The Editor of the Times.

Why do they do this! The reason is apparent. To put the whole Decalogue in their Chart would betray the falsity of the claims. Were the angels in Egypt! In the house of bondage? Was that the million of Adam. How many of the abiles of Christians which constitute the New Testament Church were under King Pharaoh in Egyptian bondage? Not one. It cannot possibly apply to any but the Israelitiation. Look at the Sabbath commandment as written on the stone tables. Keep the Sabbath Day to sanctify it as the Lord Thy God hath commanded thee. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work; but the Seventh Day is the Sabbath of the Lord Thy God; in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy ass, nor thy daughter, nor thy manservant, nor thy maid-servant, nor thy ox, nor thy ass, nor any of thy cattle, nor the stranger that is within thy gates; that thy manservant and thy maid-servant may rest as well as thou." And remember that thou wast a servant in the land of Egypt, and that the Lord thy God brought thee out thence through a mighty hand and by a stretched out arm; therefore the Lord Thy God commanded thee to keep the Sabbath day." Deut. 5, verses 12-15. Can this apply to all people in all ages! Can it apply to angels? Will it apply to the redeemed in heaven for ever? Adventist answers "Yes." But reason and common sense answers, "No." Angels—servants in the land of Egypt! Thine ox, nor thy ass nor any of thy cattle! Do the angels in heaven own oxen, work asses and feed cattle? Will this be true of the redeemed millions around the throne in eternity? "Thy manservant nor thy maid-servant, nor thy stranger within thy gates." Would this apply to Adam in Eden? Did he have servants, and let strangers in his gates back there. A man's meditation here ought to make Saturday keepers ashamed. This language shows that Israel is referred to. It cannot possibly apply elsewhere. "Thy stranger in thy gates" refers to the gentiles that entered the gates of their cities. "Honour thy father and thy mother that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee."

What land was given? Answer; Canaan. To whom was it given? Answer, Israel. Then the ox commandment was given to Israel. Angels do not have fathers and mothers. How can they honour what they do not have! Could Adam know his father and mother? Are the angels under the fifth commandment? Preposterous. Then that law cannot govern the hosts of heaven. It was given to a single nation—Israel—in a limited territory—Canaan. "Thou shalt not commit adultery." Does this command govern angels in heaven? Will it be the law that will rule the untold millions of Imortal all around the throne in eternity! Let the sons of Hagar blush with shame. These lecturers hang up their chart and teach men that this law is eternal, governs angels, and will govern the resem-

ed forever. It must stand eternally. This is all done to save their idolised Sabbath. But their argument is false from the ground up. The Decalogue cannot apply universally. It was given by Moses from God to Israel to restrain wickedness till Christ should come and remove wickedness from men's hearts. Think of God telling the angels, who are spirit beings, "Thou shalt not commit adultery." Would that not sound a little strange to the millions in heaven with immortal, spiritual, glorified bodies; yet on just such absurdities rest the whole structure of Sabbatarianism. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife. Strange language this would have been to Adam while in Eden. Stranger yet would it sound to angels in heaven and to the immortal saints around the throne, where "they neither marry nor are given in marriage." On what inconsistencies man are driven of in upholding a false creed! No wonder Paul said that these janglers desire to be teachers of the law; understanding neither what they say nor whereof they affirm 1 Tim. 1, verses 6-7. The wording of the Decalogue throughout shows that it was only a prohibitory national law, worded to fit the circumstances, and adopted to the social condition of the Jews as a nation in the land of Canaan. Banana Industry of Dutch Guiana.

BLIGHTED BY A PARASITE.

New York.—The Royal Dutch West India liner Surinam, came in from Dutch Guiana, a first steel ship only three years old, will go out of this port in a few days and for the next six months will be laid up at E. B. B. hospital for crippled craft and those that cannot get cargo at a profit or a charter. She has been plying with three sisters, the Maroon, the Surinam and the Coppenn, between this port and Paramaribo, the capital of Dutch Guiana. The Dutch Guiana banana crop has been blighted by a parasite that has practically destroyed more than two-thirds of it, and that is why the Surinam will give up trading for a time. A new crop has been planted and it is expected that within a year the liner will be in business again.

Lord Kitchener to Lease land

During a visit to East Africa a few weeks ago, Field Marshall Lord Kitchener was so struck with the prospects of the protectorate that he applied for land on a 90 years lease and will later on return to Africa to develop his holding.

Water Famine in Cuba.

Camaguey.—In view of the scarcity of water in the town of Nuevitas the provincial council voted 2,000 doles. to be used in bringing immediate relief. The prompt action of the provincial council in providing relief is being praised highly and telegram of thanks was received from the Mayor of Nuevitas.

Absconding Naval Clerk.

Havana.—Edward W. Lee, former pay clerk on the U. S. battleship Georgia, who is accused of stealing 45,000 dollars from the paymaster's funds at Guantanamo last month, has been apprehended at Jacksonville, Fla. His arrest was brought about by secret service men, who traced him by the numbers of some of the stolen bills. It is believed Lee came to Havana and shipped from this port in his flight to the United States.

Ammunition not for Intervention.

San Antonio, Texas.—The Ninth Cavalry and the Fourth Artillery are due here today. Their arrival will make possible the formation of a division under General Carter. A large amount of ammunition is also due in a few days. General Carter, in answer to the intimations that the ammunition is being brought here in connection with an intervention in

Mexico by United States troops, said that it is to be used for target practice.

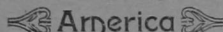

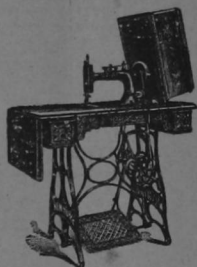
