The Late King.

It has been decided by the London Committee that the capital must have a memorial statue of the late King. This is a reasonable and appropriate decision and it is hoped that when the statue is made, it will also be appropriate and reasonable. If it is to stand above the monumental rock of London statues, it must be monumental in character, as all those who appreciated the late King's services would wish. There are other proposals for having something to the memory of the late King will also receive a fair chance. Mr. Lewis Harcourt has proposed the building of a London Museum on the lead of the Musée Carnavalet in Paris, and Lord Avebury has also proposed the erection of a Great Hall for the University of London. The former would be the most popular, the latter is a necessity which will have to be taken in hand sooner or later.

Mr. John Burns has formulated a scheme for the pushing Charity Cross Station back to the Surrey Side, building a magnificent new bridge and creating a worthy approach from the bottom, if the Strand captures the imagination. The net cost would probably not be very great, since the plan would produce a large number of frontages commanding enormous sums of money.

Charing Cross Station would then be in the same position as the Gare d'Orsay in Paris—an ornament instead of an obstruction and eyesore.

## The Pipe.

The Rev. W. J. Williams, chairman of the Jamaica Wesleyan Methodist District, arrived by the S.S. Ellis on Friday. He is on a tour, inspecting the Central American stations. He sails on Wednesday for Jamaica via Colon. The Rev. gentleman is welcomed in our midst and hope his short stay here will be a pleasant one.

## West Indies and Canada.

Mr. George Vipond arrived in Jamaica a short time ago, in the interest of his firm. Mr. Vipond is head of the firm of George Vipond & Co., fruit importers of Montreal, Canada. He also hopes to visit Cuba on business interest. His trip to Jamaica is to advise the packing houses to be more careful in the packing of oranges for Canadian market. Apparently the oranges do not arrive at Montreal in good condition. They are good eating and sweet but their appearance in the Montreal market after a long voyage is against them. The firm imports 1,000 boxes of grape fruits weekly. A very strong and healthy trade is being carried on between Jamaica and Montreal in this direction. Canada needs all the fruits that Jamaica, Trinidad and Barbadoes and the Bahamas can grow, while the West Indies need a vast quantity of The Canadian timber, fish, grain, flour, and other manufactures. Mr. Vipond is reported as being a strong advocate of reciprocal trade between the West Indies and Canada, and he believes that the British West Indian Islands with Newfoundland and the great expanding Dominion of Canada should be one political unit—not only commercial. If that day ever comes, the prosperity of the Islands will be greater than it can be under any other possible arrangement with any other country.

## India.

Lord Hardings, the future Viceroy of India at a dinner, given by the Harrow Association, England, said he had given much thought to the position of Indian students in England, and he deplored their comparative isolation in the universities and law schools,—a position which exposed them to a number of evil influence and temptations. He however pointed out that Indian boys at Harrow School are treated by other boys on a footing of perfect equality. Regarding the matter as one of Imperial concern in respect of the future of the Empire, and

that a little kindness to these young men would repay itself a hundredfold, by the spread of loyalty any devotion. Lord Hardings expressed the hope that the universities and law schools would take a leaf from the practice at Harrow. The words were both wise and timely, and anyone who is interested in the beneficent influence of England,—the Great Dependency will sympathize.

## Mutiny Among Sailors in Brazilian Navy.

From the *Telegraph and Guardian* it is learnt that the sailors of the Brazilian navy had mutined. Their demands were for an increase in pay, abolition of corporal punishment, and the adjustment of minor grievances. Congress met in an extraordinary session when their demands were conceded. The Senate also approved a proportion for amnesty to the rebels. The demands of the mutineers were granted by the government, after which they surrendered. There is peace and quietness now in the navy. Public excitement has subsided, and the city resumed its normal activities.

## Married by Proxy

From the *Telegraph and Guardian* the news is learnt that a marriage by proxy is allowed by the law of Cuba. A wedding of such character recently took place in the City of Cuba at the residence of Mrs. Soler, on the Malecon, whose daughter was Sta. Monina Soler became the wife of Sr. Francis Ruz, son of the well-known broker of the city. Sr. Ruz who is in Paris sent the power of attorney to his friend Speaker Cresteo Ferrara and another to Sr. Manuel Torres. Sr. Torres represented the bridegroom at the wedding as Sr. Ferrara was away at Santa Clara.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Father Manuel Abascal of the Roman Catholic Church of the Holy Angel. Chief of Police Armando Riva and Sr. Miguel Morales acted for the bride, while Sr. Julio de la Tone and Francisco G. Jueros acted for the bridegroom. The Bride will leave in a few days to join the husband in Paris.
