The Editor of "The Times".

Dear Sir:

Permit me space in your esteemed little journal to make a few remarks, relative to the means adopted to canvass for labour in the Jamaica market for the U. F. Coy. through the columns of the "Gleaner".

Can the Directors of that journal not see the game Mr. De Lisser is playing? do they conclude that his hand have been kept wide open or closed up? and if closed are they empty or well loaded?

Mr. De Lisser came here from Bocas del Toro, what he experienced there we know not, but what we experienced here is that he arrived here under the escort of the Manager of the Bocas division, immediately boarding Mr. Mullins Car which no coloured mand would have hoped to enter but as a servant he was feasted there and taken away to San Jose and there kept in close confinement within the circle of surveillance of the Companys officers and friends for the four days the steamer remained in Port. He was brought to Limon again in the luxurious Chair Car which arrived here just in time for him to board the steamer at 4 a. m. and sail again for Jamaica.

He goes to Jamaica and writes a most deceiving article as to the customs prevailing among the labourers on the plantations, which cannot but have the effect of inducing thousands of misinformed Jamaicans to leave their country for this post, infact he advises them to do so; some of whom like the writer can always do better at home.

Mr. De Lisser says that the Jamaicans who remain here do so from choice, but had he the opportunity of speaking to a few of us he would have found that it is from anything but choice why most of us remain here, some of us who came here, did so, by being deceived as Mr. De Lisser, is doing now with those at home being told of the golden berries that were dropping from the trees of the Rich coast, most of us came here in the days when a labourer could really make money, but living in a country where all that is thought of, is the following of Godless pursuits, and in a section of the country where the cost of living more than doubles that of any other Central American country we are left in a condition today of "Needs must, the devil drives", where we find ourselves away from home, with the hope of bettering ourselves, but without money to go home and feel recompensed for the years we have spent voluntary exile "as he puts it" from home we are resolved to remain and travel from Republic to Republic, until we either go to Camp One Cemetery or win the Prize and go home.

Mr. De Lisser says that a labourer earns four shillings per day on the farms, and five shillings on the docks and a contractor earns three pounds per week on the farms, but had he the opportunity of asikng disinterested persons of the true situation existing here, he would have been informed that the ordinary dock labourer is only paid eighty cents golds per day and at that sometimes he only gets six or seven hours work on the ships at ten cents gold per day he has no regular days job on the dock, he simply jobs around, no ships to load or unload no work, true he may have to work sometimes at night, for which he gets fifty per cents more, whereas it was formerly twice as much, but this cannot be reckoned on when talking of a mans rate per day because in a climate like this, we see the effects of nightwork by taking a walk to the Cemetery.

On the farms he would have been informed by any of the honestminded Mandadors or Timekeepers that, no labourer is permitted to earn more than six pounds per month, this is by special circular from the Manager at any rate that is what all the Mandadors tell the labourers and the Constructors eight pounds, hence as soon as a Contractor does a certain amount of work, he is prevented from working any more for that month, and since there is absolutely no work done by day labour on the Company's account on the farms, labourers and Contractors alike have to remain idle till the new month begin, hence Mr. De Lisser will find that his information so far as Costa Rica is concerned is a barefaced falsehood; besides it is his business to inform the less informed Jamaican whom he seeks to send here for gold that when he is paid two dollars and fifteen cents per day to get a dollar gold he must pay two dollars and thirty five cents to get that dollar gold.

The Company's idea is that they do not want the men to leave the country hence the Mandador must distribute the

work on their farms among all the labourers he has; mean time Mr. Lindo and the other farmers allow their men to earn whatever they can, if one man can earn twelve pounds for the month they never employ two men for the same job. Mr. De Lisser says that he only spoken to one man is Limon as a Jamaican from whom he gathered his information, but the only man as a Jamaican with whom we saw him speak on his way to the ship was Mr. D. C. De Mercads, but surely althó an employe of the Fruit Coy. that gentleman we feel would have given him reliable information.

