New Official.

With the advent of the new Agent of Police at Pocos, let us hope that his first duty will be to see that the labourers on the farms be paid regularly at least at the end of every month if not fortnightly.

The private farmers such as Messrs Canas & Coy., Arguello Casimero, Suarez, pay whenever they like. Mr Bethune is the only one around here who has a regular payday, the others all pay when they feel like doing it and yet the Police do not interest themselves in the matter for all the law says they must. These are the dealings that cripple the commerce of the district because the merchants can never know when the labourer gets his pay to collect what he owes him for his support during the month and 20 or 25 days.

Germania Robbery

Through the acuteness of Don Pedro Pablo Boza, and his men, two men have been arrested at Siquirres in connection with the robbery at Babylonia Commissary. These men have been found with a quantity of money on them, and from the peculiarity of their conduct, they have been detained, pending further enquiry. Several tales have been given as to their possession of this money, but they all seem conflicting. The U F Coy. Officials are busy making investigations as to where these men worked and how much they earned. We await further development.

Americans Killed.

San Pedro Sula, Honduras, Dec. 4.—via New Orleans, Dec. 12.—A. J. Schruder, an American from Hamilton, Ohio, was shot and killed on the plantation of the Buffalo and Honduras Company, Sunday, November 10, according to information received here today.

A widow and two daughters are here and two sons are said to be in college at Dayton.

Timoteo Rodriguez, a native, was arrested and confessed to killed Schruder, implicating Juan Litona, foreman of the plantation, who, Rodriguez said hired him to put the American out of the way.

Information also was received that an American named Davis had been shot and probably fatally wounded by a native of Cuyamel on plantation of the Cuyamel Fruit Coy.

The feelings against Americans here is growing.

Cutting Prices.

At Siquirres Messrs. Lind & Co. have dropped the prices of their goods in their main and branch Commissariats alike. Mr. Ike Corig is determined that the purchasers must have the best advantage for their money, for while he says that the labourers are earning less wages on the farms now, than they used to, and while he does not now pay the 5 per cent he used to for goods supplied to the farms, he is determined that the labouring man must have the best advantage in purchasing; another thing he says is that some of the traders around sell whisky adulterated, thus giving the consumer half whisky and half rum, he has dropped the price of whisky, etc. so that the men will be able to buy a bottle of whisky cheap rather than drink what he knows not.

Drowning in Reventazon.

On Wednesday 18th inst., there was a sad case of drowning at 5 Miles Cairo Branch. It appears that there is an old man Crawford who being unable to work on the farms, made himself a little canoe with which he takes the laborers backward and forward from one side of the river to the other to and from their work on San Domingo, Carmen and San Alberto Farms, who contract to pay him 2 colones monthly and transient travelers 25 cents each, rather than walk around the Carmen bridge seven miles. On Wednesday the policeman at Constantine Commissary went over to Five Miles and on returning, ordered the old man to take him across but this he refused to do with out his paying him 25 cents as he already owed him 2 colones for conveying him backward and forward, whereupon the Chief of Police at 5 Miles arrested the old man, of about 70 years old and landed him in jail for the day and fined him 5 colones 75 cents. In the meantime the men came along with whom he had contracted to get across, not seeing the old chap, they got on the cable and tried to get across with the result that the cable tray cut away with three men and landed them in the river below; two managed to get out, but one named Natty Nicholson got drowned. Now who is responsible for this we ask? The reply seem to echo the Agent of Police at 5 Miles; and we hope the energetic Jefe Politico at Siquirres will call on the old man to explain why he did not carry out his duty to cross those men, whereby the death of this man was caused, and we are sure evidence will be abundant that it is the fault of the Chief of Police because while we would not appreciate any insolence from the public to an officer of the law, yet from what is gathered, the manner in which this Officer addressed this aged man, was far from gentlemanly or in keeping with his position, besides, no government in the world can compel a man to work for it without remunerating him for his services, therefore we cannot see how the man could be arrested and fined because he demanded payment for his services. Let us hope to hear some more of this occurrence.

Siquirres Races.

The events passed off without a hitch, the first one was undoubtedly the race of the day; when Mr. DeLeon's Grafton and Mr. Woodbridge's Silverwing combatted for first place in the Siquirres Purse, a one mile race. They went away like a shot at the fall of the flag and both went dead even for the first heat, in the second round was the contest. Here Grafton shot ahead of Silverwing for half a length, then he wing picked him up the same space, but neither one could gain the roadway from the other, this went on until when they reached the last bend for the home stretch Grafton seemed to push ahead to gain the lead, but Silverwing who up to this was not yet hustled, made a hustle up and seemed to bounce Grafton which checked him for a while and Silverwing gained the head, coming under the judge's flag by a small margin. The pool paid 1 colon 75.

