RUSSIAN PEASANTS STARVING GUATEMALA AND SALVADOR AT WAR; 10,000 GUATEMALANS DEFEATED

ABOLITION OF DEATH SENTENCE ON RUSSIA.

British Tars Refuse to Eat American Canned Meat.

BRITISH FLEET SAILED FOR CRONSTADT.

Rojestvensky Pleads Guilty to Shield his Officers but Court Absolves Him.

(BY CABLE.)

Official figures published by the St. Petersburg Government demonstrates an emigration of an unprecedented nature to Siberia; during the past six months no less than 86,867 persons have gone to that region.

An attempt was made to blow up a bridge in Varsovia on Saturday last. The guards chased the conspirators immediately after they had filled the mine under the bridge. Princess Ivoffy and Volkonsky are using their endeavours to persuade the Zemstvo Congress to co-operate with the Government in succoring the starving people of Russia, but the majority of the members are opposed to Congress assuming the responsibility, while the Bureaucracy exercise control of the work. Meanwhile the Congress is investigating the scarcity of food. The Senate is discussing the projected law, presented by the Duma for the abolition of the death sentence, the entire Ministry and all the debates are favorable to the abolition. The project has been submitted to the investigating Committee. The Minister of War is preparing plans for the defence of all the principal cities of Russia, as a prevention against armed revolts. These plans have by some means fallen in the hands of the revolutionary Party. The "Daily Mirror" to-day published details of the troops, cannons and the positions which they intended to copy. Admiral Choukheim, Commander of the Black Sea fleet, was seriously injured on Saturday by a mutineer; he was conveyed to the hospital. The most dangerous of his wounds are in the region of the heart, and the medical men are of opinion that death will result. The assassin is a sailor of the battleship Olich Akoff. It is said the act was in revenge for the execution of the revolutionary chief, Lieutenant Schmidt. The two squadrons of cavalry which broke out in open mutiny have surrendered and expressed sorrow for their act.

Great Britain, as a proof of her confidence in the United States, recently withdrew her troops from the Canadian line, leaving the defence of Canada to the local forces of that country. The British Government is satisfied that while the United States remain faithful to the Monroe Doctrine the security of that Hemisphere is assured.

London news announce that as a result of the refusal of the crews of the Atlantic Squadron to eat American tinned meats during the recent naval manoeuvres, the Admiralty issued orders to provide the crews with Australian and Argentine meats in place of the American. The remainder of the American meats were returned to the purveyors. From now on, it will be obligatory for the navy to eat American canned meats. Mr. Winston Churchill, under-Secretary for the Colonies, in an official communication to William Redmond, says he had information that the Government of New South Wales exercised special care that only absolutely healthy cattle were slaughtered for consumption, and that the most minute precautions were observed by the packers and cold storage management, to ensure perfect results. In the event of the slightest contravention of the regulations, the licence to slaughter was immediately cancelled. Any person slaughtering an unsound animal, was liable to two years' imprisonment, and the seller to a longer period without the option of a fine. The Government Inspectors make a weekly report; notice has to be given 12 hours previous to slaughter, an infringement resulting in a fine of £5 for each head of cattle slaughtered. The Sheffield Confederation held their annual Conference on Saturday, and a letter was read from the American Ambassador, Mr. Whitelaw Reid, transmitting a message from President Roosevelt as follows: "You are authorized to inform the Confederation that under the new law the quality of the canned meat will be guaranteed by hearing the Government stamp. If any difficulty is experienced immediate complaint must be made to the United States Government and not only the

vendor." The official inspection of the factories and workshops of Great Britain during the past year reveals anti-hygienic conditions. Several preserve factories and bakeries were found in bad condition.

It is officially announced in London that the Channel fleet, consisting of the Caesar, Prince George, Canopus, Albermarle, Goliath, Glory, Devonshire, Roxburgh, Deagonese, Topaz and Argyle, will leave Portsmouth on the 21st instant on a visit to the Russian ports, arriving at Cronstadt on the 11th August, and remaining there until the 17th.

The House of Deputies refused to entertain the ministerial project, asking for a grant of money for the immediate partial restoration of Heidelberg Castle. The Minister stated that in the opinion of experts, the principal portion of the castle is in danger of falling. The House adopted a resolution to offer a premium for the best plan for the complete restoration of the Castle.

