From the pen of an optimist Notice to our Patrons

The year 1931 seems to have opened up with a certain amount of optimism among our people in Limon, and there is no doubt that there seems to be the desire of an entire awakening among the various Associations and Organizations.

We find the U. N. I. A. of Limon making a strong effort and determination to eliminate the rebellious and querulous characters from the Division, and we find those in charge joining in an open display of Benevolence and Unity, by scattering cheer and kindness among the poorer ones of the race. We do hope that this effective demonstration started out the first day of the year will lead to further beneficent activities that this

organization will carry on. It allowed us as spectators to feel hopeful as we witnessed to interrelation on New Year's day of members of the U. N. I. A. and leaders of others fraternities and religious bodies joined in a common good.

But it was not the U. N. I. A. alone that contributed to the cheering of the hearts of the poor during the holiday season, the Wesleyan Society also, but under a more reserved manner distributed gifts to their poor ones. This being the case there is reason for us to feel hopeful that other organizations will endeavour also to lighten the burden of so many of our fellow creatures as is our real duty, for we should not only think of

the temporary comfort afforded the more unfortunate ones, but the great satisfaction that one feels in having the opportunity of being even for once unselfish.

In continuation of the activities of our various organizations we must mention the great revival that took place in the hall of the Costa Rica Burial Scheme Association on the night of the 5th of January when Mr. H. E. Sinclair was installed as President. This Ass'n is a local creation of Mr. H. Laidley based upon similar ones in Jamaica. At its opening the membership rose to nearly 1000 but on account of the inconsistency its members which regretful to say is generally the case, the fever of the movement abated and the membership dropped, much to his regret and unquietness.

Nevertheless, ardent in his desire to keep its flag flying, he raised a strong campaign for new members, confident that he would bring about a revival of his organization. The members were glad to have new faces and voices among them, the result is that they elected Mr. Sinclair to the Presidency and Mr. Bond from his position as doorkeeper to the First Vice-presidency, these changes brought so much satisfaction to the members that the installation was made a public affair when many friends were invited and an enjoyable evening sandwiched with speeches, ice-cream and cakes took place.

But we still have the prove our introductory statement by saying that there was also a revival in the Limon Friendly & Literary Ass'n, when the more conservative members gave room for choosing as officers for the 1931 term, from among some of the more virile and sportive, resulting in the election of Mr. Charles Hayling as President and Mr. Bourette as Secretary.

These men are young, liberal minded, and filled with the spirit of the day, much then in expected of them in revolutionizing in a progressive manner.

Then we see that the Dhanians unveiled two Charters on one day, besides, nearly in every one of the other societies and organizations some spectacular event has taken place. We do see that all these organizations have a great aim before them in the new year and that there is a decided effort in spreading intellectual improvement among their membership; for there is no doubt that all of them although not lacking their insidious internal troubles, are a great means of contributing to the moral bearings of our people. If in this New year every member should resolve and make a determination to mend some of his shortcomings and to live strictly in conformity with the teachings of his individual Society or Association, how much would not the social condition of Limon be improved. It is a fact, but we must rehearse it for the benefit of our own selves, that the people who indulge in the most obscene and vulgar language on the streets, are our people, the greatest amount of vagrants on the streets are the boys of our own race, the continual reports of lude and rude conduct are people of our race. The lawyers and judges are made rich from the pockets of our own people, something should be done to eradicate this bad impression. These things reflect on the best of us. Nine tenths of us are connected with some Ass'n of moral teachings or some religious body, we must then cooperate either in a direct or in an indirect manner to raise the morale of our people.

We must face things as they are and instead of hiding from the truth we must endeavour to prepare ourselves for the new evolutions that has started from 1930. The world is making rapid changes. Old beliefs of superiority has a job keeping in its legs, it is only for us to see it, then having been prepared we can take the opportunities that are going to open themselves to us. We must start by inserting in the resolution of our organizations in this New Year, a determined effort to survive, and to prepare ourselves morally to take our right place. Don't be discouraged, if you lose your jobs get a doing something else, think of jobs as secondary, and always prepare yourselves for something else. Be determined to exist and we must exist. But we must be unselfish in these determinations so that those who are officers as well as

If they are to be renewed it is said that prices shall be thirty cents. Ofcourse if you watch the Concessions, the Company is not obligated for more than 3000 Hectareas of their own planting and to facilitate another 3000 in the

hands of private farmers at 60 cents. And beyond that amount naturally they are liable to take advantage of the situation. Small Settlers should beware therefore of the length of time of your Contracts, in making investments for improvements, so that there is no slumping of your fruit; deal intimately and confidentially with their officials before spending your reserve funds. LONDON.—In the House of Commons to-day Sir Gratian Doyle urged an immediate enquiry into the circumstances in which it was possible to a white citizen of the British Empire to be tried within the Empire before mixed juries of white and coloured people, with a view to putting an end to this practice.

Narrow minded people especially those who have done very little travelling have come to all kinds of ridiculous opinions of Nicaragua, in so much that a majority of them have concluded that this is a land of savages; forgetting that all peoples and every country have their shortcomings. Of course the writer

does not intend to erase these opinions or prejudices as he realizes that they have been brought about from the aggressive attitude that the unfortunate labourers of the country have had to take in their travels in other countries, so as to enable them to earn a livelihood. On the other hand the so many revolutions which

the country has been famous of may in a way allow us, to vink at the very narrow view; but if there are impartial minded people, they would readily come to the conclusion that Nicaragua is not singular in their internal disorders, as big countries like Peru, Argentina, prosperous like Panamá and Cuba, peaceful ones like Costa Rica, not to mention those of the old world are having right now their upheavals, while Nicaragua is working as hard as she can; building roads, macadamizing the streets of her principals cities, beautifying her Capital, reforming her laws and developing her well known agricultural resources.

other republics jointly. Her trade and commerce is free from monopolies.

