THESE CANALS

The Continent of America is of such an enormous length that several Water Ways are being considered to be inserted so as to make interoceanic communication more rapid.

The Panama Canal, originally the dream of the French Nation, engineered & started by them but thro criminal mismanagement the effort ended in a great fracaso in which many wealthy french families came to poverty.

The great American Nation saw the necessity of safeguarding her great stretch of Coast in both Oceans, took up the project and profiting by the experiences of the French, completed this gigantic work at a cost of 275,000,000 dollars, and now in consequence of the great Traffic passing thro the Canal yielding a revenue of 7 1/2 per cent on the expenditure, it is being considered to erect another Lock at a cost of fifty millions of dollars to cope with the existing pressure of Traffic on this short cut.

From the year 1890 the Americans have been considering the advisability of cutting another way thro Nicaragua which was really first thought of by the English, but due to their conservatism where the expenditure of money is concerned, the matter was dropped, only to be seized by the Americans; surveys were originally made from Brito on the Pacific coast, along thro the great Lake Nicaragua 70 1/2 miles of its entire length of 103 miles, then running through the entire length of the San Juan River the boundary line of Costa Rica and Nicaragua for a distance of 46 1/2 miles out into the Atlantic Ocean; but now we find that the route is changed from the lesser lake in a straight line for Graytown, making a shorter route of 183 1/2 miles at an approximate cost of 250,000,000 with eight locks, being, four on the Atlantic side of the lake and four on the 17 miles strip of western side of the lake, this is due to the fact that the lake is one hundred feet higher than sea level, hence the waters would have to be lifted to it. While this scheme is being considered which shall be the route, up comes Columbia with her idea of putting a Canal thro the Atrato river, proposing to borrow the necessary money from Uncle Sam to do the work. President Hoover has taken the idea very seriously under the recommendation of Admiral Chester, hence it is expected we shall see within the next ten years three canals through this great Continent.

The Atrato Canal will be a much cheaper one than the other two altho longer, from the fact it will be a sea level Canal and having the expanse of this navigable river.

The great advantage to the vast extent of Columbian territory to be opened up by such a Waterway need no comment but greater will be the advantages of trade to European nations, who would thus be put in direct communication with South & Central American unexplored regions hence this Canal can well be imagined as of a greater Commercial Value than either of the others, we can therefore also look forward to this as a Certainty.

Estimado y distinguido amigo:

Lic. Después de haber dejado Ud. el sillón presidencial, por segunda vez, permitame que le escriba estas líneas como admirador y partidario que he sido y soy de su personalidad, para felicitarlo una y mil veces por sus dignas y sinceras declaraciones, llenas de verdad y de patriotismo, dadas al *Diario de Costa Rica* en su edición del 31 de octubre último.

Por demás está decir, que sus declaraciones son el sentir general del país y de sus hombres pensantes.

La política exclusivista de los llamados nacionalistas, puesta en practica, bajo el gobierno del Lic. Cleto González Víquez, por más que se diga, no sólo le ha hecho daño al gobierno en si política económica, sino que ha perjudicado a la Nación y desmoralizado al pueblo, porque dar leyes sistemáticas por pura patriotera contra determinadas empresas o compañías, es desconocer los principios democráticos sobre los cuales descansa el país. Es ir, por decirlo así, contra sus sanas instituciones.

New Custom on Trains

There is nowadays a new & sometimes inconvenient habit practised by some of the Ticket checkers on our Trains which formerly the Conductors never did, that is, they take Tickets from the passengers two or three Stations ahead, which sometimes causes misunderstandings & disputes among passengers.

On 31st inst one Mrs. Beckford took the Train al La Junta for Peralta. As soon as she boarded the train her Ticket was taken away by the Revisor - when she arrived at Las Lomas she asked someone how far Peralta was, who told her it was the next station, so, ordinarily have been so, being Sunday the train stopped at Pascua, the unfortunate lady left the train in mistake and had to walk with her baggage to Peralta; had her Ticket been collected in the usual way from Station to Station this would not have occurred.

