Vehículos preferidos contra las minas enemigas

WASHINGTON.—Los técnicos del ejército de los Estados Unidos han ideado un sistema para proteger de grandes lesiones a los vehículos militares ligeros cuando una mina terrestre estalla abajo de ellos.

Según dice la Secretaría de Guerra, el dispositivo es un piso armado por cinco planchas de Adolindalaje, tratadas térmicamente para aumentar su resistencia. El sistema es colocado entre el chasis y el cubo, que delante y en sus bases ejecutadas últimamente se cierran estallando minas debajo de dichos vehículos provistos del nuevo piso.

Con este sistema se abolla quedó intacto los vehículos pudieron continuar a marcha.

Nuevo sistema de encendido para la aviación

WASHINGTON.—Una fábrica aviones de los Estados Unidos ha perfeccionado un nuevo sistema de encendido que permite un funcionamiento más eficiente de los aviones a gran altura. El nuevo sistema ya está instalado en aviones de combate y con él se salvan muchas horas de vuelo que anteriormente se perdían en las motrices de avistamiento. El nuevo encendido trabaja efectivamente en alturas de quince mil metros.

Instrucción por radio

WASHINGTON.—La instrucción por radio para la difusión de regímenes culturales y de enseñanza, según la Comisión Federal de Comunicaciones gozará de gran demanda en los Estados Unidos en el año de la guerra. La Comisión ha dividido últimamente veinte bandas de frecuencia modulada para el uso de la Dirección de Radiodifusión Pública, que incluye que más de 2000 quinientas estaciones estarán funcionando dentro de los próximos cinco años, alcanzando así el 84 por ciento de la población del país. El plan provee un sistema uniforme de estaciones difusoras de instrucción, incluyendo centros de enseñanza correspondiente de las universidades.

LA COMPAÑIA BANANERA ESTÁ ENSAYANDO UN NUEVO SISTEMA PARA LA SIEMBRA DEL CACAO CON BUENOS RESULTADOS

Un grupo de caballeros de Limón irá mañana a visitar en Zent las plantaciones que está llevando a cabo la Compañía Bananera con cacao por medio del sistema de estacas en vez de semillas como se ha ejecutado siempre. Parece que los resultados obtenidos son espléndidos en cuanto a la producción que se estima de unos cuarenta quintales por hectárea es decir cinco veces más de lo que corrientemente producen las fincas actualmente.

Según los datos que hemos podido obtener el sistema de siembra por estacas reduce el tiempo de cosecha a la mitad. Es decir que matas de un año

y ocho meses están en producción con enorme rendimiento.

Si los datos que nos han suministrado son exactos, la siembra de cacao sería la salvación de la provincia atlántica, ya que podría producir diez veces más a precios muy inferiores de lo que ahora resulta, debido a los altos precios que se están pagando.

Nos han ofrecido, para el próximo número, un detalle completo y un estudio comparativo que estimamos de especial interés para nuestra provincia y que publicaremos si nos es posible conseguirlo a tiempo.

En Siquirres no ha podido distribuirse el azúcar

Nuestro corresponsal de Siquirres nos avisa que desde principios de esta semana no se distribuye azúcar en Siquirres porque los encargados de su venta se niegan a retirar el azúcar del Banco mientras no se les permite venderlo a sesenta céntimos la libra. Alegan los interesados que ellos tienen que invertir una fuerte cantidad de dinero para la compra del azúcar y que el precio a que lo compran no permite ninguna utilidad vendiendo a cincuenta y cinco céntimos como es el precio fijado. En cuanto a los otros lugares del Cantón la situación es todavía peor pues hay que cargarle el valor de los fletes y entonces la venta deja pérdidas que ningún comerciante quiere aceptar.

Entendemos que se han dirigido al señor Administrador

General de precios planteando el problema con todos los detalles y esperan que sea resuelto favorablemente.

En lo que se refiere a Limón y al Cantón Central la situación es parecida y si no se ha suspendido la distribución es porque la Junta acatando instrucciones del señor Gobernador, mantiene la distribución mientras se resuelve la situación en una forma que sea resuelto el problema.

Hasta el momento en que escribimos estas líneas, miércoles, la situación sigue lo mismo con grave perjuicio del consumidor ya que el azúcar resulta un artículo de primera necesidad que no puede faltar en los hogares por pobres que sean. Informaremos lo que se resuelve sobre el particular.

