for them as they broke all food supply stores, chiefly belonging to the poorer classes, and after taking all they could from them and the markets, destroyed the remainder.  
Commenting on Roosevelt's refusal of foreign help for San Francisco, the "Hamburger Nachrichten" take offence, and says the acceptance without doubt would have had the effect of cementing the friendly relations between the United States and Germany; the refusal will have a contrary effect, and doubtless the refusal has political considerations.  
The Czar opens the National Assembly on the 10th of May.  
News from Varsovia says that at daylight on Saturday last seven men, dressed in uniform of the gendarme occupying two carriages, reached the prison and delivered to the governor a forged order to deliver ten prisoners confined for political reasons and who were to be tried that day. The order stated that they were to be conveyed to the city. The governor was caught in the trap and delivered the men. After daybreak the carriages were found empty on the borders of the city, the coachman bound and gagged, and the uniforms thrown on the side of the road. No trace of the prisoners or their rescuers has been discovered.  
In the fencing struggle at the Olympic Games the British team won by 9 points against 2. King Edward, Queen Alexandra, and the Greek Royal Family were present.  
The commander of the British forces in Crete has been ordered to send a battery of horse and three companies of infantry to Egypt.  
The elections in the Baltic provinces have resulted in a triumph for the Radicals and constitutional Democrats over the Nobles.  
The Catholic Archbishop of Westminster has published a protest against the proposed law for public instruction which he says is unjust because the local authorities will have the control of religious studies.  
King Edward, Czar Nicholas and the Kaiser will meet at Darmstadt in the first week of September. The Czar and Czarina will leave Russia in August to visit the Duke of Hess e.  
A fire at Lens destroyed four flour factories. It is believed that it was of incendiary origin, because the proprietors provided flour for the troops. The authorities have postponed the examination of conscripts on account of the strike. The Prosecutor General has taken action against the strikers who murdered a lieutenant of Dragoons.  
Revolutionists stole two cannon from the base of the monument for commemorating the capture of Kazan from the Tartars by Ivan the Terrible, at Gazan. Due to the inundation the thieves reached the monument by boat and embarked the cannon. It is supposed that they intend using it for revolutionary purposes.  
The police investigation at Sinfep, opal as to the origin of the anti-Jewish movement has resulted in the arrest of lieutenant Graumprenks, who is accused of inciting the population to attack the Jews.  
A German engineer has invented an apparatus which permits a steamer travelling 11 to 12 miles an hour to take in coal at the rate of 50 to 60 tons an hour. The German Government has adopted the invention.  
The Prince of Wales, the Crown Princess of Austria, Portugal, Belgium and Greece as well as Prince Albert of Prussia and the Duke of Genoa will attend King Alfonso's wedding.  
In reply to a question in the House of Commons, Earl Grey said that it was necessary to increase the British garrison in Egypt at the request of Lord Cromer, in view of the activity of Turkey over the Tabok question.  
The "Tribune" publishes a despatch from Aldershot that General French has been ordered to mobilize immediately, in view of the gravity of the situation in South Africa. The Minister of War denies the report but the "Tribune" insists and says they are probably intended for Egypt.

**LATEST CABLES.**  
The Italian papers are commenting freely on the assistance given by the Cardinals at the reception to the Ministers accredited to the Quirinal since, 1870 this has never occurred.  
The American Ambassador gave a magnificent banquet in honor of Archbishop Ireland, at which the commanders Vincenzo, Vennutelli, Sattoli, Matheni and Martencelli, assisted.  
In the 100 meter race at Olympia Daniels, the American came in first, Halmay, the Hungarian, second; Hearley, Australian, third; and Darbyshire, English, fourth. Time—1 minute 13 seconds. The bicycle race of 5 Kilometres was won by Verr, the Italian, with Coronolther (English) second.  
Swiss and Spanish anarchists have carried 40 bombs into Paris, nevertheless the situation is improved.  
Dr. Doyer of Lisbon has announced to the International Medical Congress that he has discovered a cure for cancer.  
The Sultan has refused the request of the Egyptian authorities to withdraw his troops from Tobak, England has sent instructions to his Ambassador to bring the matter up again at Constantinople.  
The rebel Bambatta, with 300 men has returned to Natal. The Colonial troops are after them.  
The civil and military authorities of Paris are ready for all eventualities for the 1st May. Eighty thousand men are on strike; of these 20,000 are of the disorderly element. Forty thousand soldiers of the line, and fifteen thousand republican guards and police are concentrated at points to prevent an entry into the city or west of the Concordia square.  
The printers will join the strike on the 2nd May, they demand 8 hours labor one day off every week.  
It is rumored that Father Gapan was arrested by order of the sacred Synod who condemned him to prison for deserting the Monastery. His wife has petitioned the Synod in his favor.  
News from Lens (France) says: "In spite of the presence of 30,000 soldiers the coal regions are practically in a state of revolt. Robbery, destruction of property and violence continues. The troops have orders not to interfere with the strikers except in self-defence. The officers are acting accordingly in the most liberal manner although the soldiers suffer in many ways. The discipline shown by the men is magnificent in face of the bottles, bricks, and pieces of iron hurled at them by the strikers, not a single shot has been fired. The only thing on record being the charge of the cavalry on the mob on Saturday, in which many of the horses and riders were injured through coming in contact with the barbed wires strung across the street. The strikers have taken refuge behind the houses and the commanders expect momentarily to receive orders to fire on them. The fury of the mob increases with hunger. Very little sympathy is expressed.

