# The future King of England feasts the President of Peru

## ON TUBERCULOSIS

This avful Scourge among mankind as vvell as the lower animals has been experimented on by scientific men of all ages vvith a vievw of stamping out the dread disease but until now practically vvithout results.

We vvere surprised to read in the Gleaner the report of the Chief Officer of the Mental Hospital in Jamaica of a fortnight ago, in vvhich he said before a Commission that ninety percent of the patients being admitted to that institution vvere afflicted vvith Tuberculosis. We now find that a nevvlly graduated Medico Dr. Golding is returning to his college for further studies in Tuberculosis, but of vvhat avail may be ask is this time apparently vvasted.

Tuberculosis has been acknowledged uncurable, except science vvill arrest and destroy the germs of tuberculosis. Science has taught us that the disease is disseminated more readily by germs flying about in the air rendered easy by the sputum of diseased persons getting dried and carried about in the dust along the streets; carried about by contact from flies on our food etc., hence until the scientific men vvill discover something vvhich vvill destroy those germs, it seem loss of time studying medicines that vvill only alleviate for the moment, but spreading itself all time. Several experiments have been made to find something that vvill destroy the germs that propagate this avful malady, but until novv there is only one that seem to stand the test, that is, The Friedmann's Vaccine, much has been said of the Calmette Vaccine but that has been found to be more damaging than curative; vvhile vve have seen nothing but praises utter-

ed vvith regards to the Friedmann's, it is only a pity that the governments of the vvorld vvill not give it vvider recognition than they do.

The vvealth of all countries is not alone calculated by the ac-

cumulation and storage of the cents and dollars in its banking institutions, but also by the efficiency of its population to enhance such accumulation, therefore it seem a criminal negligence on the authorities of any government to ignore any specific that is alleged to eradicate such a an infectious disease as Tuberculosis.

It is a very strange thing to find that the civilized nations of the vvorld have decreed that infectious diseases should be "notifiable" under the lavvs and denounced by any citizen cognizant of a case and yet Tuberculosis such a virulently contagious disease vvhich vvill destroy fami-

## Britain's Fruit Industry and her Importations

In consequence of heavy importations particularly from Russia, the fruit industry of Britain has been placed in a tight corner, as the prices had fallen to such a low stage that many growers could not harvest their Crops due to the dumping of foreign fruit. An idea will be got when it is observed from figures of the Norfolk Fruit Grower's Association that in 1929, marketings of 288 Tons realized £15,155 whereas in 1930 a tonnage of 582 of similar fruit only realized £15,530 this the Secretary Mr. J. J. F. Draper said is due to the weakness of the country's marketing Bill, classified as Free Trade, he said he refused to believe that this country will forever go on buying what they do not need; all he is hoping for is that British Markets will be secured to British growers. Referring to the McDonald government he said, a government with the courage of a Waterhen, the spine of a jelly fish and the vision of a crosseyed mule in a London fog, cannot last. He showed how the prices have fallen since 1926 the average price of all fruits was £72 per ton, in 1929 it was £57, in 1928, £52.10; in 1929, £34 and last year it fell to £27 per ton.

last year was £36,399,892 including Tomatoes of which Oranges headed the list. With Apples coming second, and Bananas third.

The total as to quantity was 24,662,935 cwt. and 14,984,537 bunches of bananas. Empire sources are well represented in the totals.

Leading in quantity were 10,618,452 cwt. of oranges, 6,124,233 cwt. of apples, 1,438,719 cwt. of lemons, 953,372 cwt. of pears, 690,818 cwt. of grapes, and 525,454 cwt. of grape fruit.

In values oranges also headed the list with £9,572,182 followed by apples, £7,469,050; bananas, £5,682,631; grapes, £1,836,901; pears £1,612,972 lemons, £1,390,107; grape fruit £864,813; plums, £797,664; and apricots and peaches, £522,502. The value of tomatoes was £4,521,369.

ly after family, is not included in the list of «Notifiable diseases» under the law, so far as we are informed Japan is the only long visioned country which has designated this disease as Notifiable; certainly a long way in advance of Western Culture. # Sobre el proyectado Frente Unico

# Continuation of the Pan American Illusion

We know the very minutest details concerning captive or murdered Americans in Mexico, and we are accustomed to read that the government of that country is incapable of establishing order at home. There are 14,000,000 peons in Mexico—poor, illiterate Indians with scarcely any conception of citizenship or patriotism; they constitute an outstanding problem in that country. Lawlessness from this as yet amorphous element must be expected for a long time to come, though crime in the best organized cities of the United States is far worse. Neither country, however, can guarantee the lives of aliens beyond its ability to do so.

