

LOS FUTUROS CIUDADANOS DE UN ESTADO MUNDIAL

Hace poco se celebró en Londres una conferencia de 2000 jóvenes británicos de 15 a 19 años de edad de escuelas de 2ª enseñanza del país. Habían dedicado una semana de sus vacaciones para tomar parte en esta interesante reunión que tenía por objeto nada menos que discutir los problemas vitales, presentes y futuros, del mundo entero. Qué espíritu tan generoso, y qué entusiasmo, animaba a esos muchachos de ambos sexos y cómo que además revelaron dotes pocos comunes de inteligencia y de imaginación, y extensos conocimientos de lo que en el mundo pasa.

La conferencia duró cuatro días. La sala y las tribunas estaban continuamente ocupadas y no podían contener más gente; muchos jóvenes vieron defraudadas sus esperanzas de poder asistir. Cada día, por la mañana, los prominentes personalidades discutían sobre temas tales como: La Carta de las Naciones Unidas, La Ciencia y el Progreso, Resurgimiento Económico, Servicios de Sanidad e Higiene, Democracia, Rusia Soviética, Educación en Tiempo de Paz, etc.

Esos jóvenes han aprendido, y bien, a pensar y a expresarse por decirlo así, internacionalmente. Después de las disertaciones escuchadas presurosos a la mesa del disertante para hacerle preguntas, no siempre fáciles de contestar, pero nunca desatinadas. Alguien preguntó al Dean de Canterbury como se podría disipar las sospechas entre la Gran Bretaña y Rusia, y el Dean le contestó: "Manifestando la misma resolución que vosotros habéis manifestado aquí esta mañana".

Por la tarde, los concurrentes formaban grupos para discusiones, y es digno de notar que ninguno de los asistentes dejó de acercarse a uno u otro de los 33 grupos en que se dividía la conferencia. Estas discusiones fueron el aspecto más saliente y veloz, y de mayor promesa de la conferencia. Allí se pudo en evidencia con qué interés esos muchachos, todos ellos en la adolescencia, siguen el curso de los problemas gigantescos que enfrentan hoy a la humanidad.

Llamaba pronto la atención que todos parecían más preocupados con los problemas de orden mundial que con asuntos puramente nacionales y locales. Se dan cuenta de que la prosperidad y la paz del mundo entero son requisitos previos y esenciales de la paz y de la prosperidad duraderas de un país cualquiera. Han adquirido conocimientos de los problemas internacionales y no pueden ocultar su anhelo de participar activamente en las grandes empresas de carácter mundial; son, en efecto, la vanguardia del internacionalismo del porvenir, los futuros ciudadanos del mundo.

De supremo interés fueron las discusiones sobre la Carta de las Naciones Unidas. Allí se trató con gran sinceridad todo lo referente a aquel trascendental instrumento. Todos estaban de acuerdo en que una organización mundial es esencial e ineludible, pero no tubieron en declarar que la Carta, en su forma actual, no es bastante. Se manifiestan convencidos de la absoluta necesidad de que los gobiernos nacionales se despojen, de parte de su soberanía, y partidarios de

POR UN MUNDO MEJOR

¿Qué debe hacerse para que en la América existan las dictaduras presentes y no se produzcan en el futuro? ¡Intentad: respetad y respetar los derechos humanos!

Ante la desorientación que la guerra que acaba de terminar de ser en pos de sí como excecación, un pensamiento que puede tener su máxima aplicación e interpretación ahora mismo, sé hace camino de luz en los corazones a manera de verdad universal: Cada persona tiene que crecer, honrar y desinteresadamente, lo mejor de sí, e inspirarse en las leyes no escritas para que se produzca en la justa medida el respeto a la persona humana, y el hombre pueda con la voluntad de Dios, disfrutar su ración de paz sobre la tierra.

El sagrado respeto a los derechos humanos es, por más allá de lo alto, fuente natural de don de surgen, se robustecen y ordenan las gracias y felicidades de los altos valores humanos, condición indispensable para que se produzca la paz y felicidad del hombre.

