## CAUSES OF THE WORLD'S HARD TIMES

«WHAT'S WRONG WITH THE WORLD?» by *The Digest*.

Here is a question that has been taxing the brains of economists, financiers, and statesmen all over the world, and which the League of Nations has just set itself to answer. Nobody denies that for months verily the entire world has been passing through an economic slump, although it is cheering to note the recent statement of Mr. Julius Barnes, of the United States Chamber of Commerce, that things are picking up, noticeably in the United States, Great Britain, Italy, the Netherlands, Belgium, Norway, Japan, and Canada.

What brings the topic up sharply just now is the decision of the League of Nations to ask one of its committees to study economic conditions and make recommendations for betterment.

The one word that has been used more than any other by writers trying to explain the world's present business discontents is "overproduction". But of late, authorities have been finding such an explanation inadequate if not incorrect. Some say that instead of overproduction, it is underconsumption or maldistribution. Some blame the war debts, some the towering tariff walls erected since the war, some call our rulers inept or worse. And a number of our most thoughtful students of political economy tell us that fundamentally it is all a matter of misuse of the world's gold supply. A typical banker, the governor of the National Bank of Belgium, blames underconsumption, intensified by the Wall Street boom and collapse; artificial interferences with prices in Canada, the United States and Brazil; overproduction in Australia; political agitation in India and Egypt; and the unsatisfactory internal condition of China and Russia. This the London *Economist*

calls "a typical diagnosis of the orthodox banker".

While many complicated factors have been operating, *The Commercial and Financial Chronicle* (New York) feels confident that "no small part of the difficulty is the disastrous interference of governments with what would otherwise be a normal development of industry and trade, the foolish resort to high tariffs and rigorous immigration restrictions to prevent free and natural competition, and the veritable mania of extravagance and speculation to which all classes have fallen victims".

A protest against the simple explanation, "overproduction", is offered editorially by the *Washington Post*:

"Certain fields of industry, particularly, agriculture, are overcropped, but to say that this country or the world is turning out more useful commodities than it should is absurd.

"Hundreds of comforts could be added to the average home, vast quantities of additional clothing be used, and the number of automobiles in use might be trebled without exceeding the legitimate needs of the people.

"The capacity of people to consume is inexhaustible. The world is not producing too much, but the economic adjustment is such that the people are not able to pay for all that is being produced. What is needed is greater purchasing power. The United States has done more to expand the purchasing power of its people than any other nation. Operation of industry at the modern rate would be impossible in a civilization with a lower living standard.

"If the standards of other peoples should suddenly be raised to the American level, there would be a serious underproduction of goods, and consequently a widespread stimulation of industry.

"European nations have suffered from the current depression far more than the United States because of their shallow domestic markets. A large part of their goods is sent abroad, because the working classes are not paid sufficient to develop extensive domestic demand. In the United States industries produce for the local market and send the surplus abroad.

"American foreign trade is tremendous, but it is only a tiny fraction of the total commerce. A healthy purchasing power makes America the greatest market in the world, regardless of tariffs.

"Attempts to solve the problem of too many goods by curtailment of production is a negative approach. Of course, many adjustments will have to be made, and producers in some fields will have to be shifted to others. But the constructive solution lies in development of the earning,

and, consequently, the purchasing power of the masses'.

But in a sense Europe, like America, is paying a penalty for producing too well, writes Harold Callender from London to the *New York Times*. In a letter summing up the findings of European authorities, this writer says of Europe:

"It is suffering, through unemployment, for its technical skill, for its rapid advance in applied science, for its admirable reorganization of its industries on a "rationalized" basis, for its quick adoption of improved processes and machinery.

"Its recovery has been so rapid, its mines, factories and laboratories have performed so capably that productive capacity has run ahead of purchasing power.

"Consequently, markets are glutted, prices have fallen, and millions of men are out of work."

In Central and Eastern Europe the farmers have been producing more than they can sell at favorable prices, which, of course, reduces the farmer's purchasing power and adds to the industrial depression. Great Britain's difficulties, according to Mr. Callender, are due, not to intensification of production but to loss of markets: "Many of her customers, including her own dominions, which used to take her manufactured goods before the war, have gone in increasingly for industrial production themselves". Several writers on economics are quoted as arguing that we are all suffering from a tendency to overproduction inherent in an expanding and accelerating machine industry. In the words of Mr. J. A. Hobson, "productive power, under the impetus of modern scientific technique or organization, is growing ahead of the expansion of markets".

