Justice to Whom it is Due.

We are informed that the United Fruit Company has brought to Limon 200 men from the interior to work on the dock. The question we now ask is where are the hundreds of men who worked so faithfully for the Company for the last many years through sunshine and rain, through perils and danger worked so faithfully on the farms and on the dock, simply to fill the coffers of the colossal Company? We answer, they are right here in Limon, and are willing to earn an honest livelihood.

No one knows better than we do the merits and demerits of the average Jamaican labourers. We have had much to do with them and in very many instances proved them to be efficient workers, and ever ready to do their portion of work as well as to them. But they justly endorse the old and familiar adage "The hope of reward sweetens labour," which we believe is a logical conclusion.

We are not saying that the United Fruit Company has not the right of choosing its own employees, that prerogative theirs, but when it is proven beyond a shadow of doubt that they all along admired and used foreign labourers much to their benefit, when no other could be got in the republic that was equal to the kind of work they had to perform is a regrettable circumstance and savours of dire ingratitude to men who worked so faithfully.

The natives of the republic are entitled to the fat of their land and which they are receiving, it is theirs by nature and no one should wrest it from them. Why this Company turned their attention to the interior for 200 men to work in Limon, is it because they cannot procure the right labourers? We again so no, it is only to intimidate the weak hearted Jamaicans, it is for the sole purpose of getting them to acquiesce to the miserable wage offered them of late, not thinking of what they got before. Why should men who have been labouring fairly and squarely for the good of both sides be cornared through selfish ends, this should not be. We say let all have equal rights according to their ability.

Can the men of the interior compete with the hardy Jamaicans, who is accustomed to warm climate, who is a terror to the soil, who have the strength and endurance to grapple with sturdiness with banana bunches that is so often seen on the dock. We boldly say the natives may be willing but are not able to compete with the average Jamaican labourer; the climate of the interior is quite different from that of Limon, consequently we believe these men will only be the introducer of some kind of fever epidemic, which in the end may prove disaster to disinterested persons, and who are in sympathy with the Jamaicans—even the natives to be have probably been forced to leave to earn a pittance to come to Limon to earn a plenty *plata*, not knowing it may be only an invitation for Camp One.

Why should these men be used as instruments to enrich so large a corporation as the United Fruit Company, whose only object is to squeeze every drop of blood they can out of the poor labourers to gratify its many shareholders

who are already well provided for.

The interior want men and these native labourers should be advised by the more intelligent ones not to allow themselves to be made a tool of, thus allowing a willing lot of men to be driven in the cold and who are ready to work at any time for a fair wage.

God's Law Governs Angels and Men.

REVIEW OF ARTICLE "I" OF THE LOWER CRITICS.

To the Editor of the Times.

It is written: "Where no Law is there is no transgression"; that, "sin is not imputed when there is no Law"; and that, "Whosoever committeth sin, transgresseth also the Law; for sin is the transgression of the Law." And we also read that, "Thy first father hath sinned"; Isa. 48: 27. Our first father is Adam. He "sinned," he broke the same Law that was written in God's "being, and in that of all the angelic hosts," and in his (Adam's) very "constitution"; that very Law which "the angels that sinned," and which "the devil" who had sinned "from the beginning" had transgressed. If Adam were not under Law—obedience to Law, he would have violated no precept when he disobeyed God; in fact he could not have disobeyed. And the charge: "Thy first father hath sinned," would have been a false charge brought against him. But, a Law that was violated in heaven by angels, and transgressed on earth by man, must without contradiction, be universal, for heaven and earth constitute the universe. And that Law is violated by all the posterity of Adam, Gentiles as well as Jews, as it is written: "All have sinned"; and "sin is the transgression of the Law," therefore all men have transgressed the Law, Gentiles as well as Jews. That all men are amenable to the Law is made plain from the following: "The earth is defiled under inhabitants thereof; because they have transgressed the Laws, changed the Ordinance, broken the everlasting Covenant." Isa. 24: 5. That charge, by God, against the inhabitants of the earth for transgressing His Law, would be untrue if all were not amenable to His Law. Again, if it was only a local Law, given only to the Jews, the charge would have been equally untrue, as they were not the only inhabitants of the earth. Again, if it was only a local Law given to the Jews in the land of Canaan, then, whenever they had travelled to some other parts of the world they would have been freed from its obligations.

Therefore, they would be at liberty to have false gods, make images, take God's name in vain, break the Sabbath, dishonour their parents, kill, commit adultery, steal, bear false witness, and covet their neighbours' goods, etc. A murderer is in the sight of God a sinner—a Law breaker, whether or not he lives in Green-land, Japan, Patagonia, Australia, or in the West Indies. What is true of that—man is true of all men who come under that or any other of the breach of God's Law, everywhere, and in every age. Cain violated the sixth precept of the Decalogue, and the Lord called him a sinner. It was a sin to kill a man in his days, as it is at the present time. That demonstrates the irrefutable

fact, is both universal and eternal. Surely the foregoing ought to convince the critic of the genuineness of the claim put forth by the Seventh Day Adventists that God's Law is eternal, that it governs angels as well as men, and that it is therefore eternal and universal. We shall leave the community to think and to decide for themselves, whether or not the Seventh Day Adventists, who are pointing them to the obedience of God's Law through faith in Jesus, are right; or whether the critic, who is trying to direct their minds from obedience to that Law is wrong.

Incendiarism.

A MALICIOUS ATTEMPT TO DESTROY BUILDING.

On Tuesday morning last an attempt to destroy by fire the building owned by Lawyer Alberto Monge Reyes and who resides at present on the lower floor

The building is a two-story house situated on Avenue 4 and consisted of several bedrooms; the upper floor being occupied by Mr. J. Ramirez and family. There is an entrance to the upper floor, which is at the back of the building and a long staircase, boarded up on each side. Beneath this staircase there is a cellar where paint, etc., are kept.

On Tuesday morning 25th inst., a man named Cooper, who resides on the premises and employed to Mr. Ramirez, got up about six o'clock and while on an errand he saw smoke issuing from beneath the staircase. He at once went to the scene and soon discovered that the fire was in the cellar where the tin of paint oil was. He at once gave the alarm when Mr. Monge Reyes and other tenants were on the scene. The cellar was opened and in it was found some old newspapers, cloth and candle, and several pieces of oil boards all of these were burning. With several buckets of water thrown by Cooper and Mrs. Monge Reyes the fire was extinguished without doing much damage, only leaving a large hole in the floor.

Had the fire not been discovered so quickly a serious affair would have been the result. Mr. Ramirez is the father of several little children that occupies the upper floor and the staircase being the only way of escape their chances would have been difficult.