Desde el momento en que existan dictaduras en nuestro Continente, se está violando la libertad en particular, y como la violación a la libertad en particular, es violación a la libertad y a la paz en general, el restablecimiento a la libertad humana se impone como medida drástica inaplazable, no sólo para que surjan y florezcan los demás valores humanos, sino para determinar por siempre en nuestro Continente, la libertad como concepto y como acción, que no exista la libertad y el respeto a la persona en la fría teoría, sino en plena dinámica acción, protegiendo, inspirando y orientando la conducta diaria de cada hombre de carne y hueso, que sobre nuestro suelo ofrecen eternamente su contribución o pequen en "el destino de forja de la humanidad."

Y conste que no nos referimos a este o aquel dictador, sino al hecho de la dictadura en sí; pues es lógico, que lo primero que hay que hacer si en verdad se lucha por un mundo mejor, es, tiene que ser, que el hombre supere valor, centro de valor, del cual irradiar y hacia el cual convergen los altos valores humanos, disfrute de los sagrados derechos que le son inherentes como ser humano.

En apoyo de lo que acabamos de exponer, podemos citar como ejemplo a los Estados Unidos de Norte América, donde la libertad no es teoría, sino como una cosa viva que nos rodea y protege constantemente; donde el respeto a los derechos humanos que engendran los principios democráticos que constituyen la forma de su gobierno, es la causa por la cual hoy este país no solamente encarna altos valores humanos, sino que es símbolo de fe y de esperanza para todos los pueblos de la tierra. Y precisamente porque este país estima y respeta a sus ciudadanos, es típico de la Nación Norte Americana, cuando confronta cierta clase de problemas nacionales, pedir que todos envíen cartas exponiendo sus ideas de como resolverlos.

En esta hora, algunas de las naciones soberanas del Continente confrontan el tremendo y doloroso problema de las dictaduras y como en el fondo esto no es problema particular de ellas, sino problema continental, hoy viernes, 11 de enero de 1946, ante este selecto grupo de la "Pan American Women's Association", simplemente en nuestra condición de ser humano, basándonos mentales y atendiendo las mismas razones que los Estados Unidos de Norte América, cuando piden su opinión a cada uno de sus ciudadanos que expresen sus ideas, lanzamos esta encuesta al público del Continente Americano y pedimos que expresen sus ideas al respecto en discursos, conferencias, por la prensa y por todos los medios de divulgación a su alcance.

Innumerables son los factores que contribuyen al respeto de la persona y como consecuencia a la paz, pero es lógico que primer hay que atender a los fundamen-

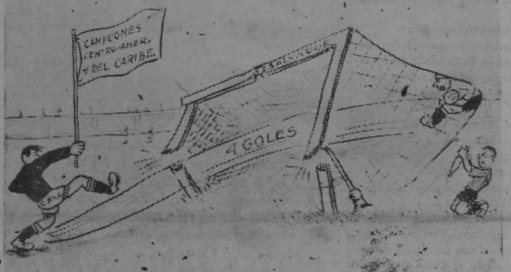

HACE FALTA UN EQUIPO

No obstante que en otras ocasiones lo hemos dicho, vamos a repetirlo ahora en la esperanza de que nuestra insistencia triunfe.

Hace falta de toda urgencia una aplanadora pequeña y un camión de volteo para la reparación de los únicos dos caminos que tenemos. No es posible hacer un trabajo eficiente y duradero si persistimos en usar métodos de la época egipcia.

Tuvimos oportunidad de recordar un trozo del camino a Portete. La cuadrilla de peones acarrea el material en carretillos de mano. Lo transportan desde lugares distantes muchas veces a una milla. Cuando lo han extendido en los peores lugares, se empareja con pilones de mano o pequeños cilindros. Este procedimiento ni es eficaz ni es práctico. El macadam no puede quedar suficientemente compacto para resistir los crudos inviernos de esta zona y se lava en los primeros aguaceros.

Es necesario que la Secretaría de Fomento envíe una pequeña aplanadora y un camión de volteo. El trabajo que falta por hacer es largo y difícil. El camino que conduce al campo de aterrizaje está prácticamente intransitable. La mayoría de los automóviles que hacen el servicio de pasajeros entre la ciudad y el aeropuerto, tienen que salir del camino y rodar por los potreros para evitar que se inutilicen los resorts y las llantas.

