Jamaican Shot Down by

SPANIARD THIRSTED FOR

Failed To Nab The Right Man And Took Auother.

On the arrival of the passenger train in Limon on Tuesday afterneon last came the news of an aggravated assault committed by a policeman at Cairo Branch, sive miles from the main line. From what we gather from one of the, principals in the matter appears that a Jamaican named Barnett who resides at Cairo Branch and the policeman slationed there had an altercation over some private matters and the policeman's ire vas roused, whereupon he drew his pistol to shoot Barnett but he took to his heels and sought refuge under the cover of his house. When he got inside he locked the door, thus preventing the policeman's entry. The policeman, who is a native of the republic, when he found it was impossible to get at his mandrew his machet and commenced brandishing it in the air, swearing vengeance on whom he came across.

The man then turned his attention to Siquirres when he found he could not quench his anger with blood. He telephoned to this station saying he wanted help at Cairo Brauch as a riot was there. Not getting a reply he started for Siquirris on foot, reaching there in a short time. A few others and himself quickly arrived on the scene on a trolley.

Before the men on the trolley got to where the man Barnett was penned up they stopped and took up the Chief of Police who accompanied them. While on their way to the house they met again of men coming from where Barnett was, and one of the policemen who is from La Junta drew his machet and commenced to flog the men with it. The men finding themselves defenceless ran for safety, but the policeman from Cairo Branch like a roaring lion thirsting after blood drew bis gun themselves defenceless ran for safety, but the policeman from Cairo Branch like a roaring lion thirsting after blood drew bis gun from his side and fired upon the retiring men laying low one of them named Ernest Greig. He received the shot in his back and he immediately fell to the ground, While lying there bathed in blood the man that fired at him went up to him and the dying man exclaimed: "I did not trouble you, I respect you." These words made the long man more forious, and like a frantic demon again drew his gun and fired at the dying man lying on the earth, the ball entering through one of his right ribs. The man again though suffering immeasely, still assured the cruel man that he was not Barnett and that he did hothing, but the man-brute replied any "Jamaican". He then thrust his 'hand for his famous friend and defender—machette—but this weapon was not at his command so he was unable to "do up" the noan Greig. Yelling "Carajo," he grasped the man by the hand and dragged him on the ground for a distance of about a chain and then abandoned him.

The men that accompanied Greig and who had scumpered on the arrival of the policemen on the trolley, went to Greig's assistance. They took him up and

When the policemen were running from Barnett's house they stopped where the wounded man was, and gaining entrance they saw him lying on the cot. 