These articles are worth a thousand pounds to the U. F. Coy. by way of advertising in Jamaica for labourers, because they have come at a time when the Co. is seeking to flood the country with labour and keep the prices lowered and here we find Mr. De Lisser writing asking the Jamaica government to raise the price of lodgment as demanded by the Immigration law to nearly thrice as much to people emigrating to Panama, so that the people can come to Port Limon and Bocas del Toro.

You will pardon me Mr. Editor for my length but as I feel it an injustice to deceive my country men in this respect I am bound to correct this misleading information.

There is no scarcity of labour in Port Limon, there are thousands of men available for work as is well known but they have all had to seek other modes of living althó it brings them no profit but a scant existence such as burning charcoal farming in vegetables to be able to supply their families needs, who would be glad to jump out again on the Company's farms to work if the Company would only allow them to work the full time on the farms, and give them what they have been accustomed to get for their labour.

EDITORIAL

THE ELECTED MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF
JAMAICA

Those Jamaicans in Costa Rica who have been the means from time to time of assisting to swell the revenue of Jamaica by sending their thousands of pounds to support their old parents and help to pay the rates and taxes, and this prevent them falling under the grasp of the law must naturally feel disgusted and annoyed over the stupid resolution of the Elected members of the Legislative Council.

For years now representation has been made in all quarters of the inadequate protection given to Britishers here as well as the ridicule to which the British flag has been subjected from time to time in consequence of the unfortunately perplexing position in which our Vice Consul is placed, by occupying "as Mr. De Lisser puts it" an exalted position with the Company which employs the greater half of Britishers in Costa Rica. Our men have suffered serious disadvantages in consequence of this oversight, shall we say, of Downing St. and to imagine that on the initiative of The Literary Association, Governor Olivier was made to see the necessity of sending an independent man to protect the interests of the fifteen or twenty thousand Britishers here, who so recommended the idea to Downing St., and to imagine that after the Imperial government should have approved of the project and willingly consented to bear from the pockets of English taxpayers the half of the expenditure necessary to have a good man sent here, that our representatives, should ignorantly refuse to vote the necessary half, and that from the interest of moneys deposited by the very people who have emigrated, is enough if the Secretary of States does not come to our rescue, to warrant the resolution of every Jamaican to go home and sell everything that they possess there, and return here and ask this government to grant us our naturalization papers and a colony of 1000 hectares of land

The Colonial Secretary must be complimented for the determined stand he took in this matter; in our defense; of course one can understand those of the elected members who are heavily interested in banana and other cultivations, as they are there for protesting their own interests and not those of the silly people who put them there, but to imagine that men like Messrs Corinaldi Evans and such like men who have always pretended to be the poor man's champion should have been so short sighted as to refuse to give protection to the people who are the mainstay of the prosperity of Jamaica is appalling.

The critics of Mr. De Lisser will, we hope put by their peculiar feelings re his labour articles of Central America, because he has proven himself a patriot by his rousing article on the foolishness and selfishness of the elected members.

In our opinion a memorial should be sent by our people here to Downing St. thro' the Colonial Secretary, thanking him for his interest in the question and praying the Secretary of States to reconsider the matter and advise some means to afford us the protection he tried to extend us.

A Champion Killed

Luther McCarthy, heavy-weight champion, was killed in the first round by a solar plexus blow from Arthur Pelky at Calgary. He was thought to have died from heart failure, but the autopsy showed that his neck was broken by the blow. The men concerned in getting up the fight have all been charged with manslaughter and are under ball or \$10,000.

The owner of the Cart has claimed £1,500 for damages to his Cart & Mule, and his detention from his daily occupation.

Jamaican Illtreated

On Wednesday evening last the Emil Boaz drew alongside the Pier and while she was discharging her cargo, what occurred we can hardly say, but the second steward was seen chasing and kicking one of the coloured waiters all over the deck, soon after, three others joined and the young man jumped on the Pier and found himself at the British Vice Consulate, which officer informed him that he could not interfere in it, nor did he inform him what course to pursue, he approached the Police, when a Cabo sent a Police with him to the ship for his things, on arriving at the ship, the boy was taken and put in irons and the Police ordered off the ship, Mr. Simon Cohn acting as Instructor, The Police returns to the Commandante and informs him of the insult offered "a la autoridad" whereupon the German Consul is communicated with and a batch of Police dispatched to the ship to release the young man and summon the 2nd officer and four others to appear before the Agent of Police.