Este camino es no solamente para nuestras necesidades domésticas, sino que es también de tráfico internacional, y no querrá el señor Ministro estamos seguros — que quienes vienen de otras partes, lleven una impresión de nuestro atraso, que sería injusta, pero perfectamente justificable con estos espectáculos.

International Problem

The importance of oil in world economy is indicated by proposals under discussion at the London Anglo-American conference particularly the idea of an international commission to deal with present and future problems concerning the development of old and new reserves and the allocation of the petroleum products to the countries needing them. The nations that have the greater needs for petroleum except the United States have only minor domestic reserves if any, and even American needs may soon require imports because of war drains and future expanded uses.

Atomic power may some day replace some of the present-day power-creating fuels, but not in the immediate future. Even if atomic power is used in the larger power plants, petroleum will be needed for many decades

and to operate automobiles. The world supply is ample for many years, and oil and gasoline can be made from oil-shale and coal.

However, the process is not simple, and nations depending upon synthetic fuels for their war equipment might find themselves at the mercy of those with natural supplies, as Germany and Japan now know. In addition to fuels, lubrication greases

for machinery are essential to operation, and most of the greases found satisfactory for this purpose are petroleum products. Petroleum chemicals are also important, but many of these can be made from coal.

The United States, in the past, has worried very little about its supply of oil. The situation has changed, however, as a result of the war, during which America provided about two-thirds of the needed oil to power not only American fighting equipment but that of the other Allies as well. Known reserves have been drawn on heavily. New reserves may be located and better recovery methods developed to get a larger percentage of the crude from under the ground, but the United States must look forward to possible importation.

The importance of oil in world economy becomes apparent by a survey of the countries using it and the regions where it is mined. The industrially developed nations are the greater users, but with the exception of the United States, they are only minor producers. Western Europe, for instance, mines very little petroleum, but needs much Soviet Russia seems to have plenty for its own need, and Rumania produces for export. Pro-

duction in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Germany, France and England is very small. Australia and Brazil are other countries undergoing rapid industrial development which now rely almost wholly on imported mineral liquid fuels.

The principal oil-producing nations in the Western Hemisphere are the United States, far in the lead, together with Venezuela, Mexico, Colombia and Trinidad. Northern Alaska has oil reserves now under development which soon may play an important part in the American supply.

Africa produces very little oil at present, the principal production being in Egypt. An American oil company has just secured oil concessions in Ethiopia, an indication that its geologists, from preliminary studies, believe that important reserves may be found.

The Netherlands Indies, particularly Sumatra, Java and Borneo, are rich sources of oil and in the future will play an increasingly important part in the oil industry. Relatively little exploration has been carried out in this vast Netherlands area so the full possibilities are as yet unknown.

Asia has vast quantities of known oil, particularly in the Arabian-Iran region. Burma is also important and both China and Japan produce some. Sakhalin island, off the coast of Siberia, was a Jap source of oil in prewar and early war years.

The Middle East fields in Arabia are particularly rich, and American authority stating that these fields are incomparably richer than those in this country.

"The rich real riches in oil as proved by drilling," Robert E. Wilson, president of the Pan American Petroleum and Transport Company, stated recently in an article in *Mining and Metallurgy*, "are in the large basins already lifted and depressed between major continents—the Caribbean area, including our Gulf Coast, Venezuela, and Colombia; the great area which encompasses Europe and Asia, which has the tremendous reserves of Arabia and Iran; the intercontinental area of the Netherlands Indies between the continents of Australia and Asia; and finally, the area around the Arctic ocean, in Northern Russia and around Alaska, which may prove a rich area but which, because of physical difficulties, has not as yet been explored."

WHAT'S GOING TO ENCOURAGE TOURIST BUSINESS FOR LIMON

From our Desk By the Editor

We do not know the extent of the activities of the Atlantic Progressive Committee; in fact whether dead or alive we have no knowledge, but perhaps by our attempt to touch their "G" strings a voice may be raised.