The students of Montevideo have decided to refuse in assisting at the reception of Mr. Root, in consequence of Imperialistic policy of the United States.

Rio Janeiro news reports that the revolutionists have entered Cayaba. Pedro Osoria has been proclaimed Governor.

Paez, Governor of Matto Grosso, was killed in an encounter near the powder factory of Coxipo. The Government has decided to proclaim Matto Grosso in a state of siege. The German Legation has asked the Government to adopt measures for the protection of German subjects in Matto Grosso.

President Cipriana Castro has granted amnesty to all political prisoners.

San Salvador news, dated 12th report that a battle took place, which lasted five hours, and resulted in the complete defeat of Cabrera's forces of 10,000 men. The greatest enthusiasm reigns. General Regalado was killed in the battle, and was replaced by General Villavicencio.

Miss Douglas, the English Tennis Champion, has defeated Miss Sutton, of California. Miss Sutton won the championship last year from her rival.

Washington news reports that Alfonso Zelaya, a son of President Zelaya of Nicaragua, has been arrested for larceny. Mr. Zelaya was recently married in the United States. For the first time in its history and for the next 12 months, the Henly Grand Challenge Cup will adorn the headquarters of the Belgian Rowing Club, who defeated Trinity Hall, Cambridge, by 3 lengths.

The Salisbury Town Council, at the request of the leading citizens, will erect a memorial in Salisbury Cathedral, to the memory of the American victims of the late railway disaster; Queen Alexandra sent a letter of sympathy to the American colony of London, specially mentioning the young bride, Mrs. Crossitt, who lost her husband in the disaster. Mr. Roosevelt in a letter to a personal friend, who asked him if it was his intention to run for a third term, said: "You will have to vote for some other Republican next time."

Captain Hank Haf, the yachting skipper, is reported dying. James Kler Hardie, Socialist and Independent Labor Member of Parliament, addressed an extraordinary letter to a young Zulu, who is now in Scotland, in which, referring to what he calls the massacre of the Zulus under pretence of quelling a rebellion, hopes the day will come when that race will be able to defend itself against the barbarities now perpetrated against it.

Lady Doyle, wife of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, died in London on the 4th July.

The officers of the Staff of Admiral Rojestvensky, and the Commander of the Bedory make a pitiable exhibition of cowardice in trying to shift the responsibility of the surrender on to each other. Admiral Rojestvensky, although dazed and out of his head at the time, utters a manly plea of guilty, because he took no steps to prevent the surrender. After ten hours' deliberation on the evidence against Admiral Rojestvensky and the officers of the torpedo boat Bedori, the Council of War pronounced sentence entirely absolving the Admiral, and condemning four of the officers of the ship for the surrender. The four have been condemned to be shot, but due to circumstances the Czar has been asked to commute the sentences to dismissal from the Navy and loss of certain civil rights. The evidence proved conclusively that Admiral Rojestvensky, through his wounds knew nothing about the surrender. The other officers were declared innocent.

The Czar has purchased an armoured automobile, which uses petrolum; its speed is 85 kilometers per hour.

An American bank with capital and system for the use of travelling Americans has been established in Berlin. Professor Krou, in a Berlin paper, has commenced an active campaign against the use of towels by hotel and restaurant waiters, which, he says, are a receptacle for microbes, due to the habit of carrying them under their arms and in their pockets, and then using them for wiping plates and glasses.

Johannesburg news is of an alarming nature. It is announced that on Tuesday the natives would make a general rising.

