From Monarchy to Republic.

How shuddering was the intelligence received not so very long ago, that a revolution had broken out in the Empire of Portugal, there should have been no cause for surprise; since we had learned that of some time past matters had not been going well on the little Kingdom of the Azores beneath an apparently pleasing exterior the waves of unrest were seething, which were to be favoured by the monarch. It was felt that at any hour the country might be plunged into a civil war. The political horizon had been darkened by that portentous light. Indeed, political observers had long felt that a revolution had been brewing, judging by the calm manner in which the Portuguese people took the latest news. Such an opportunity for an outbreak among the people arrived, while the President-Elect of Brazil, Marshal Fozca was being fitted to Lisbon.

One cannot but be alive that the brilliant success which has attended the career of the Brazilian Republic, the wonderful manner the Republic has prospered during late years has dramatically influenced the affair in Portugal, and was one of the causes of bringing about the revolution. It could not otherwise, because the monarch is informed that thousands of Portuguese emigrate annually to Brazil to make their fortune, indeed, the inhabitants of the Republic can claim an ancestry with Portugal, and have always regarded the Empire as their Motherland. Grave doubts have never been felt for the essential insecurity of the young King's throne, and one event which was very marked, and showed what way the wind blew, was the return of ten Portuguese patriots to the city of Lisbon in the last Palmetine election. We cannot help feeling pity for the young King who is so young, these memorable words, so full of promise and hope, for the ameliorating the conditions of the country, so full of high repute, which have formed, part of the speech of the throne, and which at the time any rat was the hearts of the Portuguese we wish that the monarch might have been present at the first meeting of the Crown and Parliament as a sign of the alliance which should have been the basis of peace and progress of our nation. This deed the likes of which has never been seen before brought me to the throne, and with your compliance of a dynamic and national duty. I place my faith in God and you the representatives of the nation, and with your help I may finish this mission well." Yet representatives and the nation which were rewarded? After the impression had passed, the monarch submitted the same words evolved at the time, the cankers of our nation returned to its grivings.

We need him, but not in the way he is now regarded as some one who has to be tolerated. We never have sympathy with such thought. "A man is man for all that and at that." We are not on the future of the country, the subject "Jamaica for the Jamaicans".

fever height, the blast of the trumpet sounded, and the King, who had been in retirement, was set in motion. The King, in an hour of vacillation on the part of the nation's representatives and the people, was shown weakness on his part to be able to quell the uprising, and fight it out to the bitter end, was in fight with the Royal Family. The Republicans then became masters of the situation and took possession of Lisbon. A Republic was proclaimed, and the King was as the first Provisional President. Such was the news which arrived after a few days. A horrible tragedy and weary with the spite of all mankind in the midst of the upheaval, we must render to Caesar what is due, we are confident that we have that measure had been taken to the Royal King's safety and that of the Royal Family, surely the King would be gratified for the respect which they showed to the fallen ruler under such tragic miseries.

No one will be sure will quarrel with the Portuguese people in the form of government they have chosen, but it would have wished that the ancient and royal house of Portugal would not have gone down without striking a blow. Our hopes are not to witness its realization, since the King and a number of his children are to fight for the restoration of the monarchy. We might however be allowed the grave doubts we entertain as to whether the New Ministry will be able to maintain in that peace among the people, and if it is not, it is not the true progress of the country. Will Republic form of Government be best suited for the people, or should we have what a Republic Government in a country like Portugal is likely to be, where by the majority of the people, the ignorant ignorant Portugal that 1/3th or 1/5th of the population can neither read nor write, and a people whose history for the last four centuries has been one of "political chaos, absolutism and military revolution," a people, who by tradition and education have not been trained and have not received the responsibility of self government, and now to be asked to govern, the result must surely be catastrophic. Where you have a people ignorant and illiterate people to contend with, the result must be woeful. Will insurrection arise, because the people have not been in the past? As doubtless every member of the population will more or less endeavour to overthrow the state, and bring a new order of things, what do the Portuguese people know of "Politics", to them the word means politics, and the majority of people without principle beyond the mere fact of allowing one another to remain in office for a reasonable time. The country is governed by a party of "wire pullers and bosses". The people have no interest in election.

By cable we gather that the deposed Jose Valladares, Commander of Amapala, Honduras has revolted against the Government. It appears that President Davila is unable to cope with the situation; and the intervention of the American gunboat "Princeton" which is in the harbour is momentarily expected. The British Consul with a number of American citizens have fled to San Salvador for refuge. Those who were unable to get away have barricaded themselves in their own homes. British American lives and interests are in jeopardy. It is believed that the "Princeton" is waiting the arrival of H. M. S. Scylla before proceeding to attack. What can one expect from such bigheadedness and foolhardiness of those classes of persons in Honduras who through some means or the other have tasted power for which they are wholly unfitted.

Six years ago we expressed the opinion that the country would soon pass under American rule. In recent happenings there is every indication of this becoming true. Here is a country which is wonderfully rich, its resources have not yet been developed, but financially very poor on account of the long dreary, desolating revolutions through which the country has been passing. The development of any country depends absolutely on lasting peace.

We know from our experience what the revolutions in Honduras are like, we have witnessed a few, and we can confidently say, may we never see the like again. It would be a lease of new life, and wonderful activity would be evinced in the progress of the country materially, socially and physically, the hour it comes under American rule.
