Second United States Note To Austria

The opening of hostilities would greatly favor the ammunition supply of the Allies.

WASHINGTON, 21st. — The second note on the "Ancona" incident will be delivered on Wednesday. Its text was published here as soon as the United States indirectly answered the petition of profts. This publication was made by the publication of Ambassador Nelson Page's text which reads as follows: "Twelve Americans were on board, whose names and ages are specified and of them only three survived. Therefore the rupture of relations with Austria easily may come forth.

The rupture of relations would exert no influence on the sale of ammunition to the Allies. When an imminent rupture with Ger-

many seemed certain, as the result of the sinking of the "Lousitania", it was believed that in case of such a rupture coming about, the United States would take over the ammunition output for its own use. What would happen now would be quite different, for if Austria should increase her submarine activity in the Mediterranean, endangering the safety of American vessels and the lives of American citizens, the United States would cooperate with the anti-submarine patrols and thus would not hamper with the ammunition supply to the Allies but on the contrary would greatly support it by the enforcement of adequate regulations.

Central Powers do Not Wish

War With The United States

THIS IS THE STATEMENT MADE BY THE "NIEUE COURANT" WHICH NEVER BELIEVED THE UNITED STATES WOULD BE PLUNGED INTO THE STRIFE.

THE HAGUE, 21st. — The "Nieuwe Courant", upon remarking on the incident of the "Ancona" says: "We never believed that the United States would allow itself to be plunged into hostilities. At present we believe less that ever, that the Central Powers want a conflict with the United States, notwithstanding the fact that reports are contradictory."

The courteous note of von Burian, had its moral effect as may be seen by the fact that a second detailed note was sent and the explanations of which seem to be a victory for Vienna.

LONDON, 21st. — The Daily Mail reports from Athens that the Greeks occupied the station at Doiran, thus placing themselves between the Allies and the Bulgarians.

Elections in Greece

THE PRECAUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE POLICE TURNED OUT TO BE UNNECESSARY.

SALONIKA, 21st. — The elections quietly took place. The small group of voters here made the precautions adopted by the police unnecessary. In all churches soldiers stood guard with drawn bayonets. The newspapers support Venizelos and sternly criticize the Government's fruitless victory. The opinion of army officers of high rank, is that the German attack on this place is unavoidable.

The General Staff will leave tomorrow. All troops, excepting one regiment, have been transferred to Kozani. The Allies have ordered all civilians to evacuate the neighbouring villages as a military measure.

General Townsends Makes

Important Report

THE BRITISH INDIAN FORCES DEMOLISHED A TURKISH ADVANCE TRENCH KILLING 20 MEN.

LONDON, 21st. — An official statement says the following: "General Townsends reports that he estimates, that the Allies casualties in the rear-guard section were below one thousand five hundred; that on the night from the 17th to the 18th, the British Indian forces demolished the Turkish advance trenches, killing 20 men and capturing 11 prisoners." He adds that the night from the 18th to the 19th passed off calmly.

HE HAS LEFT CHIHUAHUA ON HIS WAY TO THE FRONTIER AND WILL ENTER THE UNITED STATES TOMORROW.

EL PASO, Tex., 21st. — Garcia, Carranza's Consul in this city, announces that arrangements are being made for the surrender of Villa's army; that Villa left Chihuahua on his way to the frontier and that he will enter the United States tomorrow; that amnesty has been granted all the Villa followers, but an amnesty compatible with Justice.

The Socialists in Favour of the

Continuation of War

TEMPERANCE SOCIETY HAS BEEN REORGANIZED UNDER POINCARÉ'S HONORARY PRESIDENCY.

PARIS, 21st. — In the district of Paris, where the socialists hold the majority, this party gave a vote of six thousand against one hundred in favour of the continuation of the war, and resolved that socialist international relations be continued with the German socialists.

The Temperance Society has been reorganized. President Poincaré was appointed honorary president. The Board of Directors is formed by Messrs. Ribot, Thomas, Boyurgeois, Doumer, De Lomrad, President Finot, President Buisson, Coulon and Bouillet and many prominent persons in scientific, literary, commercial and industrial circles.

Reports from Athens state that in the elections in that city, the majority was obtained by Goumaris' partisans; that the Diro out of 22 seats vacant, won 15; that Venizelos' recommendation to his partisans, that they should abstain from voting, at the elections, was not much observed in the country districts.

DOING OF "OUR LITTLE BIT"

We must Strive to Bring About the Peace of God in Our Souls, Says Very Rev. Father O'Hare.

It does seem a hollow mockery to be thinking of Christmas joys and pleasure when so many of our brethren throughout Europe are suffering untold miseries and hardships, and it seems shameful hypocrisy to be chanting of peace on earth and goodwill towards men, when nearly the whole Christian world are challenging each other to war, and appear to be filled with malevolent animosity toward each other.

