

## The British Flag Blown Away

### King George's Day Depreciated

On Tuesday 3rd, being the King's birthday, the subjects of His Majesty King George V expected certainly to see the proud flag flying over the United Fruit Co.'s Consulate, hence several of these wended their way towards that building and on finding that no flag was hoisted there one or two walked into the office and asked the Consul why it was that the flag was not flown on King George's birthday. "Indeed", says the Consul, "I did not know". He thereupon orders his clerk to go and hoist the flag, which would be the first time such has been exhibited since Mr. Mc Gregor left here, but the flag had been laid away for so long a time that when it was run up by the clerk the line suspending the flag cut and the flag was blown off the flag-staff, and the Consul did not see the necessity of buying a pound of cord to hoist it; hence we had to be content to pass the day without seeing our flag out. The Editor of this paper however had to run about town and ask the different Consuls (French, German, Italian, American, Venezuelan and Guatemalan), as well as the Commandante of the town, to honour the day by hoisting their flag, to which they all gladly acquiesced, not without surprise however that the British Consul did not acquaint them of the occasion.

We can hardly attach blame to Mr. Doswell, who personally is much respected and admired, but unfortunately, from his position and disinterestedness in British traditions which is proven from the fact that he has expressed his disinclination to retain the office on more than one occasion, he has to bear the criticisms and sarcasms which is natural from the community; but Mr. Cox should certainly have reminded him of the fact that the King's birthday was one of the days on which the old flag should be hoisted, particularly as it was omitted on Empire Day.

## STRIKE ON BOARD SHIP

The S. S. Salamanca which was due to leave on Sunday morning at day break for New Orleans, via Puerto Barrios and Cortes, did not leave until Monday midday, from the fact that the firemen were on strike. These men came ashore without leave and the Captain fined them five shillings each, for which six of them went on strike, with the result that the ship could not leave.

A batch of coloured firemen were quickly found to replace those who had struck, but the white stokers and trimmers refused to work with them, and a rumpus ensued on board, in which it was plainly portrayed to the Captain that possibly a mutiny on the way might be the result. He therefore sends back the men from shore and pardons the refractory men, paying the new men who were engaged one day's pay.

## The New Lodge at Estrada

As delegates from the Jamaica District of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, Manchester Unity, holding its regular quarterly sessions on the Isthmus of Panama during the last two years, Messrs. Howard Guinier and J. H. S. Oates, Provincial Deputy Grand Master and Past Provincial Grand Master respectively, arrived here by the S. S. Guadeloupe of the French Transatlantic Line, on the 23rd ult., to open a lodge of the said Order at Estrada.

These gentlemen left Limon for the scene of their labours the very next day of their arrival and, after much toil with initiations and installations, brought to a close the inauguration of the new lodge, the Loyal "Ebenezer", No 9212, by dedicating the hall and unveiling the Dispensation on Sunday, the first of June.

The founder of the new lodge is the indefatigable member of the Loyal "Bethseda", No 7894, of Limon, Brother James A. Cleland, Past Grand, to whom was tendered the thanks of the District.

The Dedication service was open to the public and, like at the festive board after the installation, a large gathering of the citizens in and around Estrada was in evidence.

On Monday evening, 2nd inst., the delegates held Grand Lodge in the fine and spacious rooms of the Loyal "Bethseda" when six members of said lodge, Allan E. Martin, John Goulbourne, W. B. Gourzon, Geo. E. Scott, Walter E. Josephs, James Cleland, were granted their Past Grand or Purple Degree.

Following the desire on the part of the Jamaica District to place lodges in every well-settled centre along the West Caribbean coast, the delegates have succeeded in starting the foundation of another branch at Siquirres.

Associated with these delegates have been Messrs. J. E. McLeod and G. Allan Turner, Past Grand of the Loyal "Pride of the Isthmus" Lodge, No 7980, of Panama, who aided very ably in bringing the labours of Messrs. Guinier and Oates to a successful issue.

These gentlemen left on Thursday of this week by the same line of steamers for the Isthmus, where at the next session of the District the good news about the new lodge and the other information will be officially reported.

Mr. Schloss assisted the sick at Estrada without thinking of the charges; with or without money those suffering from the ills peculiar to our clime knew that they could approach him for help, and felt sure they would find a sympathizer in him, and very often ingratitude was his remuneration, yet this did not deter him.

The Jamaican element here have indeed deep cause for lamenting the demise of so able, so worthy and beneficial a son of Jamaica.

The "Times" extends its deepest sympathy to his brothers in Bocas, and Mr. Edward Schloss of this town in their time of grief, in which we take an equal part.

## EDITORIAL

If there is anything that must condemn the carelessness of the municipal fathers of Limon it is the condition of the streets.

Our tourist coming in and spending a day or two around Limon must certainly be shocked at the condition our streets are to be found. The only one that one can walk or drive over with any comfort is the half of the main avenue which was repaired by don Rogelio Pardo during the time he occupied the position as Governor. Since he left that position nothing has been done to endeavour to put the highways in a condition of safety to pedestrians or those on horseback or vehicles. At almost every corner are to be met holes enough to take in a man, yet the Municipality seems to collect the taxes on coaches, carts, etc., without feeling that they have any obligation to prepare a roadway for these vehicles to pass over with safety, not alone to animals drawing those vehicles but to the passengers being conveyed in them. In the ordinary course of labour if a horse or mule happened to drop in one of these holes, which is most likely to happen at any time, could the Municipality honestly evade their responsibility in this negligence?

