## Increasing Human Efficiency From New Cattle THE PEOPLE'S FORUM

Most people are inclined to consider the "Newer Knowledge" of Nutrition gained through careful chemical research to be the class of fads and of little practical importance, but when so eminent an authority as Professor H. C. Sherman of Columbia University is willing to prophesy a much more efficient human race by the application of the findings of food chemists to diet, one must think well.

Professor Sherman in an article in "Industrial and Engineering Chemistry" recently stated that the experimental evidence gathered from feeding rats over periods equivalent to 600 years of experience in human history point definitely to a lengthening of useful human life and increased human efficiency. Not only did this Professor succeed in bringing his rats to maturity earlier but in the same individuals he was able to postpone old age by improving on a diet already believed to be adequate. He also believes that these results can be easily reproduced in the human race once again. Evidence of higher health through improved nutrition owing to the betterment of a food supply already adequate have been studied statistically in sufficiently large numbers of cases to establish beyond the fact that all these differences are real and due to the improvement in diet that they cannot be accidental nor due to chance or physiological variability of the animals. Moreover, the improvements are even more noticeable in the second generation than the first.

There is no reason to doubt and every reason confidently to believe that all these findings, in general terms here stated, will apply equally in human experience and that longer life with a higher degree of health will follow an improvement in the dietary of an individual or the food supply of a Community even where the dietary or food supply was already adequate according to current Standards. It may be yet too early to say whether we should expect that improved Nutrition will result in humankind of superior efficiency to any hitherto known. Until the experimental investigation has been carried further and there has been more time for observation of human experience in the light of Newer (not higher) knowledge of Nutrition we may well hesitate to predict advances over the most illustrious cases of individual efficiency. We may, however, expect with entire confidence that the average of health and efficiency of the great majority of individuals, will be greatly advanced through the application of the New Knowledge of foods and nutrition gained through the chemical research since the Golden Age Dawns, and that this will bring to mankind that full measure of health and efficiency even more than which, the most fortunate now enjoy. And where found in Nature Laboratory, where the lower animals find their full necessities except when interfered with by their unwise owners, then we call denatured food. (Good food.)

In Europe we find the Powers of this world contending to arrive at a reasonable conclusion to make War an outlawed procedure of settling differences; but night there we find unpleasantnesses, Italy demands equal Naval Strength with France, while France, will not tolerate such an idea, having always from time immemorial maintained a Superior Navy & Army to Italy she naturally will not consider today an equality of Armament with her South Eastern neighbour & Ally. The American government has named a successor to Mr. Roy T. Davis as American Minister to Costa Rica, and there are those who are opposing or believing that this may oppose such nomination on whimsical causes. Mr. Ehrenhardt who is named such Minister happened to have been Minister to Nicaragua during the Revolution in that country and earned a reputation there as being a stern man in the interests of his Country and on this excuse hangs the reason for asking our President to veto such nomination, but certainly Don Cleto takes no cognizance of such request.

Those who are making such propositions do they not feel that they are hampering the prosperity of the Country? At a time like this when we are in dire necessity and trying to invite American Capital and Technical experience in the country for its development can they expect that by provoking the peace & goodwill of the powerful factions of the world that favours can be bestowed on us?

We would therefore advise and invite saner methods and calmer deliberations on the part of our representatives who are set to guide our destinies, and to recall the only means of assisting the present regime to tide over the many difficulties that surround us.

By way of advise, we recall a similar occurrence some few years ago, for some reason or other the residents of Liverpool England had cause to ask the American govt. to recall the Consul at that Port, what happened, he was withdrawn but not replaced, with the result that merchants and shippingmen had untold difficulty in their Commerce having had to travel hundreds of miles to the next Consulate to get their Consular invoices & other maritime documents signed for trading with the United States.

If this happened in England what of Costa Rica? Again we will advise to leave trouble alone, it will get you without courting it, much quicker will it get you when you look for it.

From the "Negro World"

HON. JUDGE NICHOLAS KLEIN

My dear friends, I am very proud to be with you again.

I left last Spring for Europe and visited Northern Africa and Nubia, Nigeria. I found there the darker races having all things in common except to their religious beliefs. There were those who believed in their Mohammed, the Christians, the Krishna and their Shintoo. There had never been the Christ Jesus whom we seem to worship, but they had heard of Marcus Garvey, the Negro leader. Their chief desire was for the getting of Liberty.

It was peculiar to me, for Mohammed was only a camel driver. Where did Jesus spend his time, but in jail. When Mohammed, the Krishna and I was charged with stirring up the people but Pilate said he found no fault in this man, yet they cried "crucify him", "crucify him". This reminds me of Garvey's imprisonment. It was ignorance of his people whom he had come to serve and reform, that caused his suffering. Ignorance is a man's enemy. Get rid of that and the job will be easy.

While you are worrying over religion here you are experiencing so much hell on earth, which is exhibited in the miserable existing living conditions that we find your people surrounded with. I would advise that you stick, and give your undivided support to this program of Liberty Negro Improvement Association, for in it is the solving of your vexed problem, which confronts the Negroes scattered the world over. For their life and insurance policies are paid up after death. Your welfare and your posterity's welfare are wrapped up in this Organization, therefore support it to the best of your ability.

I have said if the Russians, the Japanese, the Chinese have a homeland, what is the matter with four hundred million Negroes who have no? You put your leader in jail, and when they robbed Liberty Hall from you, they thought that the Association would get under. What fools are they, the masses are crying for more Liberty. Garvey, Trailors should be kicked out whenever found in your ranks. They mean you no good.

