NEWS OF THE WORLD

At America's Cup

Lord Lipton is determined although he is not in good health, to lift that Cup back to England. He has built his Shamrock V and prepared her with the minutest skill, and sent her across to compete with America's best; before sending her over he test her out with all England's best sailing light craft, and out twenty two races that she ran in she won 15 of these races in all sorts of seas, of course according to the regulations for the race the challenger has got to be built sturdy enough to come across the ocean under her own sails to compete with the lighter craft in American waters.

Capt Heard who will handle her in the race was able seaman in the last race, she carries a crew of 22 young seamen, and left British waters on 19th July and the trip across is expected to take her a month, we sincerely wish them good luck across so that she will arrive fit to be able to take back the old mug before Lord Lipton leaves these earthly shores.

World's largest Ship

The 3rd S. S. Britannic made her maiden trip from Liverpool to New York; built by Messrs Harland & Wolff Ltd. Belfast, she is of 26943 tons, 620 ft length; 82 ft breadth, 48 ft 9 ins depth and 17½ knots.

She has 13 watertight compartments and a double bottom.

Speeding up for Tourists

The Constant Spring Hotel is nearing completion and is expected to be opened up for the end of the year. The Manager appointed "a Jamaican" one Mr. Charles Cameron who was born at Windsor St Anns but left when a boy has arrived to shape up all conveniences and finishing touches. He opened the Royal Connaught Hotel in Hamilton & has been there for 15 years. And is now transferred to his native land in similar capacity. The Constant Spring Hotel has 110 rooms and if trade grows it will be augmented by Cottages built around to fill the requirement.

It will be operated by the United Hotels Company of America, the largest hotel operators of the Americas, who run a chain of 21 of the best Hotels on the continent.

The Canadian National Railways are most interested in the Hotel and will advertise & boost up Jamaica by it.

The water required for Hotel purposes and for watering the golf links, Tennis Courts etc. is calculated at one million gallons daily, in consequence, a well is being sunk at the foot of the Hills, and with powerful Pumps to put the water in a Storage Tank, enough will be secured. So far the well has been sunk 160 ft deep.

From the Panamanian papers it is also seen that an immense Hotel and Casino is to be built

for the Tourist trade in Panama at a cost of 800,000 dollars.

The Contract has been signed between the Syndicate & the government, work is to be started within six months of the signing & approval by the Executives of Contract, and is to be completed within eighteen months.

The government gives the lands and the Co. will operate for 25 years, after which if all are agreed there will be an extension of another 25 years, at the expiration of which the government will either buy or grant another 25 years after which the whole concern becomes government property without any indemnity whatever.

The Gran Costa Rica Hotel is also expected to be finished, so as to be opened up for the 15th September. This is a most imposing structure, although not of an ornamental appearance from without, but the decorations of the interior will be of a first class calibre, and as for its durability, never before has reinforced Concrete of its kind been known in Costa Rica and we feel safe in saying Central America. It carries an emergency Tank of 60,000 gallons on top, and two wireless towers for high power receiving & broadcasting.

The workmanship is a great credit to the Architect Mr. Lawrence and his general foreman Mr. Cadiz whose names will ever live in the Architectural concerns of this country.

Unemployment

The figures of unemployment as per a governmental report, through the Minister of Labour for great Britain puts the Number of unemployed in the country at 1,930,500 being a gain of 42925 over the previous week. No wonder, if taxpayers money is to be doled out to healthy strong men, instead of finding works of relief for them, to be engaged on.

Court of Appeals

The Supreme Court of Jamaica will again be constituted as a Criminal Court of Appeals for British Honduras, as was the case in former years, but discontinued. The Secretary of State for the Colonies has issued such instructions.

The Society St. Vincent de Paul

By the cleaner we see that the Treasurer of The St. Vincent de Paul Charitable Society of Kingston has issued its balance Sheet for ½ year ending 30th June, with £ 56,171 in Government Savings bank and in Treasurers hand £ 1,25 following are the Accounts.