There is no time that a shower of rain of any ordinary duration occurs that our streets are not flooded with two feet of water in some places, why is this? Because the streets are so worn that they are below the water tables on both sides of the street, hence naturally the water takes the street as its course instead of the drains. Every day masons can be seen at work digging up the cement from the water tables which could last for years yet, and making new ones, whereas the storm water does not go into the drains but coming in torrents in the centre of the streets. It may be wise therefore to advise the engineer of the Board to provide a train, which will not cost much, as the Railway gives special rates for such purposes, and go to Puita and bring in a hundred car loads of ballast which is there only to be loaded, and raise the streets and fill the holes which are getting more and more dangerous daily, and ask Mr. Mullins to connect his sewer on Sixth Avenue to the culvert at Sixth Street so as to take away the water from Mr. Arnold's farm, which floods the town at every shower; then they will earn the appreciation of a grateful community rather than remain in almost criminal inactivity. One gentleman told us that it is because the blue element has no sympathy for Limon why we are neglected; if so then if the red party never wins, we shall soon have no town.

### News Notes

President Roosevelt won his libel case against the editor who called him a drunkard easily, but he asked the court only to impose a nominal amount for damages, but to demand an apology through the columns of the same journal which was done and six cents charged as damages.

Among the passengers on United Fruit boat for New York was Mr. Ed. Mullins, Supt. Motive Power. Mr. Drysdale acts in his stead.

Mr. E. J. Hitchcock, traveling auditor of the Company, has been among us for a few days inspecting the books of the Company. We are all proud to see Mr. Hitchcock.

Scores of passengers came down to Barrios, Guatemala, but as the Company do not want the labourers to leave the country, they announced that no boat is available this week. A German boat, however, is expected for that port this week.

A terrific thunderstorm broke over this place on Monday night, by which the Wireless Station was seen from out town all on fire. The lightning arrester saved the structure. Those who were near said the building and towers rocked as though in an earthquake.

We notice that the British \$ 7,000,000 claim against Guatemala has been amicably arranged for.

The English stallion "White Knight" has been sold in France for \$ 200,000, for breeding purposes, the highest price yet paid for a horse. He won for his owners during his racing career \$ 350,000.

A telephone service has been started in Westmoreland, Jamaica. A company has been

floated for the purpose with 5000 shares of stock.

It is practically settled that the Royal Ulster and the New York Yacht Clubs will meet again in contest for the America's Cup. Sir Thomas Lipton is determined to have that trophy. Seventy-five foot boats will be used.

King George V spent Empire Day at Berlin. His speech was on the desirability of a lasting peace between both empires.

Colonel C. J. Ward Custos of Kingston, Jamaica, has resigned because His Excellency the Governor appointed the Hon. H. A. L. Simpson a Justice of the Peace without his recommendation. This is very regrettable, as Kingston owes too great a debt of gratitude to the gallant Colonel to so lose his services.

Mr. Nethersole, chief clerk of the Jamaican Mutual Insurance Co., has been appointed secretary in place of Mr. A. H. Jones, who resigned from ill-health. Mr. Jones has brought the Company to its present standing and a substantial pension.

Saturday the 24th of May was celebrated as the day of the final separation of North and South America; the two great steam shovels met in Culbra cut and took out the last shovelful of earth connecting the continents.

The S. S. "Imperator" will make her first trip across the Atlantic this month arriving at New York about the 20th of this month. The Kaiser visited the great ship and complimented the builders and owners alike.

The Turks have ceded the island of Cyprus as a coaling station to Great Britain. Meantime the Brazilians have given concessions to the Japs to colo-

nize an immense territory now uncultivated.

Judge Gonzalez Güell has been condemned. He was set down to come up for sentence on the 29th ultimo.

### Squirres Notes Fire Alarm

An alarm of fire was given here at 11.40 by Brakeman Kidd of the Northern Railway. Mr. C. Moya of Lindo & Co and a clerk in Mr. Beltraus' store saved the situation, by rushing to the scene at the south-eastern corner of Rodriguez' store in Salazar's great building.

The fire was set in a bag of straw; two bottles of kerosene oil were found on the spot. It is strange it was set just at the corner where oils and all sorts of inflammable material are stored, so that had the building taken fire, nothing would have saved the town.

It is said that Rodriguez is heavily insured. For some time now it is said that anonymous letters have been received threatening to burn the town.

### A New Society

Thanks to the courtesy of Mr. A. St. Sylvester Brown, President of the Association, we have received a copy of the Statutes of the "Bocas Industrial and Commercial Benefit Union" of that place, which has been fully registered and incorporated under the laws of Panama.

Any of our friends can call at this office and inspect same. It is a very thoughtful and well got-up book.

By the "Central American Express" of May 31st. we notice that the West Indian and Panama Club of Bocas has been incorporated in that Republic as a commercial and agricultural society with Mr. Benj. Phillippo Wynter as its president.

Mr. Sylvester Brown will be here in a week or two to arouse some self interest in the coloured people of this town.

### Sudden Death

A poor woman well-known to the community as Angie went to the Catholic Church on Thursday morning apparently well and fell ill while in service and had to be taken home by friends in a chair and died an hour after.