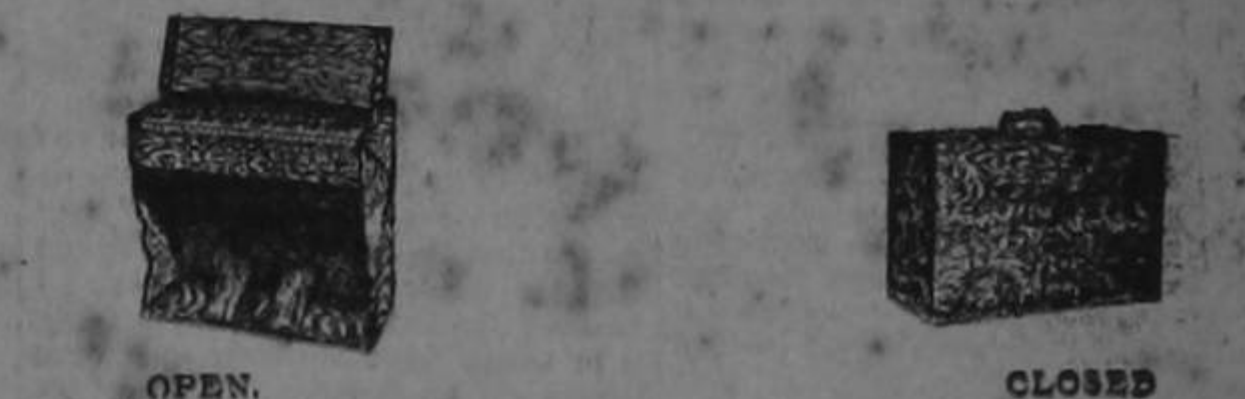

For the first time, Argentine frozen meat has been shipped to Russia; 800 tons was shipped on the Hornby Gange for Vladivostok.

Diplomatic relations between Great Britain and Serbia, which were terminated by Great Britain three years ago, immediately following the assassination of the King and Queen, were formally resumed on Monday...

Emperor William has appointed the King of Norway an honorary Admiral in the German Navy.

The dry dock Dewey arrived at Olanzap, Luzon, on Monday. The trip from Singapore was uneventful.

The China "Morning Post" announces the capture by pirates, of the British steamer Saiwan, and murder of her captain and crew.

Cables from Kingston announce that the Italian warship Umbria grounded on Thursday, while going through the channel, and is hard and fast in the bank.

Probably Skyrdloff will replace Choukain, as Commander of the Black Sea Fleet. The formation of a constitutional Democratic Ministry is assured.

The death in Skalat, of Countess Maria, mother of Minister Goluchowski is reported.

President Zelaya says: "Nicaragua is, and will remain neutral."

Under date of 16th a telegram was received in New York, reporting that the Salvadorian Army attacked the Guatemalan army in Platanar, completely defeating them.

The Kaiser, in his desire to show Germany's power to foreign nations, has proposed an exhibition in 1912, which will eclipse everything previously celebrated.

A terrific explosion occurred in a powder factory at Aspland, Wisconsin, by which 25 houses were completely demolished.

The Japanese fleet will shortly visit Kanaran Bay.

A frightful earthquake occurred in El Paso, Texas, at 11.15 a.m. on Tuesday. Many houses were damaged, and the people fled panic-stricken.