HENRY FORD on Exchequer

Ford feels that were he Chancellor of the Exchequer, he would advise all governments not to pay interests on loans, because he would borrow nothing, when any works of Improvements were to be done, he would simply issue sufficient Bills to cover the cost of the work, and withdraw those Bills from the earnings of the improvements.

We wonder what our Great statistician & Financier don Soley Quell would say to this. We would suggest to don Cleto that, instead of paying 12,800,000 interest on 8,000,000 colones at 8 per cent in twenty years, why not issue 4,000,000 colones in ten or twenty colones Bills each year for Road Construction, and withdraw them by doubling the revenue on imports, traffic for five years and increase the Rates on adjacent property Tax.

This system if honestly and judiciously manipulated would soon rid the Country of its indebtedness and lack of civilizing improvements. Offcourse the Usurers and money hoarders would squeal and show the impossibilities of stabilizing the financial guarantees of the Country, but the proletarian & the small man find it more convenient for them to live, because to have to pay twelve milions of colones interest plus the loan of eight milions. Taxes must be raised to meet the revenue on imports, whereas Taxes would only be raised to meet your eight milions from yourself and by reducing your importation by greater agricultural production, the time of difficulty say for 5 years would soon be over-come and the Country again prosperous.

Success in our Loan

The efforts of our Minister of Exchequer Don Rafael Arias has been successful in obtaining a Loan of one Million Dollars in the United States from the First National Bank of Boston; Very great has been the anxiety in governmental circles over the possibility or nonpossibility of this loan, due to the unsettled state of the Wall street money market by which the stock holders lost thousands of Millions of dollars within the past few weeks, however the Loan has been obtained altho at higher rate of interest than the government had thought of paying, they have had to consent to pay 8 percent per annum, up to December 1930.

This is a great relief, as away from calling a halt to all the works of Improvement going on in the country, there was the fear of a Rise in the exchange of our monetary system; the usurers & financial men who control the bulk of gold deposits in our Banks were watching this loan, with a view of demanding a greater Value of their gold in foreign drafts, however they are saved that distressing effect for the moment.

The Bridge Squirres

CONSERVATION IN CARTAGO Panama Lottery

On Thursday morning when the news was spread around Cartago that the Firm of Rivera & Co. had gone bankrupt one can better imagine it that to describe.

There were hundreds of people gathered from adjacent villages on foot & on horseback, later on as the trains came in, there came other scores of people who had deposited their all in all there, or others who did business there, all anxious to see whether it was true or not that the doors of Rivera & Co. had been closed; and to go back to our old story re, the most *sorrowful Crisis* we have seen in thirty years; to what may we trace the collapse of so reputable a Firm which the calm confidence of its clients still prove? principally the failure of our Banana output. We have seen the expressions of don Julio Peña, one of the most important factors of The Credito Agrícola (Agricultural Loan Bank) of Cartago in an interview with a reporter of the *Diario de Costa Rica* and this gentleman we are pleased to say practically reiterates the theme laid out in the leading article of this Journal of last week, that is, he exhorts quick action by Congress now in session by an Amendment to the Banana Law to save the Country from a Commercial collapse; he goes on to say that every owner of a plot of land from Paraiso to Turrialba had got himself interested in Bananas, so every little home had planted his ten or twenty roots of Bananas around his house in between the coffee, from which every fortnight he got his five, ten, forty to a hundred dollars in gold, and all this was invested or deposited in the Banks of Cartago; in his Bank the Agricola, there came in regularly a flow of forty thousand dollars in gold drafts whereas today there is not ten thousand coming, therefore the situation for Cartago can will be gauged. The question now arises can anything be done now? Can Congress now sitting do anything to modify the condition existing?