Braden exhorta que se mantenga vigilancia contra posibles agresores

WASHINGTON.—El Subsecretario de Estado, Spruille Braden, declaró en esta ciudad que la vigilancia de los Estados Unidos continúa siendo apresurada, tanto en el mundo de la postguerra y que el país debe hallarse en disposición de defender sus derechos y la dignidad del individuo.

Braden, ex Embajador de los Estados Unidos en Argentina, cuando nombrado por el Secretario de Estado, por el Presidente Truman fue aprobado unanimemente por el Senado, dijo en un banquete el Día de la Madre que el país no debía comprometer y perder durante las pasadas principales por los cuales luchó y con sus aliados, ganó la guerra.

Braden dijo que era conveniente recordar que los nazis, aunque derrotados, no han dejado de batallear ni han sido aún erradicados.

Ideologías nocivas

"Sobrevenían en gran número," continuó diciendo, "para disuadirnos de sus malévolas ideologías, y oímos, más tarde, que nos consideraban imitadores. A este respecto puedo hablar basando en mis propias observaciones. He presenciado el sufrimiento de miles de personas en los últimos años atrás, tal como lo hicimos nosotros, humillada, dicho con absoluto compromiso de no permitir que nadie y sin embargo, hoy ha sucedido allí."



El anuncio fué hecho en Washington por Thomas B. McCabe, Director de Liquefied Gas para el efectivo de la aviación de los Estados Unidos.

La Oficina de ventas se constituirá en el Terminal Aéreo de Miami, que es el centro de ventas de Ventas para la Exportación.

McCabe ha dicho que "con la estrecha cooperación de la fuerza aérea del centro de las operaciones de Miami ofrecerá una oportunidad excelente para disponer del exceso de aviones militares que ya no son necesarios para el servicio de las Fuerzas Armadas de los Estados Unidos.

húmedo; sopora bien la sequía. Tiene las mismas exigencias de clima que el maíz. La madurez de la semilla está en relación con el clima del lugar, la temperatura y las lluvias.

Suelo.—Las tierras fértilas y profundas, bien provistas de materia orgánica, con preferencia las arenacillas, sueltas y filtrantes, son las que se adaptan al cultivo del girasol. Puede cultivarse esta oleaginosa en aquellas regiones en donde el maíz rinde poco por razón de clima o fracasa por falta de lluvias.

Siembra.—Cuando hay buena humedad en el suelo, y sobre todo suficientes lluvias se puede pensar en la siembra. Se prepara el suelo en hiladas sobre surcos paralelos abiertos con distancia de unos 30 cms. de mata a mata, colocando en cada hueco que se

abra de cuatro a cinco semillas. A las calles se les dará un ancho de 80 cms., o algo más si se van a hacer cultivos intercalados. Las semillas germinarán rápidamente, y a los ocho días se observará el crecimiento pareja del campo.

Labores culturales.—Entre-saca o raleo.—Germinadas las plantitas, de los 10 a los 20 días, se procede a la entre-saca o raleo, dejando de cada grupo una o dos más fuertes, preferible una sola, arrancando con cuidado las que se eliminan para no estropear las que quedan. Esta operación debe siempre encargarse a trabajadores expertos. Limpia: después de la operación anterior, habrá que mantener el suelo removido, suelto y limpio de hierbas. Se puede usar un tipo de cultivador apropiado para romper los lomillitos, y las matas se aportarán cuando alcancen de 45 a 50 cms. de altura. Podas: La poda o supresión de botones se hace al tiempo de la floración, cortando todas las reses secundarias y dejando únicamente la flor terminal de cada tallo. Cuando la flor está bien desarrollada, se puede cortar las hojas empezando de abajo hasta la mitad o do-

terceras partes, y éstas pueden utilizarse como ensilaje y alimentación de vacunos.

