LA MARINA MERCANTE BRITANICA EN EL COMERCIO MUNDIAL

Por ser una isla, era natural que en Gran Bretaña surgiera una raza de audaces navegantes. Durante siglos, el mar ha atraído a los hombres con espíritu de aventura y descubrimiento, y la osadía y el instinto marítimo de los británicos, sirvieron para trazar y establecer muchas de las rutas comerciales que surcan los océanos del mundo.

Los primeros buques oceánicos británicos se basaban sobre el modelo Viking, de construcción muy fuerte pero

pesada. Para fines del siglo XII, sin embargo, este tipo había sido superado por otro enteramente distinto, a captado de las construcciones venecianas, pues Venecia era en aquella época la primera nación marítima del mundo.

Este nuevo modelo de buques tenía líneas amplias y "panzudas" con buena capacidad para el transporte de carga.

Su gran resistencia a las inclemencias del tiempo, superior a la de cualquier otro

tipo conocido anteriormente en la Europa occidental, permitió a los británicos comerciar, no solamente con los países situados del otro lado del Canal de la Mancha y del mar del Norte, sino también con cualquiera de las partes del mundo entonces conocidos.

Desde esa fecha, los constructores navales británicos concentraron sus esfuerzos en el perfeccionamiento de nuevos tipos de buques, todos ellos construidos especialmen-

te para satisfacer los requerimientos de un comercio siempre creciente. A comienzos del siglo XIX, la mayoría de los buques británicos para el servicio de ultramar pertenecían a dos tipos especializados: el carguero de las Indias Orientales y el carguero libre. El carguero de las Indias Orientales era el mejor de su tiempo, y muy bien puede ser considerado como el precursor de los vapores modernos.

En 1815, al terminar las Guerras Napoleónicas, Gran Bretaña era dueña del comercio del mundo, y su flota mercante se componía de 25,000 buques, que sumaban unos dos millones de toneladas.

En realidad, Gran Bretaña no tuvo ninguna competencia seria hasta mediados del siglo XIX. Tal competencia sirvió de estímulo a los constructores navales británicos para que redoblaran sus esfuerzos. Sus astilleros botaron tipos de barco cada vez mejores, y uno de los resultados fue la aparición de los famosos "Clipper". Era un tipo de barco que no admitía parangón por su velocidad, economía de trabajo y solidez de construcción, y desempeñó un importante papel en el desarrollo del comercio del té de China y las lanas de Australia.

En esta misma época comenzaron a construirse los primeros buques de hierro y se comenzó a utilizar el vapor como fuerza propulsora. Pero la adopción del vapor fue un proceso muy lento, y la importancia de los buques de vela no comenzó a declinar hasta alrededor de 1880.

A su vez, el acero inició la suplantación del hierro hacia 1860, y para fines del siglo ya no se construía ningún barco

de hierro. Con el advenimiento del acero y el vapor, el tamaño y la velocidad de los buques fueron aumentando considerablemente. En 1840 se construyó el "Britannia", de 1154 toneladas, y en 1855 botó el "Persia", de 3600 toneladas brutas. A fines de siglo, el mayor buque del mundo era el "Oceanic", de 17,275 toneladas. En 1903 se colocaron las quillas del "Lusitania" y el "Mauretania" de 32,000 toneladas cada uno. El tamaño de los buques continuó aumentando, hasta que en 1934 fue botado el "Queen Mary", de unas 81,000 toneladas, al que en 1938 siguió el "Queen Elizabeth", de un tonelaje aún mayor.

Velocidad y tamaño progresaron al unísono. La velocidad del "Britannia" era de 8 1/2 nudos en 1840, y para fines de siglo se construyeron buques capaces de desarrollar 23 nudos. En 1936 el "Queen Mary" cruzó el Atlántico a una velocidad media de 30,83 nudos.

