La Potencia de Producción de los EE. UU.

He aquí el cuarto de una serie de seis artículos basados en capítulos escogidos del libro recién publicado bajo el título de: *U. S. A.: Measure of a Nation*, por Thomas R. Carkashon y Rudolf Modley, donde se presentan en forma sencilla los resultados de un estudio comprensivo denominado *America's Needs and Resources*, por J. Frederic Dewhurst y socios. Ambos trabajos son frutos de un estudio de grande escala hecho por el *Twentieth Century Fund*, que es una Fundación educativa independiente que se dedica a la investigación científica en el campo de la economía.

En los Estados Unidos de América se mantiene un nivel de vida notablemente alto, y resulta interesante ver cómo se realiza la producción nacional de efectos y servicios, y cómo se distribuye entre el pueblo americano.

El valor en dinero de todas las mercancías y servicios producidos es lo que constituye el "producto nacional bruto", o sea el ingreso total. En los Estados Unidos, la mayor parte del mismo lo reciben individuos en forma de jornales, salarios, rentas, ganancias, dividendos, intereses, honorarios, etc. Una parte del ingreso se le paga al Gobierno--por medio de impuestos y por la compra de bonos de la deuda pública--y otra parte más pequeña es conservada por los negociantes para la reposición del equipo viejo o desgastado y para fines de crecimiento y expansión.

Existen dos razones principales de esto. Durante la depresión o crisis económica, el gobierno contrajo deudas fuertes para la refacción de sus proyectos de auxilio a los desocupados. La deuda pública aumentó tremadamente durante la guerra. Hoy día se necesita mucho dinero tan sólo para pagar los intereses de esa deuda, para no mencionar el capital de la misma. Item más, éste es un año en que se tiene que reducir. También, el gobierno ha extendido grandemente todos sus

tantes en la distribución de la producción nacional total, entre los consumidores, el gobierno y la formación de capital privado. Se puede tener una idea de estas relaciones tomando nota de cuánto se gasta en cada grupo, ya que lo que se gasta es un buen índice de lo que se recibe; la diferencia se apunta por capítulo de ahorros.

A lo largo de los años la proporción de estos réditos recibidos y pagados por el gobierno ha ido aumentando. Por supuesto que durante la guerra subió aparatosamente la parte del ingreso percibida por el gobierno. La parte que se invierte en compras de mercancías y servicios por los consumidores ha ido disminuyendo--aún cuando las cantidades actuales de dólares ganados han sido mayores. Lo mismo es cierto por lo que hace a los ahorros y a las reservas invertidas en construcciones y expansión de los negocios.

Simultáneamente con estos cambios, la producción nacional en general ha ido en aumento y probablemente seguirá subiendo.

En 1929, alrededor de once centavos de cada dólar de la producción nacional total americana se dedicaban al gasto de efectos y servicios por concepto de gobierno. Hacia 1940, la parte del gobierno había subido a diecisiete por ciento y es probable que llegue a un 19 por ciento en el año de 1960.

Es especialmente grata la oportunidad que se me ha brindado para dirigir la palabra a esta convención del New York Savings Banks Association que se reúne a bordo del «New Amsterdam». Difícil sería encontrar un auditorio cuya buena voluntad fuera de mayor trascendencia para el Banco Internacional. Vuestra organización, que cubre todo el Estado de Nueva York y cuenta con activos de más de 10.000 millones de dólares, es una de las más importantes instituciones inversionistas del país. Por eso encuentro que es un tributo a la solidez del Banco el que, desde principios del año, nuestro organismo haya aumentado sus inversiones en bonos del Banco y que ahora los miembros de la Asociación, en Nueva York y Westchester solamente, posean más de la tercera parte del total de los bonos colocados. El 1º de julio último la correspondiente cifra ascendía a 89 millones de dólares, lo que representa un incremento de 14 millones en los seis meses pasados.

Comprendo que un auditorio que ha depositado su confianza en el Banco, está suficientemente enterado de nuestros propósitos y actividades generales. Por eso he decidido no fatigarlos con un discurso de esa naturaleza, sino más bien presentar un cuadro más

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pirituales de nuestro tiempo. Pero necesita desarrollar su prosperidad material. Es cierto que existe una industria moderna en la India que comprende, por ejemplo, fundiciones de acero y fábricas de textiles, pero su producto, aunque considerable, cuando se distribuye entre 340 millones de habitantes representa bien poco. La inmensa mayoría de esas gentes todavía cultiva con métodos anticuados pequeñas parcelas que escasamente producen lo suficiente para vivir. La tarea de levantar su standar de vida se hace más difícil por el hecho de que el aumento de población es pesada carga adicional para una tierra de ya baja productividad.

