# The visit of The Royal Guests Great Injustice to the settlers at Guacimo

The Prince of Wales and his Brother the Prince George travelling on the S. S. Oropesa One of the great Pacific Liners of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. a boat of over 14000 tons, as the Earl of Chester, has arrived in Jamaica amid a reception befitting the heir to the Throne of the mighties. Pover on earth, and gone on the diplomatic mission for which he started out.

His mission is one for the purpose of encouraging closer friendship and trade with the South American Republics. He will travel through Peru, Bolivia, Chile, Argentine and Brazil, and finally will open up an immense British Empire Trade Exhibition in the Argentine Republic at Buenos Aires on the 14th march. Just imagine the significance of friendship, by a British Empire Trade Exhibition in a foreign country; but well might it be, when it is considered that Argentine is preeminently the country of British enterprise. More than half of all the foreign capital in the country is British, nearly £500,000,000 of British money is invested in Argentine. The Exports of wheat and meat from this country to Britain amounts to £80,000,000 per annum, but the imports from the British Isles are only £30,000,000 hence it is to increase the sale of British goods that this Trade Exhibition is being held in March and to be opened up by England's future King, that is the true reason of all this noise.

Brazil also with her £300,000,000 of British capital invested there also does not buy a half as much as she should. All these countries of South America are closely wound up with the manipulations of British Capital. He left Peru for Bolivia and will land in Santiago de Chile today from thence he will cross the Andes again

and go back to Bolivia which is a land locked country that sends 80 per cent of her Exports to Britain, while she does not take in exchange more than 20 per cent of her importations, the Prince is there to see why?

He will, after crossing the Andes mountains three times, Sailing on Lake Titicaca, a lake of 5,500 square miles of water at an elevation of 12,000 feet about sea level, visiting La Paz the Capital of Bolivia, playing golf there on the highest golf links in the world he will get into Argentine early in march and after opening up the Exhibition he will go at the invitation of the Brazilian government to Rio Janeiro the only harbour in the world that is worth seeing, "according to an eminent Brazilian. After seeing all through the pampas of Argentine and Brazil," they will resort to the fashionable seaside resorts of Argentine at Mar del Plata which is only a short run to Buenos Aires and considered the Brighton Beach of the Argentine. After all this revelling, in a consciousness of duty well done, they will arrive home about the end of April.

It might be wondered why should the Princes be sent out as Trade Ambassadors for the Empire, but is it any wonder when it is considered that Argentina ranks among the five greatest Agriculturing countries of the world, Buenos Aires with her two millions of inhabitants being the largest City of the world South of the latitude of Philadelphia, this country boasting as it does of having the world's richest per Capita population being calculated at a rate of \$900 per head, of 11,000,000 people, with an export trade of a thousand millions or the American billion dollars, owning more automobiles in in

proportion to population than any other country in the world except the United States and the British Empire; 60 per cent of all the automobiles to be found in the continent of South America are to be found in Argentine. It owns also 40 per cent of all the Railway lines in the continent, which roads carry 60 per cent of the passenger traffic of the continent. Its normal wheat and corn crops are each about three hundred million bushels of which the vast majority goes to Britain, the linseed crop averages about one hundred million bushels per annum. It ranks fourth in the world as a Cattle rearing country and third in sheep rearing, most of which are sent to Great Britain in great refrigerating Vessels. Buenos Aires is considered the Babel City of the Pampas where every language of Europe is freely spoken, but among the most numerous foreign Communities are the British and German. Over this cosmopolitan people the Nation however exerts a remarkable power of assimilation which promises well for the future racial and social integrity of the Country. You will find that after a long stay in the country, even the egoistic British born immigrant proudly calls himself an Argentine; hence the reason for the visit of the Princes to open in all these growing countries, a closer trade relationship not only with Britain but with the British Empire.

Complaints have reached us, which leads one to infer that all is not marching well with regards to equality of Justice among the Administrators of law and order in the vicinity of this settlement and in the Office at Guapiles.