La construcción de buques de carga siguió un camino igualmente ascendente. Hace menos de un siglo todos los buques de carga navegaban a vela, por creerse generalmente que no era posible transportar a vapor artículos de lieados sin que corrieran el riesgo de deteriorarse. Hoy en día, el buque mercante británico representa el máximo de capacidad combinado con el mínimo de costo, peso y gastos de explotación. Entre los buques de carga se des-

tacaron los buques frigoríficos y los buques tanques. La Marina Mercante británica es más rica en los primeros que la de cualquier otro país. — Con respecto a los últimos, el Lloyd's Register de 1926 contenía los nombres de 1156 buques-tanque de vapor y motor, con un tonelaje conjunto de 5,664,786 toneladas.

Las construcciones navales británicas continuaban progresando. El perfeccionamiento de la navegación a motor (es decir, de buques que no quemaban combustible para elevar la presión del vapor, sino que están dotados de motores de combustión interna de aceite pesado Diesel o de otro tipo similar) ha sido muy rápido desde el año 1918. Los motores británicos en el Reino Unido representan el 45 por ciento del total de buques mercantes construidos durante el año 1938.

El moderno buque de pasajeros británico reúne el más alto grado de eficiencia y ofrece las mismas comodidades que los hoteles más lujosos. No se ha desestimado nada que pueda contribuir a la comodidad del pasajero. Ahora que la guerra ha terminado, los trasatlánticos y los buques mercantes británicos reanudarán pronto sus tareas habituales y repararán barcos de lujo en los mismos lugares en que dormían los soldados. Los constructores revisarán también los motores del buque, probando las palas de sus turbinas y los 1400 metros de tuberías con ductoras de petróleo desde los depósitos hasta los hornos, así como los muchos kilómetros de cables eléctricos.

THE TANK IS BORN

military authorities. The mercy was that the German enemy did so unadvised. A year later, on November 20th, 1917, at Cambrai, the tank justified the faith of all its disciples. On that day British-General Hugh Elles, commanding the Tank Corps led nearly 400 of his fighting crews in direct assault against the Hindenburg Line. From the turret of his own tank, Hilda, heading the centre division, fluted the brown, red and green colours of the newly-created Tank Corps, the foundation of the tank soldiers' motto, "Through mud and blood, to the green fields beyond." The tanks of Cambrai smashed through a defence zone five miles deep. Between dawn and dusk they captured 9,000 prisoners, and a hundred guns. It was the pre-birth of the blitzkrieg. So astonishing was the tank success on that they that the infantry reserves served in the rear to exploit the break-through failed to

keep pace with the battle, and forfeited a grand opportunity of rolling up the entire German line. Another year passed, and once more the chance was offered. At Amiens on August 8th, 1918, British tanks shattered the front and the heart itself of the enemy in what Ludendorff described as the "Black Day of the German Army." That night the victorious British counted 16,000 prisoners and two hundred German guns, and the Kaiser told a confidant, "We must sue for peace."

The tank had crashed into its own. Five thousand tanks and then ten thousand tractor-cars were ordered for the next year's offensive, and if the enemy had not suddenly collapsed on November 11th, 1918, British tanks would have arrived in Berlin in May, 1919, in exactly the same style that German tanks reached Paris 21 years later.

COLONEL JOSE QUESADA IS TO LEAVE US SOON

There is every confidence that Don Bonilla will endeavour to follow in the footsteps of his predecessor.

We sound the same high notes in favour of Don Trino Jiménez who is to resume the role of Assistant that which he had previously creditably served. These two new leaders are well known by the bandmen and there is no doubt in our mind that they will pull harmoniously together.

IN THE VARGAS PARK

The concert given by the Municipal Band under the direction of Colonel José Quesada in the Park Vargas on the night of Saturday, eight days ago was a well triumph; a triumph which is the child of a competent music master and an inspired director.

Our humble taste in the fine profession is nothing in comparison to the high degree of praise that was expressed by a large number of front line musical talents; persons whose musical sense we dare not question. "What a pity Limon will soon be chastised by the leaving of such a musical genius as Colonel José Quesada" said a high ranking authority and we say so too. The setting of the musical

numbers and instrumental interpretations were marvellous; but our amazement ascended the dizzy height when the thirteen year old age boy, Rafael Angel Hidalgo played efficiently the Carno; accompanied by professor or Claudio Jiménez with his flute in the rendition of the serenade by Titi. WAR IN THE SAND

'TANKS IN THE DESERT,' said General von Ravenstein, when we captured him, "make a tactician's paradise and a quartermaster's hell". This briefly and accurately sums up the matter.