Recolección.—Cuando el girasol está en buen punto o sazon, y los capítulos se han inclinado hacia el suelo presentando una coloración críseácea, se procede a la recolección. Generalmente esto se efectúa después de los tres meses de la siembra o a los cuatro meses de la siembra. Un punto para conocer la madurez del girasol es cuando las florecillas que cubren las semillas se desprenden solas o a la ligera fricción con la mano. Debe tenerse presente que no es importante la madurez del tallo sino el de la semilla. La cosecha se efectúa a mano, con ayuda de un machete afilado o con una tijera de podar, cortando los tallos que llevan las flores a 20 cms. de la base. Se llevan estos a una plataforma o a un piso endurecido para completar la desecación.

Desgrane.—Ya sea golpeando las flores unas con otras, o pegándoles golpes livianos con una vara, o por medio de las mismas trilladoras que se usan para cereales, se desprenden los granos de la flor. Luego se asolean por varios días hasta que sequen completamente y se pasan por una zaranda a fin de eliminar pedazos o fragmentos de flores que puedan causar fermentación en las semillas. Las semillas ya limpias, deben ser removidas por varios días, ensacándose al final y almacenándose en algún sitio a propósito que asegure su conservación.

Desgrane.—Ya sea golpear Rendimiento. — El girasol puede rendir alrededor de mil kilogramos de grano limpío y seco al sol por hectárea. Contando con condiciones meteorológicas apropiadas y prestando una atención esmerada

Vino no solamente a estudiar los planes del nuevo Matadero que va a construir la Municipalidad de Limón, sino también a presentar algunas sugerencias para modernizar el sistema de sacrificio de los animales, la distribución de los distintos departamentos y el destino de los animales para la venta al público. Conversó extensamente con el ingeniero Municipal don Rogelio Pardo y llegaron a un acuerdo sobre todos los detalles que se discutieron en relación propiamente con la construcción y acondicionamiento del edificio.

Resta ahora que la Corporación Municipal apruebe las sugerencias en lo que se refiere al sacrificio de los animales y al sistema de destino que son de una gran importancia. Aquí sacrificamos las reses por un sistema antiguo que convierte esa necesidad inevitable de matar, en un espectáculo doloroso y cruel que es posible evitar con elementos modernos. Aquí también destazamos anteojadizamente sin el menor conocimiento de la anatomía y sin una selección de las partes de la res donde pueden obtenerse diferencias de carne que se pierden lastimosamente.

Ahora que está al frente del departamento del matadero un competente veterinario, sería fácil reglamentar estos servicios y enseñar a los destazadores las ventajas que pueden obtener ellos y el público con la modernización de estos servicios.

BALFOUR Y EL LIBRO BLANCO

El 2 de noviembre de 1917 en documento pequeño, apenado de unas pocas palabras, trajo una nueva esperanza al pueblo judío. De la existencia más incierta y menos segura el judaísmo mundial y con él, el judío como individuo, se sintieron repentinamente apoyados sobre una base segura más sólida; que presagiaba un hoy mejor y un mañana mucho mejor.

Después de gestiones inútiles entre Alemania y Rusia, el fundador Teodor Herzl, se dirigió como último recurso, al gobierno de la Gran Bretaña y, por primera vez desde la destrucción del Estadio judío en el '70 de la Era Cristiana, las negociaciones entre Inglaterra y los judíos se llevaron a cabo en un plano de perfecta igualdad, de Estado a Estado.claro está que la actitud inglesa ha sido eternamente agradecida por parte de todo el pueblo judío y, en realidad Inglaterra no podía esperar otra cosa. Y así, después de desechados los proyectos

de Uganda y de Al-Arish, se llegó finalmente a la declaración Balfour que fue dada al conocimiento del mundo, el 2 de noviembre de 1917. Fue un simple gesto del pueblo inglés y de su gobierno que confirmó, una vez más, el espiritu

Cuando apareció el documento, los judíos lo tomaron con recelo, casi con misterio. La emigración a Palestina se hacía lenta y solo después de una ardua campaña en que era necesario una fuerte propaganda entre la prensa y la gente masiva del pueblo judío para lograr apenas una emigración a Palestina en proporción mínima. Tan acostumbrado estaba el judío al dolor y a la persecución, que no podía concebir un mañana mejor o un mejoramiento del entorno de cosas. Y, debido a esto, la declaración Balfour no fue aprovechada por el pueblo judío en momentos en que pudo haberlo hecho.