Every form of propaganda, including books, moving pictures, the stage, pamphlets and cartoons, has been used by prejudiced authors and travelers to belittle Hispanic-America. Travelogues depicting the traits of a hybrid and degraded humanity in some of the Southern republics are even now in circulation. More intelligent writers have, of course, also visited Hispanic-America, but none has realized that in countries where Indians are most numerous, as in Mexico, Peru and Bolivia, the real citizen, the one with whom the United States must deal, keeps himself secluded. Hence the misleading impressions and reports of illiteracy, laziness, uncleanness and of a kind of patriarchal existence. Prone to emphasize the picturesque aspect of the country, the unwary writer does not consider that there must be more representative people as he walks along up-to-date avenues, past attractive and even palatial homes.

The United States must realize that Hispanic-America's culture is equal to its own. As early as 1800 Central and South America produced great humanists and thinkers who are universally known today. Not a few of the world's greatest contributors to modern journalism are Latin Americans. Their literary and scientific publications run into the hundreds. In commercial enterprise itself they are beginning to rival the giant industrialists of North America. Simon I. Patino, the Bolivian multi-millionaire, is a self-made man, and one of the outstanding figures in the world's mining industries. From the other republics have sprung scores of millionaires, most of them what we would term 100 per cent. Latin Americans, that is, descendants of old Spanish colonists. Originally a mere handful, submerged by millions of ignorant natives, they have solved problems with which the United States never had to contend. Now they are steadfastly striving to attain the highest form of republicanism, already within the grasp of Uruguay, and

can point with pride not only in that highly cultured little country but also to Buenos Aires, Santiago de Chile, Rio de Janeiro Ciudad de Mejico, Lima and other great cities, some much larger than Madrid or Rome. The press of the United States should foster honest opinion in its intercourse with them, denounce mercenary politics and mudslinging writers, suppress mischievous Hollywood motion-picture propaganda, discard old prejudices and study Hispanic-America conscientiously and scientifically. With the tremendous power it wields, the press could achieve in a short time what diplomacy and well-meaning governments have failed to accomplish. It could succeed where idealists, economists, scholars, Admirals and great patriots have failed. Its duty is to promote good-will and to avert friction.

A natural outcome of the policy of the Big Stick has been shirt-sleeve diplomacy. Washington has often been lax in the appointment of political self-seekers to responsible positions in its foreign service. This has only lent color to the false impression prevailing in many countries of an uncouth, illtempered Uncle Sam. Great care has been exercised lately to avoid the repetition of past errors, but it is well to stress the point and to remember that every consideration should be made for Latin sensitiveness. Pedantic boasting of the progress at home with odious comparisons of the conditions of the countries they visit should be avoided when traveling in Latin America. Its nationals are appreciative of constructive criticism, but they always resent intolerance and deprecation.

Another chief obstacle to Pan-Americanism is armed intervention. First taking the part of a few adventurers, the United States bombarded the Falkland Islands in 1831, when they were in possession of Argentina. Later, after the British took the islands in spite of the Monroe Doctrine, the United States refused to pay for damages on the ground that their ownership had until then been in dispute. President Buchanan exalted Walker's filibuster expedition to Central America. In 1854 the city of San Juan was burned by American forces. After other hostile incidents in Panama and Paraguay, the Caribbean once more witnessed displays of armed force by the United States. Hispanic-America does not forget how in 1928 marines were embarking for Nicaragua to crush Sandino and his followers, while envoys of the United States were presiding over the Pan-American Congress at Havana. Only the tact of Charles Evans Hughes and the good-

will of the tried Latin-American delegates saved the conference from ending in disorder.

Nicaragua, with its route for another interoceanic canal, is today the measure of capitalistic imperialism in the United States. America's policy there accords with no fixed principle or established doctrine, but is a policy of intimidation. What other purpose could military occupation have?