It is not in us to be pessimistic, but we are rather optimistic and desire to see the essential thing done to encourage tourists to spend some days in this city whenever visiting our Republic.

The dark veil has been somewhat lifted and the silver lining is seemingly appearing as we have seen sign with the last week's arrival of the steamship AMSTELKERK of the Royal Netherland Steamship Company; our tender buds of hope sprang anew when this palatial liner was lain at anchor in the port. We visualize what such weekly vessels can do as a means of helping our economical situation, providing the right and proper arrangements are undertaken. The intended ocean travellers from San José and other localities in the Interior, quite naturally will come to Limon either by air or rail transportation, then passengers in transit, we believe, would welcome shore pastimes. We can calculate also on the crews of the ships taking advantage of what this city would have to offer.

To be frank on the subject, Limon should organize its own Tourist Representatives and do not depend on others. The slogan of self first—self last and if anything remains, it is again for self is obviously becoming a rule of life.

In order to better our position we need action, such alertness to bring general good to all concerned.

It is our opinion that an Auxiliary Tourist Committee could spread its activities by organizing weekly in-land visitors, but for a successful issue close harmony and mutual understanding with the management of our hotels, pensions and other catering establishments would be strictly necessary.

In this connection we have had complaints from interior visitors with regard to the fluctuation of rates for room accommodations by those of fering; claiming that they have occupied rooms at a given rate and within a return of a week or so, the same class of accommodations ascend in cost, and that the charges are seemingly made according to the opinion formed on the financial position of the requisitionists.

It should be borne in mind that the well informed traveller expects to see Rate Cards and Floor Plans when seeking accommodation and we suggest that improvement along such lines be undertaken by those catering. This, we believe will be an asset to those inviting visitors to Limon whether in-land and from abroad.

RECOMMENDATION

The Atlantic Voice learns that the Committee on Infant Protection has recommended that certain modifications be effected by the granting of travel permits to Costarrican youths and in particular to girls seeking migration to the Republic of Panama. The recommendation reads in part:

In case of Young women seeking passport the Migration Office should communicate with the National Committee on the Protection of Infant, stating the reason for the solicitation of Passport and all documents concerning; in order that a determination in regard to the class of work, the economical condition and other requirements may be arrived at; those desirous to travel in educational pursuit, of course, are not subjected to these stringent measures.

It is gathered that the Committee desires to make sure that Costarrican young women are not leaving to engage in any livelihood which will prove contrary to the high standard of health and honour.

A PROPOSAL

We are told that a proposal has been submitted to the Honourable Minister of Public Education of the establishment of a Government School in the Jamaica Town Settlement; an institution to be operated on similar lines as that functioning at Cienciguata.

If this school comes into realization it would greatly relieve the congestion in the Boys and Girls schools in this city.

We are in full agreement that the children of school ages in that area warrants the project and as we understand the acquisition of a building by rental or purchase would be available.

FROM PUNTARENAS

It has been our information that two persons were wounded at Puntarenas as the result of the discharges of a revolver by the police on Saturday, eight days ago.

A man of colour is said to have stabbed a woman and after committing his dastardly act, hid in a house which was afterwards by the police and he was apprehended and taken to the police station; there he made his escape and with fleet of feet who the police followed in his chase. We gather that the fleeing prisoner was shot in one leg and very unfortunately one of the bullets gravely wounded one Señora Celina de Melendez who was conveyed to the hospital and the equally injured fugitive was retaken to the place of confinement.

AN ACKNOWLEDGMENT

We hereby acknowledge receipt of the letter of don Rogelio C. Mendoza M., under date of the 9th instant in reference to our Editorial of the 2nd of the month in course under the caption "MANY ARE WITHOUT A FLAG."

We desire to thank the General Secretary of the Sectional Committee of Vanguardia Popular for having quoted us the text of a communication by His Excellency, the President of the Republic to the Secretary of State in the Office of Foreign Relations bearing on the matter of adoption of Costarrican citizenship by children of alien parents born in the territories of

the Republic and that the Vanguardia Popular has been effecting question before His Excellency in behalf of the people of colour born in the Republic of Costa Rica.