Por otra parte, y desde principios del mandato de Palestina fue entregado a ingleses conservadores, antisemita

tas en la mayoría de los países. Para ellos, la declaración era un simple documento como tantos otros; una declaración vagas, imprecisa, según ellos los "obligaba" interpretarla constantemente pero a su gusto. Al respecto ya nuestro gran escritor N. Nordau se había mostrado celoso. Desde el primer momento y cuando le fui entregada la declaración para que dijera su "visto bueno", se mostró inconforme con su contenido. Empezó entonces a pedir una declaración más concisa, más concreta y el único que entonces obtuvo fue la burla de los demás líderes judíos.

Más adelante, los mandatarios ingleses se encargaron de justificar los terremotos de Novoku y, en los treinta años de operaciones a la creación del Estado Judío, estorbaban, por todos los medios a su alcance, el movimiento nacional renacentista.

En todas las oportunidades se opusieron a la compra de tierras, a la emigración y a la reconstrucción del país llevada a cabo por los judíos. Si bien ellos muy bien quién causaba los disturbios, quién los empezaba y quien los ter-

mornaba y, sin embargo, defendió el Parlamento Británico pedía saber la veracidad de la tesis que la causa de todo era "el factor judío". Duraron durante 25 años, buscando apoyo por todas partes lo encontraron; los Mamelucos árabes se prestaron sus fines gustosamente hasta que llegó el colapso, la publicación del "Libro Blanco" y con él, el fruto de todo un cuarto de siglo de intrigas y crímenes.

Hoy en día, las cosas han cambiado radicalmente; el espíritu conservador ha sido reemplazado por el espíritu liberal;

la administración colonial británica ha cambiado tanto en el elemento humano como en los métodos de gobierno y un nuevo "ente" de justicia parece estar germinando en todo el Imperio inglés. Todas estas transformaciones, así como han de afectar a indios, árabes y negros, habrán de afectarnos a nosotros también como parte integrante de ese Imperio. Tiempo o temprano, el "Libro Blanco" será abolido; tenemos absoluta seguridad de ello, porque decir Inglaterra, es decir "Carta Magna", es decir Estatutos de Oxford".

THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Much of our discontent in life is due less to any lack in our own right than to the seeming overabundance in that of our neighbour. If he had not so much we should discover fewer deficiencies for ourselves.

We are not so greatly dis-satisfied with what we miss as with what we possess.

TO THE MEMORY OF ARTHUR NEVILLE CHAMBERLAIN

On the record of the fleeting years, we observed on Friday, eight days ago the loss of five years ago in conjunction with Great Britain as well as the appreciable world on a whole by the death of the Honourable Arthur Neville Chamberlain who had given way in May of the year 1940 to Lord Winston Churchill in the Premiership of Great Britain.

Arthur Neville Chamberlain who was an outstanding bearer of the lamp of Peace crossed the Great Divide on November the 9th, 1940. He entered his tomb with the dislike of many of his countrymen and others heaped upon him due to his pacific efforts and the policy of his government in those early days of the lightening Nazi strides; — seemingly those who considered him a weakling had not full comprehension that the late ex-Prime Minister was playing his divine role, if we be permitted to apply such a term; in the pursuance of his efforts for the maintenance of the peace of the world and the pacification of the European Agitators. However, those familiar with the histories of the great British Empire were cognizant of the fact that in every hour of emergency Great Britain finds its leader. As in the harrowing days of Lord Nelson — Lord Roberts — Earl Kitchener — Lloyd George — Baldwin and other illustrious sons who had played their parts a right before passing off the scene of actions, so was Arthur Neville Chamberlain the right man at the opportune moment.

Let a section of the human race dub him a bell hop to the Third Reich of Germany and the other places where the conferences were conducted; let them think of him as a man who had bowed to the then raging Hitler, but all those who live in a universe of righteous thinking will do honour to the name of Arthur Neville Chamberlain; that marvellous apostle of peace — the British statesman who had fully realized that Great Britain was caught in the flood of aggression and not fully prepared to meet it; so wonderfully, in his own medium, on his knees, and with iron hand he muzzled Hitler and his henchmen and with the other hand he signalled his Government and loyal peoples to whip themselves into shape to stem the flood and at the same time his effort served as an eye opener to the other free and peace loving nations of the universe; thus we believe the foundation was laid for the Allied Victory. In our own soul we do honour to the memory of Arthur Neville Chamberlain on the occasion of the fifth anniversary of his death.

