

THE GREAT EXPOSITION AT CARTAGO

On Saturday last at 9 a. m. the President of the Republic arrived at the Campo Ayala where the Exposition was held and accompanied by his general staff, and the representatives and specially invited guests, he immediately threw the doors open after a few well chosen remarks, when the Band took up the beautiful strains of the National Anthem at which moment everyone in the great Assembly came to attention and Salute.

Don Arturo Volio Minister of Public works, improvements, and Agriculture then read a voluminous address as to the necessities which was seen by the government of don Cleto Gonzalez Viquez, to open such an Exhibition, as a means of fomenting the prosperity of the country. He said that it was now over a half a century that such men as The Peralas, Jimenez, Sancho, Yglesias, Volios, Molinas, Chavarrias, Gomez and others have been trying to improve the blood of their stock Mare and Horn but it is now twenty five years since the government has been giving every assistance possible for the importation of first class stock from Europe, America, Jamaica, Chile and Peru, to improve the blood and capabilities of

our stock, and the time has just arrived when, to support the great plan of the President to further help in the development in the stock rearing industry of the country it was decided to open this Exhibition so that rich and poor could appreciate what was being done in the interest of this branch of Agriculture, on which the country so much depends for its prosperity, and he was proud to see the efforts put forward by the farmers and stockowners in bringing forward so formidable an Assembly of the best stock in the country, he also made special mention of the courtesy of the representatives who had been invited among them being The Minister of Public works and Agriculture of Panama, Mr. Luis Felipe Clement, and other great stock men of Panama and Nicaragua, as well as the Diplomatic representatives of the United States, Mexico, Uruguay, Ecuador, Nicaragua, Chile, Guatemala, Peru, Cuba Spain and other countries. He also thanked "La Tribuna", who helped through its daily columns to make the Exposition the great success it was. He ended his discourse by saying it was not Provincial other greater countries in their achievements in the meat and

milk industry, but to show that step by step by degrees it was the idea of this administration to lend every support for the development by the selection of the best class of animals to increase the capabilities of our industry and to augment the National resources in this branch.

At the close of his remarks he was given a wonderful applause, and congratulated for his great discourse and for the part he had taken in bringing about such an admirable idea of an Exposition which had been crowned with such successes.

Mr. Emil J. Cooper the Judge who had been asked for through the diplomatic relationships of Costa Rica and The United States, then started to make his adjudications.

At 3 p. m. the Bull fights started and a very lively time was spent.

On Sunday again the doors were thrown open at 1 p. m. when another record crowd visited the Exposition.

On Saturday night a sumptuous dinner was given by the Rotary Club of Cartago at the Hotel Frances of Cartago in honour of the Exposition and

the Visitors to the old Capital. The President of the Republic delivered a great Oration, during which he complimented all who had helped to bring about such a successful meeting and said that he was truly surprised to see such a magnificent show, and was pleased to find the money which was spent by his government to aid the Show was so well spent.

The Minister of Fomento and Agriculture of Panama, Mr. Clement said this was indeed a first class Exhibition, and was very glad he had come, for it is almost incredible to think that in twenty years Costa Rica has made the strides she has, my journey with my associates has profited us much, we have come, we have seen, and we have learnt much, and we are going back to Panama to do likewise, for I congratulate this country and its stock-breeders.

On Monday the show was brought to a conclusion, with horse racing and other diversions, at which time the Mare Cricket beat, a son of philanthropist Waterboy a son of the Jamaica stock Waterman imported here by Mr. Lester Norton beat Fireball as

son of the Jamaica stud Philantrophos also imported by Mr. Norton. Then the two Jamaica stallions Philantrophist and Dreamer both importations of Mr. Norton but sold to Mr. Molina of Cartago, the former, and the later now owned by don Jose Monge of Turrialba, went for the event of the day. Philantrophist coming in the winner.

On Sunday night a banquet was again given at the Hotel Frances by the stockbreeders in honour of Mr. Earl Cooper for his acknowledged probity and efficiency as Judge. The first speaker giving the Toast of the evening was don Jose Monge to don Moestevo Martinez, to which Mr. Cooper suitably replied. The speech of the evening was that delivered by don Arturo Volio. Then Mr. Joachim Vargas Coto one of the Editors of "La Tribuna" gave the closing speech in which he eulogized don Ricardo Jimenez, as one of the greatest propagandists in the importation of Bloodstock and Mr. Cooper's experience of stockbreeding and offered him in the name of don Ernesto Ortiz Jeweller and stock breeder a beautiful Medal in memory of Campo Ayala.

