The centre of the production of the most important cereals-corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye and buck wheat-taken in the aggregate, is in Illinois, a few miles north of Quincy. Flour and grist mills, following the raw materials, are clustering near the Mississippi. In the valley, too, is the centre of the production of iron ore, coal, lead, zinc, tobacco, timber, petroleum and other important commodities. The centre of the country's manufactures is in Ohio, and, like the centre of population, which is in Indiana, it is moving in the direction of the great river. The Mississippi Valley is the industrial and social heart of the United States. It is the most populous watershed on the globe and the richest in natural resources. 