Al retirarse los británicos, el Gobierno hindú que lo sucedió

se encontró frente a un cúmulo de dificultades. La guerra había dejado los sistemas industrial y de transportes con urgente necesidad de reemplazar sus equipos y a la gente con mas dinero del que había podido gastar. Se requería gran cantidad de maquinaria y de repuestos y existía una reprimida demanda de artículos de consumo. Con la independencia vino la división del país y el tremendo desplazamiento de millones de refugiados de una a otra zona. El Gobierno encontró difícil reducir los gastos militares mientras prevalecían los disturbios en Hyderabad y Kashmir. Y, para colmo, el tiempo fué excepcionalmente malo: el monzón que decide la suerte de la cosecha, falló en tres años consecutivos.

EDITORIAL

Tuvimos ocasión algunos días pasados de ver uno o dos potreros en los cuales guardan vacas lecheras; algunas en apariencia trajeron a memoria la narrativa bíblica de las siete vacas flacas vistas en el sueño de Pharaoh.

Se nos vino en mente que el Departamento de Salubridad Pública debería interesarse en el problema de estas condiciones en general de las vacas que se ordenan para el consumo humano.

Ha sido dado a conocer por estudios científicos que fiebre ondulante y enfermedades entre poblaciones grandes han sido ingestados por causa de la leche contaminada. La leche es un producto de las vacas y desde luego si estas están infecadas, naturalmente la leche tendrá que estarla también.

Cuando los estudios profundos en muchas materias vitales, se ven con negligencia, no podemos llamarnos gentes afortunadas, ni mucho menos creer que estamos a salvo de enfermedades varias. Sabemos que los ganados sirven como depósito de infecciones y los hombres obtienen las enfermedades de una u otra forma por la ingestión de leche contaminada y productos de lechería o bien por contacto de los animales infectados.

No estamos promoviendo la sentencia de muerte para los ganados enfermos o tratando de destruir la entrada financiera de nuestros lecheros; sino que estamos sugiriendo y continuaremos agitando en este sentido, hasta que estas condiciones malas sean remedias.

Las autoridades deben decretar ciertas medidas y forzar su ejecución para que toda leche que sea vendida para el consumo deba ser cocida o algunas técnicas deben ser hechas para prevenir. También las autoridades veterinarias deben vigilar la salud y cuidado de las vacas, como también tener estricta vigilancia de la higienización del lugar donde son ordenadas.

OUR TASK

FROM OUR DESK

BY THE EDITOR

We had occasion a few days ago to see one or two pastures in which milch cows are kept; some in appearance brought to memory the scriptural narrative of the seven lean kine seen in Pharaoh's dream.

It appears to our mind that the State Department of Health should become interested in the problem of the condition on a whole of the cows which are milked for human consumption.

It has been disclosed by scientific studies that undulant fever and other sickness among large populations have been resultant through ingestion of milk contaminated. The milk comes from the cows and surely if they are diseased or infected the milk they produce, quite naturally cannot be freed from infectious elements.

When deep study is given to the inattention to many vital matters, we can well call ourselves a lucky people, saved as we are from widespread disease. It is well to speak of disease problems but our ultimate aim should be control and eradication. We know that cattle are reservoirs of infection and man gets the disease either by the ingestion of contaminated milk and dairy products or by contact with infected animals.

We are not promoting death upon sick cattle or trying to destroy the milk income of our milk producers, but one obvious method that we suggest and will continue to agitate that since it is not convenient to supply pasteurized milk, the proper authorities should decree and see to the accomplishment that ALL MILK which is sold for drinking purposes must be BOILED or some other techniques be done to make the milk supply safe and on the other hand the veterinary authorities should see to the health and care of the cows and the proper sanitary state of the place they are milked.

Bishop Gooden to Visit Limon

Next week the Right Reverend R. Heber Gooden, S.T.D., the Bishop of the Panama Canal Zone, Costa Rica and others of the Central American Republics will make his annual visitation to the Limon area of Costa Rica. His Lordship is expected to arrive in Limon on Tuesday the 17th of January and he will remain in this vicinity through the following Sunday, January 22nd.

It is the custom of all Anglican Bishops to visit the Parishes and Missions of their respective Dioceses at least once a year if possible, for the purpose of Confirming those who have been receiving instruction from their Priests and others responsible for this very important task as well as to look after other official business. A large number of young people and adults have been under instruction for Confirmation at St. Mark's Church and its Missions this year. Bishop Gooden will administer the Sacrament of Holy Confirmation to the candidates in the «Lines Missions» on Friday January 20th and to those at St. Mark's Church at the Solemn Eucharist at 6:00 A.M. Sunday January 22nd.

