The Coming Coronation.

We continue the article on "THE COMING CORONATION" by the Most Rev. the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

Look for example, at one very obvious anomaly. In Westminster Abbey this June, along side of Christian potentates from England and her Colonies will stand, I suppose, some of the foremost representatives of our Indian Empire, aliens, in race and in faith, yet knit to us as brothers in the bonds of loyalty and mutual trust—fellow-workers, albeit very dimly, in the endeavour to realize our great ideals of just and helpful rule. The presence of these men will be part of the object lesson as to what a Christian Empire means. It is absolute keeping with the principle laid down with unmistakable clearness in the memorable Proclamation in which our great Queen Victoria assumed the direct government of India. It will be remembered how in that famous document—drafted, we know, by the Queen's own hand. She described her own "firm reliance on the truth of Christianity" as being the very thought which would strengthen her in maintaining absolute religious liberty for the whole people of India "that none be in any wise favoured, none molested or disquieted, by reason of their religious faith", and how the Proclamation ended with an earnest prayer to God, that strength might be vouchsafed to Queen and officers alike for the task of carrying out this promise of even-handed justice and beneficent rule. And now some of those who, as the loyal Subjects of her grandson exhibit

bit and represent the outcome of the notable pledge she gave, will witness, as we hope, that grandson's Christian consecration to a like responsibility, and will learn how a Christian people expects an answer to its prayer, and in the strange and complex fabric of our Indian Rule itself how much there is which stirs the very sort of questioning which is brought to a point in concrete form in the crowding of a Christian Sovereign to rule over vast populations of Mohammedan and Buddhists and Hindus!

Ordinary people as we have said, are thinking now about these things in an absolutely fresh way. Student and novelist and poet give expression to our eager questionings, to our sometimes dumb bewilderment. The daily paradox at the two races, the governing and governed, in closest friendliness touch, and yet so immeasurably sundered all the while. The Coronation, if we think about its significance, forces the questions on us "Stay-at-homes" people, with unaccustomed force, and we tremble at their magnitude. All I ask to-day is, that when we are weighing what it all means, and are remembering in our prayers the Christian Sovereign of our Empire, we should have in constant recollection as we bend our knees, the overwhelming fact of the two hundred and seventy millions of his Subjects in India who are at present non-Christians, and should offer with a deeper and more thoughtful conception of its meaning the Coronation Prayer. *Confirm and establish him with Thy Free and Princely spirit, the Spirit of Wisdom and Government, the Spirit of Counsel and Ghostly Strength.* And should offer it with expectant—yes expectant—hope. There is but one power in earth or heaven which can enable any man or body of men to grapple hopefully with such task. But there is that Power and we invoked it—or rather, invoke Him who wields it, "Conquering and to Conquer".

Advice to travelling Jamaicans.

It is absolutely necessary to produce a *PASS PORT* or *PERMIT* from your Native Land at the British Consulate, and after doing so, to obtain one from the Governor before buying your ticket for departure to any Port.
Many Jamaicans who have lost such permits have great difficulty in getting responsible parties to identify them. The Consul have had lots of trouble both in extending and rejecting many according to conditions.

Workers swept out to Sea

It is learnt that during a recent and sudden tempest in the Caspian Sea a landing stage on which about 300 labourers were at work gave way and the men were swept out to sea. The sea was very violent that it was impossible to rescue them and the hope that many of them will be saved was abandoned. Several of the ships with their crews on board were sunk at their moorings at different Caspian Coast towns. Seven towns along the coast were flooded, the inhabitants in hundreds were forced to take refuge in hay stacks. The plight of the sufferers is pitiable, as intense cold has been added to the general misery. Many steamers have been sent from the port of Astrakan, Russia to aid the sufferers in the storm.

Closer Trade

It is a splendid thing that the Dominion should get into closer trade relations with the States. A Large Crowd.

By despatch it is learnt that a foot ball match played between Harvard and Yale a short time ago, resulted in a draw. More than 40,000 persons witnessed the game, and they came from points as distant as Philadelphia. Weeks before the match was played every available ticket was distributed by the committee, in so much so that thousands who came on the day of the match could not gain admittance. It was an ideal foot ball weather, both for players and spectators.

Earthquake.

It is reported from Martique that a severe earth-shock is moving from North to South was experienced on the night of the 18th November, no damage.

Scarcity of Turkeys.

News is to hand that Turkeys from Canada for the Thanksgiving day in the United States will be less than what it has ever been on account of the blackhead epidemic now prevailing in all the Turkey growing section of Canada. The Dominion biologist says that the disease is killing the turkeys by tens of thousands throughout the country. It is a parasitic disease and get its name from the appearance of the Comb after the parasite has attacked the bird. The diseased affects the digestive organs and in most cases keeps the birds very thin and scrawny in spite of heavy feeding. In some cases it causes them to swell abnormally but in all cases it renders them unfit for marketing. A simple remedy is provided and bulletins have been sent out announcing this. The birds are starved for two days, and then are allowed to drink a mixture of water and muric acid. Where the cures are affected the birds are still too thin for the market.

An Exile.

Joseph Nathan, the Lewward Island labourer who led his men in an old red coat left on the S. S. Ellis last night for his native land being an undesirable citizen for Costa Rica. We wish him better luck.

Cold Wave.

From the *Times Democrat*, we learn that a cold wave has set in in the States. A severe cold wave has prevailed in the Ohio Valley and Gulf and South Atlantic States, and there were forests as far South as South Florida.

On the New England coast storm warnings have been displayed, on account of the disturbance which has been moving north-eastward from the Carolinas.