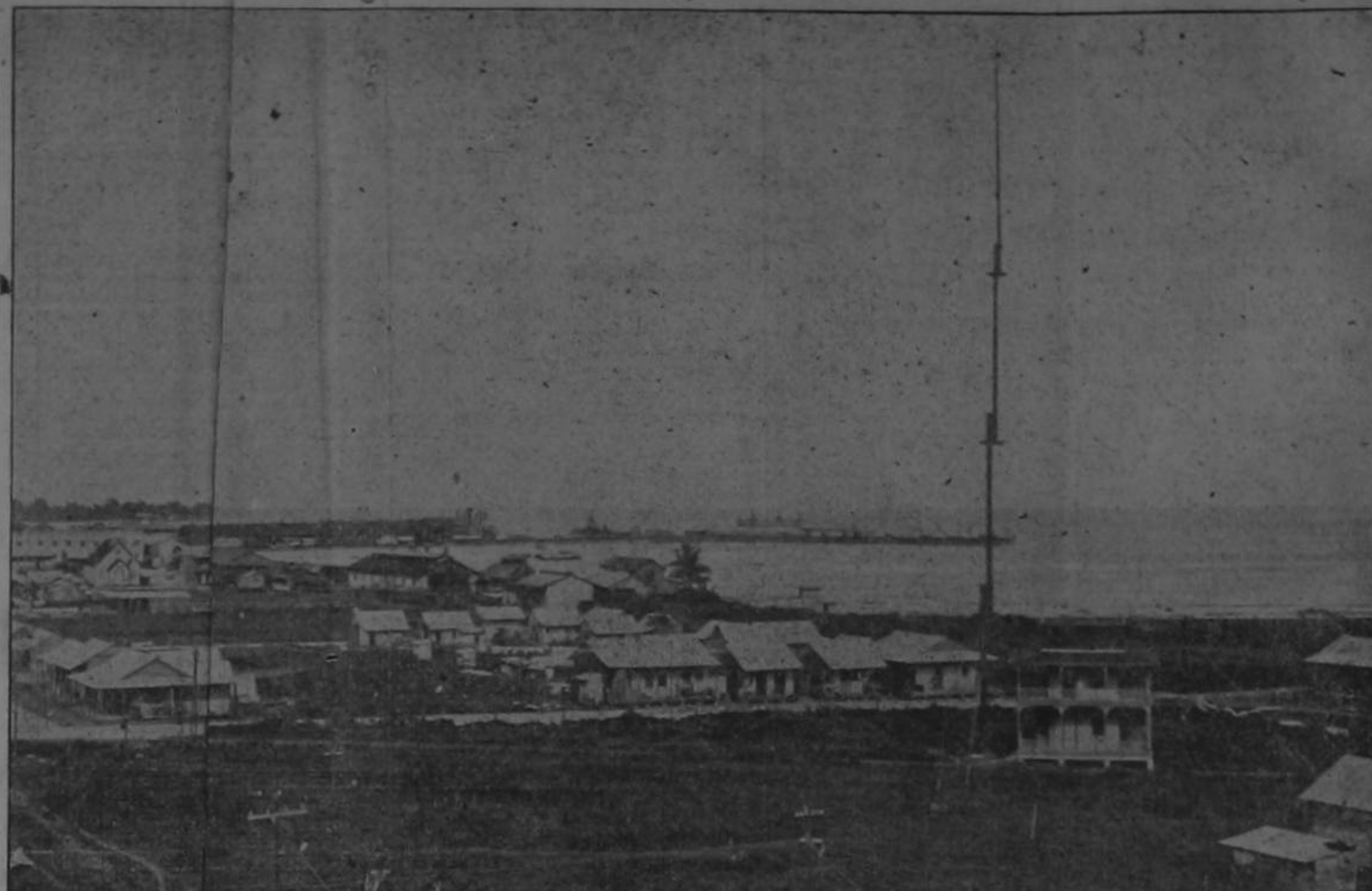

QUAINT OLD URY BOX. It Was in Use in Lynn, Massachusetts, from 1732 to 1900.

A little lacquered wooden box, now in the possession of the Lynn Historical Society, unlabeled simply "Old Jury Box," had it a tongue, tell a long and most interesting story of the growth of the town and city of Lynn during the past 200 years.

The box itself unlike most other boxes made in the early part of the eighteenth century, ovalated at the corners and glued together. It is not a large box, yet the names of many of Lynn's best citizens have been drawn from it for service on a jury sitting in judgment on their fellow-men.

RADISH AND OLIVE SALAD. Put two cup-shaped lettuce leaves together on a small plate, one for each person. Slice a small radish thin and lay round in a circle in the center and on this put a spoonful of minced or shredded olives.

JAM PUDDING STEAMED. Take half a pound of breadcrumbs, four ounces of suet, one ounce of flour, two eggs, four tablespoonsful of any jam (stoneless).

CREAM CHEESE SALADS. An appetizing salad for dinner is made of cream cheese. Roll the cheese into little balls with butter paddles, heap the balls on lettuce leaves or endive and pour French dressing over them.

PISTACHE AND ORANGE MERINGUES. This is one of the daintiest ways of serving cream for a little dinner or lawn fete. The pistache nuts can be bought at the wholesale nut stores or in the Syrian quarter of the city.

AN ECONOMICAL DINNER. Fore quarter of lamb is the most economical roast to be had, and one of the very best. Order a large piece, at least seven pounds, and have 5 or six chops taken off first, and then two pounds of the neck and rib ends for a stew or lamb pie.

MOCK TURTLE. Take a small shoulder of mutton and hang it for several days, bone it, and lay it on a chopping board. Mix together half a teaspoonful of pepper and the same quantity of ground

mace and with it sprinkle the meat. Lay on the meat a dozen oysters and scatter over breadcrumbs, pepper and salt. Roll the meat neatly, sew down the flap, and tie around with a string. Place it in a saucepan with a small quantity of water and add an onion stuck with cloves and four long peppers.