Africa has been stolen from the Negro. He did not fight back. Friends, you need not be ashamed of Garvey. The same cause that sent Garvey to jail led to the cross. Look at the great movement he has started. This is not an easy job, nor a Sunday School picnic. We want honest-minded men and women to help carry on this work in behalf of the struggling Negroes of the world.

Another election within 30 days must of necessity be held, when it is expected that Mr. Garvey will be a Candidate again.

He is also actively engaged conducting his Campaign for the St. Andrews seat in the Legislative Council against Mr. Seymour-Seymour.

## Thanksgiving Fund

In April last a Fund was opened up as a Thanksgiving offering for the recovery of His Majesty King George from his serious illness. This fund has reached a Total of £ 689,397 of which £ 218,397 has been apportioned to King Edward's Hospital.

£ 91,710 to individual Hospital's & other charitable institutions, £ 187,012 apportioned for Radium purposes in curing Cancer etc. & 192,478 for different charities.

More than 140 Hospital's have been benefited by this Kings Thanksgiving Fund.

## The Presentation

Lord Olivier (former Governor of Jamaica) who was sent out as President of the Sugar Commission to enquire into the existing conditions of the Sugar Industry of the West Indies, was the recipient of an overwhelming ovation in Jamaica; and on leaving on Wednesday last week for Cuba he was presented with a most elaborately illuminated address, presented to him at

the Ball given in his honour by the Jamaica Imperial Association at Myrtle Bank Hotel on 6th inst in a Casket Made of Yacca inlaid with Satinwood, and the root of the Braziletto with a silver plate on top engraved with the name of Lord Olivier.

The presentation was all by Jamaican Talent. The address was got up and presented by Mr. W. Farquharson chairman of the Association, was illuminated by Miss V. Nash, the Casket was made by Mr. H. P. Headlam, and the Engraving was done by Mr. L. A. Henriques. At the ball a presentation all Jamaica was present.

## M. C. C. Tour

The first Match of the M. C. C. tour of the West Indies, was started at Barbadoes on 2nd July. At 11 o'clock with the Barbadians batting; at luncheon time rain prevented further play for the first day. On the second day Barbadoes finished their innings with 100 runs, while Challenger 51 Francis 39 and the School-boy Sealy 100, Tarilton was unfortunately bowled for (one) the Englishmen went in and at call of time had 173 runs for 4 wickets.

The third days play the M. C. C. team closed their innings for 513 Runs, Pat Hendren carrying his bat for 223, Gunn 60, thus ending the first Match in a draw.

O. C. Scott & Headley of Jamaica will go to Barbadoes to play in the test match, and L. N. Constantine of Barbadoes will play in Jamaica in the test.

## French Cruiser

On Saturday 18th the French Cruiser Antares will visit this country at Port Limon. It is the first time that a French "man of War" will anchor in Limon & great preparations are being made for the entertainment of the sailors.

A special train will be run to take the officers on 30 1st men to San José where they will be entertained by the French Community there.

## Cooperative Schemes

The Citrus Fruit Cooperative Association has at last been formed in Jamaica. The Pimento growers Association is in course of formation.

So we have in this little Isle now, The Banana Producers Cooperative Association, The Citrus Fruit Cooperative Association, and soon The Pimento & spices producers cooperative Ass.

The Citrus fruit of Jamaica was formerly bought and marketed by private concerns, but now the growers have combined, and have made their first shipment, as a present to Lady Willington. It is the first time that a French-Canada for introduction to the Canadian public. Pamphlets will be distributed praising the excellence of the fruit, their trade mark is an Orange Tree standing on a Map of Jamaica with the words "Jamaik Brand" in a circle with labels of Orange Yellow.

## Knighthood Honours

The King has been lavish with his concessions of New Year honours to India; no less than fourteen have been conceded to that portion of the Empire, in spite of Gandhiji's propaganda for Independence.

One Knighthood goes to New-Zealand, one to Queensland, and five to the Colonies.

The Secretary of Lord Willington, Governor General of Canada, who passed thro' Costa Rica some weeks ago with Lord Olivier, has been created a Companion of the order of St. Michael & St. George.

## Destroyers Exercise

Next month will be great Exercise practises by the United States Destroyer fleet in the Caribbean. After their exercises they will spend a few days in Jamaican Harbours, from the 10th, to the 16th Destroyer Tender Dobbin along with fifteen destroyers with the U. S. S. Conqueror bearing the flag of Rear Admiral W. R. S. Suter will visit Kingston for six days show leave.

In April the U. S. S. Detroit, the flagship of Rear Admiral T. H. Clark Commander of the light cruiser Division of the Scouting Fleet will also visit Kingston in Company with the Milwaukee & Cincinnati.

The United States Consul at Kingston Mr. Jose Olivares & wife were booked to go to Italy but have postponed their trip until after the visit of the fleet.

## Wealth of Nations

The Dresdner Bank of Germany has issued circulars with the estimated wealth of Great Britain, United States, and Germany.

The United States, comes first with four hundred and twenty-eight thousand, five hundred & sixty million dollars or eighty eight thousand million pounds sterling \$ 428,560,000,000 £ 88,000,000,000. England next with \$ 199,575,000,000. £ 22,000,000,000. Germany next with \$ 94,965,000,000 £ 19,500,000,000.

Great Britain comes first in foreign Investments of £ 4,000,000,000. United States comes second with \$3,000,000,000 and Germany third with £ 2,000,000,000.

So it will be seen that with all the disastrous consequences of the World War Germany is by no means last in the race for World's Wealth.