But the real peace and joy of Christmas, the joy for which we should prepare, and the peace of which we should sing, in spite of the terrible war, is spiritual peace, peace of soul which may exist even while the body is engaged in conflict—that peace which must be thoroughly established in the hearts of all before we can hope for the restoration of permanent universal peace and universal goodwill.

Hence every effort by which the desire of that spiritual peace can be aroused, and its existence brought into fact, is not only laudable but of strict obligation upon all those who profess to observe the law of the love of God and of one's neighbour taught by Christ.

It is at a time like this, when the horrors of the bloody conflict are brought close to our doors that we come back to the true idea of Christmas happiness and the proper method of preparation. The Church from the beginning has never ceased to din into our ears that Christmas is a spiritual, not a worldly festival, and that its joys

CONCERN THE HEART RATHER THAN THE BODY.

She has always maintained that a smiling Christmas face is bitter

mockery when the heart is heavy; that the Christmas-tree and merrymaking are sheer hypocrisy on the part of one whose soul is burdened with the guilt of sin; that the Christmas carol from the mouth of one whose heart is not right is a song of sadness, and that he who carries a fashioned soul to the festival board is like one who brings a skeleton to a feast. In a word, she teaches that there can be no real coming of Christ at Christmas for one who has not prepared for it in the spirit of Christ.

What is preparation in the spirit of Christ? The Prophet Isaiah describes it. "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." How? "Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways plain, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

"Every valley shall be filled." That is all the base grovelling inclinations of the body must be overcome and curbed by God's law. For just as one on the top of a lofty mountain finds breathing difficult because of the lighter and purer atmosphere that envelops its summit, so the one who is accustomed to the foul and thick air of impure sin finds it difficult to breathe in the atmosphere of sweet innocence and holy joy which surrounds him at the time of the Infant Saviour's birth.

"Every mountain and hill shall be brought low." That is, pride, ambition, love of money and social position, rank and power, must be brought down, for such things are utterly out of place in a follower of Him who was born in a stable in poverty, suffering, and weakness.

"The crooked shall be made straight." That is, crooked consciences must be rectified; fraud, deception, hypocrisy, over-reaching others in business, shirking one's lawful obligations, all these deviations

FROM THE PATH OF RECTITUDE must be removed from the heart of one who truly wishes to prepare for the advent of the Way, the Truth and the Life. "The rough ways shall be made plain." That is, even smaller failings, those semi-deliberate faults which are like excrescences on the characters of even so-called good men, must as far as possible be cleared away from the heart. Resignation to God's will and patience must smooth down the trials of life and remove the obstacles that are bound to be met with even by those who are striving to lead a good life.

Such is the true way of preparing for Christmas, and to those alone who labour thus to prepare will Christ really come, bringing with Him that peace and goodwill for which we crave and strive. Can any one imagine for a moment, that if year after year from the beginning, all men had diligently prepared themselves for Christmas, in the manner described above, the present tremendous conflict would now be taking place? We hear and read a great deal now about people "doing their little bit" towards helping their country to carry on the war; let us also strive "to do our little bit" towards bringing about the peace of God in our own souls, and thus pave the way towards the restoration of international peace and prosperity.

PRIVATE NEGOTIATIONS MIGHT BE GOING ON BUT ENGLAND WILL NOT STAND FOR IT.

LONDON, 21st. — Cecil announced in the House of Commons that no negotiations had been started by the Swedish-American line for the purchase of two of the Hamburg-American line steamers; that nothing is known of private negotiations between both companies, but he made a veiled suggestion that he would accept no such negotiations. McKenna upon being questioned in the House of Commons said that he had no reports as to the loss of the submarine which sank the "Lousitania".

Lloyd George Speaks

on German Success

GERMAN SUCCESS HAS BEEN DUE TO MECHANICAL PREPONDERANCE EXERTED AT THE BEGINNING OF THE WAR BUT THIS WILL SOON END.

LONDON, 21st. — Lloyd George declared that the success of the Germans has been due to the mechanical preponderance which they exerted at the beginning of the war but that their apparent superiority will soon end.

Referring to the lesson which was learnt in the abundant employment of machine guns he said that the Germans had wasted unlimited material. He further added: "The persistency of our control over the seas has been due not only to the excellency of our seamen but also to the vast superiority of our machinery."

SOFIA, 21st. — The Bulgarian "Echo" reports that the Bulgarians, who are stationed along the Greek frontier, cause no embarrassment whatever to the Greeks while this is what the Allies are doing on massing troops at Salonika. This same newspaper further adds that the invasion of Greek territory by the Germans and Bulgarians may become necessary as it cannot be expected that Greek neutrality will last for ever.

WILL ALLOW NO NEWSPAPERS MEN TO FOLLOW HIM.

CHRISTIANIA, 21st. — Ford will allow no newspaper men to follow him on his peace pilgrimage.

ITALIAN LINER WAS NOT SUNK

ITALIAN ATTACHE REPORTS THAT THE VESSEL SUNK WAS A SMALL CARGO BOAT.

