tivo del cacao, nuestro primero y más importante método es el entrenamiento de personal en el Centro del Cacao y la consulta o entrenamiento de estos mismos hombres después de graduarse cuando hayan regresado a sus países. En este trabajo también obtenemos valiosa información en nuestros contactos con los estudiantes de varios países y la colaboración con ellos después de su regreso.

El segundo método de extensión es por medio del servicio de información representado por el Boletín Informativo del Cacao, por medio de correspondencia con los productores, y por medio del contacto personal con las personas interesadas que visitan el Centro.

El Comité Interamericano del Cacao del cual el Centro es la Secretaría permanente, es invaluable para la extensión de información a otros países. Una vez al año es posible reunirse con representantes de todos los países del hemisferio en la Conferencia de este Comité y cambiar información y opiniones con ellos.

C. Facilidades: El personal que actualmente trabaja para

lograr este objetivo consiste de dos miembros «ex officio», cuatro en tiempo completo, una secretaria, una mecanógrafa, y dos o tres estudiantes como instructores. El Director del Instituto, Dr. R. H. Allee, dirige, aconseja, y establece los reglamentos para la operación del programa, y Mr. Leonard J. Schwarz, Director del Cacao Research Institute, actúa como consultante. Los miembros en tiempo completo son Geo. F. Bowman, Director del Centro, J. Harvey McLaughlin, Fitopatólogo, y un fisiólogo y un agrónomo que todavía no se han nombrado. Además nosotros podemos consultar y discutir nuestros problemas con los otros miembros del personal del Instituto.

El plantel de que se dispone para conducir nuestro trabajo incluye oficinas, laboratorio, biblioteca, y un invernáculo en el Instituto en Turrialba. Tenemos además una finca de cacao de 95 hectáreas en La Lola con un dormitorio y un Laboratorio pequeño, y tierras disponibles en la finca del Instituto en Turrialba.

EDITORIAL

EL ATLANTICO fué invitado a asistir a la reunión de los productores de Banano, verificada el día 2 del corriente en el Salón del Consejo Municipal de esta ciudad. La Asamblea fué presidida por un representante del Ministerio de Agricultura e Industrias, quien fué acompañado por los señores Diputados de esta Provincia y otros altos personajes.

Según nuestro deber público el cual nos demanda la representación verdadera como oímos y vemos en este sentido de nuestros deberes, mencionaremos que en primer lugar notamos la escasa representación de los productores; aproximadamente setenta personas de un total mayor de seiscientos productores de banano de la zona.

De esta escasez de los productores, fuimos informados que la reunión fué improvisada o sea que las noticias no llegan a todos los lugares donde hay finqueros y por lo cual la mayoría de los productores no estuvieron presentes.

Por el contratiempo apuntado y dado lo informal de la reunión, los criterios fueron muy particulares, sin llegar a un acuerdo común y apartándose totalmente del objetivo de la Asamblea. En consecuencia los asistentes no se pudieron aprovechar de lo tratado por falta de claridad y no se llegó en definitiva a nada concreto para presentar al delegado del Ministerio de Agricultura e Industrias.

Admitimos que los productores de Sarapiquí vinieron con un programa listo hecho con Estadísticas, sin embargo, hizo falta más ideas para efectuar el remedio de las condiciones existentes.

Fué muy fantástico oír la solicitud de libertad para vender en San José y otros lugares de la República los bananos rechazados por los exportadores. Fué levantado un coro para el mercado libre y hechar abajo el Monopolio, pero dentro de los mismos propositores existe el sobre entendido que la ración de la zona por los exportadores es el resultado de la muy infortunada circunstancia que muchos productores hacen compromisos ellos mismos por grandes cantidades de dinero y créditos con ciertos exportadores en adelante de la producción.

Debemos tamizar este asunto en el coladero de oro de la justicia. Si un exportador de banano hace el riesgo de adelantarse su dinero en préstamo a los productores en ciertas zonas y si el Gobierno legisla una ley que permite a otros exportadores para comprar en dichas zonas, entonces la balanza de justicia no se ha usado equitativamente.

Los productores son nuestros más grandes y los más estimados amigos; marchamos con ellos en fila; estamos unidos por un lazo económico común; estamos movidos profundamente para oír las condiciones difíciles en las cuales están trabajando, pero no podemos justificadamente poner el yugo sobre el pezuco de los exportadores como únicamente responsables de sus sufrimientos. Deberían saber la debilidad de los intereses divididos, y la fuerza de la unidad.

En nuestra próxima edición trataremos de desarrollar más luz en este asunto. Mucho puede hacer el Ministerio de Agricultura e Industrias sin parcialidad para productores o exportadores.

OUR TASK

BY THE EDITOR

FROM OUR DESK
The Atlantic was extended the honour to attend the banana producers meeting convened in the Municipal Building in this city on the afternoon of Sunday the 2nd. instant.

The session was presided over by a representative of the Ministry of Agriculture and Industries and who was accompanied by the Deputies of this province and other ranking personalities.