JAPANESE MAKE FRIENDLY MOVE TOWARD TAN YANKS

TOKYO. — Japanese inhabitants of the Tokyo-Yokohama area are rapidly becoming accustomed to the ebony faces of Negro troops among our occupation forces, and their initial awe and unconcealed curiosity is being replaced by friendly overtures.

Hundreds of Japanese stevedores, working under the supervision of Negro non-coms on the Yokohama docks are exchanging Japanese words and phrases for a collection of pure Harleman that is likely to throw consternation into the ranks of those Japanese who are now expressing alarm over the existing state of culture in the nation.

"NO NEGROES IN TOKYO"

Though no Negro troops are presently assigned to Tokyo proper, every trip of the steam and electric trains coming up from

Yokohama brings in Tan Yanks, sightseeing bent, into the big city. With a sense of direction that is almost incredible, they immediately discover the locations of the only places in town where a fifteen minute wait in line will garner a bottle of beer. With equal astuteness they discover places of amusement which the brilliant minds of commissioned officers have missed entirely.

PLANS TO START NEW LIFE IN BRITAIN'S GOLD COAST

NEW YORK. — A 35-year-old U. S. Negro has written a letter to Lord Halifax, British Ambassador to the United States, asking the chances of starting a new life in the British colony of the Gold Coast, West Africa. He is Allen E. Webb of 505 West 148th Street, New York City. Mr. Webb served in the United States Merchant Marine during the war.

"During a visit to the Gold Coast while on war service," he says in his letter, "I was immensely impressed with the British colonial system as is operated there, and was inspired to ... offer my services in carrying an employability ideal to fruition."

LIKES BRITISH POLICY

"... I am convinced that Britain has conceived and put into practice in the Gold Coast, a policy that holds promise of the maximum development of the resources of the colony, together with a commendable degree of material well-being for the African people". Mr. Webb is married and has one child. He is at present employed by the U. S. Army in the admissions division.

"Mr. Webb first came to know the Gold Coast while serving on the Patrick Henry first of the Liberty ships. He told a reporter:

"In my travels over a large part of the world, I have rarely seen anything so impressive as this British colony."

"When my ship first arrived at Takoradi, the main port, I stood in amazement at the sight of an African, wearing an official British uniform, boarding our ship to conduct the business of the Port Authority."

"Equally strange was an interview with an African Customs official, who outlined the products obtainable, duty free, for souvenirs. But these two incidents proved to be merely preludes to a more complete observation of the African's role in the

British colony; his complete integration into the economic life of the land with British guidance and assistance.

SEES OFFICIALS

"Later I was to see an African postmaster, an African wireless operator. Then there was a meeting with an African lawyer of great renown, a railway traffic manager and a police commissioner.

"Two shipmates fell sick and I took them to Takoradi Hospital. Many shipmates submitted to medical operations, conscious of the

scrupulously hygienic conditions and the skill of the African medical assistants.

PRIMITIVE PICTURE FALSE

"By this time it was clear that where life once moved to the rhythm of tribal quarrels, and ward self-rule, the hospital, rapidly decimated by disease and fratricidal warfare there is now a thriving community headed toward self-rule. The hospitals and schools bear testimony to the huge sums spent for the improvement of health and education.

CHICAGOAN NAMED TO UNITED STATES GOVT

Washington. — Following his nomination by President Truman last week to the judgeship of the U. S. Customs Court in New York City, Irvin C. Mollison, a Chicago attorney and native of Vicksburg, Miss., declared: "This is another expression of the President's announced policy of justice and fairness to all Americans".

Attorney Mollison also had the support of Senator Scott W. Lucas, Representative A. Rowan and Mayor Edward J. Kelly of Chicago.

THE FUTURE AERIAL DEFENCE OF THE UNITED STATES

A Washington release gives the information that General Doolittle informed the Committee of Military Affairs of the Senate that the Army aspire to count on the post-war with a fleet of five thousand airplanes ready to enter in immediate service; four hundred thousand officers and men, in addition to the national guard;—very ample as could defend the United States. Declaration was effected in favour of the aerial force under the jurisdiction only of the Department of Nat. Defence. Five thousand airplanes ought to be utilized at any moment with a reserve tactic of another three thousand. The fighting air force to consist of seventy groups in comparison with the fifty eight groups of the English Air Force in British bases: comprehending twenty five groups of heavy bombers in sixteen groups of fighters of ample radius of action.