Balance in Bank on July 1st 1930 £ 96. Cash in Treasurers hand £ 12,197; Donations £ 34,15 y Collections in Poor Boxes at Holy Trinity Cathedral £ 5,010.4; Collections at meetings £ 2,45 Proceeds of Concert in January £ 5,120; Miscellaneous fid. Interest from Bank 3/6. Total £ 202,622. Payments Weekly doles to poor £ 121.50; Cash grants £ 4,126; Materials for clothing to poor £ 17,153; Stationery & printing 140. Total £ 144,69. Balance in Bank £ 56,171; Cash in Treasurer's hands £ 1,25. £ 202,63. This is a charitable institution, inaugurated & kept up by the Catholic Church all over the world.

In Limon this Society does admirable work among the deserving poor and sick, by giving out clothing, food & medicines to them; controlled by the ladies of the Church, especially have we seen, such ladies as Madame Jale, Mrs. McGuinness and others finding out the needy through rain & shine, sacrificing themselves in all the slums, doling out whatever donations they can receive from Charitable donors day by day. Their self denying customs are worthy of greater support by the Community because this Society while controlled by the Church does not confine itself to any religious affiliation, but exists merely for the poor whatever their creeds.

While on Charity by the same means we note that the Royal George United Relief Society of Kingston, is again hoping to give its annual Emancipation Day Dinner to over 300 poor on the 1st August, under the patronage of the deputy Mayor Dr. E. E. Penso.

Cricket

England saved another defeat in the 3rd test match against Australia at Leeds due to the great batting of Wally Hammond who recovered his batting form by putting on 113 runs, making the total for his side of 391 in

answer to Australias 566 of which Bradman made 334 thus giving them the uneasy position of a follow on, but by patient playing they out played time, at the call of time having 3 wickets for 95 runs in their second inning.

Scientific Progress in Radio

Some few weeks we found Mr. Marconi lighting up the Radio Palace in Australia with over 3000 lights from his Yacht Electric in the Mediterranean Sea. Now we find the Lord Mayor of London a week ago opening the Radio Exhibition in Melbourne eleven thousand miles away by pressing a button and tapping a key at the Mansion House, London, by which the diversity of lights thrown on declared the signal for the opening of the Exhibition, and within a quarter of an hour a telegram was received from Melbourne Australia announcing the success of his opening the show.

Later in the day additional lights were thrown on by the Mayors of Montreal Canada, Wellington, New Zealand; and from Fiji Islands by a similar operation.

A Record Distribution

The largest direct shipment of Bananas ever sent into Canada from Jamaica was that on the 24th ultimo by the "Lady Rodney" 83,000 stems which were entirely sold out the same day. The average price realized was three dollars and thirty cents per quintal.

Prospects of Orange and Grapefruit

The Jamaica Citrus Growers Association is progressing as rapidly as is The Banana Producers Association, there are up to now over 1500 members who will control a production of 100,000 boxes of fruit.

As is well known the last sitting of the Legislative Council voted £ 5000 to help the growers, and the government has given a plot of land near the gas works of the Railway lands to erect the Packing house and erect the machinery for canning grapefruit etc. which is unfit for shipments.

Tenders have been asked for the construction of the Packing house by Mr. F. H. Robertson the Manager and his Directors, and it is expected that by October the Citrus Association will be in operation, where a great quantity of girls will be given employment.

Lord Nelson's Home

The Governor of The Leeward Islands, is pleading with true hearted Britons to conserve the home of Lord Nelson at the dockyards of Antigua harbour where he resided as commander in chief of the Navy to the glory of the British Empire.

The necessary repairs etc. will cost about £ 6,000 to which a donor in the United States and one in Canada have subscribed £ 700, it is the balance necessary that the hearts of Britishers are being appealed to for, are there none in Costa Rica that can be touched.