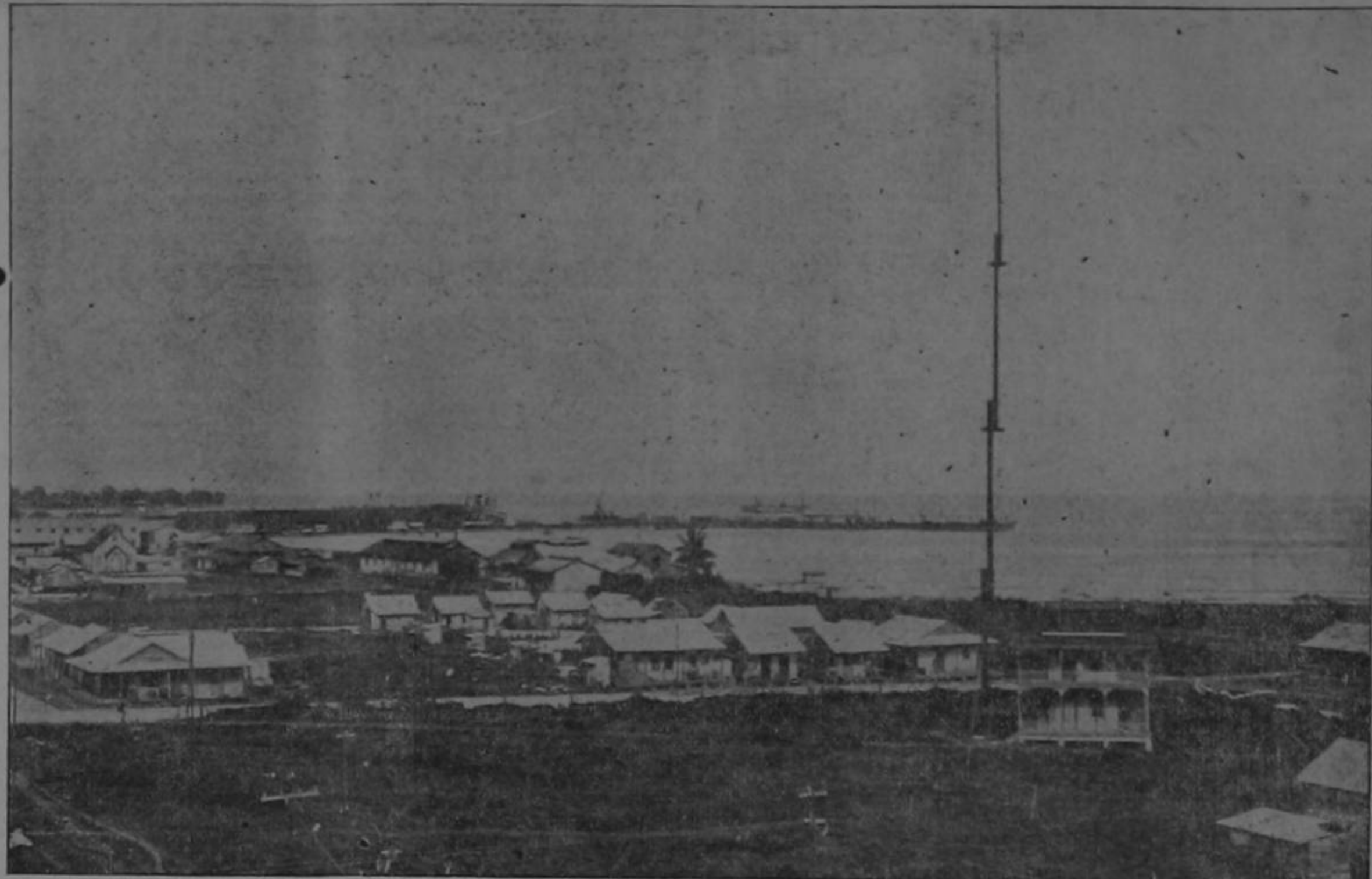
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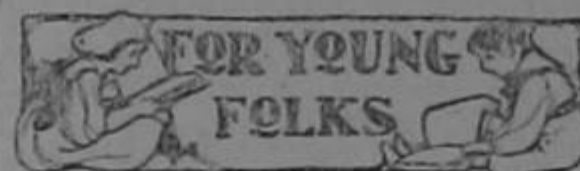

