### THE TIMES Port Limon, Costa Rica (G. A.) Limon Literary and Friendly Association.

That the Limon Literary and Friendly Association has for its object the uplifting of the morals of the young men of Limon who are so disposed, and to furnish them or its members a place and opportunity to meet during the evening and discuss matters that tend to the edification of each other. The members are also furnished with the latest West Indian papers and periodicals.

Through the courtesy of the rector in charge of St. Mark's Church the schoolroom is placed at their disposal, and for which the members ought to be very grateful. It is understood that the active members are not less than at least three dozen and is well organized, it has a president, vice-president, secretary, etc., and in addition to these some able and efficient members that is capable to give good account of themselves, and indeed their oration would be a literary treat to by-standers. But the question we would now like to ask is: "What preciable good is this society doing that have for its object so much good? We know not. If there are any only its few members are acquainted. The public is looking on keenly for its achievements, they want to know and hear of its progress, they would like to hear of debates—drawing out the good that is now lying dormant in many of its members. The public would like to see staged—even a simple drama of one or two acts. These additions would give a nimipus to many to join what is calculated to do so much good to the young-men of Limon.

We believe those that are administering the affairs of the society are conscientious in their endeavours to assist the young men, but we believe much more could be done to enlighten and draw out its members and infuse new blood

As our space is limited we will refer to this matter again in our next issue.

### TRIPOLI AND CYRENAICA.

It is roughly estimated that the occupation of Tripoli and Cyrenaica will cost Italy \$80,000,000. This sum naturally includes the military expedition as well as the necessary expenditure during the first three years of occupation, and as it is doubted whether the occupation of the vilayet is worth such a sacrifice Prof. Halbherr of the University of Rome and head of the Italian archaeological mission at Tripoli has been asked by the *Giornale d'Italia* of Rome to furnish some information about the commercial and agricultural value of Tripoli and Cyrenaica.

The professor says that with the exception of small rocky and sandy regions the land is extraordinarily fertile. The lowlands along the sea-coast are well cultivated, while the highlands up to the very borders of the desert are thickly wooded and covered with luxuriant vegetation.

Besides cyresses, which grow almost everywhere, figs and fur-

nish good timber, there are locust trees, junipers, olms and olives in great profusion. The olives grow wild and the fruit is not gathered by the natives except at Upsellata, where plenty of good oil is made. Olive trees are found near ruins of ancient cities, proving that they were introduced by the Romans, who cultivated the soil.

The eastern portion of the highlands toward Benghazi is especially adapted to the growing of grain and cereals, as a large plain over fifty miles long extends for about twenty-five miles and the stratum of humus is here very deep and there are several wells with good water. The professor thinks that artesian wells can be sunk with advantage. There are many fresh water springs at Gubb, Sacharis and Messa in the neighbourhood of Derna, and these were in use since Roman times.

There are no wild animals in the vilayet, but small game is plentiful and the number of goats and sheep is extraordinary.

The professor admits that the Turks and many inland Arab tribes are hostile to Italians, and he recounts the dangers to which the mission was repeatedly exposed owing to the fanaticism of the natives who often threatened to shoot its members. And he recalled the murder of the American De Cou at Cyrene, thus showing that the natives are practically savage but on the other hand, as the Arabs hate the Turks and are unfavourable to Turkish rule, he concludes that very probably with time their hostility will be overcome.

### Governor's Trip. A TRIUMPHAL ARCH.

Writing from Colon on the 7th inst., a correspondent states that the news of the coming visit of His Excellency Sir Sydney Olivier to the Isthmus of Panama has created a favourable impression among the majority of Jamaicans in the republic. Already arrangements are being made to extend a hearty welcome to the Governor of Jamaica, and make his stay in Panama as pleasant as possible.

A movement is on foot in Colon to secure the Municipal band to render a programme of music on the pier to greet the landing of the Chief Executive of this colony. It is highly probable that the *Colon Literary Association* will present the Governor with an address. This organization is made up largely of Jamaicans, all of whom, our informant writes, be pleased to see the Governor of their island home in their midst. There is even some talk of erecting an arch unless which His Excellency will drive on leaving the the vessel.

Of course the British Minister in Panama, Sir Claude Mallet, is, making all arrangements for the official reception of Sir Sydney Olivier at Colon by representatives of the Panamanian Government and Canal Zone. On the whole signs are not wanting to show that the trip which Sir Sydney Olivier is about to take to Central America will be of a very interesting nature.—*Telegraph and Guardian.*

### Russian Navy.

St. Petersburg.—The battleship "Cangini," the fourth of the so-called "Cangini" class of warships for the Russian navy, was launched recently. With the "Sevanoff," "Tolstov" and "Petrovskovsk," the "Cangini" will be the first squadron of the new Baltic fleet.

### Arrival of the s.s. "Sibiria"

The s.s. "Sibiria" arrived here yesterday morning from New York via Kingston. Her list of passengers this trip has been unusually small which is as follows: George H. Flint Mrs. Scootlock and Miss Katie Chase and 18 deck passengers.

### Departure of the s.s. "Carillo"

The steamship "Carillo" was despatched by the agent of the United Fruit Company Line of steamers on Saturday morning for New Orleans via Barrios. She carried the following passengers: Sydney Jourd, Victor Ringo, Ricardo Rodo, Haffor Ross and 18 deckers for Barrios.

### War News.

Tripoli.—A force of one thousand Turks, which attacked the Boumeliana outposts was repulsed after a sharp engagement lasting an hour.