The whole idea of Pan-Americanism needs revision, for its destiny rests in the hands of the United States, which must prepare to open wide the door to true fellowship. If it allows the present uncertainty to prevail after the next conference in Montevideo in 1932, then Argentina, Chile and Brazil will drop out of the Pan-American Union, and it will mean not only the end of that institution but development of the trend toward Europe, whose Latin countries have awakened to the fact that Central and South America can help them

to defeat all adverse coalitions. Led by Ortega y Gasset in Spain, Henry de Jouvenel and Maurice de Waleffe in France, scores of intellectuals in Fascist Italy, the movement is advancing steadily. Hispanic-America welcomes it, and if kept longer in doubt as to the intentions of Uncle Sam, will combine with Latin Europe. This will be all the more serious if one considers that the United States now occupies an unpopular position in the world. It has become the creditor of rival nations and is the first former colonial country that has robbed Europe of its supremacy, a dangerous position to occupy. Washington must quickly remove this nevvel and most dangerous of eventualities by radically changing its policy of evading the realities on the whole question of Pan-Americanism. It must work out a program that will make the American Commonwealth stand united on all issues.

## News of The British Navy

Not only has the North Atlantic Fleet of the World's most powerful Navy been carrying out their regular spring exercises since January 8th but, they are also exploring the deep seas regions around the West Indies and The Gulf of Mexico. The H. M. S. Rodney has been detailed to make important Scientific Explorations in these Waters, aided by Capt. Totton of The Natural History section of the British Museum and his laboratory assistants and a large assortment of scientific instruments.

The object of this exploration is to study the Flora and Fauna of the deep seas around the west Indies and the Gulf of Mexico and adjacent Waters which have never been thoroughly explored, and which is believed to have many forms of Marine life which has never been properly classified. According to the reports of the well known explorer Mr. Mitchell Hedges it is thought that there exists marine animals of colossal size similar to those reported in the Paleozoic age which never come to surface, and that marine vegetation in this portion of the Atlantic is of an enormous growth.

The assemblage of this

huge fleet under command of admiral Sir Michael Hodges consists of over forty ships of war, and will beout on their manoeuvres until the 1st April.

Among these will be, such ships as The Renown, The Tiger, the Rodney, the Malaya the Nelson the warship, the Valiant, the Repulse, the users Dorsetshire and Norfolk. As well as the mine layer Adventure with several Submarines and destroyers, and aeroplane Carrier Courageous.

On March 4th these great vessels will leave West Indian waters and join the balance of the Atlantic Squadron proceeding to Gibraltar and will engage in Warfare the Mediterranean Fleet under admiral Sir Ernie Chatfield in the open Atlantic about the 18th March, after which they will proceed back to Chatham and Portsmouth for the usual Easter holidays.

The vessels to visit the West Indian Ports during February will be the Nelson, the Rodney, the Hawkins, the York, the Dorsetshire, the Norfolk and the mine layer Adventure. One of these vessels will also visit Limon and engage the Cricket and Football teams of the Port.

All during the past week the unemployed element have been parading the streets of San José, and demanding work of the government, their chief points of assemblage being the office of the Newspaper «La Tribuna» and the Congress Palace, vvhere steps are being taken to vote the necessary sums of money to carry out Public vvorks of different natures such as the completion of the Roadvvay from Cartago to San José, building of several government buildings in San José and Puntarenas, the repairs of the Dam at Tacaes by which the Electric Power is obtained to run the Electric Railway to Puntarenas, vvwhich has recently been found to be of very defective construction, by the Contractors and has indeed fallen in. While the money for all these vvorks are being voted, some of the

leaders hovvever have been very impationate and indiscreet, by making some violent speeches against the government and even issuing ultimatum as to vvhat steps they vvill take into their hands if quick measures are not adopted, vvith the consequence that some of these men have been arrested and come givan ninety days imprisonment.

There are also 18 persons of foreign nationalities who are being vvatched vvith a view of their deportation from this country as being promoters of unrest among our people, some of these have been chased avway from the neighbouring Republics for similar causes, and are practising the same irregularities against public Order, the Executive Council is considering vvhat shall be done vvith such citizens.