LONDON, 21st. — An official report reads as follows: "The naval attaché of the Italian Legation announces that the vessel sunk on the 5th of December is not the liner "Dante Alighieri" but a small cargo boat called "Dante" of 898 tons.

--News Not Brought By The Cables--

APPEAL TO RUSSIAN MASSES IN NEW LOAN

LONDON. — Curious crowds standing in the snow-covered streets of Petrograd reading placards announcing a new 100,000,000 pound war loan at 5½ per cent interest are described by the Mail's correspondent in the Russian capital. This is the first time an appeal has been made to the masses of the people to subscribe for such an issue, as previous loans have been taken by banks and the wealthier classes.

The campaign of poster advertising was planned with skill and enterprise to attract the attention of the large portion of the population who do not read newspapers. Exclamations of bystanders when the posters were read aloud gave promise, treasury officials believe, of success for the effort to draw out the secret savings of the peasants.

ALLIES' ORDERS FILL PITTSBURGH FACTORIES.

PITTSBURGH. — The Pittsburgh Foreign Trade Commission in announcing that it was unable to find a vacant factory for a manufacturer desirous of locating in the Pittsburgh district stated that every manufacturing establishment in and around the city capable of being put in operation without an expenditure

equal to the cost of new construction was now in use.

The new business which makes this condition possible, the commission stated, was due to the orders placed by agents of the entente allies now located here and to orders from Canada. Not all of the business is for war material, although it forms a large proportion of the output.

URGE A U. S.-JAPAN DEFENSIVE ALLIANCE.

BOSTON. — The opinion that competition for trade in China between business men of the United States and Japan might develop consequences which would strain the friendly relations between the two countries was expressed by Baron Eiichi Shibusawa, the Japanese financier, and Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president (emeritus) of Harvard University, at a banquet tendered Baron Shibusawa by the Chamber of Commerce. They agreed that tactful and sympathetic action would be required to obviate serious troubles likely to be engendered by the rivalry for the China trade.

Formation of a defensive alliance between the United States and Japan and the entente allies was advocated by both speakers. Immediately after the war, they said, these nations should "band together to maintain the freedom of the seas."

Los tiendas de Navidad

Al llegar la Nochebuena, cuando las primeras tardes de verano dan a la ciudad un aspecto de risueña alegría, cuando corre por las avenidas un viento cálido y luminoso que levanta nubes de polvo, una abigarrada muchedumbre, envuelta en los rayos del sol dorado de la tarde, que ya se hunde en el occidente, desfila por la Avenida Central. Los escaparates de las tiendas, profusamente iluminados por la electricidad, tienen aspectos de portales de Nochebuena; la turba de chiquillos, que corren por la calle animada de sol y de gente, da una alegría de fiesta a las tardes; el cielo que se va tornando malva, en que tras nubecillas leves ya se ve la roja tenue parpadeo de indecisas estrellas, tiene también cara de fiesta. Todo indica que una época de regocijo invade la ciudad.

Pero lo que hay en ella de más curioso, son las tiendecitas de Navidad, con sus grandes escaparates, verdaderas arca de Noé. Imposible es casi transitar, en las últimas horas de la tarde y las primeras de la noche, por las aceras frente a estas tiendas: una aglomeración de gentes de todas clases y de todas condiciones, en la que los chiquillos forman la gran mayoría, se estrujan para contemplar la exposición de juguetes; muñecas, payasos, rifles, bolas, tambores y cornetas están expuestos a la vista del público; y este público, pasa las horas muertas viendo la cara de una colombina que parece trasnochada, que proyecta su sombra ciclopea sobre una caldrala más alta que una caja de fósforos; o si no, es un regimiento de soldados azules, rígidos y serios, hechos

piden rayos de oro y de luz, se agolpan los curiosos: tras de los gruesos vidrios que protegen los tesoros, las gemas y las joyas toman fantásticas apariencias: se le antoja al que mira al través de la vitrina, encontrarse en una de esas cuevas encantadas de que nos hablan los cuentos de hadas y de genios: sin embargo, cada joya de esas, vista en nuestras propias manos, si nula protección del vidrio, ya no nos deslumbra: es que el maldito vidrio se parece a la ilusión que crea encantos o los abulta. Frente a estas exposiciones, las de las joyerías, son más raros los concurrentes: un novio que quiere llevarle en la Nochebuena algo de su agrado a la novia que espera, un padre que busca algo para sus hijas, una muchacha que mira los prendedores de corbatas; pero aquí no hay chiquillos, y la gran procesión desfila casi indiferente ante la riqueza de estos escaparates que son, para algunos cuantos, como el suplicio del infierno.

De todos modos, son amables estas tiendecitas de Navidad, que llenan la calle de gentes y de coches y de luz, ante cuyos escaparates me he detenido yo, mas a contemplar los grupos de los visitantes, que a mirar lo expuesto, para luego continuar por la avenida, soliloqueando la copla aquella:

"La Nochebuena se viene
La Nochebuena se va,
Y nosotros nos iremos,
Y no volveremos más".