MANY ARE WITHHOUT A FLAG

THERE are many scriptural injunctions that are left on the sands of time for us to follow in our individual as well as political life; — in fact all human endeavours.

We are desirous at this writing to quote that of our Blessed Master when nailed to the Cross and pierced by sinful men, yet in forgiveness and tenderness of heart. He appealed to His Father, saying, — "Father forgive them for they know not what they do".

On the surface we might say that the Romans were quite comprehensive of what they were doing; they knew that they had bruised-wounded and scourged Christ but there was a higher and more genuine conception that was not comprehended at that moment.

Our preface in reference to that marvellous lesson of forgiveness, is to petition the National Congress to exercise that Christ-like virtue in behalf of the several thousand persons born in the territories of the Republic of alien parentage. Quite true they have not heeded the warning issued by the Government that the period for those reaching twenty two years and upward in order to become legitimate nationals through the Constitutional privilege they should have done so not later than the 26th of August 1945. This negligence is now resultant with wailing and lashing of the mind.

On the other hand we know of cases that were submitted much in advance of that date of expiration, but due to the last minute rush it was impossible to secure; in the first place the Certificates of births from the Register General Office in San José; due principally to the fact that many of the applicants were not able to furnish intelligent data as regard their birth which would facilitate the Registrar to issue the Certificates. This, in many cases is traceable to the parents as well as to the oldtype representatives in the rural districts. The deserving importance was not given in those earlier days.

Costa Rica's area of 23,000 square miles can adequately take care of twice its present legitimate daughters and sons and we believe that none born in the territories should be excluded.

Those without the legal status of any country are in a tight corner; they cannot travel beyond the UVITA wharf; if such journey is to be effected outside of the "RAT PASSAGE".

We appeal to the Chamber of Deputies to grant another extension; one over a more lengthy period.

For which he was famed, but which here is omitted that the Colonial Empire gave him a new headache every morning. To understand what head-splitting problems today await his successor, let us go down to Downing Street and into the great room reserved for the Secretary of State, with Joe Chamberlain's maps at one end, and, at the other, a portrait of George Washington, tribute to the sardonic humour of a long dead official in the Office of Works.

On the big table you will find a bundle of files, each of them marked with what ominous red tab which means "immediation".

Today the file on the top will be labelled "Palestine" — there has hardly been any day in the last twenty years when the top file has not borne that title. But in the next few weeks a momentous decision must be taken on the future of the distressed and distressing country, and the

penalties of error will be great. Before the election, the Socialist Party proposed a solution, unqualified and uncompromising, which had more regard to voting strength in this country than to justice and reality in the Middle East. Since the election, the Socialist Government has asked for time to think, and though it might have been better if they had thought before they spoke, it is at least some thing that, having spoken, they should now think.

Next will be a file labelled "demobilization", the resettlement of hundreds of thousands of men who have served in the Forces overseas, have seen new countries and new continents, have lived new lives and learned new lessons. Rightly handled, these men can be, in every village and town, the centre of vigorous and progressive life-wrongly handled, they will be everywhere the focus of purpose.

A New Era for the Colonies

By The Rt. Hon. Oliver Stanley, M.P.

The reoccupation of Malaya and Hong Kong brings to us a close the War chapter of our Colonial history. Its high lights are well known, the bravery and skill of Colonial troops in Abyssinia and Burma, the heroic stoicism of Malta under bombardment, the Fijian corporal winning the V. C. by the sacrifice of his own life for the safety of his comrades, while the sufferings of those under Japanese occupation, hitherto little more than guessed at, are now being fully revealed.