The Jamaica Banana Producers

This Association is succeeding by leaps and bounds; its membership is rapidly growing, in-somuch, so that the Directors are needing more ships, and in fact arrangements have been made for securing an extra ship every year, to be paid for by the deductions of two pence per stem supplied by the Producers. All class of Produce is being taken care of. There has been formed a Citrus Fruit producers Association, a Pimento producers Assn; a Coconut producers Assn, and all minor Products are being merged in, to provide freight for these ships and a consolidated marketing of all classes of produce.

Suicide at "La Flor" Zent

Pinrine Estillon Manager of the Farm of Mr. Alberto Hernandez adjoining "La Flor" shot himself. A few days before, he said he had a vision from his wife who died about three years ago, telling him that she needed him alongside of her and immediately he took ill in bed, with an attack of the head, doing strange things, finally he forbade his men to come near his house, threatening to shoot them if they did.

The owner of the farm was communicated with, who came to see what was happening. On arriving on Wednesday 23rd inst. at the farm remonstrated with Pinrini, and asked him how he was feeling he replied that he was feeling like a man ready to die. Mr. Hernandez invited him to come outside for fresh air and as he turned outside to prepare a chair for him he heard the crack of a gun inside, on entering he found Pinrine stretched dead on the floor. He placed the muzzle of the revolver under his heart, the bullet going through the heart and coming out on the right side.

KINDNESS REPAID From Ley River

Kindly permit me Mr. Editor space in your valuable paper to show the public how kindness pays and to be careful of people unknown to them.

One Ada Dacosta lately of Panama, came to my lodging house, sick, almost a cripple, could hardly get around, with a story that she had been turned out from the place she had been staying, as her money had not arrived from her paramour in Siquirres; through sympathy I gave her a furnished room, something to eat and drink gratuitously, my servant attending to her while

she was sick. Months passed by, she started to recruit her health and was able to get around.

In the month of March, while I was remonstrating with my servant for not attending to her duties as she ought, this woman said to me, that if I would give her wages she would look after the house and do the washing. I felt annoyed at her ingratitude and said to her, you should try and do whatever you can in the house and leave it to my generosity, seeing how hospitable I have been to you now for five months.

Ever since then she started to quit the house in the mornings returning in the evening. I advised her to find new quarters as she was strong enough now to work and assist herself, and ceased feeding her gratuitously but it was not until the night of the 25th June that she finally left my lodgings after 8 o'clock.

On the morning of the 26th June to my great surprise I found that the blankets, bedroom linen & utensils, of the room I had permitted her to occupy, as well as some of my Kitchen utensils were gone. I got a searchwarrant and the detective found my things in her new home, the Crockery were thrown by her through the window & broken when she saw the detective coming. What was unbreakable he took along with her to the Agent of Police. I identified my goods and laid a formal accusation for theft against her by escrito. The goods were valued by me at eighty colones. The detective testified that he found these in her house and had seen her throw the Cups dishes etc. through the window & smashed them; she acknowledged that the goods were mine but that I had given them to her.

The Judge instead of sending the matter over to the Criminal Court being beyond the value of his Jurisdiction, accepts false verbal evidences in my absence without notifying me, in spite of my accusation by Escrito, saying that I had given the goods to her and returns the stolen property to this woman, who consequently is now barefaced enough to be seeking the means of launching a Civil action against me for unlawful detainer.

It was surprising to us on our recent visit to Siquirres to see how much advanced this imposing Structure was under the guidance of our highly efficient Architect & builder Mr. Chas. A. Rhoden of Limon. This gentleman has rushed the work with remarkable skill, especially when it is considered that he has had to rip and dress all the 12x12 and 10x10 and other heavy timbers into smaller dimensions for uprights & stays as well as Gills & Joists; and erecting all the lower structure, he has even ripped the 1x12 turning them into cinker boards for sidings etc., all this has been a very considerable saving to the owners, and Mr. Rhoden should be well.

