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
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WINGING ROCK FIRMLY FIXED

South American Natural Wonder Defied Dictator of Argentine.

One of the strangest of natural wonders of South America, is the novediza), says the Philadelphia Recard. The stone lies about half an nour's walk from the city of Tandil. province of Buenos Ayres, Argentine tepublic, upon the highest summit of little rocky ridge. When seen from he ravine it has the form of a giant yramid, while from another view it esembles an enormous cone. It is (wenty-one feet long and twenty-eight feet high, and its weight is judged to be about 12,500 hundredweight, or about 627 tons. From the distance the stone presents a peculiar aspect. It is so highly poised on the rocky slope that it seems as if we were watching a stone roll down the hill and resting for a second upon a very small base. But when we approach this swinging rock we are asionished by a new wonder. FOR BREAKING BREAD "STICKS."

The woman who makes her own bread will appreciate some new baking pans just put on the market. Each is about ten inches long by five wide and consists of a series of tiny troughs. These are intended for the baking of bread "sticks" which look a great deal more appetizing than the ordinary slice of bread, and which cost but little more trouble to make.

HOW TO PLANK MEATS

In the Gimbel store Mrs. Roher gave a most interesting and instructive lecture on the art of "planking" meats and in the afternoon she showed how to prepare dishes to take the place of meat, "Planking is really a form of brolling," she said, "except that one side of the meat is next to a hot plank, which in the toasting imparts a flavor that is agreeable. To plank a steak one must broil it partly on one side before putting it on the hot plank. Select a hardwood plank at least 11/2 inches in thickness, make it very hot. Put on the steak; broil sidedown and finish the cooking on the plank. A steak two inches thick will require a half

"Fifteen minutes before the steak is done garnish the board with light mashed potatoes, making the border sufficiently high and firm to hold the winging suck of Tandil (La piedra steak dressing, If you are to use fresh mushrooms, broil them and have them done just as the steak is to be served. Put them over the top of the steak, one overlapping the other. Have ready a can of peas, heated and seasoned; a stuffed papper or tomato for each person and a half pint of brown sauce. Put the peas at one side of the board; arrange the stuffed tomatoes or peppers; pour on the board the brown sauce and send at once to the table.-Philadelphia Rec-





A Big Signature. Of all the signatures that come to

the Cupitol attached to official documents none covers more paper than that of Charles J. Bonaparte, Secretary of the Navy. Mr. Bonaparte's signature is about fine inches long, and the greatest beight of letters is over an inch. It makes the famously big signature of John Hancock attached to the Declaration of Independence look like a pigmy, and the chiregraphy of John Paul Jones that is exhibited to visitors at the Library of Congress as an example of boldness in writing of one's name appear insignificant.

Mr. Bonaparte's signature is written about twice the size of the usual signature of the President, and Mr. Roosevelt generally writes pretty large characters when he signs his name. The Bonaparte signature has no indication of an uncertain character. It is strongly written. It is begun on one side of the letter paper and ends pretty nearly on the other side. The usual note paper would not be wide enough to hold it. When it eventually makes its appearance in the collection of signatures of great men that is treasured at Library of Congress it will have the dismnction of being the biggest signature of all the hundreds of interesting relics of the kind that are there preserved .- Washington Star.


Care of Lamps.

A great many people injure their eyes by reading or working with a poor light. Kerosene lamps should give a clear, steady light and emit no odor. here are so many styles and sizes of lamps that it is not difficult to find just what is wanted in that line. A medium-sized lamp is preferable to a very large or a very small one for general use. A glass bowl is better than. a metal one, for there is little danger of running it over when it is being

Some lamps have an opening near the centre on top, so the burner need not be removed for filling. Be sure the base is large and heavy enough to keep it from turning over easily. Get the best grade of burners, for there is more difference in durability and quality of light given than there is in price. Be sure the wick fits and do not sew or pin the new wick on to the old one. The wick acts as a sort of pump, and there should be nothing to interrupt the flow of oil.

common use are dangerous, unless the base is bolted to the floor.

Having secured a lamp that is satisfactory, a little intelligent care will enable you to secure good results from it. Fill the bowl with oil every morning if it has been used the night before, and clean the flues until they are bright and shining. Trim the wick, cutting the charred portion off with sharp scissors even with the top of the tube. The burners are apt to become gummy and clogged, and cannot give a good light in that condition. Put them in strong suds one a week and boil them ten or fifteen minutes. Polish with dry flannel and it will be like a new burner. Keep the wick turned low when not lighted, to prevent the oil from oozing out over the top .- Western Housekeeper.



Rice Biscuit-Put one teacup of rice into a saucepan with nearly one quart of cold water; let it boil till very soft. Pour it into a bowl, add one teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth of a pound of butter, one cup of sugar, one quart of milk, half a cup of good yeast, and flour enough to make a stiff batter. Let it rise over night ami bake in gem

Timbales of Macaroni-Let a half failed to accomplish: pound of macaroni boll thirty minutes and drain it well through a colander. rich cream, the breast of a cold fowl, the mixture into timbale cups and set in a baking pan half filled with water. Bake three-quarters of an hour. Serve very hot.

Mutton en Casserole-Cut some moderately thick slices from a cooked leg of mutton, remove all fat and skin and together for fifteen minutes one and a half ounces of butter, a sliced onlon, a tomato, a few pieces of celery, a blade of mace and a few small peppers. Stir in by degrees three tablespoonfuls of flour and add gradually two cups of bolling water. When this sauce has boiled and thickened, draw the pan to the side of the stove and allow it to simmer for twenty minutes. Place the meat in an earthen casserole and strain the sauce over it. Cover with a piece of buttered paper and bake for two

THE SLEEPING SICKNESS.