Exhibition Prizes

In the exhibition the principal prize winners were for the *Gaenssey breed* the successors of Alfredo Volio.

The Guernsey Bulls were certainly as good as anything to be produced anywhere in the world.

The Jersey breed.—This was well contested between Robert Hermanos, Don Julio Sancho, Don Jose Joachim Peralta; & Coto Aguilar Bros. The best Bull however fell to don Julio Sancho, and best Cows to Coto Aguilar Bros. Heifers & young Bulls fell to Robert Bros.

The *Holstein breed*.—Was easily won by Don Rafael Vargas, who had the best Bull, estimated by the Judge to weigh 3000 lb. In cows he took 1st & 2nd. place. Don Juan Rodriguez took 2nd place for Bulls, and 1st. place for young Cows.

The *Ayrshire breed*.—This was all monopolized by Mr. Franz von Battenbach getting 1st. place in Bulls Cows Young Cows, Heifers, young Bulls & Calves, he Specializes in this Breed.

The Show of these animals was certainly all that could be desired. The accommodation provided by the government was exceptionally good for the first venture in such an Exposition.

New Trading Company

The old Firm of Felipe J. Alvarado & Co., has been dissolved by mutual consent and a new one formulated by the same partners for the same purposes, with a Capital of C. 600,000 - trading as Commission Merchants and Shippers Agents. Don Felipe J. Alvarado being President and Mr. Escalante Vice-President as usual.

It is presumed that this is a means of calling in the immense quantity of outstanding due to the old Firm and writing off the considerable losses sustained recently and starting afresh.

The Quashing of the Garvey and Aikman Cases

Being of very much interest to our readers, we reproduce from *The Gleaser* the arguments adduced to quash the conviction of these gentlemen, as has already been reported in our issue of last week.

In accordance with their decision arrived at the previous afternoon, the Judges of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court gave judgment yesterday morning freeing Mr. Marcus Garvey and Mr. T. A. Aikman who had been convicted on a charge of seditious libel and sentenced to six months and three months imprisonment respectively by His Honour Mr. A. K. Agar, Resident Magistrate for Kingston. They were on bail.

His Honour the Chief Justice upon the opening of the Court at 10.30 o'clock, said: Mr. Justice Brown has been good enough to prepare the judgment of the Court in this appeal, which judgment he will now deliver.

and therefore express no opinion on those matters.

Seditious libel is an offence at common law and by section 207 (e) of law 39 of 1927 jurisdiction is conferred on the Resident Magistrate to try all common law offences. This jurisdiction is however modified by *The Newspaper Libel Law 1896*. That Law contemplates that criminal proceedings against any proprietor, publisher, editor or any person responsible for the publication of a newspaper, for any libel published in that paper, shall be tried by a Judge and Jury. This section 3 shows that the Resident Magistrate upon the hearing of such a charge is holding a preliminary investigation with a view to committing for trial by a Jury. It authorizes him to hear certain evidence which therefore was not admissible at a preliminary investigation for a criminal libel and goes on to enact that "the Resident Magistrate, if of opinion, after hearing such evidence, that there is a strong or probable presumption that the person charged, may dismiss the case." The Jury on the trial would acquit the person charged, may dismiss the case." Again sec. 4 provides that if the Resident Magistrate upon hearing of such a charge, "is of opinion that the person charged is shown to have been guilty, the libel was of a trivial character, and that the offence might

sible for a libel published therein except as provided, and not then, unless the party charged consents to being so dealt with.

It was contended that this Law deals only with defamatory libel of a private individual. It will be noticed that the Law and also the act of 1851 which this law supplements or amends deal with both civil and criminal proceedings and by secs. 5 and 6 the Law excludes from its protection any seditious, blasphemous or indecent matter. Whether such matter is seditious, blasphemous or indecent was a question for the decision of the Jury. There is nothing which restricts the generality of its provisions and, unless we are compelled to do so by plain words, the Law should not be so construed as to deprive the persons mentioned in secs. 2, 3 and 4 of the right to trial by a Jury. We are unable to interpret the Law as referring only to defamatory libel and we will go further and say that if there be any doubt about it the doubt should be resolved in favour of permitting the right of trial by Jury to prevail. The objection in our opinion a valid one, and should have been allowed.

We also think that the objection to the fiat of the Attorney General was good, and that the conviction of Section 2 provides that "No criminal proceedings shall be commenced against any proprietor, publisher, editor, or any person responsible for the publication of a newspaper, for any libel published therein, without the fiat of the Attorney General being first had and obtained." It was contended that this fiat was only necessary in the case of a prosecution for defamatory libel and that in any event in this case such a fiat was obtained and is in evidence.

