Are scientists under such pressure for want of suitable subjects of investigation as that they are foreouth constrained to devote their valuable time and means in a moderum of nutriment as well as of inlabored and expensive experiments to asa moderum of nutriment as well as of insafer to apply their careful tests to to-bacco, chewing gum, licorice root, etc. (which are not deadly intoxicants), for a similar laudable purpose? Suppose it be authoritatively ascertained.

and proclaimed by science that alcohol is a food What then? Alcohol as a common heverage is the most cruel and relentless demon preying on humanity. In the name of debanched souls, what would it be as a food? The greater portion of the world's poverty, misery and crime are the monstrous progeny of alcoholism. Nobady knows that fearful fact better than seientific students. Let them procisim it a food. How soon thereafter would the whole brood of insatiable guzzlers make that pronouncement the prefext of their need of the imbruting swill to save them from starvation? Now men drink alcohol. for the most part to pander to their de-

prayed palates. Under the advanced scientific regimen they could plausibly excuse their indulgence therein on the ground of allaving the cravings of hunger. With that double motive how much more swift and sure their overthrow by this liquid hydra? Alas, has science become the apologist for the long train of pumitigated mischief inflicted mon the race by alcoholic beverages?

We have no quarrel with science at any point. Let it so on with its commendable researches in the interests of truth in every direction. But permit us humbly to ask if there are not more vital problems appeal-ing for scientific solution than the comparatively insignificant per centum of food that may be lodged in a given quantity of alcohol? Is it not enough for science to inform us that a'coho! is an irritant poison. to be prescribed with caution by competent medical practitioners, rather than to put itself to infinite pains in a series of intricate experiments in order to prove that it is a food?

Already dealers in alcoholic drinks are loudly heralding the statement that science | Senor don Zacarlas Chevez, Deputy s declared them to contain food. therefore to be taken freely as nutriment upon all occasions. This opinion is even now being quoted by some as a reason why they indulge in alcoholic nourishment; whereas they would otherwise refram from such drink, while it were thought to be a fever producing, nerve racking, drunkard making liquid.

If alcohol shall ultimately be found to be

a food, will it therefore be less harmful as a beverage, less intoxicating, less baneful to society, less a descoiler of homes, less a promoter of immorality, less a breeder of vice, less an incentive to riotous living, less a waster of substance, or less a soul slaver? Strenuous efforts have been and are still being made in certain otherwise respectable circles to have it appear that alcohol is the universal solvent and the elizir of life, capable of transmuting all disorder and baseness into refinement and purity, enabling men to sing with Kents.

We are told that Paracelsus, long before science undertook the herculean task of showing that alcohol is a food, claimed to have discovered the secret of physical vigor in drinking that beverage, which he accordingly freely drank, until he fell lifeless in a fit of delirium tremens in a groggery

It will indeed be a red-letter day of triumph for Diabolus when science shall reinforce his wavering ranks by deciding that his chief dependence for demoralization on this earth (alcohol) is exalted to the dignity of an essential food supply for building up the human body, which is a temple designed for the indwelling of the Divine Spirit.

Come, brothren, let us get at something more conducive to the world's betterment: something that will improve the stock of men. Nearly all the great writers of human history call alcohol a devil when it becomes incarnate. One famous author (Robert Hall) declares it to be "liquid fire and distilled damnation." Let us therefore by all means discourage men from drinking this vile beverace. 

THE PRUCAUTIONS TAKEN.

"The first indication of the weakening of a gun," Rear-Admiral O'Neil, Chief of the Ordnance in the Navy, said, "is usually the wearing out of the lining, when it becomes necessary to reline the gun. In other words, we are a gun indefinitely until it shows enlargement of the bore .r some other defect. We have small guns that have been fired more than 100 times and we will continue to fire them until the lining is worn out. All the later guns are reinforced to the muzzle.

"The Court of Inquiry which investigated the accident on board the Massachusetts reported that the ordnance equipment was entirely satisfactory. Before a gun is assembled at the gun factory, the castings are purchased by contract. These are of steel, which have been oil-tempered. All strains are supposed to be removed by annealing; that is, the tube of the gun is heated slowly and allowed to cool slowly. No one can say that all strains have been removed from the tube because it is impossible to take specimens cannot be stated definitely. 

THE FARMER'S DOC.

It goes without saying that a farm is incomplete without a dog. Since by is so important to the Yarm, I would ask, is he properly cared for and housed. He needs shelter as well as cattle and sheep, though he is but a

The dog is quick to discern the difference between a baseh and a kind word. Continual use of harsh language makes him indifferent and unmindful of what you want him to do. it is therefore imperative to use kind words always. When he does a praiseworthy act, pat him on the head, and reward him with one or two kind words, and you will soon notice a great difference. Never kick or cuff a dog. If he needs severe punishment, use a willow or a peach switch upon him, and it will prove far more effective. Be patient with a young dog. He can't learn it all in a day.

When the dog is old enough to be trained, it is well not to allow anyone else to attempt to teach him anything. The dog soon learns to understand you, if you repeat your commands in the same tones, using the same words. Others, however, will use different words and perhaps violence, thus confusing the animal and causing him to forget what you have taught him.

A dog can be trained for several years after he has attained his growth, hence there is no need of beginning when he is very young. Professional dog trainers often pick up old dogs and teach them to do wonderful tricks. There are several good breeds of dego that are useful on the farm. 

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
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