Attention is called to other economists who find the fundamental cause of the depression in the restriction or concentration of the world's gold supply. And then there are the new tariff walls which are encouraging uneconomic manufacturing in many localities.

The whole trouble, in the opinion of the National City Bank of New York, as expressed in a recent bulletin, is the upsetting of the world's natural industrial equilibrium, which dates back, of course, to the World War.

"The war disturbed established relations by giving an enormous stimulus to production outside of Europe, particularly in staple products, and the low prices resulting since the war in some instances have stimulated efforts to increase production as a means of making up for lower prices, as witness a further increase

of wheat acreage in Australia this year.

"Furthermore, legislation for the protection of home industries and to secure favorable trade balances for the protection of gold reserves has promoted a further increase of production for home markets, this causing a congestion of supplies in open markets, breaking down prices there, and eventually affecting prices even in the protected markets.

"The desire to build up home industries is not new but the efforts for economic independence were stimulated by the war.

"The idea prevails that it is safer to rely upon home production and home markets than trust to advantageous trade. It seems plausible, but carried to its logical conclusion it would mean that every person or family should be an independent unit, supplying all its own wants. That would dispose of all the conflicts and maladjustments arising from industrial organization, and the world has too much sugar, coffee, wheat, textile materials, and other staples, traceable largely to undue stimulation, either by the war or legislation. The goods pile up in the warehouses, prices break, and the producers are unable to buy manufactures because their own incomes are reduced.

"Japan, India, and other countries, in the past large importers of textiles, have become producers on a low cost basis, and are bent not only upon securing "economic independence", but achieving positions in the export field. Moreover, it is impossible to refer to the relations of Asia to the present situation, without considering the abnormal conditions existing in China, India, and throughout the former Russian Empire."

### Position of Dominions in Commonwealth

The position as given out by Mr. J. H. Thomas Minister of the Dominions, at the Imperial Conference now in Session is quite clear and decisive, as to the question, of the position taken up by Mr. James Hertzog Premier of South Africa, demanding a ruling as to the recognition by the Conference of the rights of the dominions succeeding from the British Empire, should they feel inclined.

Mr. Thomas said, "No one questions that right." You

cannot prevent a man from shooting himself if he wants to; you can only advise him that it is an unwise thing for him to do. Although it was generally taken for granted that recognition of the absolute equality of all the dominions implied the right to secede, as per the Imperial Conference of 1926, yet Mr. Thomas' reply, is the first actual admission of that right, since the question has been instituted by Premier Hertzog of South Africa.

# The Expulsion of a Millionaire Newspaper Robbery on Tourist Ship

### French "Revenge" on Hearst

FRANCE SPRINGS AN INTERNATIONAL sensation by expelling William R. Hearst, American newspaper chain publisher, because of his alleged "hostile attitude".

Every nation has the right to deny entry to "foreigners who are regarded as undesir-

able", enterprising reporters learn from our State Department.

But "France did a bad day's work for itself and for international journalism", declares the New York *Telegram*, of the Scripps-Howard chain. For "the tradition and pride of American journalism is that the press shall be free to criticize any Government, foreign and domestic", while the French Government "has none too good a reputation in its handling of the foreign press."

"Few more idiotic actions have been perpetrated by a civilized and presumably intelligent government!", jibes the London *Daily News-Chronicle*: "The spectacle of a great nation avenging upon an individual real or fancied wrongs is odious when the revenge is effective. When, as in this case, the victim is none the worse, and is advertised to the world as a man so powerful that a foreign Government dares not harbour him within its territory, it is silly."

On arrival in Paris from the Italian Lakes, Mr. Hearst received official notice of his expulsion from French territory, publicly announced thus:

"This measure, taken upon the order of the President of the Council and Minister of the interior, has as its origin the rôle played by Hearst in the obtaining and publication of a secret document relative to the Franco-English naval negotiations."

The Sûreté Générale (secret service) office further explained:

"Mr. Hearst is a Francophile, and we prefer that he should do his criticizing outside the country. The Horan affair was only one of the

reasons why he was asked to leave."

For his exposé of the alleged "secret naval accord" in 1928, Harold J. T. Horan, representative of the Hearst Universal News Service, was expelled from France last year.