This Mass will be the occasion of the first Celebration of the Eucharist by the Rev. William G. Love whom the Bishop will Ordain to the Sacred Order

of Priests on Wednesday morning, January the 18th at 9:00 A. M. The Celebrant of the Ordination Mass will be the Bishop who will be assisted by the Rev. William L. Ziadie, Rector of Limon, who will present the Ordinand and act as Litaniest. Also assisting will be the Rev. Robert W. Turner III of St. George's Church, Almirante, R. P., who will be the Epistles and the Rev. Charles E. Fish of the Church of the Good Shepherd, San Jose who will be the Gospeler. The Very Rev. Raymond T. Ferris, Dean of St. Luke's Cathedral, Ancon, Canal Zone will be the Preacher.

His Lordship's time will be full with his attendance upon his official duties and in visiting with friends in the Zone and along the «Lines», but he will be staying at St. Mark's Rectory where he will be glad to welcome his many friends of the Parish at various times during his stay in Limon.

The principles of nationhood of Rights and of Livelihood are in one way or other analogous to Nationalism, Democracy and Socialism.

But San Min Chu Iists refuse to be called Nationalists, democrats or socialists, because in reality they are not and in a sense they are all.

The Principle of Nationhood deals with the formation of nations, the influence of Nationalism in modern European history and China as a nation.

The Two Colones Silver Currency is not Acceptable

WEST INDIES VERSUS INDIA

(Culled from the West Indian Sportsman)

The historic tour of India saw the emergence of West Indian Cricket as a batting power. For the first time it passed the stage of desperate reliance on the ability and skill of one or two batsmen of class; it definitely became a well-oiled, powerful batting machine with all its pistons firing. For the first time in West Indian cricket there was responsible batting from one to six; and the so-called all rounders and bowlers at Nos. 7, 8 and 9 were as good bats technically, at least, as could be found amongst Nos. 4, 5 and 6 of teams of the old days. For the first time West Indian selectors saw before them the ideal situation of being embarrassed by a wealth of batting strength that tended to handicap balanced selection.

But at the same time, the Indian tour revealed a falling off in that hostile and penetrating attack which in the old days had so often saved us from the humiliating depths to which the mediocrity of our batting threatened to plunge us. No longer did we have a bowler with the devil and pace of a Mardindale or a Constantine or possessed of the guileful speed of a Francis or a Griffiths. We had left our fastest bowler Hines Johnson behind. His counterparts, Trim and Jones, performed well enough to show what superior speed might have effected.

We knew before our team left for India that our slow attack

was not the very best. Cameron two years ago was a better bowler than he was last year because of almost a year's absence from first-class cricket. Again, we had left behind all our useful left-arm spinners, though in the light of what transpired in the Tests, their inclusion might not have brought much better results.

In four of the five tests, we outplayed India, completely demoralising their attack and getting them out for barely respectable totals in the first innings on nearly every occasion. I give here the true reasons for our failure to clinch the victory which seemed the due reward of our skill and superiority in three of the Tests we drew.

To the great tradition of the English he had the true Shekinah in him. He had endeared himself to the great as well as to the humblest. He was distinctly conscious that the principle within him which thinks, reasons, imagines, hopes and loves was not the result of his outward possession. He always gives the greetings of the day accompanied with human sunbeam.

FOREIGN

One of the questions agitating the major powers today is that of whether to recognize officially the Communist Government of China or not. It is said in the press that Britain and the United States differ on the subject with the former for recognition and the other preferring to wait. Russia, however, has of course rushed to recognize the new regime, with her satellites following suit.

According to the present position of China two thirds of the Chinese Empire is under Communism domination and there does not appear to be any effective force against them sufficient to check their onward march. The Nationalists still claim control over one-third of China with a population of something like 112,000,000. We gather that the United States have written off Chiang Kai-shek and his armies as of little further use in stemming the tide of communism. But when all is said and done the great factor unconsidered by the nations in any appraisal of the situation in China is that of God. The Evangelical Christian in its Christmas Number states,

For if there is one thing certain it is that Communism, either in Russia, China, or elsewhere, will pass away in a vortex of bloodshed and destruction, since it is ranged not against capitalism or the 'decadent democracies' but against God Himself. Like Pharaoh of old it had been raised up on the stage of time that I might show my power in thee, and that my name might be declared throughout the earth. We may not know how

but in some inscrutable way even this scourge of mankind will be made to minister to the plan and purpose of God, who maketh even the wrath of man to praise Him. The nations may or may not recognize these godless government, but in the end it is God who will reject them."