On the field three Turkish dead were found, as well as abandoned machine guns, officers' sword and arms and ammunition. Two Italian infantrymen were slightly wounded.

It is stated that the Turks made the attack with the object of permitting a caravan to get out of the city, but the caravan was stopped by the Italian outposts.

That the Turks are sadly lacking food is proved by the dry bread and onions found in the haversacks of their dead.

When driven back in front by shrapnel the enemy concentrated on the right in an endeavor to turn the Italian flank, but the sailors brought their guns out of the intrenchments and executed a turning movement, with the result that the attack soon was turned into disorderly flight.

Another Turkish patrol was afterwards sighted, but was dispersed with a few shrapnel shells. Infantry guns have been landed by the transports.

### Dam Breaks.

La Crosse, Wis.—The Hatfield dam in Black river was torn out by a flood resulting in the destruction of fifty business houses and thirty residences in the city of Black River Fall. Two thousand residents fled to the high lands. There were no fatalities.

It is reported that the flood is increasing in volume and further destruction of property is probable. Black River Falls is a lumber manufacturing town.

### Japan Looks for A Long Conflict.

Tokio.—The Chinese situation has eclipsed all other topics here. Well informed officials throughout Japan believe that the revolutionary movement has gained a tremendous start on the Chinese authorities and that it will be a war of long duration.

Japanese trade is, of course, seriously affected, but there is reason to believe that the Tokio government will not make any move to interfere in the situation so long as the revolutionists adequately protect Japanese citizens in the disturbed territory.

Despatches reaching here say that the Chinese squadron has been reinforced by two small gun boats for a campaign by water against the rebels.

### Italy Launches A New Battleship

Genoa, Italy's third super-dreadnought, the "Leonardo da Vinci," was launched here.

The Leonardo da Vinci, which is a sister ship of the "Conte di Cavour" and the "Giulio Cesare" has a displacement of 21,500 tons. Her length over all is 375 feet, beam 9 1/2 feet, and mean draught 27 1/2 feet. The vessel will carry thirteen 12 inch guns, triple mounted, and five barbettes. Her second battery, to stand off torpedo attacks, will be made up of eighteen 4.7 inch pieces. The engines of the "Leonardo da Vinci" are of 24,000 horse power and are expected to attain a trial speed of 22.5 knots.

### Jack Johnson Still Holds the Belt

A rumour was current here a few days ago that Johnson was defeated by Wells in 8 rounds. This we are in a position to make plain by the following which is from a late American paper:—

EIGHT STOPPED.  
London.—The Wells-Johnson glove contest for the World's Heavyweight Championship, which was to have taken place at Earl's Court on October 2nd, was cancelled owing to pressure brought to bear by the Church authorities on the County Council, on the grounds that the men being unevenly matched it would degenerate into a mere brutal exhibition, and would not be in the best interests of sport. Johnson has announced his determination to retire from the ring.

### INJUNCTION GRANTED.

Jack Johnson's clever management on his own defence in the Bow Street Police Court excited far more surprise here than anything he could achieve in the ring. Commonly imagined to be an untrained boxing machine, he showed acuteness in cross-examining the police witness worthy of a trained lawyer. The court was crowded with sports including many Americans, and outside a terrific mob had come to demonstrate its admiration for Johnson and contempt for the milksons who are trying to prevent the fight.

Johnson in a dark blue lounge suit with a lavishly displayed white shirt front, of green Tolley hat and two blazing diamond rings beamed graciously upon the court. A few

seats was Rev. F. B. Meyer, the quiet frail gray-haired clergyman who started the agitation against the fight, but Johnson didn't see him.

Johnson firmly declined to be represented by a lawyer, and when his manager tried to reason with him Johnson waved him aside, took a seat at the attorney's table, and listened to a distinctly bored expression as S. J. G. General Simon stated his reason why his fight should be prohibited as likely to lead to a breach of the peace, Johnson's demourour of unconcerned good humour contempt for the whole proceeding, his patronizing air to the Solicitor General and Magistrate, his supreme disdain for Police Superintendent McIntyre's indignation of boxing were quite a novelty in an English Court, filling the on-lookers with astonishment.

"Have you got anything to say?" inquired the Magistrate, Johnson replied, "Yes, as quite a lot," in a drawing tone. "Take him away, I don't want to see him any more; I am sick of him," he said with a tired gesture when he had finished with Superintendent McIntyre. There was a loud laugh at Johnson showing all his gold teeth, joining in heartily. But in the Supreme Court the issue is already decided, as the judge granted an injunction restraining the promoters from having the fight in any Court in the position of the free holders of the Exhibition ground.

Johnson says he will fight Wells in Paris. There is no regret in any section of public opinion here that London is not to be its scene.

### United Fruit Co.

COMING OF NEW SHIPS.

Mr. E. A. H. Haggart has been informed by the United Fruit Co. that the steamers—the "Carillo," "Sicaola" and "Dives"—which are shortly coming to Jamaica on maiden voyages from Belfast, will, along with one of the steamers of the "Stepas" class, be put in service from New York to Jamaica.

The new service will commence early next year. The steamers will leave New York on Saturdays, touching at Port Antonio, Kingston on Thursdays, Colon on Saturdays, and Boca del Toro on Wednesdays arriving at Limon Thursdays. The ships will leave Port Limon after taking on a fruit cargo, on the following Monday, stopping at Colon on Tuesday, Kingston and Port Antonio on Thursday, and arriving at New York the following Tuesday afternoon.

The steamers "Aimante," "Metapan," "Santa Marta" and "Zacapa" will operate between New York, Jamaica, Colon and Santa Marta as at present.
