## DEAD HOGS AND LIVE ONES A HARVEST THANKSGIVING

We are in receipt of a very lengthy, rude letter from Mr. Johnathan Mitchell, which we would publish so that our readers could gauge the *cultural opportunities* of the Special Representative, but it is such a garbaje of grammatical errors that I am afraid those of my readers who do not know me, might judge me, accordingly. However among other things he wishes me to make certain corrections, an article in my issue of 7th inst. entitled "Presidents meet at Pacuarito." In the first place he states that he was never demanded to resign by Mrs. De Mena, but that rather he voluntarily offered his resignation; what were the reasons prompting such a generous step down may we ask? I leave the audience to say whether it is true or not, that when Madame de Mena asked him to put his resignation in writing the next morning, when he acquiesced She retorted "if you dont I will give it." What is the meaning of that? To explain this I can only refer Mr. Mitchell and our readers to, paragraph 2 of her letter of 6th June to Mr. Smith, published in this issue, and ask him what is the underlying intention of this instruction? Is this a man who should be appointed *Special Parent Body Representative*, as per the Credential? Of which Mr. Mitchell is naturally so proud that he has sent up for publication; perhaps the Special is meant in coarseness & rudeness.

Another thing he says in his letter, "that it is absurd to consider the Presidents Conclave as purporting to be the governing body of the U. N. I. A. in Costa Rica"; because he does not so consider it, not does the International Organizer so consider it, for he goes on (verbatim) - She dont tell me so, and I have her instructions. So you think that the Conference should have the *Authority that I now hold?* but that is only your opinion & we dont want it.

Now just imagine a man whom is considered, as per paragraph 2, of the letter published by Mrs. De Mena's wish, a menace to the respect of the other officers of the organization on their platforms to be a Special Representative we leave the public to judge, and so refuse to countenance the insults offered by this individual, as we have some who declare themselves.

"Dead hogs" whose hides are impenetrable to boiling water, while there are other hogs whose snouts are being pieced by the judge, tusk of a hundred and twenty colones for impertinence, thus rendering them unable to wallow in the mire as deeply as they were wont to do.

See the great Credential, of May 31st and see the letter of reflection by Madame de Mena of June 6th; and judge if the latter does not cancel the former.

This is to certify that I have appointed Jonathan Mitchell *Special Parent Body Representative* for the district of Costa Rica and Bocas del Torro. It shall be his duty to speak in Divisions in the interest of the (\$ 600 000.000). Six Hundred Million Dollar Drive, to resuscitate the Morale of the Divisions wherever necessary. He shall receive 50% of all Parent Body's Collection out of which he shall pay his expense including railroad fare, and when in active service in the divisions he shall receive (\$500) five Dollars for said service out of the Parent Body fund on the balance. *Shall Forwarded immediately to Headquarter Jamaica.*

The bearer shall not receive any money for the \$500,000 000 Drive, only pledge. In the name of the Executive Council we ask that every courtesy and respect be shown to the Parent Body Officer.

My dear Mr. Smith:

After thinking seriously of the conditions existing in the Limon Division of the U. N. I. A., I am writing with a view of assisting to eliminate some of those besetting conditions, which in my humble opinion will help to bring about a better feeling among the membership under your administration.

I. - Have no public speakers on Sunday nights program except the President, the First Vice-President and the Chaplain, two speakers outside of the devotional exercises is sufficient. It is the duty of the President of the Division to address the members every

Sunday Night, just as the President Genl. does in Jamaica.

2. - I am instructing for the safety of the Division that you desist absolutely from placing before the membership of the Limon Division, to address them on any public occasion Messrs Corvall and Mitchell, or any other person or persons that would occasion open rebellion in such meetings and cause disrespect to other officers sitting on the platform of the organization.

3. - That the Garvey Literary Club function distinct from the Division, and as such when using the Liberty Hall for any functions that an agreement be made between the Division and the Club on a fifty fifty basis or a rental (Specified amount).

4. - That the units of the Division when having any Public functions for any purpose, shall turn over to the Treasury of the Division for overhead expenses fifty per cent of all funds collected, and fifty per cent shall be left in their individual Treasury to be expended as they shall see fit. At all functions carried on in the Liberty Hall, the Chairman of the Trustee Board shall be present at the window where tickets are sold to represent the interest of the Organization, if the Chairman of the Trustee Board cannot attend then the Secretary or the Treasurer shall attend.

5. - That the Secretary and President of the Division shall be responsible for all publications made in the name of this Division and no private individual. That the monthly report of the Division must be sent up to the Parent Body each month with the receipts of death grants attached, showing amount paid in the name of the Parent Body, less the total amount called for on the report.

Trusting that you will see to it that the above instructions be carried out to the letter, I have the honour, to remain.