As we see it, it looks impossible, for allowing that Congress were willing to humiliate itself and send an intermediary to ask the Company to enter into negotiations again, with a view of granting her whatever she may demand; what could be done? nothing; like all large concerns a presupposed or appropriation must be voted for the Current Year, and in view of the fact that Costa Rica had rejected the propositions put forward by the Boston Office, naturally these operations have been diverted

to her other fields of transactions, nothing therefore seem to be possible except by an act of charity by the Company to alleviate the circumstances and is the Company disposed now to act charitably? it can hardly be expected, such an act would seem more Christlike than human; and on the other hand how sorrowful it is that in a beautiful peaceful country like ours, that there are no men of vision in our Congressional Hall, who will legislate for the best interests of our Country, rather than with a spirit of irony, with a spirit of revenge, with a spirit of antagonism against a Corporation which undoubtedly has been the making of this country, are there no men in Congress who could have foreseen that these conditions must have arisen as an effect of the recent Banana Law and take the matter to the Country for a decision, as would be done in other civilized communities? Or were they fooled? And if so by whom? Where is the proposition by the German Gov. we heard of for developing the Tortuguero Region, where is the prospect of the Cuyamel (Who rambour says has since sold out to the U. F. Co.) and its Cooperative Association.

Is it these promises that fooled our men in Congress? if so, we can only say they lack that foresight that we gave them credit for, for how could they pick a quarrel with the U. F. Co. with out having a substantial guarantee from some other Company or Companies, for it would take all the Companies put together that we know of trading in Fruit, to do what the U. F. Co., has done or can do for Costa Rica. In thinking of a Cooperative producers Association, they might have been led to be inspired by the formation of the Jamaica Cooperative Producers Association, but then, that Association had an enormous guarantee behind it, it had the special laws of the Jamaica Legislature, it had the British and Canadian governments guaranteeing and subsidizing four ships each to take all classes of Produce, not only Bananas but Sugar, Rum, Coffee, Coco, ginger, Annatto, Limejuice, Honey, Mangoes, Pineapples, Oranges, Grapefruit, coconuts, tomatoes & other vegetables; so that if they were actuated to move toward a Cooperative system they should have studied all points of cooperation and see where their guarantee of ships to export the produce was coming from, and a thorough knowledge of the possibilities of our government declaring our existing credit a monopoly for no, and so providing for the advent of another Co. on the business, for otherwise every stem of fruit here belongs to the U. F. Co. The situation will therefore be seen to be most sorrowful as we have said, from more standpoints than one, first our Banana Industry is ruined, and worst of all is, that if any steps are to be taken as a modification of the position, it can hardly be done without great humiliation on the part of the nation, by now begging instead of dictating terms to the Company.

Something has got to be done and that very quickly to save us from being starved out. What will the government do to prevent nearly every merchant in the provinces of Cartago and Limon from Bankruptcy in the next six months, and the labouring element from starvation, for we must face facts as they are, it is indeed sorrowful.

Information has been supplied to this government whereby it is proven that 500 Tickets of the Panama Lottery is being sold here weekly, the information asserts that these Tickets bear a price of ten dollars, but are sold here for twelve and a half, thus giving better results to the sellers than ours.

Consequently the prohibition is going to be more rigid. If however the directors of the Lottery would give a few more prizes of one or two thousand colones and pay for the three ending numbers as does the Panama, and be a bit more liberal with the vendors & purchasers alike who take their risks, there would be no need to watch the Panama, and after all why put on the dog in the manger trick. does Costa Rican Tickets not go to foreign Countries as well?

A proposition by an anonymous letter addressed to the Manager of our Lottery Mr. Avenida, proposing to him that he should fix it so that a certain number would play as the grand Prize by which the writer would get a half and the Manager a half was denounced and the letter published by Mr. Avenida and the proposer of such a rascally scheme is being searched for as a pin in a haystack.

In consequence of this letter one Mr. Joaquin Alvarado Passos, has written to the charity board in charge of the lottery scheme asking them to sustain public confidence, by bringing in all the fichas to be placed in sight of the public, to place them in the barrels, to thoroughly shake & mix up these in the barrels to public gaze, and that every prize number should be drawn by a different person, selected from the bystanders, especially should this be done in the big prize to be played on New Years Day, so as to avoid any suspicion due to the published proposition.