This building is a two Story Structure of (68x36). The Lodge, ante and Banquet rooms are all upstairs, while down stair is divided into six living rooms for the Bros. and a lib-

rary and recreation hall with a folding partition for enlargement of the room if necessary in case of literary debates.

The plan is a very elaborate one, and does much credit to Mr. Rhoden's skill and ability as an Architect; He has been building several of this kind of construction, reared from old lumber, of these houses being sold out by the Company, and has worked them up with considerable economy to the owners; some of these buildings when finished the lumber is so utilized that very little firewood can be got from the pile of second hand materials, it therefore behoves those who feel like investing in constructions to see Mr. Rhoden as his long experience must result in satisfaction to his clients. The Forester Court at Siquirres will certainly be a credit to him when completed.

Progress of our Banana Contract

This vexed question has been the theme of all arguments on the streets as well as in the homes and it has been under discussion in the Congress Hall by the representatives of the people for ten days now and yet no decision; we have seen no less than nine bulletins and handbills scattered on the Country seven of which are in favour, we are yet unable to find out who is paying for all this propaganda work, whether it is the Banana producers or those who hope to obtain work by the putting thro' of the Contract or who, The Representatives of the U. F. Co. have publicly asserted that they are not in any way interested in any propaganda work, & why should they? anyway the country is seriously aroused over the late of the Concessions as it is placed before Congress.

There are some very forcible arguments by the oppositionists or rather we should say the modificationists, because there is really no one opposed to the rescuscitation of the Banana Industry but many persons are clamouring for modification of certain clauses, which would result in more beneficial opportunities to the producers as well as to the government.

Some deputies are arguing on the facilities gained by the Company by exemption from duties on materials needed and used in the construction and maintenance of Railways, as well as agricultural implements, and accusing the Company of selling in their Commissaries such goods on which they got exemptions. So far as the exemption is concerned, every civilized Country in the world grants exemptions in works of public utility, and as for selling at a profit exempted goods it could never be expected that an influential, powerful company such as the U. F. Co. is, would stoop to such subterfuges. The majority of Custom house clerks and Bookkeepers of the U. F. Co. are Costa Ricans, how then could it be presumed that a Company which is intelligent enough to make a gigantic success of its business could be so stupid as to stoop to collusion in contrabanding (for that it does really amount to) with her Custom house and other dependents; «Murder will out one day» and wherever would the prestige of the Co. be to find herself in a ten million dollar line for contrabanding over a thirty year Concession; how stupid does the allegation appear.

Others contend over the Railway Concessions and the impossibility of competition arriving at the door; but let us ask wherever is the sense of penalizing the Company because she has made a good bargain? Everyone succeeds by paying attention to his business, and if one wants to show patriotism, it is not by hampering the other in his business which is beneficial to the country but to create more business.

Patriotism is not to be exhibited by speeches but by actions. There are the men who are suggesting that the Negroes were invited here, and resided here for thirty or forty years and have made a new generation here must be made to starve so as to give work to the natives, forgetting that most of these negroes are now native born & bred; there are immensely wealthy men here and some of the modificationists (let us call them so) are wealthy, why not do something, so that we may see that there is no real necessity for having a Co. here, let us be independent if we can. The Pirris Farm Co. is an example, that if we are patriotic we could have formulated Syndicates five years ago for developing the Pacific lands, the Colorado and San Carlos lands. Be patriotic and band ourselves together and make the Tortuguero Canal, so we could open up all those lands. Any four Capitalists here can put up a million colonies to put that work thro; and see what benefit it would be to the government and our labourers.