Less is known here of the privations and the labours borne to a greater or less degree in all Colonies; the rice-areas of Ceylon and Mauritius deprived of their traditional diet and offered in exchange the white flour which to us was an unobtainable luxury, and to them an unpalatable and unsatisfying makeshift; the grave shortage of con-

sumer goods throughout Africa which has left the natives with little of that which normally is their sole incentive to labour; the U-boat successes in the Caribbean which at one time threatened the West Indian islands not merely with privations, but with famine.

Nor should we fail to pay tribute to the men of the Colonial Service, deprived of the normal opportunities for leave — those periods which in a tropical climate are not so much recreational luxuries as physiological necessities — cut off in some cases for seven or eight years from their wives and families, increasingly short-handed as normal wastage created vacancies which there was no remuneration to fill, incessantly harassed with fresh activities, as wartime stringencies necessitated new and unfamiliar extensions of Government activity and Government control. Yet they carried on loyally, efficiently, uncomplainingly, though re-

haps sometimes envying the lot of their more fortunate colleagues who had been allowed to join the Services. Without their devoted labours the structure of Colonial administration which might have been irretrievably damaged and the war potential of the United Nations grievously impaired.

But these were years, full of difficulties, have not been without their brighter side. In the dark days of 1940, when the survival of the British Empire and even the integrity of our own shores were matters of faith rather than certainty.  bridge between the western and the eastern oceans.

By 1940 armies no longer marched at the foot pace of 10 miles a day. Sixty or seventy miles between dawn and dusk was an easy stride for the panzers. Once Field Marshal Rommel halted for three months with a great army within a summer's day of Cairo.

The armies wheeled and circled about the illimitable Desert as formerly they had manoeuvred within a few

close fields. But the Desert

will had nothing to credit.

It takes many thousand gallons of petrol to haren an armoured division a hundred miles. This means a fleet of supply trucks, and for every further hundred miles that you travel you need a proportionate increase to keep the supply chain rolling. In the great battles of the Western Desert, the British or the Axis armies were sometimes a thousand miles from their main port bases, almost always five hundred miles. The reader can work out for him self the quartermaster's pro-

blem. The Royal Army Service Corps, in fact, worked it out, and solved it brilliantly.

After those first few months when General Wavell led only 30,000 Empire troops against 300,000 Italians, the strength rose eventually to 150,000 on the Allied side.— They required as a fair minimum one gallon of water per head per day, though often the soldiers managed with far less. Tanks had to be maintained and repaired, and the guns had to be fed.

Along the coast there are some roads, and a railway goes part of the way, from Alexandria to Mersa Matruf. South of this belt there are mostly tracks; once made, these tracks last for many years and they lead in all directions, so that you can not know where any one will take you. Traffic must steer by the stars, or by the sun, or the compass. If it travels by night, it must go without lights, in darkness that the world has long since agreed to call Egyptian.

One Christmas Eve a Supply officer drove off from a tank unit to a Desert dump

seven miles away to bring in some supplies. He left at mid-day, and when he got there he had to wait for the Supply truck to come up. It never came. He arrived back at his unit twelve hours later — without the supplies. They said, "It tooka long, time didn't it?" He replied, "It was seven miles there, and 120 miles back". A slight variation of his compass had left him utterly lost.

 less disillusionment and sultry discontent.

There will be a bulky bundle on Malaya. Here we have not only to restore the high standard of social services which gave the lie to the charge of exploitation but we have to refashion a political machine too cumbersome to work with speed to remote to give authority or uniformity, and recally to consider to evoke the loyalty of the Chinese and Indian communities who together comprise the majority of the inhabitants of Malaya.

Ceylon and its new constitution, Malta and self-government, the closer integration of the East

African territories, post-war training and recruitment of the Colonial Service—all crowd upon us. But behind all these specific questions lies the general problem, how to fulfill the fundamental purposes of our Colonial administrations. We are pledged to help forty separate territories along the road to self-government, and to raise their economic resources and to raise their social standards. Despite the war we have made steady progress in the last few years, but with the peace the Colonies will expect a quickening of the tempo and an increase of achievement.

