### English Team at Barbados

#### Second Match

From late Jamaica papers to hand we are able to give our readers the full scores of the second match at Barbados; also the commencement of the first match of the English team that is now doing battle at Demerara:

#### SECOND MATCH AT BARBADOS

##### DEFEAT OF THE ENGLISH TEAM

BARBADOS, Feb. 10.—The return match, Barbados vs. Mr. Somerset's eleven, was commenced at Kensington Oval yesterday in good weather. The attendance was rather scant as compared with Wednesday and Thursday's numbers, but it was nevertheless well patronized, but the grounds presented a rather deservied appearance, the 'great unwashed' failing to turn up in their usual large numbers. The spin of the coin resulted in favour of the visitors and, electing to bat, they were all dismissed for 139 runs, in which Browne contributed 35 in brilliant fashion. C. R. Browne's 'puzzlers' proved very troublesome and played havoc with not a few of the batsmen. The people's favourite, 'George,' captured two wickets for the small total of 9 runs. Barbados occupied the wickets shortly after 3 o'clock and at call of time, had contributed 157 runs for the loss of 4 wickets. The bowling of the Englishmen was better than in the first match, but our batsmen all played cautiously except those dashing cracks from the Bay, H. B. G. Austin and G. Challenor.

#### MR. SOMERSET TEAM AT DEMERARA

The English team has just arrived at Demerara and commenced their first match against the hosts. Below we give short report by cable to Georgetown.

(Special by W. I. and Panama Telegraph Co.)

Georgetown, British Guiana, Feb. 24.—At the close of the second day's play in the first match between Demerara and Mr. Somerset's English team, the position is, that at best the colonists can only hope for a draw tomorrow, the visitors, this afternoon, having placed themselves in a well nigh impregnable position. Demerara, who had overnight put on 40 runs without loss in reply to the Englishmen's first innings total of 225, continued their innings this morning. The mastery over the visitors' attack was however, not continued, and in spite of some good batting, the total closed for 190-35 below the total put together by Mr. Somerset's men.

The visitors in their second attempt give a grand batting display. The home team's attack was first mastered, and then battered to every point of the compass. Runs were piled on at a rapid rate, and when play ceased for the day, the total stood 242 runs for the loss of but one wicket. The Britons have thus placed themselves in a winning position as with 9 wickets in hand they are now 278 runs on. It is expected that they will declare about noon tomorrow, and Demerara will have to play out time to save the game.

### Young Turks and Old Turks

There are always a lot of people as well as elsewhere who prefer to concern themselves about the affairs of other people rather than about their own. There is a contingent of Americans who take little interest in the great problems that should claim their attention at home, but who never miss an opportunity of voicing their detestation of the course of the Turkish Government towards the Christian inhabitants of Macedonia, Armenia and other portions of the Turkish Empire, although in many cases these same so-called Christian inhabitants have deliberately brought about the persecutions of which they have been the victims with a view to their political effect and their influence on international sentiment.

When former Sultan Abdul Hamid was overthrown the champions and apologists for the Macedonians and Armenians jumped promptly to the conclusion that the Young Turks would do away with all the evils of which the Christian people of the Turkish Empire complained. They expected the prompt emancipation of Macedonia and the according of equal political rights to Christians. These good people are beginning to realize that a young Turk in essentials even if he differs in policy to some extent

Macedonia under the new regime is being ruled with as firm a hand as ever and Armenia is in no better plight. The Turkish Empire instead of being ruled from the Yildiz Kiosk as formerly is being governed from the rooms of the committee on safety and progress of the Young Turks party in Salonica. The acknowledged officials of the Government, from the Sultan down, are mere figureheads, as nothing important can be done without the consent of the Salonica oligarchy. Christians are being treated much as they were before and the ascendancy of Islam is as pronounced as ever. A mere change of politics and rulers has not changed the Turk, who is the same bloodthirsty fanatic he always was.

### Making money

The chief difficulty with the woman who wishes to make pin money is her dislike of advertising. There is work to be done in every community. Frequently women are at a loss to know who to get to help them out of some difficulty, or take long trips to the store for some forgotten articles when they would gladly have paid some one to do the service.

As an example: One girl I knew, says a writer in Good Housekeeping, went to a city to school every day from her suburban town. It so happened that she had quite a wait every afternoon before the afternoon train came. As she was not a rich girl, and the business course she was taking was costing her some of her capital, she conceived the idea of paying it back by doing errands in the city for people in her home community. She did not work on the basis of the professional shopper, for she did not have enough work on the basis of the professional shopper, for she did not have enough work to warrant this procedure, but she charged 10 cents for any one errand or several errands, amounting to one dollar's worth of expenditure. If goods were bought costing \$1.50 she charged 15 cents; if \$2 worth, she charged 20; this being, as I have said, where several errands were involved. For only one errand she charged 10 cents, whether the purchase amounted to \$1 (as this amount the shops would send free to her suburban town); small packages that could not be sent free she carried, or, by combining errands, had the goods sent in her name and distributed them the following day. In this way she was not greatly burdened by carrying parcels, yet always saw that her patrons would not be obliged to pay expressage. She likes the work and it nets her a nice sum weekly, and as she has good taste her patrons are well pleased with her purchases.

How did she get this work? You ask. That is where we began. She advertised in the local paper, which almost every one in the community read. She inserted a notice giving her prices and general rules, and instantly her commissions began. In fact, she has so much to do some days that

one of her rules is that she can only take a certain number of shopping errands, and first come first served, other requests have to wait for the next day, as she has to take the same train home each day or her task would become too burdensome. Advertise, then. Let it be known what work you can do, and want to do. If a girl or woman is willing to go out as a general helper, charging by the hour for her services, she can be sure of work in almost every village or town.

### Systematic Robberies

For some time ago a regular systematic robbery began going on in the market and no means of stoppage can be made or the marauder brought to justice. It is very peculiar and surprising that although a policeman is stationed in the market every night and the place is supplied with electric light, so that any one attempting to commit a robbery can be detected. But in the face of all these precautions it is an almost every week report that a stall been robbed, and no account of the robbery could be given by the policeman that is paid to protect the people's things. It is not for us to charge the policeman that is put to guard the goods but we are surprised to see in the face of the limb of the law goods are taken from the stall holders. It was on Friday night last that a barefaced robbery was committed at the stall of Mr. Elias Salomon. This man locked up his stall securely the previous evening but on his opening it next morning he found some embroidery thrown about the counter, this was a sign that some one had been playing loose with him. He then made a close inspection and discovered that about a dozen and a half handkerchiefs been stolen. Salomon says his stock is so varied that he cannot say just now what else had been stolen. The stall was found quite intact, nothing broken, but Salomon avers that of any one were to put a flat instrument on the counter and prize up the bars that is put to enclose the goods they could easily have access to the goods.

We believe if another watchman was put over that watchman some good result may arise and this systematic fraud stopped.

### Third-class sleeping cars
