### A Peace Preacher

Baron d'Estournelles de Constant, one time French Minister and Chargé d'Affaires at London, member of the French Senate from the Department of the Sarthe, member of the Hague Conference and recipient of the Nobel prize, arrived at New York on board the Provence, of the French line, to make an extensive tour of the United States in the interests of world peace.

"What commerce wants everywhere is peace," Baron d'Estournelles said. "What agriculture wants is peace. What industry, science, education, moral and material progress want is peace. Yet peace is organized nowhere. War still is given as the supreme solution of international quarrels. Thousands of millions of dollars are spent everywhere by the governments for preparation for war and only a few thousand for preparation for peace.

"This cannot last. War belongs to the past. Peace is the policy of tomorrow, the policy of labor, the policy of science. Peace is our duty to the coming generations. Let us organize, then, for peace and justice."

The Baron comes here under the auspices of the American Association for International Peace and is said to divide with Count Apponyi, who recently visited this country, the honors of being the foremost European advocate of international good will.

"In my addresses I will deal with many matters which now should engage the attention of those who seek for world peace," the Baron said. "I will speak of the necessity of the bringing nearer together of France and Germany by reciprocal concessions, for I believe this to be imperative in the establishment of world peace."

I will demonstrate that, with the exception of wars of independence, the majority of wars waged have been needless and have acted as disastrous for the conquerors as for the conquered. In the face of the daily progress of science, particularly in the matter of communications, with the discoveries in aerial and submarine navigation and wireless telegraphy, war has become an anachronism and not a solution.

"Preparations for peace are an indispensable complement of progress. Nations now have no other alternatives than forcing and civil war or the organization of peace. Such organization is the positive and patriotic duty of each State and individual. It should be inscribed at the beginning of every political programme, without distinction of party, for all reform, international, economic or social, is subordinate of the morrow."

Baron d'Estournelles will confer in this city with Mr. Andrew Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. His first address will be made in Philadelphia next Monday before the city Club, and in the evening of that day he will speak before the Twentieth Century Club, in Brooklyn. He will go to Washington next Tuesday. His itinerary includes practically every large city of the United States. Upon the close of the Lake Mohonk Conference on May 26 next, at which he will be a speaker, he will visit Canada. While in this city he will stay at the Hotel Belmont.

### Englishmen Suffer Defeat

Trinidadians Win Match By Margin Of Seven Wickets

(By W. L. and P. Telegraph Co.)  
Port of Spain, Saturday.—The return match between Trinidad and Mr. Somerset's English Team was commenced here today, and went slightly in favour of the home team.

The Colonials won the toss and, as the weather was fine, Harragin elected to bat. All Trinidad made a fair use of their opportunity, the last wicket not falling until the total had reached 216. The bowling and fielding of the visitors were fair.

The M. C. C. in their turn at the wickets gave an improved display, having up 131 runs for the loss of 7 wickets at the call of time.

The match will be continued to-morrow, the M. C. C. combination with 3 wickets in hand being 85 runs behind the Colonials first inning's total.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Monday.—All Trinidad has again vanquished the visiting English team, on this occasion the margin in favour of the colony being seven wickets.

Mr. Somerset's combination, who had at the close of play yesterday, lost seven wickets in their second innings for 131 runs, continued batting this morning. The three remaining wickets put in 31 runs, the total closing for 192.

Trinidad was set the task of getting 124 runs, and turned the trick for the loss of but three wickets, winning the match by 3 runs and 7 wickets.

M. C. C. Combination 177 and 192.

Trinidad 216 and 162 for 3.  
Mr. Somerset and his men sail tomorrow for Jamaica where they will remain a fortnight. Up to the present the net result of the tour has been:

Played 8 matches, won 3 lost 4, and 1 drawn.

Won: One match against Demerara two "test" matches against the West Indies.

Lost: Two matches to Barbados and two to Trinidad.

Drawn: One "test" match.

### Anarchism in Japan

Tokio.—Premier Katsura, the famous Japanese statesman, has alarmed the government officials by his statements as to the spread of anarchy in the empire, and it is certain that more arrests and executions will occur in spite of the furor aroused by the summary killing of Denjaro Kotoku, his wife and ten others and the imprisonment of fourteen of their associates. Anarchist outbreaks have occurred in several laties of late, and the authorities have determined to wipe out the trouble makers with a ruthless hand. They are at a loss to find out how the anarchist propaganda obtained so great a headway before showing prominently in the surface. Several members of the diet have attacked the government of late for allowing anarchism to spread.

### The Maine Dam Near Completion

Havana, Cuba.—Colonel Black, of the maine Commission, announced that the dam will be finished within two weeks, when pumping will start. The battle ship will be on dry ground within six weeks, he says, ready to be inspected by the official commission which is to draw over the exact cause of the explosion.

Colonel Black says the divers' reports indicate that the hull is in very bad condition.

### Conflagration at Jamaica

Over a Thousand Pounds Worth of Damage Done

From the latest file of Jamaica news to hand we reproduce a short account of a destructive fire at Port Royal on the 11th inst.:

The Port Royalties were at the verge of panic shortly before noon on Saturday, when the alarming news spread around the ancient town that fire was raging in the dockyard, and spreading fast in spite of the efforts of the Garrison to stop it.

The fire originated, curiously enough, in the fire engine shed, but the cause of the outbreak is unknown. Different people had different ideas on the subject, some thinking that the fire started on the engine itself, and others that a cigarette end dropped to the waste organ did the trick.

However, this is merely speculation, and the military authorities will make an effort to determine the cause.

The fire-fighters redoubled their efforts, and shortly before two o'clock the flames were got under control. The townspeople were then let in; the men and women formed a bucket brigade, and helped in the work of extinguishing the blaze.

The net result of the blaze was the complete destruction of a long low range of buildings, one part of which was used as a shed for housing the fire engine, and the other part for storing timber was completely gutted; and another building to the west, used as a cement storehouse, so badly damaged by fire and water as to be completely wrecked. The steam fire engine was reduced to scrap iron and a quantity of cement spoiled. The timber room was empty. The total loss is estimated at between £1,000 and £1,500.

The building burnt and gutted are the property of the Admiralty, and it is probable that the military, who are now in charge, will have to replace them.

# Victory of Langford

Defeat of Australian Not Wonderful Says Jack Johnson

Later is Willing to Meet Him in the Ring

New York.—"Jack" Johnson in Frisco, said: "Langford's Victory over the Australian in London is not wonderful by any means. Still, if Langford wants to fight me he can have a match if he will make a big side bet, say 20,000 dols. If he will put up that much money I will fight him anywhere."

Hugh McIntosh, according to the latest advices from London, will offer a purse of 40,000 dols. at least for a battle between Langford and Johnson. If they can be brought together in London the bout will be limited to 20 rounds, but if they will agree to fight to a finish in the Paris Hippodrome, recently leased by McIntosh, the purse will be increased to 60,000 dols., it is said.

Joseph Woodman, Langford's manager, sent a cablegram to a local sporting man conveying the information that he has authorized McIntosh to make a match with Johnson and that Langford is ready to fight the world's heavyweight champion in England or France. Langford can get backing here to the extent of 20,000 dols. as a well-known Bronx real estate man offered to furnish that money several months ago, and is still ready to do so.

Langford's next fight will be with Sam Mc Vey. They are matched for 20 rounds on April 11 at the Paris Hippodrome.

Digger Stanley, England's bantam champion, and his manager, Alfred Mark, sailed for home yesterday. Stanley said that if Burns would cross the ocean the National Sporting Club would hang up a fat purse for another bout. He expressed the opinion that Burns is the best bantam in America.
