British West Indies. He was organizer of the Asia Conference at Nagasaki in 1926.

MINISTED TO STUDY B. G. RICE INDUSTRY

Hon. I. W. A. Barrant, Jamaica's Minister for Agriculture, is soon to leave for British Guiana, where he intends to study the Guianese rice industry. Mr. Barrant will be the guest of the British Guiana Government and his stay is expected to last about two weeks.

STUDENTS ENTER W. I. UNIVERSITY

A group of nineteen West Indian students from Trinidad, British Guiana and Grenada have arrived by BWI Airways in Jamaica to enter the University College of the West Indies. Most of them will pursue courses in arts.

TWO FROM W. I. GET INDIAN GOVT. SCHOLARSHIPS

H. M. Sampath of San Fernando, Trinidad, and W. Chandra Perasad of British Guiana, have been awarded scholarships by the Indian Government.

FIRST W. I. STUDENT WINS PAKISTAN SCHOLARSHIP

Rashed Buckdian, of Rio Claro, Trinidad has become the first student in the British West Indies to be awarded a scholarship from a University in Pakistan. Mr. Buckdian, who has been awarded a science scholarship of the University Punjab, was a student of St. Mary's College (catholic), where he gained his School and Higher Certificates.

JAMAICA TO USE ALCOHOL AS MOTOR SPIRIT

Both the House of Representatives and the Legislative Council of Jamaica have sanctioned in principle the manufacture in the island of absolute alcohol, to be mixed with imported gasoline and used as a motor spirit.

Reason for the step is the increase in sugar production, with a consequent increase in molasses, without adequate outlet for it.

The Birth of a Freak of Nature

By "La Nacion" of Saturday eight days ago we culled the news of the birth of a child with three faces on one head at Coyalor, Abangares in the province of Guanacaste. The faces are said to have been alike only that

the common face was more visibly than the other two. This freak of nature is reported to have caused great sensation in the locality. It died a few hours after birth and was buried on All Saints Day.