It is to be observed that the Section implicitly requires the fiat to be obtained prior to the institution of a prosecution for "any libel" published in a newspaper. A libel may be either blasphemous or seditious, or obscene or defamatory of a person or body of persons. There is no justification for cutting down the general words "any libel" so as to exclude blasphemous, seditious, or obscene libels. Such authority as there is, is against such a construction.

In *R. v. Bradlaugh* 15 Cox 223 for blasphemous libel the fiat of the Director of Public Prosecutions was obtained before criminal proceedings were commenced and in *Archbold's Criminal Pleading* it is practice the necessity for it seems to be clearly indicated.

The next question is whether the fiat which was given in this case is such a fiat AS THE LAW REQUIRES. This fiat mentions no one by name but allows "the prosecution of the proprietor, publisher or editor of *The Blackman*, or any person responsible for the publication therein of a seditious libel on the 14th. day of January 1930". We must follow the decision in *R. v. Allison* (Case 559) in which it was held that the fiat (granted under the English Statute to which section 2 of our Law corresponds) ought to have mentioned the name of every person against whom the prosecution was intended to have been allowed and that it is the duty of the Public Prosecutor to ascertain the persons against whom it is intended to prosecute before granting his fiat. In accordance with this decision we must hold that this fiat is not such as is required by the Law and that the objection taken to it is well founded and should have been upheld.

The appeal must accordingly be allowed and these convictions quashed.

At the trial of the case, Mr. E. E. Campbell, barrister-at-law who appeared for Mr. Aikman, took the objection when his client was asked to plead, that the Court has no jurisdiction and he tendered a written statement on the Law submitting the points which the Appeal Court has now upheld.

Later in the trial, Mr. S. W. P. Foster-Sutton who appeared for Mr. Garvey raised the point as to the defective fiat of the Attorney General. Both these points were considered to be not fatal by the Resident Magistrate upon the hearing of the case.

THE COURT JUDGMENT

MR. JUSTICE BROWN delivering the judgments said:
 Rex. vs. Marcus Garvey and T. A. Aikman.—The appellants were charged on indictment in the Resident Magistrate's Court for the parish of Kingston with writing and publishing a seditious libel. The alleged seditious libel was published in a newspaper of which appellant is described as Managing Editor and the other the Literary Editor.

At the trial it was contended (1) that the Resident Magistrate had no jurisdiction to hear and determine a charge of seditious libel against the editor of a newspaper and (2) that the fiat of the Attorney General was not in accordance with the requirements of the Newspaper Libel Law 1896 as it did not name the persons against whom the criminal proceedings were to be instituted.

The Resident Magistrate overruled both these contentions and convicted the appellants and from that conviction they have now appealed. The argument on this appeal has been confined to these two submissions, we have heard nothing as to whether the words published amount to a seditious libel or whether one of the appellants is prosecuted by section 7 of 14 Victoria c. 34

BE ADEQUATELY PUNISHED

by virtue of the powers of this Section, the Resident Magistrate shall cause the charge to be read to the person charged, and then address a question to him to the following effect: "Do you desire to be tried by a Jury or do you consent to the case being dealt with summarily?" and if such person consents to the case being dealt with summarily, the Resident Magistrate may summarily convict him and adjudge him to pay a fine not exceeding fifty pounds, and in default to be imprisoned as a first class misdemeanant for any period not exceeding three months."

The will of Mr. Minor C. Keith

According to the first declaration of the will of this great benefactor of Costa Rica along with the many bequests that he made, the value of his Estate was said to be twenty three million dollars, of which he donated to charitable institutions of Costa Rica the sum of three millions of dollars.

Now that the will has been contested by his nephew Mr. Henry Keith, who felt that he did not inherit sufficient of his Uncle's fortune, the valuation of his Estate is only said to be now..... \$ 3,366,304. What then has happened to so deteriorate the worth of his holding? Surely Mr. Keith's Lawyers and Executors must have had an Inventory of all assets with an equitable valuation of them? In the Tribuna of Wednesday however, we find the Special Service Cable from Riverhead, Long Island 20th. inst. "The Executors of the will in the Estate of Mr. Minor C. Keith, presented to the Courts of the County of Suffolk an Inventory of the goods of the deceased, which is calculated in a gross total of \$ 4,772,284.17 less liabilities of \$ 1,366,504.44. This inventory has revealed with great surprise to some, a considerable diminishing of the value of this Estate. At one time it was believed that Mr. Keith had left at his death a value of not less than \$ 23,000,000. It was not however until a thorough investigation into the matter brought about by the objections placed by his nephew Mr. Henry P. Keith, at the Legacy left him that the true value of the decedent's Estate has been brought to light."