In this race thousands of dollars changed hands for the backers of both horses were equally confident. The confidence may well be imagined by an incident that came under my eye—a barber named Mitchell after waging all he had on Grafton was accosted by an unknown to him, a carpenter named Aikman, for a bet of 5 colones. Mitchell informed him that all he had left on him was five cents. Aikman hereupon waged him his 5 colones to his five cent on Silverwing and won.

The next race was the Flying Handicap which was easily won by Mr. Woodbridge's Vagabundo, Mr. Bryan's Ballwood second.

The 3rd race was the Merchants Stakes which was easily won by Mr. Bryan's Smallwood with Mr. Richardson's Oscar Wilde 2nd. Pool paid 1 colon 10 cents.

The 4th race was the Test, which was won by Lady Clara, but not without a hard battle with Smallwood. In this race Smallwood keenly upheld all past traditions and his reputation as the best horse in the Province of his size; for after having a serious contest with Oscar Wilde in a three quarter mile race, he comes right back in this following race and gives Lady Clara a close chase, coming in a good second, easily ahead of Lipton. Pool paid 5 colones.

The 5th race was the Scurry between Grafton, Alma, Silver

wing and Ballwood; this again was a very exciting race, from the start it was clearly seen that Alma was unfit being sick leaving the race to the other three, in this race Mr. DeLeon decided to mount himself which was an immense advantage to Silverwing by fifty pounds burden, however he relied on the stability of his horse, for a while it seemed as if there could be no separation of the two horses not until the home stretch again did the wing push ahead of him, here Ballwood crept up on Grafton for second place and the finish was most interesting between the two, but due to Mr. DeLeon's good riding he saved Grafton a whipping by Ballwood also. Pool paid 1 colon 30 cents.

The day was most pleasant and the crowd behaved admirably, there was not even a quarrel on the ground.

The second day's races was not as interesting as the first partly from the fact that the rain fell so heavily all day that the people who would have come out could not, and partly from the fact that the winning horses were practically spotted from the proceedings of the previous day. The first race was the Maiden Stakes, won by Mr. Richardson's Oscar Wilde with Mr. Bryan's Ballwood 2nd.

The second race was Rose Hill Handicap between Grafton Silverwing and Alma, the last named did not face the starter leaving the race between the other two, who were equally backed, Silverwing however came in an easy winner.

The 3rd was the Jockey Club Stakes which was won by Oscar Wilde with Lipton 2nd.

The next was the Golofina Cup which was won by Vagabundo with Lady Clara second.

The last was what was called the Consolation Stakes between Lipton, Oscar Wilde, Smallwood and Rosa, which was won by Smallwood with Oscar Wilde second. This closed the day's proceedings and the Band went back to the town where they paraded the principal residents, finishing up at the Siquirres New Drug Store, where they received an eloquent address by Mr. C. A. Shaw, complimenting them on behalf of the Committee for the faithful manner they had performed the duties which through the generosity of Don Gerardo Lara, they were detailed to do wishing them a continued life of usefulness to their country many pleasant Xmas Seasons and an enjoyable voyage home

No obstante tales contrariedades, no desistió de sus propósitos, fijó de nuevo su mirada en Francia á donde regresó para tomar parte activa en el movimiento revolucionario que había llegado á su período algido.

El decapitamiento del Rey Luis XVI y el de su esposa María Antonieta había causado profunda indignación en las Cortes Europeas, que veían en aquellas nuevas doctrinas la justicia de un pueblo libre que rompía las cadenas de la esclavitud y del oscurantismo, doctrinas que seguirían como ejemplo las demás naciones, produciendo la caída de los tronos y de la realza ensorberbecida.

Era necesario salvar el principio de la monarquía, mucho era el odio que se sentía por aquel movimiento inexplicable, Inglaterra, Alemania, Austria y España celebraban pactos de alianza, se coaligaban y mandaban sus ejércitos á las fronteras de Francia, invadiéndola, creyendo llegar á tiempo para impedir en su huida á los reyes, salvarlos y evitar su muerte: fracasaron los planes de esas potencias ante la imposibilidad.

El Directorio, con actividad asombrosa organizó un ejército para oponerse á la invasión y nombró General en Jefe de él al General Duperier Dumouriez, y como su segundo á don Francisco de Miranda, ya general para aquella época, al primero por considerársele uno de los Jefes de grandes condiciones militares hábil estratégico y á quien algunos han tenido como émulo del Gran Napoleón; y al segundo, además de poseer estas condiciones, por su serenidad admirable y buen acierto, demostrados en esa misma campaña, en la que había adquirido el renombre de Soberbio Castellano.