We desire to state, however, that in view of our early avowed willingness to serve our people through the medium of "La Voz Atlantica", it is regrettable that the Sectional Committee did not extend the courtesy to us. On the other hand we understood that the National Association for the Advancement of Costarricans of colour has since October the 16th, 1945 ceased Chief Magistrate in the premises,

was really more an operation of

motored troops than of tanks, after the Italian evacuation of Benghazi tanks led an armoured force in a 150 mile dash straight across the desert to intercept the flying enemy. Pressing on through a blinding sand storm they caught him at Beda Fomm and destroyed him utterly. In the Second Battle of Libya (November, 1941) General Auchinleck, seeking to provoke Rommel to an armoured clash, advanced upon the enemy's tanks with a cruiser force in a wide flanking drive from the south. At the same time his Infantry tanks frontally assaulted Rommel's main entrenchments further north. Rommel received a severe hammering, but he slipped away to El Agheila to come back and fight another day.

In the Third Battle of Libya (June, 1942) it was Rommel who attacked. He moved two panzer divisions swiftly round south of the British minefield and, coming up inside it, threatened both our unarmoured troops and rear. He

was met in head-on collision by two British Armoured Divisions, who sought to pin him against the mines. After ten days' ferocious fighting, Rommel broke open a gap through our minefield on the west, cleared out his wounded tanks, and brought up new armour. Rommel had the best of that argument (for one thing he had a better gun), and this time the British did the withdrawing. In those days RAC field commanders were sometimes criticized for what was called the "Death or Glory" cavalry charge. Since the German 88-millimetre outranged the British 2-pounder at battle range by 700 yards, however, it was imperative to "charge" in order to come to grips with him. We shall see what happened when a new weapon came on the scene.

In the fourth great battle of the Desert War, the Battle of Egypt, not only had the RAC received 6-pounder guns for their Crusader tanks and the reinforcement of the admirable American Shermans with their 75-millimetre guns, but also for the artillery men a mass of 25-pounder and 6-pounder anti-tank guns had reached the front, then securely anchored between the sea and the Quattara Depression. These factors called for a different handling of our armoured forces. So this time instead of being themselves the Assault Force, the tanks were given two other tasks, (1) close support of the infantry assault, (2) exploitation of the break-through.

General Alexander opened the Battle of El Alamein with a gigantic artillery barrage (for many days previously the RAF had bombed the Axis lines and all approaches). Now, under the cover of the guns the sappers went forward and cleared the mines. Then the infantry advanced, the

tanks closely following to beat back the counter-attack, and to break down strong-points that defied the assaulting waves.

After nine day's close and savage struggle, the battle rose to its final pitch in the terrible tank clash at El Aqaqir. While British Armoured units raided deep into the enemy rear, the massed British tanks moved against Rommel's armour south of El Aqaqir and there, in just and flame all day, they fought it out. By night the field was littered with three-quarters of the Axis tanks, and long into the darkness terrible duels continued. Next day the entire British armoured power poured through the shattered front, and the pursuit to Tripoli began.

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MISSION TO INDIA

The urgency with which the British Government regards the achievement of full self-government in India is underlined by the unprecedented action of sending three Cabinet Ministers to India later this month. Never before has so large a delegation of such high-ranking officials been sent there. This step dramatizes the British determination to set in motion the machinery to be used by the Indians in drafting their new constitution and deciding for themselves whether they prefer complete political independence to remaining in the British Commonwealth.

Previous British missions have played historic roles in the evolution of self-government in India. In 1917 Mr. E. S. Montagu, then Secretary of State for India, paid a visit to that country which resulted in the constitutional advance known as the Montagu-Chelmsford Reforms of 1919. In 1928 Parliament sent out the Statutory Commission under Sir John Simon to investigate the working of the Montagu-Chelmsford Reforms, but there was no one of cabinet rank on the commission.

In 1942 Sir Stafford Cripps, a member of the British War Cabinet, was sent to offer India complete self-government under a constitution of India's own devising, as soon after the war as the Indian political parties could agree on such a constitution. This mission tragically failed because the various Indian parties rejected the proposals for a diversity of reasons.