It is strange that a man of no mean intelligence, along with his Lawyers and Executors and Accountants could sit together and bequeath away six times more property than he had. Something seems wrong to any man of ordinary thought. Under these conditions then, what becomes of Costa Rica's gift of \$ 3,000,000, this is a very technical case.

The Tramway License

The Tramway License of the Jamaica Public Service, has been extended for another year as from 10th February.

The Tramway Co. or Jamaica Public Service's License to operate has expired since a couple of years ago, and application had been made to the Governor in Privy Council for a new License, but the Privy Council has not yet considered the new application pending the entry in the field of another Company with better Concessions hence the Co. has had to be getting extensions from year to year.

At this extension the Co. wishes represented by Hon J. A. G. Smith K.

C. instructed by Mr. Cameron Duff. There being no opposition to the application the extension was granted it is expected that the New License will soon be considered.

Company's Merger

Mr. A. Muller President of the Atlantic Fruit Co. and Mr. M. Kervin Vice-President of the DiGiorgi Fruit Corporation are both staying at Aguila Vale, one of the large properties of the Atlantic Fruit Co. in Jamaica. It is expected that the merging of interests of both Companies is being arranged for as was announced by Mr. DiGiorgi some time ago in the Daily Gleaner.

Jamaica Banana

Up to now Jamaica has sent to Europe, American and Canadian Markets 3,740,000 stems of Bananas as against 2,670,740 for last season.

The United Fruit Co. is not buying in the open market these two weeks, leaving it all to the Jamaica Producers Association; she is merely Shipping her own production of fruit.

Unemployment

William Grey President of the American Federation of Labour speaking before the Commercial Committee of the Senate, said that the number of unemployed during the month of February in the United States amounted to 3,700,000 which is an increase since October of between 11 to 22 per cent. The salaries of these unemployed calculated at \$ 4,000,000,000 per annum shows shortage in monetary circulation in the country. He assures the Senate that if something is not done to alleviate the serious conditions existing it is feared serious ruptures in the Civil life of the Country will be the result; and recommends the adoption of the Wagner law which appropriates a permanent fund of \$ 1,500,000,000 to help the unemployed.

Smallpox

Two new cases have been discovered one in Paraiso, and the other in Monte Redondo these are now ten cases confirmed, Vaccination being rushed in all the villages around up to now there are 100,000 persons Vaccinated.

The Banana Loan

In connection with the Loan which was announced a fortnight ago. It is verified that a syndicate of Bankers, represented by Watson Williams & Co. of New Orleans have made an Offer to Loan the government five millions of

dollars for twentyfive to thirty years at 7 per cent; but no confirmation yet as to their interests in the Banana Industry. It is suggested that if they mean business, they should send a representative here to discuss the points at issue.

The Labour Party

The McDonald Cabinet met with a defeat on Monday but not sufficiently crushing to warrant resignation.

Safety First

During the past six months there have been more accidents in the various branch of activities than any other like period in the history of the country for the last ten years. These mishaps have had so many attendant fatalities that the public is becoming askant. Of course it is customary that whenever there is a frequency of occurrences of any kind the wheels of investigation and observation are generally brought into motion, sometimes we find public sentiment very much tinged with criticism. However, the foregoing characteristics, but rather wish to make a few observations and suggestions to readers of this valuable Journal.

The year 1930 has nearly completed a quarter of its cycle and as is customary we all make or renew resolutions at the commencement of each year. Some of us adopt slogans and decide that these individual slogans should be the guiding principles of our daily activities, others set up mottoes which they hope to live up to during the year, and there are others who have neither slogan or motto. The slogan Safety First, is often mistaken to be intended only for the Railroad Department but I wish to state that this is a very good idea. Safety First is a Universal slogan, it is adoptable to every phase of human endeavor and therefore may be said to be the father of all mottoes. The people of every nation set aside the memory of which they perpetuate the memory of their famous men sometimes its a warrior, and explorer, an inventor or an originator. Not long ago the people of the United States celebrated the Fifteenth anniversary of the existence of Electric Light, payig great tribute to the great Edison. The same people set aside the 4th of July for their national Holiday. The same people would do well to find out the originator of this greatest of all modern slogans set aside a day for demonstration and so impress upon the world the worth of its adoption.