Mr. Hall, the new Secretary of State, will have certain advantages; he will find an increased interest in this country, a greater willingness to help in

Parliament and more money than any Secretary of State has ever had at his disposal before. But all the goodwill, all the attention of the new Secretary of State.

distance, all the money, will not of themselves solve the problems which are before him; they will also require statesmanship of the highest order.

We talk about self-government; but how, for instance, can you run Democracy in bi-national territories, where the doctrine of "one man, one vote", gives to a racial majority perpetual domination over other communities alien to it in race, religion, custom and language? We talk about economic development; but how do you develop the economic standards of islands with no mineral resources exhausted soil and great increasing over-population? We talk about raising social standards; but how can you do that by Government activities alone unless the more fortunate members of the community are prepared to give that voluntary service which in this country is a universal and age-long tradition, but is in many Colonies a new and rare exception?

Did You Know? MAKING VICTORIA CROSSES

That: X-Ray Unit Can Penetrate Steel

A remarkable British X-ray unit which can penetrate two inches of solid steel or eight inches of aluminum was on view in London recently. The unit is used for the detection of errors in assembly and general industrial research and control.

That: Penicillin Scientists are Wiping Out Cattle Disease

Research scientists in Britain are using penicillin to cure dairy cattle of mastitis one of their most serious diseases. The results are "almost too good to be true," says Professor Scott Watson, who is chief Education and Advisory Officer to the Ministry of Agriculture.

That: Unbreakable Spectacles Exist

A British scientist has invented spectacles which can be trodden on, dropped or bent without being damaged. He is Professor Low, inventor of the bi-focal lenses—used for both long and short sight—and the contact, invisible lens which fits over the eyeball. His latest invention, unbreakable glasses, weighs less than a quarter of an ounce. They are made from one piece of fine wire with tiny, half moon lenses set just below the line of vision. The wearer can lift his eyes from his book for normal sight without interference from the glasses.

That: "Pickpack" Craft was used in the Pacific

Another wartime secret now revealed, is that Britain had produced a pickpack ship at the time the war in the Far East came to an end.

This steam-driven transport ferry, designed for use against Japan, carried a smaller craft on its upper deck and launched it by listing to an angle of forty-five degrees when it arrived at its destination. Lashed to its sides were pontoon pier or causeways, which could be used as portable wharves.

These ocean-going transport ferries are now to be used to carry the fleet of small craft needed in the Pacific for the task of taking relief cargoes to devastated areas. They will now carry thirty-five tons of peaceful cargo.

PALUDRINE - THE NEW ANTI-MALARIAL DRUG

A new and revolutionary compound for the treatment of malaria has been discovered by a team of British research workers.

The new drug, until recently known as 4888, is to be distributed in a form to be known as paludrine. It marks a revolutionary departure in anti-malarial research, since it is a much simpler compound than any anti-malarial drug known hitherto, and is much more powerful, and has a much wider influence upon malaria than any known specific.

Until recent years the only drug of any real value in the control of malaria was quinine. Apart from attempts to synthesize quinine, research chemists over the last thirty-five years have sought to make chemical compounds of their own design

to combat malaria. There emerged only two compounds of any value—parasuquin (plasmochin) and mepacrine (atebrine). Mepacrine is much superior to parasuquin for the treatment of human malaria, and in spite of certain shortcomings was of paramount service during the war, particularly after the Japanese overran the quinine-producing areas of the East Indies. Authoritative medical opinion now considers that mepacrine is fully equal in value to quinine and even in some respects superior.

During 1945 a team of I. C. I. research workers at Blackley, Manchester, discovered the existence of anti-malarial activity in a class of compounds hitherto unexplored for this purpose.

Paludrine was first administered to human patients by the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. Clinical trials began at the school in the beginning of February, 1945, and in the course of the work more than 100 cases were successfully

Every Victoria Cross—the highest award within the British Empire and Commonwealth for valor in arms—has ever been awarded, comes from a modest little jeweller's shop in the West End of London. You would hardly notice it in your ordinary goings-and-comings unless you called at the bookellers next door or walked out of the old pub just over the road.

