There is the same necessity for having the farm fleek consist of profitable adividuals that there is in the case of the flocks and herds of larger andunis, and in a general way the same rules apply to making and maintaining such a flock. There is often on the farm a flock of common stock that is free neelimated and well accustomed to its surroundings and yet not very profitable. The one who has the care of this tlock should took into the matter and learn if possible why it is so. Blood is much in a flock, but it is not everything. The one who cares for the flock should be shie to tell the preis decided upon, whether for eggs or at lower end where pen rests upon the way men and women seem to be at the fiction reg. ment, weed out the flock closely along this line; procure a pure-bred male of one of the breeds appropriate to the purpose in view, and grade up the hardy, vigorous, well-acel mated birds, continuing the process of selection from generation to generation. This process is not so rapid, of course, as the substitution of the pure-bred flock from the start, but it is safer, and with the increasing interest that will be taken as to care, management and selection, ability and knowledge to give pure-bred care will have been acquired by the time the flock is practically pure-bred.-Geneva March, in The Epitomist.





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

EVOLUTION OF THE BLACKS OF JAMAICA.

A CREDITABLE RECORD.

Miss Pullen-Bury, who was in Jamaica some time ago, read a paper on "the Rapid Evolution of the Jamaica Black," a couple of weeks ago before the members of the Anthropology section of the British Association.

She said that there were two matters of anthropological, interest which could not fail to strike the observant visitor to Jamaica namely, the fusion of varying racial elements, and the rapid transition from semi-savagery into civilization of the descendants of African slaves, Nowhere else in the world were similar phenomena to be met with. It seemed possible to have one civilization for blacks, coloured people and whites. After giving the history of the island for the past cen-tury. Miss Bury remarked that if by civilization was meant the safety of life and protection of property, then the civilization of this people of Afri-can origin in Jamaica was complete a rather bold statement to make. Their courtesy, native politeness, and cheerful disposition - were features duly noted and appreciated by the numerous American visitors who flocked to the shores of Jamaica every winter in search of health. They compared the condition of the black under Brit-ish rule with that of his brother in the States and agreed that the problem of how to deal with an emancipated race had been more successfully, dealt with in Jamaica than in their own part of America. Crimes of violence, the penalty for which was lynching in the States, were unknown in Jamaica. Murder was of the rarest occurrence. A white woman could, for she had. done it, ride or walk in perfect security by night or day in any part of the island. The old African Obeah wor ship was gradually disappearing.
Miss Bury referred to Archbishop

Nuttall's philanthropic efforts and broad-minded views of how to deal with the coloured and black classes in Jamaica, and said that they were thoroughly appreciated across the Atlantic.—Daily Telegraph.
