## CORONATION FESTIVITIES.

Witnessed by Over Two Thousand Persons.  
BRILLIANT ADDRESS  
VICE-CONSUL AND GOVERNOR TOOK ACTIVE PART.

The coronation of King George V. is now an accomplished fact and was celebrated in Limon in good style.

A splendid success! This is the universal opinion of all as nearly every item in connection with the celebration was carried through successfully.

### THE WEATHER.

All fortune seems to have dogged the day's proceedings. There had been very heavy showers of rain during the night and early morning, and at day break heavy clouds swept across the sky, and there was a general uncertainty as to whether Port Limon would have the pleasure of showing her loyalty to the King of England. But dawn fortune smiled and gradually the misty clouds gave way to a little sunshine.

### THE MILITARY DISPLAY.

From 7 a.m. people were seen weaving their way to the Wash House Grounds where the men were to gather and march to the Plaza-del-Toro, and by 8 o'clock the men assembled on the street opposite the American Consul's office.

The men were tastefully dressed, the Infantry wearing white tunics and black pants with red sash and white cap, while the Cavalry was dressed in white tunic and pants, leggings, and Baden Pouch hats. The men held every inch of a soldierly air. Commanding Officer Peter Noel after giving the order "fall in," the men preceded by the Mounted Cavalry marched along Third Street, crossing Miramar Hotel, then passing Dr. Stegall and down Front Street to the Plaza-del-Toro. On reaching there the men were put through a course of exercise, after which the command "Stand at ease" this was to await the arrival of the Vice-Consul Mr. McGregor. Just at this period the rain which was

falling slightly during the march came down heavily.

The men were not long in waiting after as about ten minutes and an automobile drew up in front of the ground, from which alighted His Britannic Majesty's Vice-Consul of Limon, Governor Pardo, the Commandante and the Criminal Judge. The drum and life as also the Government band played "God Save the King" while all stood erect with hats off. The Governor, Commandante and Judge were escorted to a canvas tent, specially prepared for them and the Vice-Consul mounted a horse.

Here what was never seen or written in the annals of history of Limon was displayed on this morning. Under the heavy downpour of rain the men were just through a grand military parade, the infantry and cavalry. The march was performed in splendid style; the well trained men received a hearty applause from all around. Sopping wet the men went through their manoeuvres, not thinking of self but like real British soldiers observed discipline to the hilt. The trooping of the colours was masterly performed and great credit is due to Lieutenant Peter Blackman for the manner he acquitted himself; he was entrusted with the colours. Mr. McGregor, the worthy Vice-Consul, like a full-gledged representative of the King was no less conspicuous in showing his loyalty and faithfulness, although he met with an accident that almost caused his death when he alighted from the automobile was game to the end, the drenching he got from the rain on the field seemed to have done him more good than harm.

After the trooping of the colours God save the King was played, the mounted cavalry and infantry marched in front of the Vice-Consul and saluted him, twenty bombs were then fired in honour of the King.

### THE ADDRESS.

The infantry and mounted cavalry then lined up in front of the Vice-Consul and Commander-in-Chief Peter Noel in a regular and firm voice read the following address:

MR. MCGREGOR, Vice-Consul.

Sir—We, the officers and men of the Military Display on the 22nd day of June, 1911, take pleasure in ministering around you on this occasion, to wit, the Coronation of our Sovereign Lord King George the Fifth. We well realize the supreme joy that having are but small tributaries of the stream that strengthen the British Empire, but as loyal subjects we desire to trust our volcanic voices of joy before you on this unique occasion.

Since the Omnipotent has permitted him that grand privilege which is only the privilege of a King to declare himself ruler of millions of his fellowmen we feel it our duty to express our feelings of loyalty to you his representative here in Limon and to you his well-known fact to your Sir, that wherever British subjects are gathered to gather the assurance of the simple words "God Save the King" recalls their thoughts to their splendid heritage as sons of the greatest Empire the world has ever known—the greatest, not only in its illimitable extent but in its intense and efficacy to afford freedom of speech to all whose privilege it is to come beneath its sway. It is this great Empire you Sir, have this distinguish-

guished honour to represent.

You, to the best of our ideas and memories as British Vice-Consul here have done your duties in an impartial and upright manner, a manner that has won for you commendation even from your non-admirers all which stand forth forcibly to show that you are a worthy representative of His Majesty King George V. and by your personal acts and deeds have further caused us to realize and see the symbol and the confirmation of imperialism or imperial ideas.

It may not be generally known or understood that your position as Vice-Consul is not an enviable one, your position is far different from men who pursue their peaceful ways, also from the stern and busy turmoil of diplomatic strife. Not being able to please the people all the time, you are liable to be severely criticised as being partial, but by the fair and broad-minded subjects it is generally expressed that you are a man of high integrity and fine calibre, competent to guide and represent so ill and great a power as the British Empire.

Beaconsfield and Gladstone have had their criticisms, so what care we; but history will say with us that you, have discharged your duties with dignity and skill with credit to your country and honour to yourself.

We have Sir, enjoyed the pleasure of your acquaintance for some time past, have come to friendly contact with you, have noted your interest and affairs in general, and feel pleased to express that you have always maintained a high standing for our city and our nation.

Some day you live to fill the position you see deemed to hold.

Limon, June 22d, 1911.

The Vice-Consul who was visibly touched replied in suitable terms. (Owing to the rain our reporter was unable to get near the speaker.)

His Excellency Ricardo Jiméñez who promised to be present was unable to attend but was represented by Governor Pardo, who was the recipient of an address after that of the Consul's. The Captain of the cavalry Sam Nation read the address in an impressive manner.

Governor Pardo on behalf of the President and himself made a short but splendid reply in English. Three cheers were then given for the King and the President of the Republic. The English and Spanish National Anthems were played and the men remained on the ground while the Vice-Consul, the Governor, Command-in-Chief Noel, the Commandante, the Judge, Ven. Archedea Robinson and one of his Chaplains, repaired under the canvas tent and with champagne drank the health of the King. The men were re-formed and marched to Saboria's dairy house.

### THE SERVICE.

At 12 o'clock noon, the men marched to Government House then to St. Mark's church the Vice-Consul and Governor Pardo attending. They sat in the front seat. The service was a musical one. The first lesson was read by Catechist Binns and the second by Rev. E. A. Pitt, of Wesley Church. Leaflets specially printed

for the occasion were used. Archedea Robinson ascended the pulpit and read to the crowded edifice the order of the Coronation Service in England (he said exactly what is done at Westminster on that day). At the conclusion the Rev. gentleman said among other things: "My friends, those are official words so that you may know what is going on. This form of coronation is not for a few years. In times past the Empire was but a small one, but to-day the Empire that George V. reigns over is the largest. We now look up to King George V. as the chief of the Empire and this being so we should pray for him. His crown is laid on the altar of God and when we are obeying him we are obeying God. We are glad to have George to lead us, for he is a wise man; he comes at a time of great difficulty when he has to face much difficult problems, so we ought to pray for him.

We are to be thankful to be here and to be the guests of the President of Costa Rica. The man who love his King and country ought to be good. Let us try and thank the Government of Costa Rica for all the good they do to us." At the conclusion of the sermon a collection was taken up. God save the King was sung and the orderly crowd left the church for the foot-ball ground.