Some time ago applications were made by several residents at Guacimo to the Ministerio de Fomento for permission to build houses on the government strip along the Railway lines at this place. These applications were received and favourable considered by the Fomento, inasmuch that a Special Agent Was sent down to inspect and measure up these lots don Guillermo Casasola in Association with the Jefe Politico actually came and conferred with these applicants on the 15th of December 1930.

These people thinking that all was well, went about buying up their materials etc. but now that they endeavour to start their buildings they have been stopped by the Agent of Police under orders he says from the Jefe Politico of Guapiles except the applicants are in possession of a Contract with the Fomento. They are now being called upon to send in another solicitude through our present Agent of Police, which costs another fee to him for his services although such expense has already been incurred costing these poor people \$2500. What may we ask has become of the first solicitudes which were accepted and approved of by Fomento; surely the Jefe or Sub.

Inspector de Hacienda must have such Contracts in hand, why not hand over such Contracts for the lots to these people who are willing to construct, rather than demanding them to go to further expenses to pay the Agent of Police to make out another document to obtain these Contracts.

It appears that there is a Carpenter Contractor who is in great favour of the Agent of Police who can get permission to build for these unfortunates, if the contract for the house is given to him, ofcourse the price of the permission is included in the

price of the Contract for building the house, but in the name of Justice why should this be allowed by the authorities?

The proper manner for all who have made solicitudes to the Fomento is to present himself by means of a competent interpreter (it may cost you two colones) to the Jefe Politico or Sub. Inspector of Hacienda (government Rents) and ask for your Contract or reply from the Fomento if none is there for you, address yourself again to the Fomento asking for a Reply to your former request and Continued on Page 6

## Railroad Accident at La Gloria

What might have been an awful catastrophe was providentially spared us by the hand of fate. While the Passenger train which left San José at 9 a. m. for Limon was on her way down; at about half past eleven in the vicinity of La Gloria the great coffee Estate of Messrs Lindo Bros, something went wrong with some break rod of one of the first class passenger Coaches, possibly one of the brake shoes then got under the wheel and derailed this Coach, with the result that it also drevv the other off the Track both cars capsizing laying on the vvindowvs, throwing all the passengers on the right side, of the Coaches on top of those on the left side, the panic can better be imagined than described.

The great fortune is that the derailment occurred at a spot where the Cars capsized against the cut ... the Hill and leaned against the hill cutting what might have been had the capsized occurred on the precipitous side where in some places the roll down the hillside in that vicinity would be hundreds of feet?

Fortunately there has been no casualty several passengers were battered and bruised by the capsizing and falling on top of one another, and the rear brakeman Chavarria got badly bounced against the seats, but conjecture what might have occurred had they

turned turtle a few meters from the spot of the accident.

This is unquestionably a result of the drastic retrenchments carried out on the Railway. It is impossible to expect that thorough inspection of the Cars can be now carried out before they leave the yards as formerly; from the fact that in some cases 75 percent of the labour has been suspended; hence one man must do the work of two and three at times and in shorter hours too. In San Jose for instance the shops have been made bare of hands inasmuch that the foremen and timekeepers are dismissed or have to work at fifty per cent reduced Salaries; how can it be expected that interested efficiency can be secured under these conditions.

It will not be alarming to see not only wrecks caused from defective Cars and Engines, but whole Bridges may soon collapse and engulf trains; as there is no time for inspection of rolling stock and bridges nowadays as used to be done. A little Tar spouted out of a jet by airpressure on the Bridges now is quite sufficient, the painter cannot see if a bolt or rivet is slack or the ironwork corroded by the touch of his brush; The roadmaster having to run from Alajuela to Estrella, what inspection can he give to the basements and footings of his bridges? The Engineer Corps

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# El descarrilamiento del Martes último Notas Sociales y Personales de Limón