The Banco Nacional de Seguros, loaned a quarter million for street reconstructions; Zonta advanced a million to be repaid by Custom duties; patriotism only counts when we act patriotically why not propose to do something in Agricultural lines if you want to be independent of the Company, but instead, patriotism is called now to place difficulties in the way of the entry of foreign Capital and leaving one section of the Community to starve, while we import all articles of food, Sugar, Rice, beans, Corn, Beef, hides etc. Had our public men who are making such elaborate, statistical accusations now, as to what the Company has gained and what she has presented our represented to the government, had taken time by the forelock, and incited public opinion since the first presentation of the propositions in Don Ricardo's Administration, as to the possibilities by trying to do something for ourselves whether on the Pacific or in the Tortuguero Valley; get a few ships under Contract until you can buy one or two as The Pirris has done, then we would be able to discuss terms now with the Company, but in a poverty stricken condition as is our populace today, it is just so much dangerous waste of time to attempt to impose conditions on a Company who can afford to do without us, therefore the only solution seem to be to take the best that can be obtained and set your populace to work rather than risk a hunger strike which is the most fierce uprising the world can experience and it seem that this is what some of our public men are inviting.

The Directors of the Company cannot be termed Angels, but they realize that the labouring population is suffering, and they have yielded to many points and to press for more is likely to make one flee rebellious; for it must be remembered that the Co. can afford (we wont say to do without Costa Rica because she has too much at stake here and besides she has a tender sport for this country) but surely she can afford to lay passive for another year, and will the modificationists realize what might happen in another year of starvation?

The latest that the Co. has conceded is to hand the government a cheque for 695,636 colones for backward Territorial Taxes in connection with the Holdings of the Ferrocarril Costa Rica & Northern Railway Cos. Which she has been contesting for the past ten years and could continue to contest. We hope therefore that with all these exhibitions of good will towards the prosperity of the Country that the voting will be taken successfully this week.

A National loss

By Cable from Paris the death is announced of Marquis Don Manuel Maria de Peralta, Costa Rican Minister to Europe resident in France, on account of which the country has been declared in Mourning for three days.

Don Manuel born, in Cartago in 1847 hailed from the Noble house of the Marquis of Fales de Peralta and married in Paris The Belgian Countess Juanita de Clérembault, Marquise of Comaunt-Bléron and duchess of Castellara.

The loss to Costa Rican aristocracy and influential diplomatic service can hardly be replaced. He was perhaps the oldest Consular diplomat in the world, having served the diplomatic Corp of his Country for 57 years.

His body will be brought back to Costa Rica.

The Free Seventh-day Adventists, Manager of Limón Service Bureau Says

Dear Sir:

In attention to an article which appeared in your issue of the 26th instant, under the caption "Jane Barrett triumphs in suit against the free seventh-day adventists an ignominious lie", and on account of mention being made of the Limón Service Bureau in an insinuating manner, the Limón Service Bureau is forced to deviate from its policy of strict indifference and passiveness towards the emotions of individuals in their legal disputes wherein we are directing the interest of their adversaries, so as to rectify the misleading accusation brought to the understanding of the public by the author of the article under consideration, Elder J. B. Mosley.

Litigation Brought about to

avenge alleged ill-treatment

At the outset, we must state, without

fear of contradiction, that the difference between plaintiff and defendant doubtlessly grew out of the inclinations of both litigants to avenge alleged ill-treatment; for while the plaintiff, Miss Barrett, sought retaliation by demanding from the free seventh-day adventists the immediate payment of an over-due debt, the Legal Representative, the President, the Leader of the organization, Elder Joseph Benjamin Mosley, ventured to retaliate by denying the responsibility of his association or himself to Miss Barrett for the liability incurred. And we understand that it was on account of those denials why the plaintiff subsequently retained the services of our Legal Department to force the settlement of the obligation, through a judicial action.

Limón Service Bureau Conducted case with due respect to organization but with devoted fidelity to client

Our conduct in the case was one of unusual tolerance and highest consideration, and we would have rather bring

about a settlement of the debt in an amicable manner and to the satisfaction of those concerned, having in mind that we were dealing with a religious organization deserving of the public's respect and for which we do not entertain any sentiment of animosity, but utterly failed.