Despite the rejection, the Cripps offer in its main outlines still represents British policy, although changes may be made, especially in the manner of forming the constitution - making body. The object of the present Cabinet Mission is to give additional authority to the negotiations which the Viceroy is to carry on with elected Indian representatives.

Last September the Viceroy, Lord Wavell, returned to India from London and announced specific steps to be taken, in conjunction with Indian leaders and after the Central and Provincial elections, to promote Indian self-government. These included: 1) Preparatory discussions with the elected representatives of British India and with the Indian States, in order to secure the widest measure of agreement as to the method of framing a constitution; 2) the setting up of a constitution-making body; and 3) the bringing into being, in the meantime, of an Executive Council having the support of the main Indian parties.

The Central elections and session by the British Government.

BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

Provincial elections have now been held, and the results in the remaining Provinces will be known shortly. The next move is discussion about the formation of the constitution-making body. The Cabinet Mission will act in association with the Viceroy in these negotiations.

The Cripps proposals had outlined a method for setting up the constitution-making body, and it was meant only as a suggestion, but Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express was able to alter if Indian leaders agreed upon some other method. The method proposed was that immediately the results of the Provincial elections were known, all the members of the Lower Houses of the Provincial Legislatures should as an electoral college, proceed to elect the constitution-making body a system of proportional representation. This new body should be in number about one tenth of the number of the electoral college. The Indian States ruled by the Princes would be invited to appoint representatives in similar proportion to their total population.

The Ministers and the Viceroy will again lay this plan before the Indian leaders as a basis of discussion. The presence of the Ministers will simplify decision, but they will have to consult the Cabinet in London on the most important issues.

The first great problem to be faced in the discussion will be the insistence of the Moslem League on "Pakistan", a separate Moslem state formed from those parts of northern India where Moslems are in a majority. On the other hand, the Congress Party, which is predominantly Hindu, demands a united India. Britain's policy has in the past implied the hope for a single unit, but if reasonable agreement can be reached on another basis, Britain would consider it. Although the British Government hopes for the widest measure of agreement, they have not made agreement among the Indian political parties the first condition if any advance toward full self-government.

The composition of the Mission is itself indicative of the importance attached to their objective: Lord Pethick-Lawrens, Secretary of State for India, Sir Stafford Cripps, President of the Board of Trade, and Mr. A. V. Alexander, First Lord of the Admiralty. Sending the President of the Board of Trade at this critical time, a key figure in the British domestic policy, shows the importance accorded the Mission.

HUGE CIRCULATION OF BRITISH NEWS-PAPERS

BIG BRITISH PAPERS
The largest daily newspaper circulation in the world, according to an Associated Press dispatch from London, is claimed, and on very solid grounds, by Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express with a net average for February of 3,442,000 copies. The British capital has three other daily newspapers selling in the neighborhood of two million copies more or less—the Daily Mirror well over that number, the Daily Herald next, and the Daily Mail apparently a couple of hundred thousand copies below.

To match these towering figures this country has only the Daily News of this town with an average week-day circulation of approximately two and a quarter million copies. But the Sunday circulation of The News, with 4,500,000 copies, apparently passes or at least ties the biggest Sunday circulation in Great Britain, which is that of the News of the World. A second London paper, The People, publishes more than three million copies on Sunday.

BRITONS AVID READERS

What these single items indicate is more than borne out by the total figures for newspaper circulation. The British people are far ahead of us as a newspaper reading public. The total number of morning and evening papers sold, according to the latest trade statistics, is 41,000,000 copies in Great Britain and 46,000,000 copies in this country, with a British population only one-third of our own.

One reason, perhaps, is the size of British newspapers, smaller than ours at all times, and cut down by war rationing to a fraction of normal, in many instances to four pages. A public hungry for war news can be imagined buying as many different newspapers as it can afford on the chance of picking up something crowded out from a person's regular paper.

But the war is not the chief explanation. Giant daily circulations are an old story in the British press for half a century, ever since Lord Northcliffe's debut, with the Daily Mail in 1886. On the eve of the last war the

WEST INDIAN CONFERENCE

On Thursday, February 21st, in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands of the United States, the second West Indian Conference opened under the auspices of the Caribbean Commission.