Reference was made to the vulnerability of the United States in attacks to cross the polar regions and said that the United States is actually manufacturing a plane with twice the radius of action than the Superfortresses, but which was requisite to detach that the United States have not the monopoly over the planes of very high flights, mentioning that the Japanese succeeded to manufacture a bombing plane which flies without the series of harmonic proportion 16,000 kilometers in proof flights and that the aeroplanes of Lockheed from where the North American Superfortresses left for the flight to Washington having been constructed by the Japanese as base for bombers against the United States. Continuing we gather that the General informed the Committee to consider the imperative necessity of the unification of the armed forces, acknowledging the greater importance of the aerial forces.

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BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

HOW HE DIED

The official British report on Hitler's last days is written in calm, matter-of-fact language, but nevertheless conveys the atmosphere of nightmare. How could it be otherwise? From the time he first caught the world's attention, the megalomaniac from Austria always seemed as if he belonged in a wild dream. With his street-fighters, his Gestapo, his book-burnings, his concentration camps, his pogroms, his deliberate policy of mass extermination, and all his other acts of limitless evil, he had such abnormality in him that there were moments when it was hard to believe he was quite real and not a projection of the mind's imagination.

It was in keeping with his character, therefore, and with the character of his whole career that he died as the British are convinced he did. First, after hysterical soul-searching and prolonged prostration, there was his April 22nd decision to meet his doom in Berlin with Eva Braun, who had enjoyed the peculiar glory of being his mistress. Then, on April 28th he revealed arrangements for their double suicide and cremation. Next, on April 29th, for some reason known only to themselves—possibly to achieve a measure of personal respectability in the eyes of history or because of some last-minute impulse of brooding romanticism—the two were wed and at their nuptial feast spoke of nothing but the deaths they were soon to die. And finally, at about mid-afternoon the next day, after the last farewells, they destroyed themselves, he with a gun and she with poison. But there was to be one more touch of the macabre. In keeping with the Fuehrer's instructions, Goebbels and two or three others of the faithful, moving like figures in a scene from hell, carried the bodies to a garden, drenched them with gasoline and set them afire, so that no trace of them could ever be found.

Thus it was—and the British say the evidence is as conclusive as it can be—that Hitler with his Eva came to an end in dying as the whole dark world of Nazism crashed down. As a finish, it was some better than the finish of Mussolini and his Carlotta, but night-marris nonetheless. To the last the megalomaniac was like a figure in a wild dream. The dramatists will have much to work with there. One must assume that in whatever plays they write about him, they will make provision for devices—or stage or on—to suggest how terrible were the weeping and suffering of the multitudes not because this man died but because he ever lived,

NO MORE WAR TRIAL DELAY

It would be nothing short of an outrage to delay the Nuremberg war crimes trials until after the first of the year, now said to be contemplated, to give the Nazi defendants more time to prepare their cases.

After the formal indictments were finally handed down, defendants were given a month to engage counsel and prepare their defense. That should be ample time for this purpose, bringing the start of the trials to November 20.

But now we hear the German counsellors are asking for more time and court observers are saying that they do not see how the tribunal could refuse them. Why not? Couldn't the court simply say "No?"

Two factors promoting delay are said to be the condition of two of the prisoners, Gustav Krupp von Bohlen, who is ill in a hospital and Rudolf Hess, whose mental fitness is still questioned. If Krupp remains to ill to stand trial, why could not the proceedings begin without him? As for Hess, he has been in Allied hands so long that it seems incredible that it is still undetermined whether he is sane or not. The summoning of a special psychiatrist from the United States to examine him is certainly carrying things to farcical extremes.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN AND THE BRITISH EMPIRE

LONDON, Nov.—London commentators call attention to the tribute President Truman paid to the British Empire in his speech at the White House on Saturday, November 10th, at which the British Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Clement Attlee, was the guest of honour. The Chief Executive of the United States said: "One of the great things of the British Empire is that when they have a foreign policy—and they always have one—the British people are behind this policy, no matter which Government is in power." This inevitably evoked Prime Minister Attlee's observation in his Mansion House speech, when he stated: "It is, I think, in these days, when we are considering how nations can live together and progress harmoniously, worthwhile to look at the example which the British Empire and Commonwealth can afford."