## What William lenning Bryan thought of the Haitians Niggers

In a recent article written by John H. Allen in The Current History of May, former Manager of the Banque Nationale of the Republique de Haiti, in a very unusual manner; he makes a statement among other references, that he makes in regard to the Republic of Haiti, of an invitation which he received from the late W. J. Bryan, on one of his trips to Washington during the time that he was manager of the Bank.

Mr. Bryan then Secretary of State requested of him a description of Haiti and its people; when I arrived at the office Mr. Bryan said, Mr. Allen, I want you to tell me everything there is about Haiti. We are very much interested in Haiti. Tell me about the country and why the people are, anyway Where is Haiti?

Mr. Allen included in his description the fact that the people of the Island all speak French to which Mr. Bryan replied:

"Dear me, think of it, Niggers speaking French!"

Now our idea for repeating this remark of Mr. Bryan is to prove the sentiment of discard nursed by some prominent Americans against other unfortunate people.

The idea of Mr. Bryan exhibiting surprise at negroes speaking French, is preposterous although true. Can it be possible that a Secretary of States does not know the geography even of the Western Hemisphere?

It seems then that the then Secretary of State of the United States, was not cognizant of the fact that French was spoken in Haiti for over One hundred years, and that it was the language of the Island country. Or was it that Mr. Bryan occupied so much of his life time in studying the Bible that he had no time to acquaint himself of the lands bathed by the Caribbean Sea, which lands at this very instance are being threatened by dominance of his countrymen, or was it that Mr. Bryan begrudged the Negroes of possessing a language with which he was unacquainted.

There is it. How unlogical is it to think that people of the type of Mr. Bryan, should be entrusted with the welfare of the very people who, with anticipation they belittle and begrudge. May we ask then, is it a strange thing that the American intervention? in Haiti or anywhere else serves only to sow hatred for themselves and their country, when they lack diplomacy and tact in the handling of people and the affairs of people of other customs, when merchand they emphasize their disregard for other people's

qualifications, and insultingly enforce their spurious customs, carrying with them the fetid germs of discrimination against everything that is not American.

Mr. Allen as a writer does justice to his conscience, for he exposes statements which are influenced by race hatred, or supercilious superiority, and gives facts proving that foreigners especially Americans, have contributed prominently in fomenting revolutions among the natives of Haiti and are the chief factors in bringing about the condition of chaos which existed in the country and which these foreigners exploit to their advantage and to the detriment of the natives.

Among the many exposals that he makes he prominently

outlines the case of the National Railroad of Haiti, which the Haitians were forced to take over at an exorbitant sum from an American Syndicate through the instigation of the Department of State. and to substantiate our indications we have the recent occurrence in Haiti with the U. S. insisting in enforcing on them a President which the people do not want, and not until the women were bold enough to threaten to place their bosoms before the Machine guns of the U. S. that their demands were acceded to.

In the face of all this Mr. Hoover's Cabinet advertise themselves as Intercessors of World Peace.

The colored, youths of Limon have not aimed at anything. We have every opportunity, and we are wasting them in the strain of the Jazz Songs. We could have doctors, lawyers, professional men of every description, if we would just put our shoulders to the wheel, and remember that time is too precious to waste it in idleness.

## Accident Claims decided

Among the latest claims awarded by the Superior Court on Arbitrations of accident cases were those of Antonio Richardson against the Northern Ry. Co. by which the Co. has to pay him for temporal incapacity 50 days a @ 2.00 per day and for permanent partial incapacity @ 1600 as a monthly allowance of 28 colones for 5 years.

In the case of Daniel Campbell against the Northern Ry. Co. he is awarded @ 1957 and a monthly rental of @25.00 for five years; to be paid in advance into the Nacional Banco de Seguros.

## Empire Commerce

The Prince of Wales opened the Congress of the Federated Chamber of Commerce of the British Empire, at which there were over 300 delegates from different parts of the Empire.

Mr. Levis Ashenheim, was the representative for the Jamaica Chamber of Commerce.

## Counterfeit Bills

Nearly a million dollars of false Bills have been captured in the United States of America three arrest have been made in connection with the false issue of these Bills.

King George being indisposed from rheumatism on his 65 birthday on Monday 3rd. He remained quietly at home and the Prince of Wales answered the various calls.

## New fruit boats for the U. F. Co.

The U. F. Co. has put under construction eight of the eighteen boats she has estimated for. There are to be six of 4000 tons, being three for the San Francisco Port Armales run, and three for the Port Limon Nevv York run, these will be 450 ft in length by 60 ft, beam and will draw 24 ft of water with a speed of 16 Knots per hour.

Two are under construction of 20,000 tons for transatlantic

Channel ports, of a speed of 20 Knots, being 705 ft in length by 86 ft, beam and will be fitted to carry 600 ordinary first class passengers, 400 Tourist passengers and 200 steerage or 3rd class making a Capacity for 1240 passengers. They are being rushed to completion in two years.