To that little shop the postman every now and again takes a letter marked "O.H.M.S." And that has been happening ever since the Crimean War and right up to the end of this war. For the making of V.C.s has been in the hands of the same family—first the founder of his jeweller's shop then his son, and now his

grandson. At first sight the Victoria Cross looks as though it would be quite easy to make. Any good metal worker could one might think, tackle the job. Just the bronze medal, the same colour as an ordinary penny, and the red ribbon. But a closer look shows it's not so simple. Perfect craftsmanship is necessary to achieve such a delicate design. The model itself is in the shape of a Maltese cross and embossed in the centre is the Royal Crown. On the crown stands a lion. Every detail, even down to the lion's nostrils, is absolutely flawless, every line and every curve is perfection itself. Under the crown are the two words "For Valour", words that seem

to gladden out at you and give you the feeling that you're in the presence of something mystical. And then there's the red ribbon.

And all this is built by this jeweller family into an insignia only just over three long and an inch and a half wide. The V. C. the most cherished decoration there is, is yet the most democratic, for anybody in the Navy, Army, or Air Force—a ship's boy, a general, a night pilot—in any British or Empire serving unit, can win it, and the award is made whether the winner survives or not. The only condition attaching to the award is that the act of bravery must be carried out in the actual presence of the enemy.

MONTGOMERY OF ALAMEIN

I understand that Field-Marshal Sir Bernard Montgomery will retain his family name in the style of the viscounty he stowed upon him in the New Year's Honours List and will be Viscount Montgomery of Alamein.

He could not be simply Viscount Montgomery because the Earl of Pembroke is also Earl of Montgomery of the Great Ards and there is moreover, a Scottish barony of Montgomerie dating from 1445, which is held by the Earl of Eglinton.

For the normal territorial basis Sir Bernard has chosen Hind head in Surrey, and the peerage

will be gazetted as Viscount Montgomery of Alamein, of Hindhead, in the County of Surrey.

Sir Bernard is following in what now seems to be an established tradition among Service peers of retaining their surnames in their titles.

SIR H. ALEXANDER

I understand that this course is also likely to be adopted by Field-Marshal Sir Harold Alexander, Governor-General-designate of Canada.

For a similar reason to that mentioned in the case of Sir Bernard Montgomery, Sir Harold is unlikely to be simply Viscount Alexander. That style has been used in the past as a courtesy title in his own family. The Earl of Caledon holds a viscounty and a barony also, but

there has been no ceremonial occasion as yet to title Alexander as a courtesy style for the peer, and the practice has been to use the title of viscount to the family name, as is done with several other cardinals. The present Lord Caledon, Sir Alexander's eldest brother, has no son.

But even if this style has never been used by Sir Harold's own family, he could, under the rules, be deprived from being Viscount Alexander without territorial suffix by the fact that there is a dormant Scottish barony of Alexander of Tulloch, created in 1630 with the viscounty of Stirling, and again in 1633 with the earldom of Stirling. All these titles have been dormant since 1739.

LORD ALAN BROOKE

It is under tood that Field Marshal Lord Alanbrooke Chief of the Imperial General Staff, Admiral of the Fleet Lord Cunningham of Hindhope, and Marshal of the RAF Lord Portal of Hungerford intend to keep the same styles in their new viscounties. A notable difference in Lord Portal of Hungerford's case, however, is that while the barony conferred on him last year may descend by special remainder to his elder daughter his viscounty has the normal limitation to heirs male.

Marshal of the RAF Sir Arthur Tedder, I understand, is to retain his name in his barony as Lord Tedder.

Of civilians who appeared in the Honours List Lord Southwood is to retain the same style in his viscounty, Mr. Colin Campbell is to be Lord Colgrain.

treated. By arrangement with the Medical Research Council, supplies of the new drug were then flown to Australia for more extensive clinical trials, have confirmed that this new drug is not only more effective but is also considerably less toxic than either mepacrine or

quinine. Paludrine is most remarkable in its protective action against the infection from the bite of a mosquito. It is more effective in this respect than either mepacrine or quinine, and I may be that suitable dosage will afford complete protection.

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