PRINCE TELLS OF DACHAU CRIMES

Scenes of appalling brutality, deaths from starvation, and of incidents of cannibalism at the notorious Dachau concentration camp are described by Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia, a distant relative of the ex-Kaiser. The prince, who was interned there in 1944, has made a statement to the United States War Crimes Commission.

Persecuted for refusing to join the Nazi party, he was arrested in May, 1944, and later transferred from Salzburg to the Dachau camp hospital with diphtheria. There he saw patients who had died from starvation.

"Prisoners coming for medical treatment", said Prince Leopold, "were kept waiting outside the hospital, 100 to 200 at a time. Stripped of their clothing, they stood for periods up to two hours during the coldest months of the year. Many died from exposure. Towards the end of March, 1945, trainloads of prisoners arrived at the camp. Many were dead on arrival; the living were terribly starved. As the carriage doors were opened, the dead fell out. Some of the prisoners in this new arrival had existed by eating human flesh".

RADIO CONTROLS TRAINS

SAVINGS PASS \$ 10,000,000,000

For the first time in Canada a railway yard is being completely operated by radio. Tests are being conducted at the Long Pointe yard of the Canadian National Railways with the cooperation of the Canadian Marconi Company. With the touch button contact is established between offices and locomotives. Instructions are given, received and checked in a matter of seconds. Ten locomotives and two yard offices are equipped with 50-watt transmitting and receiving sets. Central control units are located in the offices on the tender of each engine there is a steel—encased radio having an aerial similar to those used on automobiles. In each car there is a control box with a loud speaker and microphone, which allows three-way communication among locomotives and with the central stations.

If the tests are successful, it is anticipated that the operating hours of locomotives will be considerably reduced while freight shipments would be speeded up by as much as 24 hours. The use of radio communication would bring about faster train movement with greater operating economy and efficiency, according to H. F. Finnemore, chief electrical engineer, C. N. R.

The National Savings movement yesterday passed the \$10,000,000,000 mark in savings raised since the campaign began at the beginning of the war, said Sir Harold Mackintosh, chairman of the National Savings Committee.

"These astronomical figures", he said, "mean that during this period an average of four shillings out of every pound of private income has been saved and lent to the Government. And that was in addition to four shillings direct and two shillings indirect taxation on every pound. Thus, one half of the private income of the country has gone to the Government either as voluntary savings or as taxation".

National Savings averaged \$32,000,000 a week since the campaign began. The tenth thousand million was obtained in 27 weeks at the rate of \$37,000,000 a week. This high figure was due to the Thanksgiving Campaign, during which a record average of \$74,000,000 a week has been raised.

Last week's "small" savings totalled £ 20,520,662, as compared with £ 21,646,582 in the previous week. Last week's total was made up of £ 6,473,596 from the sale of Savings Certificates, £ 9,489,561 from the sale of Defence Bonds and £ 4,557,706 from an increase in the balances due to depositors in the Post Office Savings Banks.

"MY DEAR DIZZY"


Here is the "Last Letter" of a British Secret Agent, smuggled home while he was awaiting death in Buchenwald Camp.

It is one of the most "humane documents" of the war and permission has now been received to publish it in full.

The Agent, captured in civilian clothes by the Germans, eventually saved his life by inducing two German doctors who were conducting "human guinea-pig" experiments to transfer him to the special hospital wing. Later he persuaded them to exchange his identity with that of a French corps.

The corpse was cremated in the writer's name. Then in spite of his weakened condition the writer made a number of attempts to escape. Finally he broke out of a camp near the Bohemian border and led ten companions to safety in the American lines.

Pictures have now been released telling the story of Radar—the radiolocation developments which British scientists had in readiness at the outbreak of war. Years of research and experimentation in conjunction with Service experts led to the development of defensive devices which revolutionised war tactics. Later, offensive devices were evolved—Radar range-finders for guns for locating enemy surface and under-surface craft from both air and sea, air—craft attachments by which night fighters could locate enemy raiders, and bombers could bomb accurately through cloud, being a few examples.