Our Minor Crops

As a consequence of the distressed condition of our financial outlook of the Province due to the falling off of the production of our Bananas, the drop in the price of our Cacao, the suspension of all works, and cutting down of expenses by the United Fruit Coy, in every Dept. it is advisable that our farmers should look to the planting of Minor crops - such as Cane, Yuca, Potatoes, Corn, beans, Yams & vegetables of all kinds for home consumption.

We again return to the thought of Sugar, there is no reason why we should not plant Cane on an extensive scale in this country. In an article from the Daily Gleaner we find that the sugar Industry of the West Indies is being threatened, if the subsidy given to West Indian Sugar is withdrawn as seem to be the idea of the Labour Government of the Mothercountry with a view of lessening the cost of this article to the labouring man; this industry will again dwindle to nothingness in the west Indies; why then should Costa Rica not provide for an emergency. We find that from the month of July till now we have imported over 30,000 tons of Sugar. Is it not regrettable that with all our abandoned banana areas, which have been so well drained, no one can think of planting Cane to help in supplying enough for our Consumption, which is calculated at about 120,000 tons per annum? The Small farmers ought to be advised to plant enough sugar Cane and all other Minor crops to feed themselves in this crisis by those in authority.

Reduction of Forces

Every step is taken by the heads of Depts. of the U. F. Coy & Northern Railway Coy. to retrench every dollar that can be saved.

The Traffic Dept. has reduced several of their newly promoted Engineers back to the firemen's list or be dismissed. The brakemen are now paid by day labour so as to retrench the days on which these men did not actually work but were paid for under a monthly wage. So that these men would be shy of \$ 9 days in the month.

In the workshops all the helphs have been dispensed with and the recently employed Carpenters & helphs who were employed in the repairs & construction of new Rolling stock imported. In the fruit Dept, several Receivers & men have been laid off and the loading of the fruit has been reduced from 7 to 10 cents per 1000 to the loaders to 5 1/2 & 7 1/2 per 1000 stem, & ofcourse as there are only two boats per week now to be loaded, it will be seen how disastrous these retrenchments are to the workers.

In the merchandise Dept. all helphs who used to work between the breakfast and dinner hour are now dismissed since the business is closed for the breakfast hour and at 5 o'clock. In the

Farms also the pruning Knife has been most drastically applied. The Mandators & labour-ers houses are being taken down and sold at a sacrifice, the mules also are being sold out cheaply, those farms having forty mules are now reduced to fifteen or twenty the balance are sold out on easy terms to the Small farmers.

Ofcourse all these savings may appear not only hard but cruel to the persons affected, but its a natural consequence, if there are no Bananas to load the ships, its only reason to expect that these retrenchments must come. The Northern Railway is also taking up the Rails in certain sections of the Roadway where there is not sufficient Traffic but this action is declared illegal by the government's Lawyer who is detailed to study and investigate the Original Concession, however further developments are being watched in this direction.

ARMISTICE DAY

Brooklyn N. Y., Oct. 3.—The Rev. William S. Blacksher of Texas, rector of St. Matthews Protestant Episcopal Church in Brooklyn, who aroused a storm of criticism three weeks ago, when a group of the publicly banned Negroes from his congregation, was made to feel the sting of unreasonable prejudice last week, when Negro waiters in his favorite restaurant refused to serve him and a party of friends.

Last Sunday, according to William H. Bryan of 1372 Bergen street, the rector, who dines in the restaurant of a big apartment house on Bergen street, entered with a party of friends. A waiter declined to serve him. So did all the other waiters.

He appealed to the head waiter, who is also a Negro and the latter upheld the waiters, giving the rector no satisfaction.

Outraged, the Rev. Mr. Blacksher then appealed to the white management, which assumed the rector by sustaining the head waiter and the waiters.

With flaming cheeks, the rector and his party of friends left the restaurant, even as the Christian Negro maiden left St. Matthews church on the previous Sunday.