The next morning they appear as ordered, they however get up a story that the boy drew a knife at them hence the reason for the fracas, whereupon the judge decides that the boy must be paid off and dismissed rather than be illtreated by four officer, any one of whom would be strong enough to hold the youngster and give him a whipping.

News Items

The matter of bearing half the Salary of the Consul Protector for Jamaicans as recommended by the Home Office, has been unanimously rejected by the peoples representatives in the Jamaica Legislative Council. Every elected member voted against it. Hence probably we shall have no Protector.

Mr. Anthony Charley of Mase Mure estate in Westmoreland is dead. He has been one of the most influential Planters of the Parish.

Inasmuch as we have repeatedly asked the Secretaries of all the Lodges to send in their items of interest, yet they have never done so; we however pick it up along the streets that the election of Officers for the Loyal Phoenix came off on Tuesday when our old friend Mr. James A. Stibble was elected to the chair, we are personally proud that the members of the Phoenix have made such a good selection. Men of confidence and respectability of Mr. Stibble's class are well needed at the head of such organizations just at this moment.

We learn that Grant, the man who was arrested on suspicion for shooting Jackson, left town as soon as he was liberated.

The Mizpah Lodge will dedicate thier Lodge again on Sunday 29th June at 3 p. m.

An alarming scandal among gentlemen from whom no one would expect such a thing is being whispered on the streets, serious defalcations are said to be going on somewhere. In our next we shall be in a position for giving details.

The Police looked pretty lively around town one Monday when the Chagres arrived, word got around that they were on the scent of an American, "we thought Jack Johnson had got away" but we saw them approach McDoswell as Agent of the ship, when a white man was pointed out, but when the identity of a certain gentleman was asked of him, he evasively said "O these are all for the U. F. Coy. It was then that on looking scrutinizingly on the men, we recognized them as immunes.

We learn that Mr. C. De Leon got burnt out in Honduras, it is said to have been done from jealousy of the other fosemen there as Mr. De Leon was given the best Residence and had a free hand to do what he pleased. It is now reported that he has since been shot.

We are pleased to see in our midst Mr. C. E. Richardson brother of our friend the druggist Mr. R. E. J. Richardson of Cairo. Mr. Richardson is studying for destricty in Howard University N. S. A. and has come here to spend his vacation with his Brother in Cairo.

The Times wishes him a pleasant stay with us.

There is before the Courts since Monday last a most dastardly case of Rape said to be committed by an Uncle on his niece, there is however said to be evidence forthcoming to prove the accusation a plot, set by some woman against him.

Jack Johnson has been sentenced to one year and a day imprisonment and \$1,000 dollars fine but he has obtained leave for a new trial again liberated on bail of \$30,000 dollars.

The case against the U. S. F. Coy, as a trust has been postponed indefinitely, but it is likely to be called up at any time again when M. Gregg Asst Attorney General, who has been called to Boston may be able to devote himself again to the matter.

We are proud of don Marcial Alpizar as our representative, he has presented a project to Congress for making Roads and improving Agriculture in this Province, we will give further information as soon as the matter is fully discussed.

Congress has already approved that certain rates will be levied to be appropriated to Roads Construction, fifty cents will be paid per hectaria of uncultivated lands adjoining any Roadway and 25 cents away from Road, two hectareas for 25 cent for cultivated lands away from roads and 25 cents per hectarea alongside of road way, 50 cents head tax per annum on all male inhabitants capable of working a 2 per cent tax per annum on all moneys deposited in any Bank and one per cent on the Receipts of the Customs, these amts as we have said will be devoted to Roads.

