REALM OF WOMEN.

CARE THE CHILD.

"Everyone knows everything about tuberculosis nowadays," says the writer of an interesting article in "Chamber's Journal" this month.

"People speak of a threatening of tuberculosis, and says that if it or that symptom continues it will mean a sanatorium, as if a sanatorium were a last resort when all else failed, instead of the first step toward a cure.

"I cannot repeat too often that the very best thing at the very beginning is a stay in some open-air sanatorium or a winter spent in the high Alps, where open air, invalid diet, and cheerful surroundings have been resorted to a score of times.

"I especially address myself to mothers, and beg them to keep their eyes open for the first intimation of this disease in their children.

"One of the earliest symptoms is an occasional mysterious rising of the temperature; another is a languor in movement and a disinclination to games; another, a 'winter cough or loss of appetite; another, constant attacks of influenza," a slight pain in the shoulders or side often described as 'growing pains.' In fact anything outside the ordinary healthy, noisy life of childhood, anything unusual or mysterious in health or spirits, should be treated at once, and talked over with a medical man.

"To enter in more particulars, I will try to imagine what, with my present experience, I should do if I saw any of the premonitory symptoms in a child under my care. I should knock off lessons entirely for three months, or six, or even a year. Any strain on the mind is very bad for an anaemic child, and he would soon pick up lost time if he regained health and strength.

"If there were a temperature I should keep him in bed till it went below ninety-nine degrees. I should give him three pints of milk a day (six tumbler), and milk only; by which I mean no tea and no coffee. I should always make him rest for half an hour before his meal, and if he did not dislike it I should give him from six to eight ounces of raw beef a day, minced fine, in sandwiches.

"I should leave his windows wide open at night, and draw the bed beneath them, being careful that he wore flannel and had one or even two hot bottles."

Wanted to be Reformed.

So much has been said about the Postal Packet Department, that it is now time to turn our attention to the Letter Department.

Why should these things be allowed to exist?
On Friday the 15, the s.s. "Paraisina" brought mails for Limon, among them English mails. This had to go to San José and return to Limon. On Sunday evening, the mails were brought back to Limon, and some were sorted and others were allowed to remain on the ground to be walked over until Tuesday morning before they were thought about, which eventually were sorted to their respective owners, who were no doubt caused much inconvenience, through not getting same for their persons.

Perhaps the postal authorities may be able to tell us why such things are allowed. This has not happened once, but frequently.

An Enjoyable Function.

In celebration of their first anniversary the members of the Limon Friendly and Literary Association passed a most enjoyable evening on Monday at King Edward's Hall. The walls at the north end of the building was tastefully decorated for the occasion; in the centre was a large picture of King Edward VII. in the uniform of a British Field Marshal below which was a large Union Jack draped with a palm leaf. In the centre of this was a magnificent photograph of Her late Majesty Victoria "The Good" on a back ground of the White Ensign of old England; slightly below and on either side were two beautifully framed pictures of His Majesty King George V and the Prince of Wales over which the folds of the Union Jack fell in a graceful manner; on either side of the two last named pictures was a small Red Ensign. The pictures were flanked by palms, crotons, of every conceivable hue, and beautiful snow white flowers; the Costa Rican colors filled the right and left panels of the walls around which was lavishly placed leaves of brilliant colors.

At 8.30 the President, the Van. Archdeacon Robinson, called upon the first Vice-President, Mr. D. C. deMercedo to address the meeting.

Mr. deMercedo, after the applause which had greeted his appearance had subsided, commenced by paying a glowing tribute to the founder of the Association, the Rev. Raynes Waite-Smith, who, by his untiring energy and personal magnetism in spite of all the difficulties and hypotheses against his success, succeeded in founding the Association with 22 members, one year ago, Sept. 9th last. He reviewed the many abortive efforts previously made on the same lines, and announced the membership now numbered 50, among whom were many gentlemen of standing in the community, who readily added their names as honorary members; the library, though in its infancy contained many valuable standard works among which were several volumes of the Encyclopaedia Britannica from the Times Book Club of London, the People's Encyclopaedia of the United States, presented by Mr. O. P. Nunes, several valuable books, the gift of our popular American Consul, Mr. Chester Donaldson (who was also an honorary member of the Association). Over £100 had been collected during the year, chairs had been imported, and there was a deposit lying in London for the supply of books and magazines. (Monday). Ping pong, skittles, quoits, etc., had been added to the Society's amusement and a healthy balance remained in the hands of the Treasurer. Before closing his address the Vice-President urged the members to continue their interest in the Association and to be punctual in the payment of their subscriptions in order to continue the good work so ably commenced by its worthy founder, the Rev. Waite-Smith, whose absence he sincerely regretted.

The Vice-President was vociferously cheered at the close of his address.

The Ven. Archdeacon then made a short address, followed by the Rev. Worsfold the 2nd Vice-President, who read a humorous

piece. This was followed by a song "The First Kiss of Love" by Mr. Crippie; Mr. Worsfold followed with an Irish song to the accompaniment of Mr. Robertson, the Organist of St. Mark's. This was encored; a very amusing dialogue by Messrs Rudbeck and Bloomfield followed, and then the Archdeacon amused the audience with a story of a Jamaican gentleman on a visit to the Mother country, and who was entertained at a country house where the family brought a pair of his pantaloons every night. The event of the evening then followed in the drinking of the health of His Majesty the King, coupled with the prosperity of the Association, a beautiful supply of rich cakes, ice cream, etc., was done full justice to by the members and their guests, then the ping pong tables, quoits, skittles were brought out, and Mr. Robinson joined heartily in the evening's amusement.

The entertainment was brought to a close at midnight after an enjoyable three and a half hours.

Local News.

The rains are still falling and among the ship workers great inconvenience is caused.

Mr. J. A. Robles and family, well known in San José, arrived on the s.s. Mecklenburg.

The remains of Samuel Osborne were interred yesterday morning at Camp Currier.

Look out to-morrow or the day after the "City Scout," he is coming well.

The s.s. "Portoguero" sailed for Bristol, Manchester, taking 55,000 bunches of bananas.

The "Prinz Joachim" is expected to arrive here on Thursday with cargo, mails and passengers from New York, Jamaica and Colon.

The s.s. "Cartago" is expected from Southampton via Kingston and Colon and will sail for New Orleans via Barrios on Friday.

The new directory for constructing buildings in Limon is to hand and many contractors have been compelled to make new plans under the new requirements.

"Steadman, one of the labourers on the coal ship "Senostad" suffered a terrible accident yesterday morning receiving a fractured skull and other bodily wounds.

The sanitary condition of many yards is awfully bad and yesterday morning Inspector Parlo had lots of work around the buildings known as "Alfitt's".

The fencing of that piece of land by the Railway Station is nearing completion and many would like to know what will next happen under the improvement law.

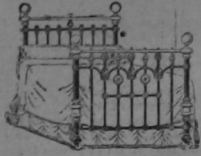