Our public duty demands of us the true representation of things as we see and hear and in this sense of duty we must report that first of all, we note the meagre representation, numerically, of the banana growers; approximately seventy persons out of more than half a thousand on this zone. Of this poor showing we were told that the meeting was impromptu and by which the bulk of the cultivators of banana were absent. This gave rise to our first disappointment when we listened to individual expression of contrary views; some of the speakers were foreign to the topic; there was no evidence of oneness as to clearly and comprehensively impress the listeners who had come to get good food for thought. We admit that the growers of the region of Sarapiquí came with a set programme backed up with statistic, however, deeper thought as to the cure of the existing wounds was necessary.

It was rather humorous to hear plead for liberty to sell such bananas not wanted by the exporters in San Jose and other parts of the Republic. A chorus was raised for an open market and down with monopoly; yet within the hearts of the very chanters there was the truth buried that the zone ration to exporters was the result of the very unfortunate circumstance of many producers having compromised themselves by accepting large sums of money from certain exporters much in advance of production.

We must shift this matter through the golden sieve of justice. If a banana buyer risked large sums of money in loans to farmers in a given area, and if the government frames such a law to permit other non-investors to buy fruit in such zones, then, the scale of justice would be unbalanced.

The producers are our greatest and most esteem friends; with them we march abreast; we are united by common economic ties; we are deeply moved to know the trying conditions on which they are labouring, but we cannot justifiably yoke the exporters as solely responsible for their sufferings. They should know the weakness of divided interest and the strength in unity.

In our next issue we shall endeavour to spread further light on this matter. There is much can be done by the Ministry of Agriculture without prejudice to farmers or buyers.

COMMONWEALTH AND ATOM

— Continued from Saturday, March 11th —

Unless Atomic Energy can be effectively controlled, our civilization may prove to be as fissionable as uranium itself. It is not an accident that in November 1945 the Prime Ministers of the United Kingdom and Canada proposed to President Truman that the problem of Atomic Energy Control should be placed on the agenda of the United Nations General Assembly and that a special Commission should be set up. Throughout our long discussions, the Commonwealth nations have all urged the necessity of the fullest democratic control over all Atomic Energy production by an International Authority. They have urged that this Authority must publish its reports, and be accountable to the Assembly; and that, if this involves the surrender of "sovereign rights," then sovereign rights must go.

We must have economic security as well. We must raise the living standards of the less developed nations, we must utilize their untapped natural resources; we must abolish preventable poverty, ignorance and hunger. All this may mean subordinating sovereign rights to human welfare; it must mean the integration of national interests with the wider interest of mankind. In all these ways, the experience of the Commonwealth in recent years has been outstanding.

The Commonwealth countries are the backbone of the Sterling Area. The Sterling Area links six hundred million people and is the greatest multilateral trading area in the World. The Sterling Area only works by mutual concessions and adjustment; by the voluntary subordination of sovereign rights to common welfare; by integrating national interests with the wider interests of the whole.

For this great purpose of promoting economic security, few meetings in Commonwealth history have been more important than the Colombo Conference. Not the least important thing about it is that it has been held in Ceylon. In going there, ministers from the other Commonwealth countries wanted to do honor to Ceylon, the newest nation in the Commonwealth to gain self government and independence.

But that was not their only reason. They wanted also to get nearer to the problems which they had to discuss; to talk about them in the atmosphere of Asia; to look at them through the eyes of Asia. And they wanted to show the world how the Commonwealth binds East and West together, how its part-

nership links free nations in all the continents in perfect equality and friendship for their common good.

They talked, of course, of many subjects, but all the time—whatever the item on the agenda—they fell this to be dealing with the fundamental issues of peace and human welfare: how to build up a peaceful order; how to secure the cooperation between Asia and the West by which new hope can be brought to the toiling masses of the East.

The new Australian Minister of External Affairs, Mr. Spender, said recently that the destiny of Australia is irrevocably conditioned by what takes place in Asia. His Prime Minister, Mr. Menzies, has said that the happiness of Australia will in the long run depend upon the well-being of the simplest citizen of India or China. In the Commonwealth, we believe that it is true not only of Australia but of us all. Only if we believe it, only if we resolve to end the hunger, the grinding poverty, of a thousand million people in the East, have we moral right to resist the spread of authorization rule.

Some people say that the formal ties, the legal bonds, of the Commonwealth have been reduced to vanishing point. And, indeed, it has not written constitution; it has no elaborate machinery; not even an established secretarial staff. But none who knows its working doubts that it is stronger, more closely knit, than ever before. The consultation among its Governments is more continuous, more comprehensive; there has been nothing in history like the economic collaboration and mutual assistance of its members in recent years; above all, the minds of its peoples have been drawn together.

Of course, the Commonwealth cannot serve as a model for the international organization of the world—the community of nations needs more elaborate institutions and written rules. No Commonwealth nation believes that the Commonwealth is its sole salvation; that it should seek to isolate itself from affairs. All are active members of the United Nations, and all believe that the law of the Charter is a powerful link, not only between themselves. But they believe also that the fact of their membership of the Commonwealth enables them to play a more fruitful part in the United Nations, and in world affairs. "Dominion status", said the Prime Minister of New Zealand, "is not

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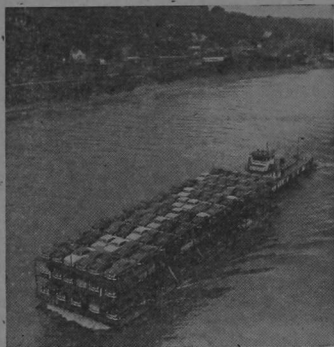