El lunes último y en el lugar denominado La Gloria, el tren de pasajeros que hace el trayecto entre San José y Limón, sufrió un grave descarrilamiento que providencialmente no tuvo irreparables consecuencias personales que lamentar. Dos de los vagones de pasajeros se volcaron completamente, dichosamente hacia el lado del cerro, pues si hubiera sido hacia el Sur, nada ni nadie habrían podido evitar que hubiera caído en la pendiente. La causa de este hecho fué el defectuoso funcionamiento de los frenos; la manivela de la máquina se quebró completamente en dos pedazos; y unos cuantos golpeados y heridos levemente, apenas hubo.

Todas estas máquinas y vagones que trabajan día tras día, tienen que ser revisados continuamente en los talleres que la Compañía tiene para el caso. Pero ahora, así lo entendemos, no lo son todo lo que deberían, pues el número de trabajadores no lo permite, dado que aquella lo ha reducido a la mínima expresión.

Es de temerse, por lo que ha sucedido, que en el día de mañana a pase algo semejante, o lo que es peor, por ejemplo: el hundimiento de un puente, pues la Northern en su afán de economía, ha suprimido a los revisores de vía y el cuerpo de Ingenieros, está actualmente representado por uno. Obvia el decir que es insuficiente para una buena labor en toda la línea férrea, desde Alajuela hasta Limón. En la forma que hoy día se pintan los puentes, con un aparato manejado por medio de aire comprimido, el trabajador o pintor, es muy difícil se dé exacta cuenta del estado de los mismos o de sus diferentes partes. El hierro oxidado no resiste mucho; no

habiendo quien lo note, pues si se revisa será apenas por encima, está dentro de lo posible que ceda bajo la acción del tiempo y más aun, del peso.

En caso de que en un accidente se registren desgracias graves y personales, la Compañía tiene dinero en cantidad y abogados que la sacarán airosa de la situación, no sucediendo lo mismo con todos los damnificados, quienes no dispondrán de los recursos necesarios para a-

venturarse en un litigio con tan formidable contraparte.

Estas son las causas que nos mueven a emborronar estas cuartillas, para que el Gobierno tome en cuenta el mal y peligro a que estamos expuestos los que nos vemos en la imprescindible necesidad de usar ese medio de comunicación, y así trate de conseguir con la Compañía, se puedan llegar a evitar problemáticas, pero muy posibles desgracias.

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# Unemployment and Income Tax

The Editor of the «Searchlight»

Dear Sir:

Kindly allow me space in your valuable journal to give expression to a few thoughts which to my humbly way of looking at things may have

the so much desired effect of, if not fully, but at least satisfying in part the desires of the labouring man.

In the first place the term labouring man must be construed to mean the person who labours with his hand

and not so much the professional who works with his refined and cultivated superior intellects. The situation that confronts the Country at present, while it may be reasoned that this situation, crisis, depression, or call it what you may, is World-wide, and for this, and as a satisfaction this Country is no exception to the rule, is not to be truthful so World-wide as some would have the less informed to believe. If we take the situation in France as also Russia, the conditions, Economic, Social and commercially are as a fact superior to most of the so-called leading Governments of, not alone Europe, But the Americas. It may be well for one to spread Propaganda (falsely) against a people in case of war, so as to stir up the animosity of other peoples against the enemy, but it is stupid and unwise to spread false propaganda, distort facts which if the truth was properly known would bring peace, joy, contentment to a large majority of the human family, I am beginning to affirm that if the truth in respect to the real working of both these Governments (France and Russia) was properly and truthfully known that every reasonable person would agree that they are on the right track in the establishing of justice, equity, and a well balance adjustment of the primordial principles of Government.

I am perfectly aware Mr. Editor, in writing this article, that the average sinner will believe me to be a full-fledged Soviet, and one in the employ of the Government, as they have to say of any that attempts to make a departure in Civics or even in Philosophy; but if the thoughts to be exposed will make me to be considered as such, then I most gladly accept this end.