Jefes y ejércitos, marcharon á las fronteras de Bélgica, teniendo que trabar combates en el mismo territorio francés en la parte que había sido ocupa-

da por los coaligados, á los cuales desalojaron brillantemente de sus posiciones repeliéndolos hasta hacerlos salir fuera del país.

Ocupado el territorio de Bélgica por el ejército francés, que marchaba siempre adelante, persiguiendo de triunfo en triunfo al enemigo, se libró la batalla de Valmy en 1792 salvando con «la el general en Jefe á su Patria y á la República, decidiéndose allí, la retirada de los prusianos. Invadidos enseguida los países Bajos Austríacos, vino después el desastre d' Nerwinde perdiéndose las provincias Belgas Austríacas; y fué este desastre el que cubrió de gloria á Francisco de Miranda, en la célebre retirada que lleva ese nombre porque con ella salvó el ejército abandonado por Dumouriez y por consiguiente la dignidad de la Francia. Por este hecho, fué inscrito su nombre junto con el de los hombres célebres que figuran en la columna de La Vau dé.

Al conocer el Directorio la defección del General en Jefe de aquel ejército, dió orden de prisión contra él no pudiéndose llevar á cabo la aprehensión por haberse pasado Dumouriez á los ejércitos coaligados. Tocóle á Miranda sufrir las consecuencias de ese desastre, y hecho preso en su propio campamento fué conducido á París para comparecer ante el Tribunal de la Convención, á dar cuenta de sus actos. Acusado de complicidad en aquella traición, tuvo como defensor al mismo abogado que defendió á la reina María Antonieta ante aquellos mismos jueces, y si brillante fué la defensa, más aún lo fué, la que se hizo el mismo Miranda con elocuencia que llevó al delirio al pueblo que ocupaba las barras. Fué absuelto, y al salir de aquella sala, la multitud, se lo echó en hombros victoriándolo y paseándolo en triunfo por las calles principales de París.

También quisiera saber su opinión en este sentido: ¿es verdad que las manos del Maestro fieron gentilicias? Porque: yo concibo que hayan sido muy blancas... y delicadas... y tenues... pero no estoy seguro de si aquellas manos fueron gentilicias.

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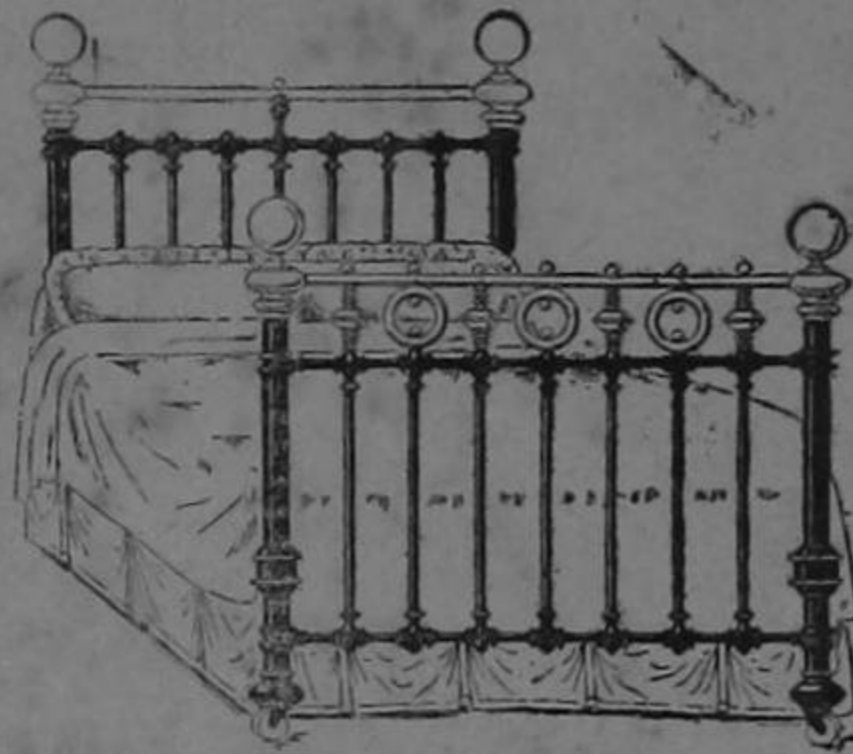