Personal

We are pleased to see among us again looking in the pink of health Capt. Owens Marine Superintendent of the Northern Ry Capt. Owens left here in a very precarious state of health some months ago and his many friends are all proud to welcome him back.

He is one of those men that has always stood up boldly for right and justice on the side of his men, it is true that in the execution of his duty he may have to rush up against some fellow, but on the whole he is anything but a hard man to get along with. The Times extends him a hearty welcome.

Our Ice supply

Of late we have not been having much to complain of as far as our supply in this luxury is concerned, but would like to ask Mr. David Lindo who is responsible for this to us, to try and secure an extra supply on Saturdays to last on Mondays, as frequently on Monday evenings we find ourselves minus Ice, possibly another ton on Saturdays would prevent our complaints to which we seem so prone.

Picnic

There will be a picnic on 4th July over the Tuay, got up by Mr. J. A. Murry. The Launch will leave the Pier at regular hours for the convenience of passengers going to it.

New coins

There are to be found on Exhibition at Messrs Maduro and Sons, the new Coins of the Realm of Great Britain. There, will be seen some new coins that have never yet been issued in the kingdom, there are, a penny, two penny, four penny, sixpenny shilling, florin, and half crown pieces in Silver, meanwhile we have in gold, a ten shilling, sovereign, a two sovereign and five sovereign pieces; these coins are ordered at each coronation, and already these are being sold at a premium.

Banana disease

We note by the Jamaica Papers that the Banana disease is making rapid strides in St. Catherine, a commission has been sent out by the government to report on the extent, causes, effects and remedy, we shall watch to see what will be the result of this Commission, we have seen, several commissions and experts brought here by the U. F. Cy. and all sorts of experiments have been made, yet we have never heard anything as to the reports of these Commissions, of course they must have been given, but altho' of a private request, we thought the Cy. in the interest of public good, in an industry in which they are vitally interested, would have said something by way of an advice to our farmers, as to the findings of these Commissions. We have heard of several causes for the disease here, but each exponent, seem to have his own theory and base his findings on his observations in his particular location, but, while we have all seen the effects, no one, but Mr. John C. Wilson seem to claim that he has found the remedy but at such a cost possibly that the poor agriculturists cannot know, we take it that it now rests with the government here to ask the agricultural Society to interview Mr. Wilson, and the Company, and gather from either of these sources what can best be done to save the havoc being done on the plantations around, of course this information may have to be paid for, but when we come to consider that banana is the greatest upkeep of the labour market as well as the mainstay of the Commerce of one half of the country, to say nothing of the immense annual revenue derived therefrom by the government which is all paid for by the farmers, it seem only right that this branch of the government's educational policy, should spare no pains in seeking out every information which will tend to enhance the prosperity of the agricultural resources of the country and issue them out in monthly pamphlet forms to the farmers and leading men in every district.

The lands under cultivation here have come to the stage now when science must be brought to help nature and it is in the place of the government to educate her people into the proper manipulations of the possibilities of our soil, therefore if "Immune bananas" are the means of solving the problem now before the plantations who are being ruined by the devastating ravages of the banana disease, as seem evident by the resolve

of the U. F. Cy. Then it is up to the government, if after investigation it is agreed that immune bananas will save us, to import the plants of this precious article and sell at cost to the farmers desiring for while the U. F. Cy. has imported several Carloads of it the ordinary farmer could not secure a plant under any conditions, if on the other hand technical care must be introduced as Mr. Wilson seem to think, and which solution we also favour then come to an understanding and let us have the benefit of the experiences of those who have earned them. It is hoped that those gentlemen with influence in the capital will bring their influence to bear on the government to begin to interest themselves in better researches in the agricultural branch of education.

Erratum

A wrong impression may have been caused by our article in our last re Weir's defeat in Trinidad, The Jamaica Cycle Club claim that they never sent Weir, hence it cannot be looked upon as an intercolonial contest. He went from Colon after being there without any training or supervision by the Club, and went to the Sports in an entirely private capacity, hence they contend that his defeat cannot be considered to their discredit but to his personally.