Prof. Kech on its Origin, and Its Rapid Spread in Africa.

Prof. Robert Koch lectured in Berlin on the "Sleeping Sickness" which he investigated for several months in Equatorial Africa during the year 1905. Emperor William and a distinguished company were present.

The malady, said the professor, had been known on the west coast of Africa since the beginning of the last century, and it had spread to the north shore of the Victoria Nyanza and threatened German-Africa, Probably two hundred thousand persons had died from the disease. He had found whole villages on the shores of Victoria Nyanza to be empty, and the population of some groups of islands had died to the last soul. The infection was spread from human to human by the sting of a fly, the glossina palpalis, somewhat larger than an ordinary fly. The peison affected the usual health for several days, and then the sufferer was attached with fever, became incoherent, the glands were swollen, the patient became enwith the sleep mania.

one of the noticeable features in our East Virginia agriculture. 

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

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Kuroki A Re-Incarnation of Sir Hector Macdonald

ALL INDER BELIEVES THAT THE " JA-PARESE" GENERAL IS NOVE OTHER THAN THE DISGRACED AND SUP-"POSED DEAD SCOTCH

WARRIOR.

Bombay, April 28.-A curious tale is going the rounds of the bazaars in findia. It is believed by every native that General Kuroki, the marvellous Japanese commander, is no other than Sir Hector Macdonald. Many people have never believed that the brilliant English general is dead, and not long ago there appeared in the London "Times" an offer of reward of \$5,000 to say one who had seen his dead

It is also a fact that Sir Hector was once invited to go to Japan to train the japanese Army, and he actually mentioned it to Lord Roberts. No honor has ever been publicly bestowed on Kuroki, who appears to have van-ished as suddenly and mysteriously as

Even the Japanese with all their reticence confessed to a correspondint that Kuroki had much foreign blood in him, and one American journ- riving Zent alist declared he was a Dutchman. Rudyard Kipling first lifted the veil showing a little of the mysterious a.m. workings of the Indian bazaars. The celerity with which they spread ru-

mours of events taking place at great distances is familiar to all Anglo-Indian residents, but invariably baffling to them. The mutiny of the Sepoys was known throughout India almost as soon as it occurred, and it has been an unexplained mystery up to to-day how the information was so rapidly disseminated.

Both the life and death of Sir Hector Macdonald were full of romance and mystery. His exact age is not known; the circumstances of his death and burial are obscure. What is known is that Macdonald was a Scotch crofter lad, that he colisted in 1871 and that he served in the ranks ten years. His rise to a major-general and K.C.B. was the result of pure soldiering.

In the Afghan campaign, at Kabul, on Majuba Hill and at Omdurman he won fights and fame. After the Boer campain he was given a high command in India, and then in 1903 came that he had suddenly left Hindustan "on private business."

On 'this business he reached Paris, and there read in a newspaper that he was to stand a court martial on "grave charges." Then came the report that immediately on reading this paragraph he went to he room and shot himself.

At first it was decided that the General was to be buried in Paris, but a new surprise appeared in the person of his widow, of whose existence the War Office did not know. By the express wish of Lady Macdonald the body-or as rumor says now, the caffin-was sent to London and unceremoniously huddled away to Sco'land in a baggage van. The body, or the coffin, was quietly, almost secretly, buried in a public cemetery at half-past 6 in the morning. The it left the Paris hotel .- "New York

Feathered Murderers.

BIRDS POISON THEIR FEATHERED OFF-SPRING DETAINED IN CAPTIVITY.

A gentleman who travels much in Central America tells an interesting atory of his experience with tropical birds. To put it in his own words, he said: "In cleaning up the site to build the railroad station at Sonsonate, in the Republic of El Salvador, I left standing a tree called tempisque, which was, and is still, the favorite nesting place for several kinds of birds. With the aid of a ladder one day I secured from the nest some young alosontes (mocking birds). Fearing that I could not secure the right kind of food for them, I made a rough cage and put them in it. I placed them where the parents of the little captives could take care of their young ones, which they soon did with

all the solicitude I expected. "Excepting the shelter of the wings of their progenitors, and liberty to fly freely in the air, I think they enjoyed every inducement to grow strong and be happy in their comfortable prison. Perhaps the impossibility of getting into the cage made the parent birds more affectionate and assiduous in their visits. When the breeding-time arrived, I watched the expectant mother birds gathering feathers, moss and other material with which to build their nests. One of my peons Mayor de Papelerla y Ob remarked: 'Boss, you better bid adien to your chicks; their daddies are going to get them poison from the brush.' His remarks made me think of what I had read in natural history at school, that when the African swallow emigrates to Europe the invalids and the very young birds which can not accompany them are poisoned, Still, I did not believe that the parents of my young sinsontes could be so cruel or so wise as to kill my birdies. Yet, a few days after, I had the sorrow to find one of my mocking preson o sin ir primir, y on general birds stone dead. I took it out and dissected it, hoping to ascertain the para todo le concerniente & Impresi nature of the poison. I fear that the peon might be playing a joke on me. I had to abandon the idea when I found in the poor bird's stomach, among other food, a piece of undigested and swollen pink butterfly. All the the rest of my prisoners died one after the other, and in the stomach of each I found remains of the swollen pink butterfly. Then I instructed my peons to catch some butterflies, which I fed to the wild mocking-birds, and I had occasion to observe that they are them all except the pink ones. These birds were free and wild ones and had an instinctive discretion which made them reject the injurious food. 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
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