In London, on the way to his castle in Wales, Mr. Hearst gave a bristling statement to the press, asserting that the French Government was right in attacking him, but wrong in acting against Horan, who was only his agent in the publication of the "secret Anglo-French treaty" which "upset some international 'apple-carts', but informed the American people." He also reiterated probable French irritants in the Hearst opposition to United States entrance into the League of Nations or other "European protective pacts", and Hearst intimations that France, "now the richest nation in the world, might use some of her German indemnity to pay her honest debts to America." Mr. Hearst retorts:

"If being a competent journalist and a loyal American can make a man 'persona non grata' in France, I think I can endure the situation without loss of sleep."

Paris papers score Mr. Hearst in approving expulsion. The *Echo de Paris* recalls the Hearst campaign for American neutrality *Figaro* declares:

"If all Hearst's gestures of the past were insufficient to explain his expulsion, the impudence of his London declarations justifies it."



# Man's Dirty Clothes

HE SENDS HIS UNDER-CLOTHING to the wash, but he buys coat and trousers of dark cloth so that they won't show the dirt.

Dirt, however, is just as bad when you don't see it.

Man's habits need cleaning up, says *Good Health* (Battle Creek, Mich.) We read:

Personal cleanliness is for human beings a very recent acquisition. Most lower animals keep themselves clean. Note how meticulously tidy is the house cat.

The cave man reveled in dirt, and so did every

European in the Middle Ages. The leather breeches and unshorn sheepskin shirts worn alike by peasants, proprietors, and high-church officials, were never washed. The Russian peasant still goes into winter quarters in November, and never thinks of bathing until he comes out in the spring. In some parts of Spain, two baths suffice for a lifetime, one by the midwife, the other by the undertaker.

The Finnish mother sews her children up in the fall, and provides for a change of clothes in the spring. A doctor once found such a sewed-in child suffering from smallpox in a New

York tenement. The mother refused to have the clothing removed because she knew the health officer would destroy it.

But we are beginning to cultivate more cleanly habits.

The wearing of under-clothing, which may be frequently changed, protects our outer clothing from soiling with body wastes; but our outer garments, especially those of men, store up accumulations of germs and dirt from a great variety of sources. The dark colors conceal the dirt, which brushing and even the dry cleaners do not remove.

Women wear lighter colors and washable fabrics and change often, and so their garments are cleaner. Women wear much less clothing than men, and so suffer much less from overheating, especially in warm weather, a common cause of summer colds and sinusitis. Of course, the cold does not come directly from the overheating. A cold, a sinusitis, is an acute infection. The germs are already on the spot, but asleep, so to speak. Overheating and after-chilling lower the resistance and awaken the germs to activity.

The heavy dark clothing worn by men is most uncleanly and unhygienic. The universal excuse for dark colors is that light

colors show dirt. That is a good reason for choosing light colors. The dirt is there when it does not show. Dark shades are a camouflage for not only dirt but germs and disease.

Dark and heavy clothing not only accumulates dirt and germs but excludes from the skin the beneficent solar rays, the greatest of all disinfectant and vitalizing agents. Thin, or loosely woven, white fabrics permit the sun's rays to reach the surface of the body.

A men's dress reform movement is need. Who will start it? White garments for both winter and summer. Porous fabrics that will permit contact of light and air with the body surface and allow emanations from the skin to escape and perspiration to dry quickly, and less clothing to burden the body and cause overheating and after-chilling.

The modern woman has shocked our sensibilities by casting off nearly all her nether garments, but appears to have gained something of the same hardness enjoyed by the barelegged Highlanders of Scotland and the mountaineers of Greece.

Will the women allow their husbands and brothers to dress as scantily as they do themselves? From a health standpoint it seems that the less clothes we wear the better for our health.

## Spreading The Germ American Race Prejudice Slapped

Moscow, Aug. 14—American race prejudice got a cool reception today when a prominent Moscow editor under the headline running all the way across the page, said «We Will Not Allow the Ways of Bourgeois America in the U. S. R. (the Soviet Union). The news story which followed resented in no mean terms the action of 300 American engineers and mechanics employed in a tractor plan who beat up a Negro and threw him out of the common mess hall for the reason that he is a Negro.

The correspondent says the assault on the Negro was strongly disapproved by the tractor workers, who held a mass meeting and adopted a resolution «to remind those of

our comrades who do not understand that the U. S. S. R. is the fatherland of all workers, including Negroes.»