regiment of Dragoons has been ordered from Belfast.

News from Colon states that 20 steam shovels are on the Isthmus, of these 17 are working and the remainder ready to be put in operation.

The London "Daily Mail's" correspondent in St. Petersburg telegraphs that Father Gapon is in Kokoiska, Finland, living quietly.

A band of robbers disguised in soldier's uniforms entered the treasury at Dushet, Tiflis; and carried away 35,000 roubles.

The French bark "Dunquer" rescued the survivors of the Belgian training ship which sank near Dover. Many were saved by the port authorities but they refuse to give any particulars; this has caused a sadness, and the arrival of the "Dunquer" at Hamburg anxiously looked for.

The British authorities have called on the first Natal reserves to check the native rising. The Zulus are on the point of rising and much activity is noticed among the Beveris Land natives.

The "Orient" correspondent telegraphs to Berlin that a discovery of great importance has occurred at Lazaro. The document, which is said to be authentic, has caused a sensation throughout the world.

In spite of the weather, King Edward and Queen Alexandra, accompanied by the Duke and Duchess of Acosta, ascended Mount Vesuvius in automobiles.

The police of Lebanon have discovered the headquarters of a band of revolutionists, in which was a complete plan of the fortresses, telephone connections, deposits of arms, provisions, &c., with photographs.

A Milan despatch to the Paris "Eclair" says that the Vicar General of the Jesuits, has persuaded the Emperor Eugenie to place the whole of her fortune, which is calculated at 100,000,000 francs at the disposal of the church.

The Odessa revolutionist fired on the Inspector of police, Progebnos, and mortally wounded him, killing his Aide-de-Camp; both these officials were very active during the October massacres.

King Edward and Mr. Charles Harding, under Secretary of Foreign Relations, who accompanied His Majesty, are constantly receiving despatches from Campbell-Bannerman and Earl Grey, relative to the Turkish difficulties over the limits of Tabah.

The British steamer "Haversham," with 3,000 Russian soldiers on board, from Vladivostok for Odessa, arrived at Singapore on Monday. The "Haversham" collided with a Chinese steamer, the "Beutong," in the straits of Malacca and sank her; of 101 Chinese on board 30 were drowned.

A Berlin despatch says: "A lawyer named Margolina has received a letter written by a woman, enclosing another with 1,300 roubles cash, Gapon's pocket book and the key of his safe box to the deposit vaults of the Credit Lyonnais. The latter begs Margolina to carry out the instructions contained in the enclosure and which he may afterwards receive. The pocket book contains a receipt signed with the letter M, and is dated April 8th, the day on which Gapon disappeared."

Great Britain's patience with Turkey over the Tabah question is exhausted. The Secretary of Foreign Relations says that if Turkey does not immediately comply with England's demands, another naval demonstration will take place.

BABY DROWNED BY ITS 3 YEAR-OLD SISTER.

A pathetic story of the death of a baby six weeks old was told at the Woolwich Coroner's Court, England, by a mother.

The child was Dorothy Ruth May Branch, and on Friday last the mother left it in a cradle in the kitchen with her elder child Florence, three years old, while she went upstairs.

A little later Florence came up, and throwing her arms about her mother's neck, kissed her and said: "Sorry mamma."

As this was the way that Florence usually acted after some trifling act of wrong doing, Mrs. Branch paid no attention to it, but on going downstairs she found the baby in a bath full of water. She rushed with it to the nearest doctor who pronounced it dead, and on her return Florence said to her: "I put Dolly in the water, mamma. Dolly dead. Buy another Dolly."

The coroner pointed out to the jury that Florence was too young to be held responsible for the death of the baby, and a verdict of "Death by Misadventure" was returned.
