Rivalry in big dirigibles

Largest airship yet built for the British navy

It is 150 feet long and Equipped With Wrecks.—Germany's Zeppelin Airship.—\$ 1,350,000 in Prizes for Aviators.—Marine Contest Next Summer.

Although the new Siemens-Schuckert dirigible balloon, which made its trial trip in Germany on Monday, is the most powerful airship yet tried, it is surpassed in size by the vessel which has just been completed for the use of the British navy. This airship has been built at Barrow on designs prepared by Messrs. Vickers Sons & Maxim and several aeronautical experts, who have taken the Zeppelin type of vessel as their model.

Precautions have been taken to preserve the secrets of this British airship, no stranger being allowed even to approach the enormous shed in which it is housed. Both officers and men concerned in its construction are sworn not to divulge any of its details, and to any one seeking for such information is handed a leaflet on which are printed the penal clauses of the official secrets act. Nevertheless sufficient particulars have been learned to make it possible to compare it with the latest Zeppelin vessel and the new Siemens-Schuckert airship.

The British dirigible is of British manufacture throughout, even the envelope, which is of the same character as the fabric used in the latest Zeppelins. The principal dimensions are: Maximum length, 510 feet, compared with the 485 1/2 feet of Zeppelin VIII; maximum diameter, 48 feet, against the Zeppelin's 46 feet, and gas capacity, 706,830 cubic feet, compared with the 529,750 cub feet of the German boat.

The British vessel is equipped with two sets of eight cylinder Wolsley engines, each of which is rated at about 200 horse-power, and in this also she has a considerable advantage over the latest Zeppelin, which has three Daimler-Mercedes motors of 115 horse-power each. The latter are intended to give the vessel to which they are fitted a speed of thirty-five miles an hour, will the British vessel is credited with forty-five miles an hour.

There is yet one other detail in which she marks an important improvement over her type, and this is in regard to the metal used for her framework. This metal is a recently discovered alloy known as duralumin, which is both lighter and stronger than aluminum, the metal used in the Zeppelins. The British vessel is equipped with three propellers one large one at the rear being coupled up to the aft motor and two smaller ones being carried on outriggers on each side of the forward gondola.

It is intended that the airship shall work in conjunction with the fleet as a scout. She will carry a powerful wireless apparatus, which will enable her to send news of the movements and position of an opposing fleet while within clear sight of the ships and yet well out of range of the enemy's guns.

The launching of this airship is likely to take place any time within the next six weeks. If her trials prove satisfactory she will

take part in the summer naval maneuvers and also join the home and Atlantic fleets for the coronation review at Spithead.

How does the British naval airship compare with the latest German vessel, the Siemenschuckert, which is described as the most powerful dirigible ever constructed? The Siemenschuckert is a non-rigid, fish shaped vessel 300 feet long. Her maximum diameter is 43 1/2 feet and she has a gas capacity of 460,000 cubic feet.

Of the three cars which are attached to the balloon the centre one serves for passengers and also carries two 24 horse-power petrol motors controlling the valves of the balloon. The ship's engines are placed in the fore and after cars, each of which carries two 125 horse-power Daimler motors. The front motor in either car drives a single propeller.

The cars are hung from the balloon by stays of pliable material which are attached to the bag along almost its entire length. No steel ropes are employed.

In her trial flight on Monday she carried twelve people, but it is stated that she can carry as many as fifty. The vessel is the private property of the Siemens-Schuckert Electric Company and was constructed by Cap. von Krogg, formerly of the aeronautical battalion of the Prussian army.

It is pointed out that if the aeronautical prizes offered this year could be equally divided every aviator would receive about \$ 5,000, a sum which would approximately balance the cost of his machine, and his expenses. The prize money, it is estimated, will amount to \$ 1,250,000 and the number of men who will be flying or learning to fly this summer in all parts of the world will be about 2,500.

One of the most interesting prizes is that of \$ 10,000 for rising from and settling again on the sea at points to be arranged between Folkestone and Boulogne. For this competition a new type of machine will be required. The contest will take place in the English Channel during the summer and will be under the management of the municipal authorities of Folkestone and Boulogne.

At least one machine which will safely alight upon water is in existence. It is the invention of a Frenchman named Fabre and was tried on the Riviera last year. When on the surface of the water the vessel rests upon three large floats arranged after the fashion of the wheels of a tricycle, two being under the main plane and one under the forward elevating plane. The under surface of the floats is convex so as to offer the least resistance to the water when the vessel is set whirling and the machine is driven forward.

Two seasons ago Major Davidson was experimenting in England on the grounds of the Aeronautical Society with a machine in which he hoped to rise from the water. His experiments were not successful.

English Cricketers at Barbados

Success Defeat in first match

An Innings and 103 proved their quietness

By latest Jamaica papers to hand we are able to give a synopsis of the result of the first match played at Barbados between them and Mr. A. H. Somerset England.

Barbados, Feb. 9.—The cricket champions of the West Indies to-day pressed home the advantage gained on the first day's play in the international cricket match with Mr. T. L. Somerset's English XI, and this afternoon all Barbados is celebrating a great victory.

The local batsman, who had at the close of play yesterday a total of 257 runs was a very meritorious performer this morning, and succeeded in almost doubling the overnight score before the last batsman was sent pavilionwards.

The wicket was in about the same condition as yesterday—sticky and rugging proving no easy matter. Under the circumstances Barbados' score of 257 runs was a very meritorious performance, and one worthy of the first cricketing colony in this part of the hemisphere.

The Englishmen, who had made 93 runs in their first innings, started on their uphill task of making 134 runs to avoid the inning's defeat shortly after luncheon.

The second innings was a story of the repetition of the first. The visitors' reply could not look at the home team's attack; and, in a little under two hours' play, were all out for a paltry 91.

Barbados thus won a hot victory by the huge margin of an innings and 103 runs. The victorious home team were the recipients of a great ovation from the big crowd of spectators.

In view of the quick ending of the match, it has been practically settled that a second match will be played with the visitors, commencing tomorrow.

On Monday the first "test match" between England and the West Indies will commence here. Play is limited to three days. Trinidad will be represented by Messrs. Harrihan, Constantine and Andre Cipriani, who are now here.

Second Match

Home team on fair road to score another win

The second match was commenced the next day and like the first the tone seemed to start with things their own way.

Barbados, Feb. 10.—Barbados is once again on top of England and the second match already bids fair to end much the same as the first yesterday, i. e., in a victory for the island combination.

The return match with Mr. Somerset's eleven was commenced at Kensington on the 10th, and started to bat on a much improved wicket.

Once again, however, they broke down before the local attack, as although they led by 100 runs in the first match, they were all sent back to the pavilion for the very moderate score of 139.

The ground work of the home team was brilliant, excellent bowling being backed up by magnificent fielding. Barbados commenced her innings after the luncheon interval, and again the island crickers gave another sound exhibition of batting, the Englishmen's total being passed with but four wickets left.

At the call of time this afternoon Barbados has scored 157 runs for the loss of four wickets, and so at this point, with 5 wickets, in hand have a lead of 16 runs.

The match will be continued to-morrow, when high hopes are entertained of another victory to the credit of the West Indies.