The resolution calls on the Americans to «condemn severely this savage, anti-worker and barbarous misdeed of a group of backward American workers of the Soviet bent in their pitiless struggle against the exploitative and barbarous remnants of capitalism.» The resolution concludes:

«We will not allow the ways of bourgeois America in the U. S. S. R. The Negro worker is our brother like the American worker. We castigate any who dares to destroy in the Soviet land the equality we have established for all proletarians of all shades of colour.

Among the suspended employees are all the revisors on the trains who have been let out; the Conductors are again put on the service of Ticket collections as formerly. We are sorry to see included, our friend Mr. Bell Yrmdaster of Squires who goes back as Conductor.

It is understood that more reductions are yet to be carried out, not only in cessation of their offices, but a reduction in Salaries will also be made; but since the retrenchments carry increase of work to the retained workers, it is difficult to see how Salaries can be reasonably cut.

This is a heavy blow to

us but in consequence of world depression it is hardly to be surprised at, when it is considered that the Co. has many millions of pound of Cacao in the her warehouses, for which no markets can be found, retrenchments are inevitable.

Due to the World depression going, there are over sixty Banks that have been forced to close their doors in the United States, the suffering among the depositors etc can well be imagined. According to the statements of Mr. Stein a representative of the Company and other informations obtained, it appears as if the Company will not do much planting in the next year, due to the difficult world situation, and coupled with the congested state of the banana market, very little it seems will be done in the coming year.

# Religion an "Unfit Subject" in China

CHINA IS AGAIN AT WAR with Christianity.

The Nationalist Government, controlling most of China, has issued an order banning the teaching of religion in mission schools below the rank of junior college, the order being the reply of the Chinese authorities to the petition from Christian churches asking for a repeal of previously announced restrictions.

Moling Tsiang, the Minister of Education, says *The Christian Century* (Underdenominational) makes four principal points in upholding the Governments' policy:

In the first place, he objects to the teaching of Christianity without teaching, at the same time, the tenets of other faiths.

Second, he holds that unless children are protected from the approaches of religion in youth, they will not be free to make ration-

al religious choices when maturity is reached.

Third, he declares that if, as they say, the churches are not conducting their schools as a means of gaining church members, they will not be deeply affected by the elimination of religion from the curriculum.

Fourth, he considers religion an unfit subject for inclusion in a modern scientific education.

The decision is announced as final and not subject to review.

The Anglican Bishop in the province of Honan is reported already to have ordered all schools of that communion closed, and has even ordered some of them torn down. This move, it is said, is to prevent the Government from taking them over for public-school purposes.

It is well calculated to arouse intense resentment on the part of many Chinese.

## Causes of the...

Brought from page 1

The nations of the world, as J. C. Royle puts it in a Consolidated Press dispatch from Washington, are following the procedure of the smoker who "rolls his ovvn". In other words, "they are using every effort to cut down each manufacturing process which may yield a profit to others or increase the price to themselves". Each nation is trying to produce as much as possible of its ovvn foodstuffs, to manufacture its ovvn clothes, to refine its ovvn petroleum, to buy wheat instead of flour, This, of course, has an upsetting effect on the world market.

Another upsetting factor is noted in a Swiss banking publication, quoted by the London Economist. This is the vvide shifting of consumer demand from staple articles to products of a more luxurious and varied character. This, explains The Economist, "has three important consequences".

"In the first place, it renders a large part of the equipment of certain industries permanently superfluous, and requires a change-over from the production of coarser to finer grades of food, textiles, and other articles of universal consumption; secondly, it reduces the scope for mass production with its attendant economies;

and lastly, as demand for luxury goods is more fickle than that for staple articles of food and clothing, it means not merely an immense initial adaptation of industry to new conditions, but a permanent state of comparative instability in which similar acts of adaptation over smaller areas of production at a time vwill constantly be required.

"As this change in the general character of demand is consequent upon the leveling up of the standard of living and the increase of leisure, which have been going on steadily since the war, and vwill, it is to be hoped, continue, this increased instability of industry must be accepted as a new element in world economics vvhich has come to stay.

"Concurrently vwith this development has come the industrialization of backward countries, so that markets vvhich might have taken the coarser products of the textile industries in the older countries, vvhich the home demand shifted to finer products and to silk and rayon, have instead been supplied to a large extent from their ovvn newly established factories, and the world productive capacity has become redundant".