If our captains of industry would hold their annual "Safety First" celebration our people would more readily inculcate the principles of this invaluable slogan, and the number of accidents which very often occur through lack of precaution would be reduced to a minimum. This slogan is even worthy of an ornamental frame, the most conspicuous place in every home, any household that characterizes its movements upon the principles "Safety First" is well on the road to success. If we begin at the cradle, we find that mothers would have less hair rising frights and babies less bruises if "Safety

First" is applied when the youngest creeps too near the edge of the staircase. The school boy would find it profitable by preparing his lessons at home before going to school. The carpenter by securing his scaffold in the proper manner would avert many accidents which often entail permanent disability and fatality.

The engineer and other motive power operators by reading their orders twice would avoid overrunning their limit and would not so often commit Homicide and suicide at the same time.

The farmer by propping a bunch of Banana that threatens to up root would be better off by the value of the stem.

The pedestrian by stopping at crossings to observe the movements of traffic would reduce the annual toll of traffic fatalities. Housewives by placing their crockery in the center of their cup board would be better off when the chickens start to fly about or Baby goes near.

The secretary by placing each correspondence in its appropriate envelope would avoid dispatching contrary communications.

The Book keeper by checking over his entries at the time of posting would not sometimes find himself compelled to do the whole month's work, over in one night when his trial Balance fails to prove correct.

The store keeper by looking about the corners and into empty cases would not so often lock away someone who becomes the unknown partner after he has retired. Solicitors by studying their briefs correctly would not so often omit technicalities which sometimes cost them their case.

The foregoing comments will no doubt be sufficient to show the evident worth and the valuable service we could each render ourselves by the adoption of this simple motto "Safety First" or seguridad ante de todo.

For some time now the Printers and Printing establishments of this country have placed a memorial before the President to protect this Industry against what they feel an unjust foreign competition brought about by the Rich Corporations and Firms, but until now nothing has been heard of it, it being suspected that powerful influence is being brought to bear with a view of smothering this petition.

One will have to be acquainted with the formalities of the Customhouses to appreciate the thousands upon thousands of dollars of printed matter that is brought into the Country. All large Firms and Organizations bring in their labels, printed Stationery, Bill heads, letter heads, etc. It is any wonder then that there is so much unemployment in the country.

There is no reason why all these printed material which are admitted all free of duty should not be printed in the country by placing a prohibitive Tax on such things. It may be argued that the government would lose revenue, but it would not because the materials for printing would come in greater quantities besides finding work for the unemployed printers. Since writing this article we find that the proposal to place a duty of ten colones has been agreed on in four colones per Kilo on such printed matter.

What is Autotoxemia

(Continued)

Before going into the effects of Autotoxemia, let us examine the causes of this condition. Knowing that such a condition can exist we must find out (1) what to do to prevent its occurrence, and (2) what to do to stop it when present. At once we are impelled to ask "What makes the poison?" and "Where does it come from?" or, at least, "Where is it before it automatically gets into the blood?" This article has been written to answer these questions and to outline a simple, practical method to prevent self poisoning and to stop it when present.

Alimentary Tract, an Automatic Machine

The blood stream gets its supply of water, fuel and building material from the digestive system, and when poison is there, it gets that, too. To understand how the poison gets there it is necessary to know something of the working of this important part of the body.

The digestive system is also known as the alimentary tract, the gastro-intestinal tract. It is an automatic conveyor or transport system, to carry food materials from mouth to stomach and intestines, and to carry the waste through the colon to the rectum. It is also, a chemical laboratory and retort to break the food materials into the elements needed by the body. Its structure is practically the same throughout its entire length. Though the successive parts have different names, they are really only differentiated segments of a single tube.

As a transport system extending continuously from the lips to the rectum, it must run on schedule time. Any delay will cause confusion and disrupted service. It may be likened to one of the modern automatic machines which receives raw materials and transform them into a finished product, wrapped and labeled ready for market. The various motions of such a machine are so accurately timed that the slightest delay, will clog the machine, turn out an inferior product. And, if once corrected, wear out the machine itself.

Though the length of the human alimentary tract totals less than thirty feet it is divided into several sections by valves or station stops which in a large measure, regulate the time schedule, slow down the conveyor and prevent reverse action.

In next article I will describe the mouth which is responsible for many ills.

Instead of having one ball for each number, you should only have forty Balls numbered with from four noughts up to four nines.

Naval Conference