The Eastern Coast of Nicaragua measures 325 miles long from Cape Gracias to Grey Town, and the Western Coast line is 200 miles long from the Bay of Fonseca to Salinas Bay. Numerous large navigable rivers, are on the Eastern side, the most important being the Segovia, Rio Grande, Escondido and the San Juan. There are two big lakes: Managua and Granada; the latter is the largest lake south of the great lakes in the U. S. Natural extensive grazing lands create her possibility to supply all of her sister republics and other foreign countries with cattle. Gold and silver mines in her central districts. Mahogany, cedar, pine and other woods abound in her forests. So that for a country of so great resources it is necessary that its people should have a temperament adequate to its development and for its protection.

We are not regarding at this moment the important and prominent position in world finance and politics that Nicaragua will be called upon to take in case the U. S. of North America should decide to build the great waterway through her territory; but we wish to detail a few of her great possessions.

A temperament consisting of an equal amount of frankness, boldness, fearlessness, zealousness, intelligent determination, hospitality and above all laboriousness.

Of the five republics of Central America her lands are the most fertile, her commercial possibilities alone are equal to those of the four

It will be remembered that Mr. Richard Rogers served for many years in the Customs Commission house of Felipe J. Alvarado y Cia in Limon and later with Aragon and Co. Afterwards opening up his own Commission business in Limon, prior to being

engaged by Don Cleto Gonzalez on the recommendation of don Alberto Aragon and sent to Puntarenas, where he is now employed under don Rafael Beeche who is Supt of Importation and Exportation for the Government; who it will be remembered was also Chief Clerk of the Shipping Dept of the U. F. Co. in Limon some years ago, similar to the job now held by Mr. T. C. Tarry.

Activities of the U. F. Co.

At last the proposals for planting 1500 Hectareas of bananas on the Atlantic Division by the U. F. Company or rather the Banana Company of Costa Rica has been started in the vicinity of Guacimo.

A heavy Tramway is to be run from the fifth mile post of the old Rio Frio Railway running North through Costa Rica or Walkyria Farm near the Rio Santa Clara through the lands formerly occupied by Messrs Sassa Pirie y Fischel towards the Astua Pirie contract reservation lands of the Tortuguero valley.

Ties cutting has been started as well as Underbrushing etc. but the prices for these works are so distressingly low that the Contractors are having trouble in getting men to work. Tramway ties which were formerly cut at five cents gold are being paid for now at three cents, and it is understood that the prices for underbrushing, lining, planting and felling are being offered now at twenty dollars per hectarea; extremely low indeed, but anything is better than nothing, this will prevent us from eating one another.


All works except actual reaping has been stopped on the old farms for three months, and it is understood that so soon as the coffee Crop is completed a further retrenchment will be made in the Commissary and Audit Departments, so as to bring expenses down to a minimum.

Some of us are blaming the Company for all this stringency, but with the present conditions of the world's markets, it is only reasonable to expect that any well organized business must re-

duce expenditures to its minimum, so as to avoid collapse. At present the value of the Shares of the Company have fallen to such a ridiculous valuation that it behoves the Directors to do everything possible to equalize expenditure to income. With Stock fallen to 57 what can we do but sympathize in the movements we see around us.

We have been continually through these columns advocating and advising our people to economize in every line, hence in view of recent happenings it is our duty to again call on our people to adopt rigid economy in our homes so as to meet contingencies. The ladies are those to whom we must now appeal, to cut out everything that has a look of luxury. Cut the old expensive dresses instead of wearing them to market to buy your chickens etc. Eat economically, cut out entertainings, where one room will do, why rent two and three, of course we know we are up against harsh criticism and even abuse for our advices in this line by a certain element of sports, but this is not the class to whom we are appealing we allude to those ladies who in a sober reasonable way will like to help their men folk to live as happy as they can under the existing circumstances which has overtaken not only us but the World; and you men who have to face the cost of homelife, insist that every frivolity be cut out, and if those around you will not be advised, cut them out too, let nothing stand in your way of equalizing your income to your expenditures.

Collision of Trains

A serious collision between two electrically driven trains occurred on the Government Pacific Railway at 11.15 A. m. Wednesday 14th between the Stations of Concepcion and Hacienda Vieja. Conductor Victor Manuel Cabrera and Engineer Nestor Ramirez handling a work train with Engine 4 ran into The Local train on its way to San Jose, under Conductor Guillermo Vargas and Engineer Daniel Montero with Engine 7. One Engine No 7 was completely destroyed beyond repairs, the other very badly damaged, as a result there was one death and fifteen wounded some seriously.

There were four carloads of Gasoline in the local which caught afire by the Contact of the Electric overhead wire and exploded, destroying completely the Cars and the roadway. The loss to the government is estimated at about a million colones.

The work train under Conductor Cabrera who is seriously wounded and Engineer Ramirez overran their orders and vvas going rapidly to clear the local at the nearby station vwhen the collision occurred A labourer named Sanchez vwho vvas travelling on a vwork Car laden vwith rock got killed by the dumping of this Car, vvhich comp-