The Caribbean Commission, formerly called the Anglo-American Caribbean Commission, is one of the most serious and promising attempts at international co-operation in colonial problems. The change of name announced last month marks an important event in its development; namely, the acceptance by the governments of France and the Netherlands of the invitation of Britain and the United States to become equal partners with them in the Commission, thus broadening the area of co-operation. The Commission now includes the four countries with territories in the Caribbean: the United Kingdom (the Leeward and Windward Islands, Trinidad, the Bahamas, British Guiana, Jamaica, Barbados and British Honduras); the United States (Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands); France (Martinique, Guadeloupe, and French Guiana); and the Netherlands (Dutch Guiana, Curacao and its associated islands).

The enlarged Commission will continue to hold to the purpose for which the United States and Britain founded it in 1942: to encourage common action in social and economic matters among the colonies in the area. Many of their problems are difficult to solve because of the communities, which hinder the establishment of full-scale social institutions such as centres for medical research and health, agricultural colleges, and co-ordinated inter-island transports.

Leading newspaper circulations in London must have been very different from what they are today.

LABOR PAPER SOARS

In second or third place after the Daily Express among London papers is the Daily Herald with an estimated two million circulation. It is the official organ of the British trade unions and its growth in the last fifteen years or so is certainly a romance of business. In a newspaper

Only by common action over the whole area will the needs of the individual colonies in these matters be fully met and the economic and social research in the area be made available to all.

The enlarged Commission also hopes to continue its encouragement of the peoples of the region to participate in the work of the Commission, with the object of developing their free political institutions. One definite measure taken to foster local participation was the arrangement made last June by Britain and the United States to include representatives of Puerto Rico and local British West Indian Colonies as Commissioners. According to this agreement each parent government was to be allowed four Commissioners; two of the four British Commissioners were to come from the British West Indian colonies and were to be unofficial Commissioners. Now for the first time, the Dutch and French Governments will also appoint four Commissioners each.

Another important measure of colonial participation is the Caribbean Commission's sponsorship of the regular West Indian Conferences, to which each British and United States territory has sent two delegates, and the French and Dutch territories a total of eight. One of each pair of the British and United States delegates is unofficial, thus securing wider, unhampered representation.

The Conference now sitting is reviewing the recommendations of the first West Indian Conference held two years ago in Barbados, and considering further action to be taken on policy recommendations recently made by the British and American representatives of the Caribbean Commission.

The problems to be dealt with

at St. Thomas include raising the nutritional level of the region; re-absorbing into civilian life persons engaged in war employment; planning of public works for improving agriculture, education, housing and public health; health protection and quarantine; industrial development; the possible expansion of the Caribbean Research Council.

These were the topics developed at the Barbados Conference in 1944, which referred its recommendations back to the Governments of the territories concerned concerned in the two intervening years, since action has been taken. The cooperation of the United States and the United Kingdom has been of considerable benefit. For instance, Britain had, up to December 31st, 1944 approved £3,410,000 (\$33,640,000) under the 1940 Colonial Development and Welfare Act for Development and Welfare measures in the British West Indies. Money for this fund comes from the British taxpayer.

It must be emphasized that the functions of both the Caribbean Commission and West Indian Conference are purely advisory. The delegates at St. Thomas will report to their governments, the recommendations arrived at by the Conference, to be acted upon only if agreed by the Governments. It is an experiment in colonial regionalism which promises, over a period of years, to bring improvements in productivity and standards of living to a region in need of both.

A few hours the Great Trek was resumed. After forty days and nights of journeying, Rommel came to El Aghella, where twice before the tide of desert war had turned. The Eighth Army had been ready for another Alamein. But though armoured battles followed, the German commander kept the main body of his troops disengaged and in retreat. On New Year's Day, 1943, the 7th Armoured Division and the New Zealanders (8th Armoured Brigade), left-flanking the position at Wadi Chebir, advanced boldly and directly across the sand towards Tripoli. Its armoured cars entered the town three weeks later.