## Income Tax in Costa Rica

There is being proposed in Congress by Deputy Julio Padilla an Income Tax on earnings, but this is placed at from @ 50,000 per annum or under @ 4,000 per month and upwards; this is only aiming at large Capitalists, but in times like these, there is no reason why every individual earning say from four hundred colones per month up, should not contribute say two per cent towards maintenance of the government. Every employee of the U. F. Co. pays two per cent for the maintenance of the Hospital, and most of them never get a Pill because they are never sick, why is it in times of financial shortages, such a Tax should not be imposed to help. In Jamaica such is imposed on all earnings from @ 200 per annum & upwards, why not here?

## A Councillor suspended

After a very patient hearing, stretching over several weeks, Councillor L. P. Fernandez of the Kingston & St. Andrews Corporation Council has been suspended for thirty days for misconduct by receiving a bribe of @ 5 to vote against an application to the Council for construction of a building in the district of Kencot, which would apparently have been detrimental to a Chinaman's interests.

Councillor Marcus Garvey moved the suspension and carried his motion by six votes to four.

This, the most vital question that is hanging over us, is still being held in the balance, and is again postponed for next week. Again the Cabinet of Don Cleto looks like falling on account of this matter, up to now there are three Ministers of the Cabinet who are opposed to the Contract tooth and nail. The Minister of Education Mr. Fournier having always been an 'Apras' man always staunchly opposed everything sounding U. F. Co. accepted his portfolio with the understanding that he would not be called to argue anything that concerned this business; The Minister of Gobernacion Mr. Arias is also opposed to certain clauses of the Contract and now the Min. of Public Works Mr. Cortes says if the Contract as it stands is accepted by the Cabinet to be presented before Congress he will resign. Now it is the Ministers of Fomento and Finance Messrs Arragon and Cortes whose business it is to present this project to Congress for decision and if one is refusing his cooperation, what will be done?

The strange thing about this vexed question is, that none of the opposition can propose a solution for the financial problem that is strangling us, and really up to now they have not been able to cite, a reasonable cause for their opposition.

To state that the U. F. Co. has made fortunes and left none in the country is preposterous, it does not take many minutes to look around to find the many improvements brought into being by the operations of the U. F. Co. In fact every progress towards Civilization in the Country has been made possible

by the financial manipulations of the U. F. Co. the very fact of the financial paralysis of the country and the resources of the government today has been brought about by the curtailment in the operations of the Co.; and if this is continued for another six months, we shall soon be getting into cannibalism and Edemism.

There are one or two points that the Management of the Co. has been asked to modify, and although they could very well afford to stick out, because she has what we are cavelling for, & must have at all costs; yet it is expected they will show their non-avaricious attitude and concede to such modification. Don Cleto sees the situation clearly, and is trying to do everything possible to alleviate the distressing situation by getting this Contract through so as to find Work for the thousands upon thousands of men & women, who today are suffering the pangs of lack & stringency in every part of the of the Country, because it is not in Lacom so much that is suffering, because thanks to the advice of such leaders as Mr. Sam. Cress of the U. F. Co. who has been advising the necessity to plant food stuffs for their own consumption, hence we have in the Province lots of minor products, which help considerably to minimize the suffering; but Commercial men are those who are faced with bankruptcy and privations more so; and it is hoped that Don Cleto's government will put every penny produced to the Co. and work together with him for the good of the inhabitants of the Country.

## From Other Lands

### Banana trade in Jamaica

For the five months up to the 25th May, Jamaica has shipped 8,775,397 stems of Bananas, as against 6,507,721 for the corresponding season of last year. For the week ending 25th May they shipped 684,799 stems of which the U. F. Co. lifted 334,038. The Atlantic Fruit Co. took 109,220 and the Jamaica Producers Association took 241,541 stems.

The Producers Association paid their suppliers two shillings and eight pence per cent; of which two pence per cent was paid to the government on account of Interest & sinking Fund on £ 200,000 debentures towards the costs of ships supplied.

Pimento has again risen in price going up to seventy shillings per cvvt.

### Exhibition in Jamaica

Another Exhibition is being considered in Jamaica, Sir Reginald Stubbs governor of Jamaica is much in favour of the proposition, and has gone so far as to name a Committee to investigate the possibilities.

That of 1891 was a great success so far as advertising the Island was concerned and out of that has sprung most of our present Commerce; but was not a financial success, because governor Blake had to call on those people who stood surety for the success of the undertaking; to stomp up the deficit; but we are feeling that on this occasion it

would be more of a financial success judging the facilities now afforded in ocean travelings, (of course the Hotels, Merchants, Railways, Shipping lines & Garages, each would have to subscribe very heavily to help to bring this about. We believe that every Jamaican in foreign parts who can creep aboard the boats would be present.