Both in personal interviews with Elder Mosley and through the medium of written communications addressed to him in his official calling, we endeavored to entreat him to settle the matter extrajudicially. As affirmative evidence of this fact, we are quoting for the public's information the letter of our communication to the Elder which reads as follows: "Limón, December 28, 1929. Elder Joseph B. Mosley, President, Free Seventh-Day Adventist, Limón, C. R.

Dear Elder: I am insisting for the third time that Miss Jane Barrett is entitled to the balance of One hundred colones due her from the Three hundred (C\$ 316.00) and sixteen colones due until December 3, 1929. I am sustaining again that the payment can be obtained through legal process, along with interest, and I am warning you to be rather discrete and to evade any attempt made to foment you into a litigation much to your disadvantage and which would not bring credit to your organization, for honesty and veracity, an safeguarding our good name, hence I reiterate my desire for an amicable and equitable settlement of the matter, by Tuesday December 31. Cordially Yours" (sgd) Aurelio E. Bernudez. In the meantime, our client, Miss Barrett, had been continually writing, instructing us to file judicial action for the was urgently in need of the money, while we response were advising her to be prudent.

The foregoing explanation, if true, as it is, must obliterate from the mind of the impartial public any preconception of the plaintiff, Miss Barrett, as "concocted together with the Limón Service Bureau to throw the deal on the organization", and that notwithstanding the retort of the "charges" "we kept agitating the matter".

Free Seventh-Day Adventist Church was embargoed and organization sued after Miss Barrett was called "Damned negro woman" and threatened to be imprisoned by their attorney-at-law.

It was not until the latter part of March of this year that Miss Barrett acted vehemently that the Free Seventh-Day Adventist Church was to be embargoed and subsequently sued. The determination was reached by our client, after Elder Mosley, a Mr. Thomas Miller, (an officer of the organization) and the organization's Attorney-at-Law called at our offices to clarify certain doubts which, as was natural, brought about a friendly discussion on the subject in issue, and the organization's Attorney, Barrister Daniel Zeledon, finally offered to pay the balance of the debt; the offer was accepted, but due to an established rule of our Bureau, that payments proceeding from judicial actions should be received from the debtor or even the Courts, by the client in person, to safeguard our business reputation, the Attorney was advised that Miss Barrett would call at his office in person and receive the C\$ 100.00 balance, and it was so agreed. "We felt so elated over that seemingly amicable solution of the affair that a memorandum was dispatched to Miss Barrett at once requesting her to come to Limón at the earliest possible opportunity to receive the C\$ 100.00 and she proceeded accordingly; upon her arrival here, she was instructed to call at the organization's Attorney's office for the company of our messenger, and so she did. We were alarmed and surprised a few minutes later, when we learned that Miss Barrett had not paid the C\$ 100.00 but, that instead, she received a "Warm tongue from the Attorney, who in his abuses, called her, among other things, a "damned negro woman" and threatened to have her imprisoned, if she did not abandon his precinct immediately. Those were the two sparks which fell in the oil and cause the blaze.

Regarding the legality of Miss Jane Barrett's action against the Free Seventh-Day Adventists and the liability of the organization, we shall submit our statement and our grounds for sustaining that Miss Jane Barrett did triumph in suit against the Free Seventh-Day Adventists, in your next issue.

Imprisonment for Aimony

James R. Barrett of Matina was arrested and taken to Limón on 20th. ultimo, because he refused the courts order of C\$ 3200 monthly to his wife Alethea Barrett.

Barret claims that he had found his wife unfaithful and for that reason had left her, after giving over to her whatever he possessed, and went to live in another district. He also claims that he discovered that she had married two other husbands who are yet alive; he says in 1913 she married one T. Wil-

son in Panama, later she is said to have married one Felix Archer in Bocas del Toro, and coming on to Costa Rica she married him in 1926; she has informed him that both husbands were dead but in December 1927 he got information that they were both alive when trouble started, and to add insult to injury he found her yet unfaithful to him on January 19th, 1929.

The case for aimony was conducted by solicitor Egbert Brown, but Barret was unrepresented and was dealt with Exparte.
