El Empréstito

Parece que han surgido nuevas dilaciones para el arreglo del Empréstito Francés.

Ello no depende de los Bancos, sino de los acontecimientos.

El conflicto franco-germano como motivo de la cuestión de Marruecos, no sólo no se ha resuelto en la fecha en que esperaba el crédito sino que por el contrario se ha complicado con el arreglo franco-español.

Creyendo probablemente la prensa Francesa que el litigio con Alemania estaba definitivamente zanjada, suponiendo aliada a España, empezó á ocuparse del arreglo franco-español insinuando desde luego la idea de que España debe abandonar Lareuche y Alcazar.

Esta abundante pretensión ha sido, como es natural, rechazada por la opinión pública española y el problema ha quedado de nuevo sobre el tapete, no solamente por lo que respecta á España, sino también y muy principalmente, en lo que hace á Alemania.

Aunque es muy difícil conjurar desde aquí, lo que la gran prensa europea con sus poderosos recursos y sus maravillosos medios de información no ha podido poner en claro, parece indudable por el curso de los acontecimientos, que existe una inteligencia secreta entre Alemania y España y que la acción de esta última en Marruecos, ha sido tomada de acuerdo con el imperio alemán.

Si ello es así, Alemania seguirá la política de dilaciones que inició desde el primer momento y tendrá definitivamente en Jaque á Francia.

Es el interés alemán, que Marruecos no caiga en absoluto bajo el protectorado Francés; la presencia de España allí debilitará, poderosamente el influjo de Francia; la facilidad con que España ha ocupado los territorios de Lareuche y Alcazar, sin disparar un tiro, es buena prueba de ello.

Por otra parte, España no puede al día, acceder á las pretensiones Francesas, tanto porque su acción está perfectamente de acuerdo con los tratados internacionales, como porque su honor nacional está ya demasiado comprometido, para poder retroceder.

Gobierno español que llegara en ese asunto sería Gobierno muerto; en la Madre Patria no entienden de «Fashodas» y ligados de caso, prefieren ir a catástrofes como la de Santiago de Cuba, dolorosas en lo material, pero que a costa de sangre y de muchas vidas, salvan ese mundo de ser indefinidamente comprometido, pero cada pueblo tiene su alma de la que no puede desentenderse.

La consecuencia lamentable de todo ese estado de cosas, es que el Empréstito de Costa Rica sufre y sufrirá dilaciones, cuya duración es imposible calcular, porque Alemania no desea que el mundo de dar lugar a esas mirablicas «versaciones» con los Diplomáticos Franceses, que por lo estériles merecen ya el calificativo de habladurías.

TRACING THE ORIGIN OF OBEAHISM.

II

The novice of a priest or priestess on the Gold Coast lasts for about two years. During that time the novices are trained to the work in one of the numerous local theological colleges. They are taught the several dances, initiated in the art of working themselves into a frenzy and of letting fall oracular utterances which possessed by the spirit of a god and in a supposedly unconscious state. Their ordinary ceremonial dress is white cloth, and they draw themselves all over with white clay. They all carry switches or sticks in their hands. Sometimes—on very special occasions, it seems—they wear red, red is the colour of blood, and the gods love blood; and red is the colour of the sacrificial robe. Most of the Jamaica street preachers of the present day are clothed from top to toe in white. And if you will notice the leader of them, you will generally observe that she carries a small switch in her right hand.

Dancing to a particular rhythm, possession by a god, then prophecies supposed to be uttered by a god through the mouth of the possessed priest or priestess—that is one of the commonest religious ceremonies of the West African priesthood. Undoing the mischief done by witches—that is one of its most ordinary functions. Now let us read a missionary's account of the first great outbreak in Jamaica of what was then called Myalism, and which then occurred because the slaves had recently been freed and some of the old slave laws relaxed. We shall then see at once that Myalism was nothing but an improved form of the old West African religion.

The wild outbreak of Myalism, in 1842, which the Rev. Hope Waddell was one of the most startling events in the history of the Jamaica missions, and showed how deeply rooted the old heathenism of their race still was among the negroes. There had been outbreaks of this "Myalism" in the previous year, and on one estate a frenzy had seized on some of the people, who went about crying that the estate was poisoned by obeh, and that many had set in them, and fighting in the name of God all who were supposed to be guilty of the infernal art. Observe that these "Myalists" were not about as the servants of God and the enemies of the devil. The African terms, and many of the African conceptions, had already disappeared. The people were now nominally Christians, and were now performing African rites mixed up with Christian ceremonies.

Then came 1842 with its wild orgy of Myalism. The ministers were staggered by it. Members

of their churches were seized by a desire to become possessed by "the spirit," which, instead of being a West African god, was vaguely conceived to be the Holy Spirit Himself. Mr. Waddell has also described for us a meeting of these "Myalists."

The missionary went to where he heard the "Myalists" were dancing, and "we found them in full force and employment, forming a ring, around which were a multitude of onlookers. Inside the circle some females performed a mystic dance, sailing round and round, and whirling in the center with outspread arms, and wild looks and gestures. A low monotonous tune, to which the performers kept time, as did the people around also, by hand and feet and the swaying of their bodies. A man who seemed to direct the performance, stood at outside with folded arms, quietly watching their evolutions. This ceremony was afterwards closed with a prayer and a hymn.

The wife of an ex-merchant died away, Jamaica being a country where there have always been policemen, and where some work must be done if men are to get and pay their taxes. In 1860-61, however, some ill-advised persons thought the island needed a religious revival, such as took place in Wales the other day. They had their revival, but they had something else also. For again Myalism broke out, stirred the Churches, and in an age of immorality, from that time onwards it has been known as Revivalism.

Today, however, the Revivalists do not pretend to seek out and destroy obeh, for the law is severe, not only on the obeh man but on anyone who claims to have any knowledge of obeh and its works. The good and pious Revivalist who should venture to tell where obeh was, or who had been obehed, would be promptly sent to prison for an obeh man or woman. Perhaps some Revivalists do still perform the good work to be done, and for the good work, but as a rule it is the professional obehman who now undertakes to "pull off" as well as to "put on" obeh.

I have known some of these obehmen and very pleasant persons I found them. Quite intelligent and conversational. They charge for the work they do, it is true, but the Revivalist or Myalist also used to exact a stiff price for undoing the obehman's work; for it must not be thought that the Revivalists ever abolished their followers in a purely missionary spirit. As to know how the obehman works, that is very easily explained: you go to him and tell him you want to make an enemy ill; he gets something belonging to that enemy, mixes it with the blood of a fowl, a few feathers, some grave dirt, perhaps also a human bone. These he throws into the yard of the man to be injured, or buries in front of the man's house, or hangs upon a tree. In any case the thing is done so that the man's attention may be drawn to it, and then terror is left to do its work. There are not today, however, many cases of obehing with intent to injure other persons. Apart from the fact that obehmen are vigorously hunted down and proscribed by the police, the great majority of the present are convinced that it is wrong and sinful to endeavour to injure a fellow creature by account means while poisoning is not a thing

which the conscience of the Jamaican will easily tolerate. Those who go to obehmen in these days do so more for charms to make them lucky, or that a ghost may be "taken off" them. For though there are few who will put a ghost on, there are not a few rather willing to think that ghosts have been put upon them. These sometimes resort to the obehman, who has thus become the healer as well as the ill-doer whereas he was once an ill-doer entirely, with the myalman as his professional enemy.