As a Costa Rican, I have been silently, and carefully weighing certain actions of principally one or two of the Officers of this Government in their endeavours of seeking out, and implanting radical and new ideas in the Government in the shape of laws for the purpose of lifting the machinery of the Government out of the condition in which it has been placed by a succession of well-meaning, but withal, illadvised administrations.

To be brief, the efforts recently put forth by señor Tomas Soley Guell, to create a tax per capita or persons from 18 years up, to provide funds to cancell the floating debt that weighs so heavily on us all, is worthy of eulogy in its intention, but when the matter is scrutinized, analyzed, clarified, delved into in all its ramifications, it is already found by some of the clear thinkers of this country, that

the measure of law submitted or to be submitted to the consideration of the Sovereign Congress must suffer vast reforms if it is to be acceptable as a durable measure of alleviation. There has been much comment pro and con, but really none seems to come to the point at which divergence the public mind would be inclined to accept as a reasonable substitute. I have my ideas as an opinion on this measure, but will not disclose it in this article, yet rather than leave this opportunity for another time so say something on the point, I will here say that if the law as submitted to Congress were to pass as it is, then the poor will have every reason to be poor, and the rich will more so have every reason to be rich in a more unreasonable way than formerly.

In respect to the efforts put forward for relieving the urgent and indispensable necessities of the out-of-work families, in San José this is also a very good effort, but one fraught with humiliations, confusions, and evil habit-forming precedents; this also I will leave for the future to comment on, but while here, I will say only one word, could, not the Government provide speedy work for all, in which these same funds could be doled out in the form of pay or salary in a dignified and manly fashion, rather than in the way of gifts of charity?...

Am I going to be considered as a Critic? if so then the Constitution of the Republic guarantees me free speech in expressing in a legal form on themes affecting the life of this my second home of adoption, Arts. 36 and 37 of the Political Constitution. To the minds of sane, prudent, wise, and unselfish persons, the needs of this old world of ours is not so much planning to further place more burdens where it can or cannot be borne, but to find a God-given solution of social economic problems confronting the Governments of the world, there is an old and trite saying which runs thus: «Sameness creates staleness, and staleness breeds contempt,» this apparently foolish saying may aptly be applied to the vast, stealthy, and gigantic yet to some imperceptible, changes occurring among and around us every day, if we take the branch of agriculture, of surgery, of scientific achievements in every branch of human endeavours, men and women of vision must come to no other conclusion than that God Almighty through his son Jesus Christ has begun to take charge, and to shape human affairs as he has promised he will do in this time, yet some are heaping contempt on these confusions. It will not take much efforts for even the average person to agree that there exist a perfect confusion on the part of even the most righteously-inclined

Diplomatic, executive or Administrative head to so shape affairs of their respective Government so as to bring joy, peace, and contentment to the great majority, and to my mind there will be no panacea so long as man is selfish to his less-favoured-fellow; what is needed is as God said it, a seeking after peace, a seeking after righteousness, (by the question arises, what is righteousness.) What is needed is a better adjustment of diffusion of wealth and its concomitant, of commodities in recompense for honest toil, of a more just basis of appreciation of value of all work or labour, in comparison with, and in agreement with the standard of values, both of work, and the commodities of life....

What is needed is more humility, and true Godliness on the part of the law-makers, in giving and making laws which will be administered equally to the rich and poor alike, to the Negro as to the white, to the big as to the small....

In my next I will endeavour to prove that labour-saving machinery is intended of God for a blessing and not a curse as it is at present.

## POPULARITY and DUALITY

The Sandinistas have taken the town of Gracias a Dios at El Tule, Nicaragua the American Marines had an encounter with 150 rebels of the Sandino Party, five of these were wounded. Sandino has advised the American government through a representative, that he will lay down arms, as soon as the last American Marine, is withdrawn by the United States.
